It took almost 2,500 years of a revelation process, including Apostolic Tradition, to give us the compete Bible we Christians today embrace as;


"The Written Word of God!"

It Came To Us Through Tradition

- The first serious Christian crisis; Acts 15:1-2
- The solution; The Council of Jerusalem (~49 AD)
 Acts 15:23-28
- "It is the decision of the Holy Spirit and of us"
- This <u>TRADITION</u> of an <u>inerrant</u>, <u>Holy Spirit guided</u>, council, gave us the Bible (46 OT/27 NT Books)
- BTW, this same TRADITION also defined:
 - Jesus Christ is: true God coeternal with the Father (Nicea 325)
 - The Blessed Trinity: three divine persons; Father, Son, Holy Spirit
 - only one God (Nicea 325, 1st Constantinople 381, 4th Constantinople 870)
 - Mary is: the Mother of God (Theotokos) (Ephesus 431)
 - Jesus is: truly God and truly man (two distinct natures) (Chalcedon 451, 2d Constantinople 553)

Without this Tradition the Bible is just another book!


Biblical Revelation Process



In The Beginning

- Genesis 1 11: Things/locations (East?)/times are vague
 - Two creation stories and the first human sin
 - Cain and Abel
 - Noah and the flood
 - The Tower of Babel
- "As literature, GN 1-11 is defined as 'myth,' in which every story seems to describe some sort of model, for bad or for good, of the proper relations of God to the world of humans." - The Catholic Study Bible, Genesis Reading Guide
- "A 'myth' is an imaginative and symbolic story about a reality beyond our (the writer's) comprehension."
 - The Bible and the End of the World, pg 36 (Margaret Nutting-Ralph)
- Biblical Myth & Legend were used to teach salvation truth
- Why would divinely inspired Biblical writers use myth or legend as a form of teaching literature at all?

How Biblical Writers Viewed the World




When the Bible was Written, this was Incomprehensible

Abraham Hears God's Call

- GN 11:31, "Terah took his son Abram, his grandson Lot, son of Haran, and his daughter-in-law Sari,,, brought them out of Ur of the Chaldeans,,, when they reached Haran, they settled there."
- ~1950 BC; GN 12:1 "The Lord said to Abram: 'Go forth from the land of your kinsfolk and from your Father's house to a land that I will show you."
- Events from the time of Abraham on can be placed in the actual historical and social framework of the Near East in the early part of the 2nd millennium BC and documented by non-biblical sources.

Ancient Near East



Key Events/Dates in Bible Development

- ~1950 BC: Abraham hears God's call, GN 12:1
- ~1600 BC: Hebrews arrived in Egypt
- ~1250 BC: Moses leads the Hebrews out of Egypt
- ~1020 BC: Beginning of the Monarchy
 - Saul/David/Solomon,,,
 - This is "probably" when the transition from oral to written tradition began in earnest (first evidence of written Hebrew)
- 922 BC: The Kingdom splits; Judah (S), Israel (N)
- 721 BC: Israel (N) falls to Assyria (10 lost tribes)
- 587 BC: Judah (S) falls to Babylon, exile begins
- 538 BC: Persia (Cyrus) defeats Babylon, exile ends
 - Torah "probably" finalized during or shortly after the exile


Key Events/Dates in Bible Development (continued)

- ~538 516 BC: Temple rebuilt & rededicated
- ~515 398 BC: Restoration (Ezra & Nehemiah)
- ~332 BC: Alexander the Great (Hellenism brings the Greek language & culture)
- ~250 150 BC: The Septuagint Hebrew sacred writings translated into Greek (no OT yet)
- ~175 135 BC: Maccabean Revolt (brought Jewish independence 135 – 63 BC)
- 63 BC: Pompey captures Jerusalem and Israel becomes part of the Roman province of Syria


Key Events/Dates in Bible Development (continued)

- ~7 4 BC: Jesus is born
- ~28 30 or ~31 33 AD: Jesus' public ministry
- ~49 AD: Council of Jerusalem
- 70 AD: Romans destroy the 2nd Jerusalem Temple
- ~100 AD: End of the Apostolic Age (2 Peter?)
- ~200 AD: 1st Hebrew Canon with 39 OT books
- Three Christian Councils; 382 at Rome, 393 at Hippo, 397 at Carthage, defined the Biblical Canon (27 NT + 46 OT = 73 divinely inspired books)
- 1517: Protestant Reformation 27 NT + 39 (Hebrew Canon) OT = 66 books
- 787/1546: II Nicaea / Trent both reaffirmed the 73 book Bible (27 NT + 46 OT)


The Roman Empire

The Debate Over Bible Books

- 19 of the current 27 Books in the NT were generally accepted without debate
- The NT debate involved; Hebrews, James, 2 Peter,
 2 & 3 John, Jude, Revelation, Mark 16:9-20, plus
 41 other various letters, epistles, and gospels
- The 1st Jewish Canon (~200 AD) eliminated; Tobit, Judith, 1 & 2 Maccabees, Wisdom, Sirach, Baruch, and parts of Daniel and Esther from OT
- The earliest Christian communities always used and accepted the Septuagint which included all 46 OT Books we use in our current Catholic Bible

NT Writers Used the Septuagint

- "The quotations from the Old Testament found in the New are in the main taken from the Septuagint; and even where the citation is indirect the influence of this version is clearly seen." JewishEncyclopedia.com, Feb 2012
- Septuagint "Behold, the virgin (Greek, parthenos) shall be with child and bear a son, and they shall name him Emmanuel." – Mt 1:23; Is 7:14
- Hebrew Canon "the young woman, (Hebrew, almah)
 pregnant and about to bear a son, shall name him
 Emmanuel." The Prophet Isaiah (Hebrew Canon)
- Apparently Matthew used the Septuagint!

In Summary

Dead Sea Scrolls:

- Found in 11 caves
- Excavated; 1947 1956
- 981 separate texts (some only in fragments)
- Scrolls dating from; ~385 BC to ~82 AD (predates Hebrew Canon)
- Remnants of all 46 OT Books were found, except Esther

The Real Bottom Line

"Since, therefore, all that the inspired authors, or sacred writers, affirm should be regarded as <u>affirmed</u> by the Holy Spirit, we must acknowledge that the books of Scripture firmly, faithfully, and <u>without</u> error, teach that truth which God, for the sake of our <u>salvation</u>, wished to see confided to the Sacred Scriptures." – Vatican II, Dei Verbum 11
