“ I stepped into the role of President of the Board in early 2025, and it has been both a privilege and a responsibility to serve an organization so deeply rooted in lived experience and survivor leadership. Over the past year, we have seen meaningful growth across all areas of SAFE — in our Board, in our survivor-led SAFE Committee, in the services we offer, and most importantly, in the number of survivors we are able to support. We’ve also seen growth in our income, allowing us to expand these services and meet rising needs in our community.

While we are not happy that the demand for our services continues to grow, we recognize this as a clear sign that SAFE fills a gap that too many survivors still face. In 2026, we are preparing to meet that need with renewed purpose, deeper partnerships, and a shared vision for what survivor-centred care and advocacy can truly look like.



SURVIVOR STORY

“ I believe all of [this] has made me the strong person I am today, and now allows me to help others get out of situations I wish I could have had help getting out of. ”



Those are the words said today by an amazing adult woman whose abuse story began at a very young age.

She was molested and human trafficked by her foster brother at the young age of 4 and 5.

She was molested everyday at age 13-14 by her Mom's best friend. She took the abuser to court - who was sentenced to two (2) years but got out early for "good behaviour".

In her early twenties she was ruffied at a bar, then taken advantage of by multiple guys in the bar bathroom while security stood around and didn't do anything.

She has also overcome emotional abuse in a same sex relationship.

Her name is Ashley. She is a survivor and is proud to be a member of the SAFE Committee. She bravely shares her story in the hopes to help other victims of abuse and GBV.

“Leaving was hard and incredibly terrifying, but staying was not an option.”

Those are the words of an amazing woman, Crystal.

She says: “Nothing prepares you for the moment in life when you are left with two very clear choices: stay and die or leave and live.”

Her threshold moment came when she saw her ex-husband on her home security camera with a gun. After all the years of telling her the various ways he thought about killing her, she knew those thoughts were going to become actions.

... her only hope was to leave.

The day she drove away changed the course of her life forever. She loaded up her kids and their pets, put her car in drive, and pressed the gas pedal. She thought to herself *“Is this what it’s like to never go home again? Am I really never going home again?”*

She was both overwhelmed and scared.

- My home
- My family and friends
- My career

She left her home with only what could fit in her car.

One could say that she and her children lost “everything” the day they left their home, but that would not be true. They left behind their material possessions, but they kept their lives. They kept their hope of having a real life, one that was not defined by constant threat.

In Crystal’s own words:

“At 41 years old with two kids in tow, the instant I put the car in drive started a new life of hope, but in the face of incredible fear. Fear of the unknown. Fear of continuing to not be believed. Fear of no one helping. Fear of no one making him stop. Fear of eventual permanent separation from my children, just like I had been threatened with for years.”

Her name is Crystal. She is a survivor and is proud to be a member of the SAFE Committee. She bravely shares her story in the hopes to help other victims of abuse and GBV.

Leaving was hard and incredibly terrifying, but staying was not an option. Now that we are more than one year in our new home, our new life, I know beyond a reasonable doubt that leaving was not only the right choice, but it was truly our only choice. Thankfully, we found people and systems in our new home that have given us protection. I am happy to say that we have found a life of freedom, safety, and stability. My children are thriving and healing, and I am slowly but surely building a new life.

I am blessed to now live in a place with the opportunity to use my voice in the pursuit of freedom and safety for others. I am free to tell my story and use my experiences to encourage others. I refuse to let the sadness and trauma of the past consume me today. Looking forward to the future, I am planning to devote my life to securing freedom, safety, and stability for other mothers and children with similar experiences – everyone has the right to these basic elements of life. My goal is to help every mother know that there is always hope on the other side of the threshold.”



THE SAFE COMMITTEE

“Gender-Based Violence (GBV) is a declared epidemic in Ontario.

Having SAFE there to provide the survivors voice is paramount to supporting victims/survivors of GBV.

Our unique perspective through our lived experience ensures we focus on the needs and voices of those directly affected by violence.”

The SAFE Committee is the heart and soul of SAFE. The Committee is made up of female-identified and non-binary survivors who are no longer in crisis. Their core focus is to provide support and services for victims and survivors and their family members, educating the community through advocacy efforts and speaking engagements, and providing community consultations to organizations who service victims and survivors.

WHO SAFE SUPPORTS



Victims and Survivors

Female-identified, non-binary individuals who have experienced gender-based violence (GBV) or intimate partner violence (IPV).

SAFE supports these individuals to prevent them from before, during and after experiencing abuse.



Support Agencies and Law Enforcement

Professional agencies and police providing professional services to victims and survivors.

SAFE provides a survivor's voice in each step of engagement.



Community and Government

General public and government representatives.

SAFE organizes events to educate the public to recognize GBV and IPV, how to support those in need, and how we can work together to prevent it. SAFE also advocates for survivors to government representatives at all levels.

JUST THE FACTS

- **Every 6 days a woman in Canada is killed by an intimate partner.**

- **1 in 8 women and girls globally have suffered rape or sexual assault before turning 18.**

- **More than 11 million people in Canada have experienced Intimate Partner Violence (IPV) at least once since the age of 15. The rates are higher for:**
 - **Women with disabilities (55%)**






In every way possible I felt safe sharing my experience (trauma, abuse and fears) with the facilitators. I felt the facilitators believed in me and my want/need to work through and process things in order to better myself.

The knowledge, through sharing their experience, was so very supportive knowing that I "had" this group; and, knowing I was going to be able to meet gave me a sense of self prioritizing and a safe place to discuss what the week held.

I am definitely more aware of how my abuse is valid and yet does not define me. I feel connected to a community that exists, not in secret because we need to be embarrassed, but not spoken about because that is not WHO we are.

A community that recognizes my pain and appreciates the strength it took for me to live in it, work through it and come out strong on the other side. It's hard to describe how abuse makes me feel, but I know the ladies in my group understand it and that made all the difference in the world for me to accept myself as a "survivor".



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

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


IMPACT STATEMENTS

“Through our partnership with SAFE, Achēv’s Stronger Together program has significantly strengthened frontline and community capacity to recognize, respond to, and support individuals impacted by gender-based violence (GBV). Together, we have equipped board members, staff, mentors, volunteers, and facilitators across organizations such as Moyo Health & Community Services, Courage in Action, Newcomer Women’s Services Toronto, and the Women’s Centre of Halton with practical, trauma-informed tools they can apply immediately in their work. Staff participants consistently reported increased awareness, enhanced confidence, and accessible strategies for providing survivor-centred support within their programs. This collaboration has also contributed to the creation of safe, empowering learning environments for women, newcomers, and community members. 




IMPACT STATEMENTS

NOTE 1: DEFERRED CONTRIBUTIONS – CONTINGENT GIFT

During the year, the Organization received a commitment of \$2,000 from a donor. The contribution is contingent upon the Organization obtaining registered charitable status, which would enable it to issue an official donation receipt for income tax purposes. As of the financial statement date, the charitable status had not yet been granted. Accordingly, in accordance with the deferral method of accounting for contributions, this amount has not been recognized as revenue and is included in deferred contributions on the statement of financial position. Revenue will be recognized once the condition has been met.
