
I'm writing right after proclaiming Sunday's Gospel about Jesus coming to earth to ignite a fire. To be clear, we fervently pray to never experience another fire as we did at OLV last January 14. But the fire of God's love and of His Holy Spirit we do hope will burn even more brightly this year than ever before. With the fervor we experience in the faith of so many in these parishes, there's no reason it shouldn't! It's a goal ever before us in our ACC planning process, All Things New.

In his homily on the fire Gospel, Pope Leo referred to the fire of charity which can bring about a more peaceful world. That might serve as one important reminder for us. Sometimes with our fervent faith, and ideas about our Catholic faith, and the particular, personal priorities we have regarding faith practice and involvement, we forget about the greatest spiritual gift and the greatest of the commandments which is namely, love.

What does our faith look like without love? Some versions appear more as competition or an over emphasis on self importance, others like intolerance and exclusion, some like self-righteousness. There's not enough space in this newsletter to get into

specific examples, (and there's no reason to dwell on the negative) so suffice it to say, paraphrasing St. Paul, faith without love can easily lead to sounding like a noisy gong or clashing cymbal....and that's certainly not an attractive, evangelical sound! But we know it when we hear it and it creeps into parish and ACC and church life very easily.

So please, in all we do this year, let us burn with both faith AND LOVE so that those around us and all we meet will always know not only what we believe, but also know of our care and concern for them (our love), and our respect for all that they hold important. Then they can say (or sing!) of us: "They will know we are Christians (Catholics) by our love"! God's blessings and burning love!



Hospitality Ministers

On the Sixteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time (July 20), the First Reading and Gospel were all about hospitality. Abraham and Sarah served dinner to three unknown men



who were standing near their tent. They killed a choice steer, baked bread, and gave the men respite from their travel. The Gospel portrayed the familiar story of Martha and Mary inviting Jesus into their home as Martha prepared dinner for their Guest and Mary sat listening intently to His words. That's essentially what the Greeter and Usher Ministry is all about. These folks welcome parishioners and visitors in all 3 churches of our ACC. The greeters stand at the door and are the first line of hospitality. Some even hold the outside door open, extending hugs to all who enter!

They open the inner doors of the church and offer a friendly smile and welcome to all who pass through. (Just as Abraham, Mary and Martha did for their visitors) The ushers then help those who need accommodations in seating and in receiving Communion. Their task is to take care of all the guests--parishioners and visitors, who are attending Mass. They notice if anyone is in need, take up the collection, and direct people in line to receive the Body and Blood of Christ. Can there be any more important duty than that? Both ministries, greeters and ushers, are among the first people



we see as we enter the church, and their kind and friendly greeting goes a long way in encouraging all to come back and join in the celebration at Our Lord's table again. FAITH FORMATION REGISTRATION SEPT. 17

Registration for Children's Liturgy of the Word (ages 3-6), a program that takes place during the 10:30 Sunday Mass at OLV, will be available before and after Masses on the 13th and 14th of September, and from 4-7 PM on Wednesday September 17 There is no registration fee to participate in this program, but we will accept free will offerings to help cover the cost of materials. The first session will be Sunday 9/28 during 10:30 Mass.

Registration for Faith Formation grades 1-11 will be from 4 to 7 p.m. on

Wednesday, Sept. 17 in the Our Lady of Victory gathering space.

The registration fee is \$50 per student, UNLESS it is the student's Sacraments Year; then an additional \$50 fee is asked for to help cover additional expenses. The family maximum for registration is \$125, plus free registration for children of Faith Formation volunteer teachers. Scholarships are available for those in need.

Faith Formation classes will begin on Wednesday, Oct. 1. Grades 1-5 will meet

from 3:40 to 5 p.m., and grade 6 and up will meet Wednesday evenings.

Second Grade is typically the year students are prepared and receive the Sacraments of Reconciliation (Confession) and First Communion. Students attend the Wednesday afternoon program for this preparation. If a child is older than second grade but has not yet received these Sacraments, special arrangements can be made with Deb Forstner, Elementary Faith Formation Coordinator. Also, grade 11 is typically the year students are Confirmed.

Kampa: Stewardship of treasure: An invitation to trust and generosity


To be honest, when I was asked to write about treasure as it relates to stewardship, I felt a bit of a knot in my stomach. Too often, conversations about stewardship are reduced to money and budgets, to keeping the lights on and paying the bills. But stewardship, when faithfully practiced, is so much more than what we place in the collection basket or how we share the contents of our wallet.

At its heart, stewardship is a way of life. It is a lifelong commitment to discipleship that embraces four pillars of prayer, hospitality, formation and service. It flows from the biblical principle that everything we are and everything we have is a gift from God. It calls us to see ourselves not as owners, but as stewards who receive these blessings with gratitude, manage them responsibly and return them with increase to the Lord.

When we speak of treasure in the context of stewardship, the Gospels are our guide. While the world often measures generosity by quantity, Christ invites us to measure by trust, love and relationship. God, the source of all good things, does not seek our giving out of guilt or obligation. Rather, he invites us to participate joyfully in his mission. Stewardship of treasure is not about financial transactions it is about our relationship with God, our trust in his providence and our transformation of gratitude into generosity.

This is why our giving should never be reduced to merely "pay-

ing the bills." Every offering, no matter the size, becomes part of something greater. A dollar given



Like prayer or fasting, giving is a spiritual discipline that draws us closer to God. Just as fasting frees us from our notions of comfort, and prayer reorients our hearts toward the Lord, intentional generosity loosens our attachment to material possessions. It reminds us that our income, savings and possessions are not the source of ultimate security, but are temporary trusts from God, granted to us for the sake of his kingdom.

The U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops, in their pastoral letter "Stewardship: A Disciple's Response," encourage us to make our giving planned, proportionate and sacrificial. When we give intentionally and consistently, generosity becomes not an occasional impulse but a faithful habit — part of our very identity as disciples.

We must remember that God cares less at the amount of our gifts than about the love they reveal. My office often receives donations of one or two dollars accompanied

by heartfelt notes apologizing for the small size of the gift, sometimes accompanied by explanations of financial hardship coupled with a deep desire to help sustain diocesan ministries. These sacrificial offerings move me profoundly. They remind me of Jesus' teaching in the parable of the Widow's Mite, where a woman gave only two small coins, yet her gift was greater than all others because she gave from her scarcity, not from her surplus, and with complete trust in God (Mark 12:41–44).

At its core, stewardship of our treasure is about love — love for God, love for neighbor and love for the mission of the Church. When we give from a place of gratitude, our offering becomes more than money — it becomes an act of worship. As St. Paul reminds us, "God loves a cheerful giver" (2 Corinthians 9:7). In giving, we draw nearer to the heart of Christ, who gave everything for us.

So, the next time you think about "treasure" and stewardship, I invite you to recognize the deeper truth. It is so much more than numbers, budgets or bills. It is about trust. It is about love. It is about joining God's mission of hope and mercy in the world.
