## LENT 2025

When I returned to the parishes for a visit on the first weekend of February, I shared a message about "recovery". I offered thoughts about OLV's recovery from the January fire and my own, personal recovery from alcohol dependency leading to a reflection on the renewal and rebuilding of our hearts and souls joined together as a "spiritual temple".

My brothers and sisters, this is the invitation offered to us this Lent. At Our Lady of Victory we will very much be about the repair of our church building. But through this, and alongside it, Jesus who Himself goes into the desert for forty days calls all of us to that "inner repair

work" of spiritual renewal. The Scriptures suggest a three prong approach.

Intensified **praye**r leads to a deeper relationship with God. **Fasting** can make us aware of not only physical hunger, but our hunger for better relationships with the people in our lives and our thirst for justice...and then doing something about it. Our **almsgiving** helps us realize how much we have to share, and that whatever we give can truly be a blessing for others. I know it's a cliché, but I'll say it anyway, with sincerity: may this be the best Lent ever! Let us all find ways to repair and renew our spiritual lives and become ever more pleasing to our God.

# The Silent Apparition at Knock, Ireland

Saint Patrick is easily identified with Ireland, but who is Our Lady of Knock?

On August 21st, a wet dark evening in 1879, the villagers of this place had spent the day doing the usual work of the harvest time of the year – gathering winter fuel and fodder. As evening approached, the heavy mist that had been persistent throughout the day, turned into a steady downpour. The villagers gathered around the turf fires in their homes, taking comfort and shelter on a terrible night.

Suddenly word spread throughout the village that something extraordinary was happening at the Church, and so they hurried to the windswept gable where they witnessed a heavenly vision surrounded in a brilliant white light. Men, women and children gathered in prayer at the gable wall of the parish church.

The witnesses clearly saw the Blessed Virgin Mary dressed in white robes, her hands and eyes turned towards heaven in prayer. On her head was a gold crown, and where the crown fitted the brow, a single golden rose. On her right, bowing respectfully towards her, was St. Joseph. He appeared older, his beard and hair grey, and like Our Lady, he was barefoot.

To Our Lady's left stood John the Evangelist vested as a bishop, wearing a small mitre. He held an open book in his left hand, and in its pages the lines and letters could clearly be seen. He appeared to be preaching, but no voice was heard. He stood so that his back was neither turned to the Virgin nor to the Lamb that stood upon a simple plain altar. Behind the Lamb was a Cross. The witnesses watched and prayed for over two hours, and though they were wet, they noticed that no rain fell upon the Apparition or on the gable.

Many have reflected on the rich symbolism of the Apparition. Those who saw it were immediately drawn to Our Lady's presence, a reflection of the deep Marian devotion of all those present. For

many years after, it was the presence of Our Lady that people were instinctively drawn to.

Devotion to St. Joseph has always emphasized his role as the protector of the Holy Family, and he appears at Knock as a secure gen-

tle presence beside his wife, head bowed reverently toward her acknowledging and reminding us of her unique place in the history of the Church.

St. John the Evangelist stands between Our Lady and the altar and Lamb. It is his Gospel that refers to Jesus as the Lamb of God. He appears to be preaching on the Eucharistic altar, cross and Lamb that is at the very center of the Apparition.

Unique to the Apparition is the presence of the Lamb of God upon the altar, a visual presentation of the gift and mystery of the Eucharist. This central element is not to be found in any other recognized Marian Apparition. Knock Shrine is honored to have been officially recognized as an international Eucharistic and Marian Shrine by Pope Francis, through the Pontifical Council for New Evangelization



When you cross the threshold and enter Knock Shrine, you leave behind the worry and cares of a troubled world and join with your fellow visitors on a journey. Each person who comes to Knock has their own reason for making the journey, however long or short, to experience a unique and tranquil atmosphere.

Knock is a reminder of the faith that has been passed down through generations. Some come searching for answers and consolation, others to reflect and find peace. One thing that is guaranteed is that you will leave Knock Shrine feeling refreshed and renewed. There are no strangers here, only fellow pilgrims....

 Attending St. Andrew the Apostle Church on Chincoteague Island, VA, in a cozy white church (just like St. Elizabeth) that was packed with worshipers and a life-changing statement was made by the priest during his homily, "When you die, will it matter that you have lived?"

At St. Elizabeth it matters that people live! From the smiling welcome at the front door, to the warm greeting of the priest, to the delicious homemade treats and coffee made by parishioners, it's a joy and an honor to "travel" to St. Elizabeth on Sunday mornings!

## **STEUBENVILLE 2025**

Each year a group of teens from our Area Catholic Community (ACC) and their youth ministry team travel down to the University of St. Thomas in St. Paul for the annual Steubenville Conference the last weekend of July. This conference is one of 19 such conferences happening each summer at arenas and colleges throughout the nation. At the conference, teens experience a life-changing encounter with Jesus Christ that ignites their faith, strengthens their prayer life, and empowers them to live on mission long after the conference ends.

Throughout the 3-day weekend, teens encounter the love of Christ alongside 2,100 of their peers. The teens hear from incredible Catholic speakers and participate in Mass each day. There is praise and worship, confession opportunities, Eucharistic Adoration, and so much more offered. They sleep in the dorm rooms, meet new, like-minded people in a safe environment, and experience their faith with their peers. What an awesome way to spend a weekend in the summer!

Teens are welcome to attend as rising 9th graders through the summer after their senior year. College students are welcome to attend as young adult participants up until age 21.

Last year, our ACC brought 28 teens and adults to the conference, with half of our teens experiencing the conference for the first time with the other half of the teens returning for the second, third and even fourth time.

Maria Schroeder, 9th grader and daughter of David and Kelly Schroeder, attended for the first time in summer of 2024. She describes her experience as, "nothing she's ever gone to before." Initially nervous about attending but bolstered by hearing of her older sibling's experiences, Maria came away loving the conference. "I felt like I could do anything faith wise. I didn't have to hold [my faith] back, I could let myself go and not worry [about what other people think.] During adoration, when Jesus in the monstrance was processed around the gym, I just wanted to be closer to Him. Jesus was actually there."

While each participant's experience is unique to them, Maria is not





alone. Many of our teens (and adults!) come away with a renewed passion for the love of Jesus and the Catholic faith.

While I did not attend this conference as a teen, I have been blessed to attend as a chaperone for the past three years. Each year, however, I am blown away by the incredible faith our teens have and the growth they experience as their relationship with Jesus Christ blossoms. Their willingness to step into their faith journey and allow God to work in their hearts reminds me as an adult that I need to do the same.

Each year, the conference has a guiding theme for the weekend. The 2024 theme was ILLUMINATE with the accompanying verse: "The light shines in the darkness and the darkness has not overcome it." John 1:5. This year, the 2025 theme is CONSUMED with the accompanying verse: "For the LORD, your God, is a consuming fire, a jealous God." Deuteronomy 4:24

The 2025 Steubenville St. Paul conference takes place July 25-27.

Our ACC has 45 tickets to share among our three parishes. We are asking for participants to commit to \$100 to help cover the \$345 ticket price and help to fundraise the rest. Funds raised from the annual Ash Wednesday Soup Supper and the donut fundraiser over Palm Sunday weekend go to cover the remaining cost of the tickets and our bus ride for the event.

Travel to Milwaukee for the night.


#### **DAY 2 - SATURDAY**

Holy Hill was declared a Shrine with "Portiuncula privilege" by Pope Leo XIII in 1903. In addition to the main basilica, it contains a **Marian**

Attend Mass at the Basilica of St. Josaphat

The Basilica epitomizes the striving of early Polish immigrants to express their ethnic heritage, spiri-

tual devotion, and patriotic pride by building impressive houses of worship. At the time of completion, the only building in the country with a larger dome was the United States Capitol. It contains a Marian side altar.

### You've Gotta Have Hope...and More

I was feeling pretty punk in mid-January. Maybe I was just being an alarmist, but things entirely beyond my control seemed to be spiraling into chaos. A seemingly endless parade of devastating tornadoes, fires, floods and life-taking heat waves was destroying lives and property in our nation and around the world. Death and destruction in Ukraine, Gaza, Lebanon and other hot spots were increasing, while millions of innocent, defenseless men, women and children (my sisters and brothers all) were facing starvation in places like Darfur, Syria, Sudan and the Congo.

I'm keenly aware that this isn't "the worst of times." The world's been around a long time, and bad things have been part of it ever since Eve ate the apple and Cain slew Abel.

Nonetheless, after returning home from a memorable fun-food-family 90th birthday bash honoring my indispensable, still-beautiful wife of 66 years, I found myself sitting in the same warm, comfortable, safe home in which she and I had raised our four much-loved and very-loving sons. No floods, no bombs, no drones, no bullets, no missiles, no torture, no imprisonment, no starvation—nothing but good! Much more, in fact, than any man deserves.

"Aye," as Hamlet might say, "and there's the rub." What right had I to so much when so many have so little? And how, feeling as I did, could I offer a positive message to readers?

Then followed what I consider an amazing series of events. I knew, of course, that Pope Francis has pronounced 2025 as a "Jubilee Year of Hope." Hope. I certainly needed that.

Not long after, I recalled St. Paul's listing of Hope with Faith and Love—which, as Margaret informed me—are the "Theological Virtues."

And then came, not a divine revelation, but an entirely secular thought. Seemingly out of nowhere came a few words from the Broadway musical, "Damn Yankees."

#### You've gotta have hope, mustn't sit around and mope"

That was it! Yes, Hope was essential. No doubt about it. But the last phrase added the finishing touch. "Mustn't sit around and mope!"

Those who have achieved hoped-for goals such as eradicating serious communicable diseases, becoming a great mother, walking on the moon, winning a championship, discovering ways to make food safer, or just plain being a good person didn't achieve them by sitting around and moping. They achieved them, as I must, by exerting the effort needed to do so. Without that effort I might as well, as my mother might say, hope "until my face turns blue."

So, I'll do as much as I can to hope instead of mope. Perhaps that will help my effort to devote a little more of my time, talent and treasure—coupled, of course, with prayer—to those selfless men and women who continue, despite overwhelming odds, to heal a broken world.

I know that those efforts—no matter how sincere—will do little or nothing to heal that break. At the same time, I will continue-in the hope that my efforts will help make life just a little better for one of my sisters or brothers who has so much less than I.

Of course, it helps to remember, "Whoever gives a cup of water to one of the least...
