# **BE ALERT:** Deer, Elk and Moose, Oh My!

We share our roadways not only with other motorists, cyclists, and pedestrians—but also with wildlife. Unlike humans, wild animals don't understand traffic rules, and their unpredictable behavior can lead to serious accidents.

In the U.S., a driver hits an animal every 26 seconds, resulting in the deaths of 1-2 million large animals annually. These collisions cause over 200 human fatalities and more than 26,000 injuries each year.

To reduce the risk and severity of animal-related crashes, follow these safety tips?:

- Maintain a safe following distance, especially at night. This gives you more time to react if the vehicle ahead strikes an animal.
- Slow down in areas marked with wildlife crossing signs or near heavily wooded regions, fields, or where streams cross under roads-particularly during dusk and nighttime hours.
- Use high beams when safe to do so, and watch for the reflection of animal eyes in your headlights.
- Stay alert for groups: If you see one deer, others are likely nearby.
- Drive straight, brake firmly, and blow your horn. Swerving can lead to loss of control, collisions with other vehicles, or running off the road.
- Always wear your seatbelt. While it won't prevent a crash, it significantly reduces the risk of serious injury.

# **PLUG IN YOUR TRUCKS**

Benefits of plugging in

- Easier starts: It warms the engine, making it easier for the engine to start in cold weather and reducing the strain on the battery.
- Less engine wear: A warmer engine starts more smoothly, reducing wear and tear on internal engine parts.
- Improved fuel efficiency: The engine reaches its optimal operating temperature more quickly after a plugged-in start.
- Prevents fuel gelling: Keeping the engine and fuel warm helps prevent diesel fuel from thickening or "gelling," which can clog the fuel filter and cause damage.

## **CHECK TIRE PRESSURE**

Cold temperatures cause tire pressure to drop significantly, and underinflated tires can lead to poor handling, reduced fuel efficiency, and a higher risk of blowouts.

- 1.Use an accurate gauge: A quality tire pressure gauge is the only reliable way to check pressure. Thumping tires with a bat is not accurate enough.
- 2. Check when tires are cold: Always check your tire pressure before driving.
- 3. Verify the correct PSI: Check the tire's sidewall or your truck's specifications to confirm the maximum recommended cold PSI.
  - Steer tires are typically inflated to around 110 PSI.
  - Drive tires are often inflated to around 85-100 PSI

# **Cold weather supplies**

A stocked winter emergency kit is essential for safety in case of a breakdown. A separate kit with truck maintenance gear is also important.

### Personal supplies

- Warm winter clothing, including gloves, a hat, and insulated boots.
- Heavy-duty blankets or a subzero-rated sleeping bag.
- Non-perishable food, water, and a manual can opener.
- A flashlight with extra batteries.
- A first-aid kit.
- A snow shovel, ice scraper, and window de-icer.
- Hand and foot warmers.

### Truck maintenance supplies

- Tire chains for heavy snow and ice.
- Anti-gel fuel additives to prevent diesel from gelling in the cold.
- Extra windshield washer fluid (winter-grade).
- Spare fuel filters, as gelling can clog them.
- Jumper cables (heavy-duty).
- Traction aids, such as sand or kitty litter.
- Reflective warning triangles.

#### For Drivers:

Get adequate sleep before driving, aim for 7–9 hours per night. Be aware of medications (prescription or over the counter)

that may cause drowsiness.

Take responsibility for managing personal health factors that contribute to fatigue.
