#### **GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT**

I am pleased to present this year's report on the back of a profit of \$794,118 which is up \$200,878 for the financial year 2021. Our Earnings before Interest, Tax, depreciation, and Amortisation (EBITA) is strong at 25.1% compared with 23.5% for 2021. This result is especially pleasing as it includes a loss at the Country Club of \$227K. The result further emphasises the decisions by the board to invest in commercial real estate, being the RMS site, which is completely debt free. The decision 3 years ago to invest in the gaming room on a new layout, furniture and annual machine upgrades has also assisted in this result.

Towards the end of last year, Hagen and Manuela decided they did not want to execute a new lease over the bistro, so we decided to bring the catering inhouse. It will allow us more flexibility in special offers to members and guests along with trialing different dishes to appeal to more people. Atikur has stepped up from cooking with Hagen to lead the new kitchen with cooks from Bangladesh, Philippines, Nepal, and Australia. It has been a challenge to get a full crew trained up, but we are now open 7 days, and the members draw happening on Wednesday and Friday nights.

A further change occurred last year as Ken Snowden retired from attending to the bowling greens here at the club. Mark and Kieran from the country club have stepped up along with the rest of the crew to take over the maintenance of the greens and have just completed their first renovation of the top green. By all accounts, they have done very well so far.

2023 is shaping as a very different year to 2022 and the result of the state election and presumed labour victory and margin will dictate the success / failure of many clubs into the future. Any changes involving cashless gaming will be introduced over a period and will affect the viability of many clubs over time. For this reason, while the progress of the development at the golf club has been slow, largely due to factors coming out of Covid-19, the board and I are working to ensure this plan is achieved to secure the long term viability of the country club.

I would like to thank all the staff who have worked so hard in both club houses to achieve this result. We have often worked short staffed which has put extra pressure on those staff rostered to work. The course staff, ably lead by Mark have continued to provide an excellent golf course for members and guests and now also bowling greens. Finally, I would like to congratulate Atikur for taking on the head chef role and offer all my support for the future.

No regional clubs can survive without the support of volunteers and sponsors. I would like to thank the volunteers who have helped on the course, in the kitchen or any other duties performed at either club this past year. Also, a big thank you to the sponsors who have supported the sporting committees this last year.

I end my report by thanking the board for their hard work and support in 2022 and look forward to a challenging 2023. To all those members who have supported the clubs these last years, thank you and we look forward to welcoming you in 2023.

#### 1. Introduction

The financial report covers Club Bega Ltd as an individual entity. Club Bega Ltd is a not-for-profit Company Limited by Guarantee, incorporated and domiciled in Australia. The Company was incorporated as a Company limited by guarantee on 13 July 1972 (# 001 011 383) under the NSW Companies Act, 1961, NSW. It is registered with the Australian Business Register - Australian Business Number 97 001 011 383 and is registered for Goods & Services Tax purposes. The registered office and principal place of business of the company is 82 Gipps Street, BEGA, NSW, 2550. The company was formerly known as Bega RSL Club Limited.

The functional and presentation currency of Club Bega Ltd is Australian dollars.

The financial report was authorised for issue by the Directors on 02 March 2023.

Comparatives are consistent with prior years, unless otherwise stated.

The Company is an entity to which ASIC Corporations (Rounding in Financial/Directors' Reports) Instrument 2016/191 applies and, accordingly amounts in the financial statements and directors' report have been rounded to the nearest dollar.

#### 2. Basis of preparation

The financial statements are general purpose financial statements that have been prepared in accordance with the Australian Australian Accounting Standards - Simplified Disclosures and the *Corporations Act 2001*.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

Significant accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and are consistent with prior reporting periods unless otherwise stated.

#### 3. Transition to simplified disclosure

The Company has adopted AASB 1060 General Purpose Financial Statements - Simplified Disclosure for the first time in these statements. Previously the Company prepared statements in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards - Reduced Disclosure Requirements. The change has no impact on the recognition and measurement of amounts in the financial statements. Some disclosures have been added or amended in line with the requirements of AASB 1060.

#### 4. Summary of significant accounting policies

#### a. Income tax

The Company is a Not-for-Profit Entity with a main objective of providing quality sporting facilities in Bega NSW. The Board has reviewed its income tax status and have assessed the Company to be exempt from income tax under section 50-45 of the Income Tax Assessment Act, 1997 (Cth). Consequently, no provision for taxation has been made in the financial statements.

#### b. Borrowing costs

All borrowing costs are recognised as an expense in the period in which they are incurred.

#### c. Financial instruments

Financial instruments are recognised initially on the date that the Company becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

On initial recognition, all financial instruments are measured at fair value plus transaction costs (except for instruments measured at fair value through profit or loss where transaction costs are expensed as incurred).

#### i. Financial assets

All recognised financial assets are subsequently measured in their entirety at either amortised cost or fair value, depending on the classification of the financial assets.

#### Classification

On initial recognition, the Company classifies its financial assets into the following categories, those measured at:

- · amortised cost
- · fair value through profit or loss FVTPL
- fair value through other comprehensive income equity instrument (FVOCI equity)
- fair value through other comprehensive income debt investments (FVOCI debt)

Financial assets are not reclassified subsequent to their initial recognition unless the Company changes its business model for managing financial assets.

#### Amortised cost

The Company's financial assets measured at amortised cost comprise trade and other receivables and cash and cash equivalents in the statement of financial position.

Subsequent to initial recognition, these assets are carried at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method less provision for impairment.

Interest income is recognised in profit or loss.

#### Notes to the financial statements

#### Impairment of financial assets

Impairment of financial assets is recognised on an expected credit loss (ECL) basis for financial assets measured at amortised cost.

When determining whether the credit risk of a financial assets has increased significantly since initial recognition and when estimating ECL, the Company considers reasonable and supportable information that is relevant and available without undue cost or effort. This includes both quantitative and qualitative information and analysis based on the Company's historical experience and informed credit assessment and including forward looking information.

The Company uses the presumption that an asset which is more than 30 days past due has seen a significant increase in credit risk.

The Company uses the presumption that a financial asset is in default when the other party is unlikely to pay its credit obligations to the Company in full, without recourse to the Company to actions such as realising security (if any is held).

Credit losses are measured as the present value of the difference between the cash flows due to the Company in accordance with the contract and the cash flows expected to be received. This is applied using a probability weighted approach.

#### Trade receivables and contract assets

Impairment of trade receivables and contract assets have been determined using the simplified approach in AASB 9 which uses an estimation of lifetime expected credit losses. The Company has determined the probability of non-payment of the receivable and contract asset and multiplied this by the amount of the expected loss arising from default.

The amount of the impairment is recorded in a separate allowance account with the loss being recognised in finance expense. Once the receivable is determined to be uncollectable then the gross carrying amount is written off against the associated allowance.

Where the Company renegotiates the terms of trade receivables due from certain customers, the new expected cash flows are discounted at the original effective interest rate and any resulting difference to the carrying value is recognised in profit or loss.

#### Other financial assets measured at amortised cost

Impairment of other financial assets measured at amortised cost are determined using the expected credit loss model in AASB 9. On initial recognition of the asset, an estimate of the expected credit losses for the next 12 months is recognised. Where the asset has experienced significant increase in credit risk then the lifetime losses are estimated and recognised.

#### ii. Financial liabilities

The Company measures all financial liabilities initially at fair value less transaction costs, subsequently financial liabilities are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method. The financial liabilities of the Company comprise trade payables, bank and other loans and lease liabilities.

#### 5. Critical accounting estimates and judgements

The directors make estimates and judgements during the preparation of these financial statements regarding assumptions about current and future events affecting transactions and balances.

These estimates and judgements are based on the best information available at the time of preparing the financial statements, however as additional information is known then the actual results may differ from the estimates.

There are no significant estimates and judgements which would have a significant effect on the financial statements.

#### 6. Revenue and other income

#### a. Accounting policy

#### i. Revenue from contracts with customers

The core principle of AASB 15 is that revenue is recognised on a basis that reflects the transfer of promised goods or services to customers at an amount that reflects the consideration the Company expects to receive in exchange for those goods or services.

Generally, the timing of the payment for sale of goods and rendering of services corresponds closely to the timing of satisfaction of the performance obligations, however where there is a difference, it will result in the recognition of a receivable, contract asset or contract liability.

None of the revenue streams of the Company have any significant financing terms as there is less than 12 months between receipt of funds and satisfaction of performance obligations.

#### ii. Specific revenue streams

The revenue recognition policies for the principal revenue streams of the Company are:

#### Sales revenue

Sale revenue includes bar sales, poker machine income, catering income, greens income, keno income and TAB income. All of the services and goods for these revenue items are provided to customers at the time of the sale and income is accounted for at that time. If deposits are held for any of these revenue items a liability is booked until the service or goods have been provided to the customer and then for as income.

#### Membership income

Membership income is received in advance for the period of membership paid for. A liability is booked for membership income received in advance with the income spread over the membership period paid for.

#### iii. Other income

Other income is recognised on an accruals basis when the Company is entitled to it,

#### i. Land and buildings

Land and buildings are measured using the cost model.

#### ii. Plant and equipment

Plant and equipment are measured using the cost model.

#### iii. Depreciation

Property, plant and equipment, excluding freehold land, is depreciated on a straight-line basis over the asset's useful life to the Company, commencing when the asset is ready for use. Leased assets and leasehold improvements are amortised over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or their estimated useful life. The estimated useful lives used for each class of depreciable asset are shown below:

Subsequent to initial recognition, the lease liability is measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method. The lease liability is remeasured whether there is a lease modification, change in estimate of the lease term or index upon which the lease payments are based (e.g. CPI) or a change in the Company's assessment of lease term.

Where the lease liability is remeasured, the right-of-use asset is adjusted to reflect the remeasurement or is recorded in profit or loss if the carrying amount of the right-of-use asset has been reduced to zero.

#### Exceptions to lease accounting

The Company has elected to apply the exceptions to lease accounting for both short-term leases (i.e. leases with a term of less than or equal to 12 months) and leases of low-value assets.
