### Discipline and Behavior Management Policy

No child shall be subjected to any form of corporal punishment. Praise and positive
reinforcement are effective methods of the behavior management of children. When children
receive positive, non-violent, and understanding interactions from adults and others, they
develop good self-concepts, problem solving abilities, and self-discipline. Based on this belief of
how children learn and develop values, this facility will practice the following age and

developmentally appropriate discipline and behavior management policy:

### We:

- 1. DO praise, reward, and encourage the children.
- 2. DO reason with and set limits for the children.
- 3. DO model appropriate behavior for the children.
- 4. DO modify the classroom environment to attempt to prevent problems before they occur.
- 5. DO listen to the children.
- 6. DO provide alternatives for inappropriate behavior to the children.
- DO provide the children with natural and logical consequences of their behaviors.
- 8. DO treat the children as people and respect their needs, desires, and feelings.
- 9. DO ignore minor misbehaviors.
- 10. DO explain things to children on their
- 11.DO use short supervised periods of time-out sparingly.
- 12.DO stay consistent in our behavior management program.
- 13.DO use effective guidance and behavior management techniques that focus on a child's development.

### We:

 DO NOT handle children roughly in any way, including shaking, pushing, shoving, pinching, slapping, biting, kicking, or spanking.

- 2. DO NOT place children in a locked room, closet, or box or leave children alone in a room separated from staff.
- 3. DO NOT delegate discipline to another child.
- DO NOT withhold food as punishment or give food as a means of reward.
- 5. DO NOT discipline for toileting accidents.
- 6. DO NOT discipline for not sleeping during rest period.
- 7. DO NOT discipline children by assigning chores that require contact with or use of hazardous materials, such as cleaning bathrooms, floors, or emptying diaper pails.
- 8. DO NOT withhold or require physical activity, such as running laps and doing push-ups, as punishment.
- 9. DO NOT yell at, shame, humiliate, frighten, threaten, or bully children.
- DO NOT restrain children as a form of discipline unless the child's safety or the safety of others is at risk.

### "Time-Out"

"Time-out" is the removal of a child for a short period of time (3 to 5 minutes) from a situation in which the child is misbehaving and has not responded to other discipline techniques. The "time-out" space, usually a chair, is located away from classroom activity but within the teacher's sight. During "time-out," the child has a chance to think about the misbehavior which led to his/her removal from the group. After a brief interval of no more than 5 minutes, the teacher discusses the incident and appropriate behavior with the child. When the child returns to the group, the incident is over and the child is treated with the same affection and respect shown the other children.

### Infant/Toddler Safe Sleep Policy

A safe sleep environment for infants reduces the risk of sudden infant death syndrome (SIDS) and other sleep related infant deaths. According to N.C. ### Staff/Child Ratios

Ratios are the number of staff required to supervise a certain number of children. Group size is the maximum number of children in one group. The minimum staff/child ratios and group sizes for single-age groups of children in centers are shown below and must be posted in each classroom. The staff/child ratios for multi-age groupings are outlined in the child care rules and require prior approval.

# Additional Staff/Child Ratio Information:

Centers located in a residence that are licensed for six to twelve children may keep up to three additional school-age children, depending on the ages of the other children in care. When the group has children of different ages, staff-child ratios and group size must be met for the youngest child in the group.

## How to Report a Problem

North Carolina law requires staff from the Division of Child Development and Early Education to investigate a licensed family child care home or child care center when there has been a complaint. Child care providers who violate the law or rules may be issued an administrative action, fined and/or may have their licenses suspended or revoked.

We, (name of facility), believe that preventing, recognizing, responding to, and reporting shaken baby syndrome and abusive head trauma (SBS/AHT) is an important function of keeping children safe, protecting their healthy development, providing quality child care, and educating families.
Background SBS/AHT is the name given to a form of physical child abuse that occurs when an infant or small child is violently shaken and/or there is trauma to the head. Shaking may last only a few seconds but can result in severe injury or even death <sup>1</sup> . According to North Carolina Child Care Rule (child care centers, 10A NCAC 09 .0608, family child care homes, 10A NCAC 09 .1726), each child care facility licensed to care for children up to five years of age shall develop and adopt a policy to prevent SBS/AHT <sup>2</sup> .
Procedure/Practice
Recognizing:
<ul> <li>Children are observed for signs of abusive head trauma including irritability and/or high pitched crying, difficulty staying awake/lethargy or loss of consciousness, difficulty breathing, inability to lift the head, seizures, lack of appetite, vomiting, bruises, poor feeding/sucking, no smiling or vocalization, inability of the eyes to track and/or decreased muscle tone. Bruises may be found on the upper arms, rib cage, or head resulting from gripping or from hitting the head.</li> </ul>
Responding to:
If SBS/ABT is suspected, staff will <sup>3</sup> :
<ul> <li>Call 911 immediately upon suspecting SBS/AHT and inform the director.</li> </ul>
Call the parents/guardians.
o If the child has stopped breathing, trained staff will begin pediatric CPR <sup>4</sup> .

Prevention strategies to assist staff* in coping with a crying, fussing, or distraught child  Staff first determine if the child has any physical needs such as being hungry, tired, sick, or in need of a diaper change.  If no physical need is identified, staff will attempt one or more of the following strategies <sup>5</sup> :
<ul> <li>Rock the child, hold the child close, or walk with the child.</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>Stand up, hold the child close, and repeatedly bend knees.</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>Sing or talk to the child in a soothing voice.</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>Gently rub or stroke the child's back, chest, or tummy.</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>Offer a pacifier or try to distract the child with a rattle or toy.</li> </ul>
Take the child for a ride in a stroller.
Turn on music or white noise.

### **Application**

This policy applies to children up to five years of age and their families, operators, early educators, substitute providers, and uncompensated providers.

### Communication

### Staff\*

- Within 30 days of adopting this policy, the child care facility shall review the policy with all staff who provide care for children up to five years of age.
- All current staff members and newly hired staff will be trained in SBS/AHT before providing care for children up to five years of age.
- Staff will sign an acknowledgement form that includes the individual's name, the date the center's policy was
  given and explained to the individual, the individual's signature, and the date the individual signed the
  acknowledgment
- The child care facility shall keep the SBS/AHT staff acknowledgement form in the staff member's file.

### Parents/Guardians

- Within 30 days of adopting this policy, the child care facility shall review the policy with parents/guardians of currently enrolled children up to five years of age.
- A copy of the policy will be given and explained to the parents/guardians of newly enrolled children up to five
  years of age on or before the first day the child receives care at the facility.
- Parents/guardians will sign an acknowledgement form that includes the child's name, date the child first
  attended the facility, date the operator's policy was given and explained to the parent, parent's name,
  parent's signature, and the date the parent signed the acknowledgement
- The child care facility shall keep the SBS/AHT parent acknowledgement form in the child's file.

\* For purposes of this policy, "staff" includes the operator and other administration staff who may be counted in ratio, additional

caregivers, substitute providers, and uncompensated pro-	oviders.

### Safe Procedures for Pick-up and Delivery

Rule .1003(b)

Child care programs must establish safe procedures for pick-up and delivery of children to ensure children are protected from danger and not exposed to risk of harm. This includes safe pick-up and delivery procedures for parents, as well as, safe pick-up and delivery procedures for the transportation of children to and/or from the center, to and/or from public/private school programs, to and/or from the child's home, to and/or from off-premise activities, such as, field trips and other education outings. The safety procedures must be communicated to parents, and a copy must be posted in the center where the procedures can be seen by parents. Your safe procedures may include:

- ✓ Time frames, if appropriate, for pick-up and delivery of children
   ✓ Upon arrival, children should be accompanied inside by a responsible person
   ✓ Where the child should be taken upon arrival
   ✓ Who the parent should notify when the child arrives and departs
   ✓ How children should be picked up (i.e. Upon departure, an adult must come inside the facility and notify staff
- Authorization is required in writing when anyone other than the designated responsible person indicated on the child's application arrives to pick up the child.
- ☑ Children should never be left unattended
