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Mission statement



To support the development of a more sustainable NHS by disseminating Best Practice and informing National Guidance.

The NPAG Sustainability Network Group is a dedicated forum for NHS leaders, managers, and specialists working in sustainability to connect, collaborate, and accelerate progress towards Net Zero. Meeting quarterly, the group provides a trusted space to share challenges, exchange proven solutions, and showcase innovation.

- Facilitate regular discussions for NHS Sustainability Leads to share best practice, lessons learned, and successful approaches.
- Maintain close liaison with NHS England, ensuring a two-way exchange that spreads best practice from the front line and shapes future policy and guidance.
- Host expert guest speakers, technical specialists, and relevant suppliers to bring fresh insight, innovation, and practical tools to members.
- Benchmark sustainability performance across member organisations to identify opportunities and stimulate continuous improvement.
- Promote active member participation through the presentation of replicable case studies, tools, and approaches.
- Champion sustainability as a strategic priority across all NHS organisations, embedding it within clinical, operational, and corporate agendas.

The Terms of Reference are reviewed regularly and will be revisited at the start of the 2025–26 round of meetings.

Executive Summary

The 2024–25 NPAG Sustainability Network delivered a year of rich collaboration, peer learning, and practical problem-solving, bringing together NHS sustainability leaders from across the UK. Four well-attended meetings – three virtual and one face-to-face – combined high-quality national updates with member-led case studies, themed discussions, and opportunities for direct collaboration.

The programme addressed pressing priorities, from Green Plan refreshes and clinical engagement to innovation adoption, data consistency, and leadership buy-in. Members engaged with senior NHS England representatives, gaining insight into evolving national policy, funding opportunities, and practical tools.

Standout features included the integration of clinical perspectives into sustainability planning, exploration of new technologies, and an inspiring "Show & Tell" session in the final meeting, which showcased diverse projects such as electric ambulance rollouts, surgical gas reductions, e-bike trials, biodiversity enhancements, and sustainable catering initiatives. Throughout the year, members demonstrated that sustainable healthcare is both achievable and beneficial, delivering environmental, financial, and patient care gains. The network's strength lay in its willingness to share challenges openly, celebrate successes, and collaborate on solutions.

As the NHS continues its Net Zero journey, the NPAG Sustainability Network Group remains a vital platform for peer support, innovation sharing, and shaping national thinking from a front-line perspective.

Introduction

This year marked my first as Facilitator of the NPAG Sustainability Network, and it has been a privilege to work alongside such committed and innovative sustainability professionals. Across our four meetings, the network has demonstrated its value as a safe, trusted forum where members can learn from one another, challenge ideas constructively, and collaborate on solutions that deliver real-world results.

Meeting Dates, Formats & Membership Oveview

The 2024–25 programme balanced the accessibility of virtual sessions with the depth of engagement that face-to-face meetings enable.

Membership included sustainability leads from NHS Trusts across England, with representation from acute, community, mental health, and ambulance sectors. The network continued to attract new participants, with cross-sector expertise enhancing discussions and collaborative opportunities.

Meeting Summaries

Meeting 1 – 3rd October 2024

Theme: Green Plan Refreshes, Clinical Engagement, and National Policy Update

Presentations: Sammy Fell (NHS England) outlined the April 2024 Carbon Reduction Policy changes, PSDS Phase Four funding priorities, and interim Green Plan guidance. With the official update delayed, Trusts discussed "light touch" refreshes focusing on known priorities. Clinical engagement emerged as a critical challenge, with members sharing strategies such as using Green Champions, aligning with existing clinical goals, and building relationships via stakeholder mapping.

Lessons and Benefits: Members benefited from peer reassurance that proactive Green Plan updates would not be penalised, gained contacts for collaborative EV infrastructure projects, and shared insights on carbon foot printing tools. The meeting reinforced the value of embedding sustainability in mainstream work and maintaining regular engagement channels with NHS England. Attendees left with practical tactics for overcoming stakeholder resistance and ideas for integrating sustainability into operational and clinical pathways.

Meeting Summaries Continued....

Meeting 2 – 23 January 2025

Theme: National Policy, Climate Messaging, and Sustainability in Palliative Care

Presentations: Katherine Calder (NHSE) shared COP29 outcomes, sustainable procurement updates, and the new NHS 10-Year Plan. Brooks Livermore and Justine Etheridge presented a palliative care case study demonstrating waste reduction, resource stewardship, and measurable clinical benefits from small-scale interventions.

Lessons and Benefits: Members debated climate change messaging—balancing urgency with engagement—and explored linking sustainability directly to patient care to gain clinical traction. The group identified an opportunity to create a national sharing platform for Trust achievements, with NPAG potentially facilitating. Participants took away practical approaches such as creating sustainability care trolleys, halving battery use, and reducing single-use plastics. Networking benefits included making contacts for biodiversity net gain strategies, e-bike policy development, and UVC decontamination trials. Members valued peer-led insights into integrating sustainability into everyday care while overcoming time and resource constraints.

Meeting 3 – 3 April 2025

Theme: Green Plan Guidance Delay, Leadership Engagement, and Clinical Integration

Presentations: Katherine Calder (NHSE) urged Trusts to proceed with Green Plan refreshes despite national delays, while Ian Stenton (NHSE) emphasised board-level ownership and systemic integration. Updates included NEEF funding feedback and the upcoming GB Energy Fund.

Lessons and Benefits: Members shared methods to frame sustainability as a patient safety and quality improvement priority, such as reducing anaesthetic gas use or embedding sustainability in QI cycles. Benefits included learning governance templates, gaining examples of successful executive engagement, and networking for EV infrastructure and carbon literacy training initiatives. The meeting reinforced the importance of cross-trust collaboration, practical KPI development, and using local carbon data where national sources lack accuracy. Attendees left with a stronger case for board sponsorship and tools to integrate sustainability into core organisational priorities.

Meeting 4 – 3 July 2025

Theme: Clinical Focus – Mental Health, and Innovation in Sustainability

Presentations: Dr Jacob Krzanowski (Royal College of Psychiatrists) explored embedding sustainability into mental health care, framing climate change as both a public health and clinical care challenge. Jack Stancel-Lewis (NHSE Innovation Service) presented pathways to adopt innovations, from carbon dashboards to Al-powered energy optimisation.

Lessons and Benefits: The "Show & Tell" session showcased tangible successes—from decommissioning nitrous oxide systems to EV charging rollouts and sensory gardens—providing replicable models for others. Members gained practical insights into aligning Green Plans with clinical values, building innovation readiness, and preparing adaptation strategies for climate impacts. Benefits included new contacts for joint pilots, case study sharing, and potential subgroup formation on sustainable mental health models. The meeting deepened understanding of how sustainability enhances care quality, staff wellbeing, and organisational resilience, leaving members motivated to scale proven solutions.

Key Themes & Value Delivered

The 2024–25 programme demonstrated that the NPAG Sustainability Network is more than a meeting forum – it is a trusted, high-value community of practice where members access expert insight, peer-tested solutions, and practical tools to accelerate sustainability delivery across the NHS.

Clinical integration and patient benefit emerged as a central theme. Members learned how reframing sustainability as a patient safety and quality improvement issue builds stronger clinical engagement, from reducing anaesthetic gases to embedding nature-based therapies in mental health care. The network provided case studies, templates, and advocacy techniques to help members secure clinical champions and link Green Plan actions directly to better patient outcomes.

Innovation readiness and adoption featured strongly, with members benefiting from early exposure to cutting-edge tools such as real-time carbon dashboards, Al-powered energy optimisation, and biodiversity baseline mapping. Presentations from NHS England's Innovation Service and peer-led "Show & Tell" segments gave members practical knowledge on evaluating, funding, and implementing new technologies, as well as navigating procurement and governance hurdles.

Peer-to-peer collaboration was a consistent value driver. Members shared templates for board reporting, carbon literacy training programmes, and biodiversity strategies, enabling rapid adaptation and avoiding duplicated effort. Cross-trust partnerships formed around EV charging infrastructure, e-bike schemes, and PSDS funding applications, creating efficiencies and strengthening bids.

Leadership and governance integration was reinforced as a vital enabler. The network gave members tested approaches for gaining board-level sponsorship, embedding sustainability in governance structures, and using metrics to improve visibility and accountability.

Celebrating and scaling success was exemplified in the July "Show & Tell" session, which highlighted replicable initiatives such as:

- Decommissioning nitrous oxide systems to cut emissions and costs
- Waterless urinals saving millions of litres of water annually
- Plant-based catering reducing emissions and improving staff engagement
- Repair and reuse programmes extending the life of clinical equipment
- Sensory gardens enhancing patient experience and biodiversity

The NPAG Sustainability Network's greatest strength lies in its collective expertise, openness, and action orientation. Members leave each meeting with practical solutions, new collaborations, and renewed momentum – turning shared challenges into shared achievements that advance the NHS towards its Net Zero goals.

Looking Ahead 2025-26

The 2025–26 programme will build on this year's achievements with a continued focus on clinical integration, innovation, and practical delivery. Themed sessions will enable deeper exploration of priority areas such as sustainable surgery and anaesthetics, estates decarbonisation, waste reduction, and nature recovery.

A structured blend of three virtual meetings and one face-to-face event will ensure accessibility while maintaining opportunities for in-depth networking and collaboration. The "Show & Tell" format will continue, with added emphasis on case studies linked to measurable impact and board reporting.

Strengthening collaboration with NHS England, professional colleges, and other NPAG groups will remain a priority, ensuring members' voices shape national policy and tools. The network will also explore developing a shared repository of templates, metrics, and practical tools to support rapid local adoption.

By sustaining momentum, embedding sustainability into governance and clinical practice, and celebrating innovation, the NPAG Sustainability Network will continue to help members deliver impactful, scalable change in the drive towards a Net Zero NHS.

NPAG Developments



CPD Certification

The NPAG is a member of the CPD Certification Service. The NPAG NHS Sustainability Network is accredited for CPD approval for 2025-26. CPD Certification is a formal recognition of the contribution that membership of the NPAG Telecoms Best Value Groupmakes to members' continued professional/personal development. At the end of the annual round of meetings, members will receive certificates of attendance for all meetings attended during the year to evidence the contribution made as part of lifelong learning.

NPAGNetwork

The NPAGNetwork provides the facility for members to ask questions of any individuals, group or groups within the overall NPAG membership. Questions can be sent to the NPAGNetwork Coordinator who disseminates them across the NPAG membership. Responses are collated and returned to the originator and others who declare an interest in the question asked.





NPAG Library

Each BVG member is added to the specific group MS Team allowing the contribution of files, links and documents via the Teams Channels. This is in addition to the above and adds an extra means of communication between meetings and is group led.
