CAWA FINANCIAL OUTCOME 2025

The Loss in 2025 of \$87,159 as opposed to the 2024 Loss of \$41,773 was below the budget forecasted loss of approx. 134,000k. This was due to increased revenue to budget for Competition Entries/Ticket Sales, Affiliations & Kiosk Sales. The expected high Maintenance costs that were required for the Theatre did occur. Together with some unexpected storm damage and repairs required. The Theatre repairs and Maintenance costs were \$147,000 with Capital Repairs and New Plant and Equipment expenses totalling \$95,000. Depreciation on the Associations Assets reflected into the Profit and Loss was \$153,000. This is a journal transaction not a cash transaction, but it does affect the result of the profit and loss.

I also note that Income from the 2025 State Team (deposits paid in late 2024) were included as 2024 Member Contributions Income and not accrued as deposits held for the 2025 year. The nett effect to the 2025 Income was approx. \$98,000 on the 2025 accounts. The accounts would have therefore been profitable for the year.

On a positive note, all the core income streams of the Association increased. Affiliation Income increased 10.5%, Theatre Hire Income 9.2%, Comps Entries/Ticket Sales 16.2% and the Kiosk 7.7%. A true testament to the Volunteers and staff who have been overseeing these areas within the Association.

2026 BUDGET

The 2026 budget has been tabled to the Board of Management. The 2026 Budget forecasts the Association back into profitability.

ATO AND SGC REQUIREMENTS

All ATO compliance requirements have been lodged for the year. Superannuation payments are also paid and lodged in accordance with regulations.

CAWA EMPLOYEES – 2025 REVIEW

A full review of pay rates was conducted and amended in July 2025. This was in line with the State Wage increases against the relevant awards.

CAWA INTERSTATE CHALLENGE

In June 2026, CAWA is hosting the Interstate Challenge with Teams from South Australia. The budget for this has been ratified by Board. This event is being run at breakeven costing to keep costs down for all members and visitors. We would like to encourage all our members to support this fantastic event.

In summarising, I would like to thank my fellow board members for their continued support throughout the year. I would also like to thank Alyce our Association bookkeeper for her fantastic work. To Lorraine and Jenny in the office – thank you ladies. Looking forward to a great 2026



Association Information

The financial report was authorised for issue on 15 April 2026 by the Board of Management the Association.

1 Summary of Material Accounting Policy Information

Financial Reporting Framework

The financial statements are special purpose financial statements prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the *Associations Incorporations Act (WA) 2015*. The association is a not-for-profit entity. The committee has determined that the Association is not a reporting entity as the users of the financial statements are able to obtain additional information to meet their needs.

Statement of Compliance

The financial report has been prepared in accordance with *Associations Incorporations Act (WA) 2015* and the basis of recognition and measurement specified by the following Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations.

Basis of Preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on an accrual basis and are based on historical costs. They do not take into account changing money values or, except where stated specifically, current valuations of non-current assets.

Accounting Policies

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of these financial statements.

a Revenue

The Association is first required to determine whether amounts received are accounted for as Revenue per AASB 15: *Revenue from Contracts with Customers* or Income per AASB 1058: *Income of Not-for-Profit Entities*.

a Revenue (Continued)

Funding arrangements which are enforceable and contain sufficiently specific performance obligations are recognised as revenue under AASB 15. Otherwise, such arrangements are accounted for under AASB 1058, where upon initial recognition of an asset, the Association is required to consider whether any other financial statement elements should be recognised (e.g. financial liabilities representing repayable amounts), with any difference being recognised immediately in profit or loss as income.

Revenue and other income

Revenue from contract with customers

- Identifies the contract with a customer;
- identifies the performance obligations in the contract;
 - recognises determines the transaction price which takes into account estimates of variable consideration and the time value of money;
- allocates the transaction price to the separate performance obligations on the basis of the relative stand-alone selling price of each distinct good or service to be delivered; and
- recognises revenue when or as each performance obligation is satisfied in a manner that depicts the transfer to the customer of the goods or services promised.

Variable consideration within the transaction price, if any, reflects concessions provided to the customer such as discounts, rebates and refunds, any potential bonuses receivable from the customer and any other contingent events. Such estimates are determined using either the 'expected value' or 'most likely amount' method. The measurement of variable consideration is subject to a constraining principle whereby revenue will only be recognised to the extent that it is highly probable that a significant reversal in the amount of cumulative revenue recognised will not occur. The measurement constraint continues until the uncertainty associated with the variable consideration is subsequently resolved. Amounts received that are subject to the constraining principle are recognised as a refund liability.

Operating Grants, Donations and Bequests

When the Association receives operating grant funding, donations or bequests, it assesses whether the contract is enforceable and has sufficiently specific performance obligations in accordance to AASB 15.

When both these conditions are satisfied, the Association:

- identifies each performance obligation relating to the grant;
- recognises a contract liability for its obligations under the agreement; and
- recognises revenue as it satisfies its performance obligations.

Where the contract is not enforceable or does not have sufficiently specific performance obligations, the Association:

- recognises the asset received in accordance with the recognition requirements of other applicable accounting standards;
- recognises related amounts (being contributions by owners, lease liability, financial instruments, provisions); and
- recognises income immediately in profit or loss as the difference between the initial carrying amount of the asset and the related amount.

a Revenue (Continued)

Sale of goods

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised at the point in time when the customer obtains control of the goods, which is generally at the time of delivery.

Interest Income

Interest income is recognised using the effective interest method.

b Employee Benefits

Short-term employee benefits

Liabilities for wages and salaries, including non-monetary benefits, annual leave and long service leave expected to be settled wholly within 12 months of the reporting date are measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liabilities are settled.

Other long-term employee benefits

The liability for annual leave and long service leave not expected to be settled within 12 months of the reporting date are measured at the present value of expected future payments to be made in respect of services provided by employees up to the reporting date using the projected unit credit method. Consideration is given to expected future wage and salary levels, experience of employee departures and periods of service. Expected future payments are discounted using market yields at the reporting date on national government bonds with terms to maturity and currency that match, as closely as possible, the estimated future cash outflows.

Defined contribution superannuation expenses

Contributions to defined contribution superannuation plans are expensed in the period in which they are incurred.

c Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprises cash on hand, demand deposits and short term investments which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

d Trade and other receivables

Trade receivables are initially recognised at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any allowance for expected credit losses. Trade receivables are generally due for settlement within 30 days.

The Association has applied the simplified approach to measuring expected credit losses, which uses a lifetime expected loss allowance. To measure the expected credit losses, trade receivables have been grouped based on days overdue

Other receivables are recognised at amortised cost, less any allowance for expected credit losses.

e Property, Plant and Equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value as indicated less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and any impairment in value.

Following initial recognition at cost, buildings are carried at fair value less subsequent accumulated depreciation. The last known revaluation was performed in 2001. The values shown do not necessarily reflect current day values.

Revaluation adjustments are made on a class basis. Any revaluation increment is credited to equity under the heading of asset revaluation reserve except to the extent that it reversed a previous revaluation decrement of the same asset class that was previously recognised in the surplus/deficit.

e Property, Plant and Equipment (Continued)

Revaluation decrements for a class of assets are recognised directly in the profit or loss except to the extent that they reverse a previous revaluation increment for that class. Any accumulated depreciation as at the revaluation date is eliminated against the gross carrying amount of the asset and the asset is restated to the revalued amount.

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets are depreciated over their estimated useful lives commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

Depreciation is calculated on a straight line basis over the expected useful life of the asset commencing from the time asset is held ready for use. The depreciation rate used is as follows:

Buildings	2%
Building Improvements	3% - 15%
Plant & Equipment	4%-40%

f Trade and other payables

Trade and other payables represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the incorporated association prior to the end of the financial year and which are unpaid. Due to their short-term nature they are measured at amortised cost and are not discounted. The amounts are unsecured and are usually paid within 30 days of recognition.

g Income Tax

The financials have been prepared on the basis the Association is exempt from income tax.

h Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the assets or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the statement of financial position are shown inclusive of GST.

2 Critical accounting judgments, estimates and assumptions

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts in the financial statements. Management continually evaluates its judgements and estimates in relation to assets, liabilities, contingent liabilities, revenue and expenses. Management bases its judgements, estimates and assumptions on historical experience and on other various factors, including expectations of future events, management believes to be reasonable under the circumstances. The resulting accounting judgements and estimates will seldom equal the related actual results. The judgements, estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities (refer to the respective notes) within the next financial year are discussed below.

Estimation of useful lives of assets

The Association determines the estimated useful lives and related depreciation and amortisation charges for its property, plant and equipment and finite life intangible assets. The useful lives could change significantly as a result of technical innovations or some other event. The depreciation and amortisation charge will increase where the useful lives are less than previously estimated lives, or technically obsolete or non-strategic assets that have been abandoned or sold will be written off or written down.

Employee benefits provision

As discussed in note 1(b), the liability for employee benefits expected to be settled more than 12 months from the reporting date are recognised and measured at the present value of the estimated future cash flows to be made in respect of all employees at the reporting date. In determining the present value of the liability, estimates of attrition rates and pay increases through promotion and inflation have been taken into account.

MANAGEMENT LETTER 2025

We have now completed our audit of Calisthenics Association of WA Inc. for the year ended 31 December 2025.

Our audit has been conducted in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards. Our procedures included examination, on a test basis, of evidence supporting the amounts and other disclosures in the financial report and the evaluation of significant accounting estimates. While our procedures are designed to identify any material weaknesses and detect misstatements from fraud and error, there is an unavoidable risk that even some material misstatements may remain undiscovered. This unavoidable risk is due to the test nature and other inherent limitations of an audit, together with the inherent limitations of any accounting and internal control system.

Apart from the audit adjustments and differences identified and acknowledged in our representation letter, we have noted the following matters which we believe need to be brought to your attention.

Fixed Asset Stocktake and Valuation

We noted that it has been a while since a stocktake of all assets on the asset register were carried out. Conducting a stocktake of all assets ensures that assets that are held and in use are recorded on the fixed asset register.

We recommend that a stocktake of all assets be done before 31 December 2026. We had also raised this matter following last year's audit.

Additionally, we noted that the last known valuation of the buildings by an independent valuer was done in 2001 and it has been a while since then. We were provided with an insurance report dated 8 September 2023. The insurance report does not represent the current market value of the buildings.

An independent valuation will provide a more reliable estimate of the buildings' fair value. We therefore recommend that prior to the end of the 2026 financial year, you have the buildings valued by an independent valuer and that the valuer shows a breakdown of the land and building.

We take this opportunity to thank you and Robyn Cox for helping us with our queries and providing information as required to enable us finalise the audit.

Rules and Regulations Committee Representative – Karen Quinn

New initiatives introduced to the CAWA Running and Flexible Rules over the past two years continue to be embraced and appreciated by coaches, adjudicators, and our hardworking theatre volunteers.

We continue to review our Running Rules in an endeavour to maximise opportunities for creativity without compromising the smooth and effective operation of our competitions.

Grading of clubs remains a challenge due to low competitor numbers in some clubs.

The grading of our Senior Graceful Section has once again proven successful this year.

Large numbers in some of our younger Graceful sections this year, along with the potential for further growth in 2027, may warrant a review of the grading process.

The ACF Rules Committee is currently reviewing the National Rules. This review, which commenced in 2025, is being conducted in phases over a four-year period to allow for stakeholder input, refinement, and pilot testing where appropriate. It is expected that the review will be completed in 2028.

Stakeholders will continue to be consulted for feedback as the review progresses.

The ACF Rules will remain as currently published for 2026.

CAWA Rules and Regulations

Calisthenics Skills Administrator – Stephanie Humphrey

2025 was a challenging and difficult year for WA Skills.

Applicants completed their exam entry via RevSport. Club coaches were often unaware which candidates had elected to sit an exam, as well as the exam entered to sit.

Many parents completed the application incorrectly entering their own name (not their child's name), and / or their child into the wrong exam. Or they entered their child into multiple exams.

Sadly, entries did not come to the Skills Administrator via clubs leaving a huge jigsaw puzzle to be sorted.

Once entries were finalized Skills prep classes then clashed with State Team trials, followed by exam clashes with State Team training.

Finally, as WA did not have a local Grade 4 examiner available to examine, Grade 4 exams and some Grade 3 exams (due to a conflict of interest) were held on 24th January 2026 (Medal Exam Day) with Michelle Higgins.

WA had 425 exam applicants, a record number of entries with 56 more than the previous year. Of that number, 403 candidates presented for exams, including our 2025 Gold Medal Honours candidates, Sophia Savaris and Sarah Simpson.

For all clubs Test and Grade exams were held in November and December 2025, and January 2026. 257 candidates sat Tests 1, 2 and 3, and 135 candidates sat Grades 1 to 4. Medal exams were held in January 2026. Nine candidates sat Medal exams. WA had a 97.49% pass rate.

To ease the heavy weekend examining load on our local examiners, three weekday evening exam sessions took place. Again, these were favourably supported by candidates and parents.

On Saturday, 8th November Sophia Savaris and Sarah Simpson successfully completed their Medal journey. Both achieved their Gold Medal Honours. Diane Winterling (from South Australia) returned to WA to be our examiner. She thoroughly enjoyed a very busy day examining the Honours performances and adjudicating the 12-Years Solo / Duo Competition.

Diane again acknowledged the dedication shown to the Medal programme by Sophia and Sarah, and their coach, Karen Quinn. She departed Perth inspired by a wonderful day of examining and performances.

WA embraced class exams for Test 1 and Test 2. 175 candidates sat Test 1 and / or Test 2, giving our younger candidates a positive experience as they begin their Calisthenic Skills journey.
