## MCS FAMILY INTERVIEW

## The Fleming-Lu Family

## Tell us about your family?

We moved to Santa Barbara in 2016 when Will accepted a faculty position at UCSB, where he teaches courses on Japanese literature, language, and culture. Kathy has been able to continue working remotely with Deloitte as a research director and executive coach. Will grew up outside New York and in Northern California (but was born in Milwaukee--accounting for the Brewers baseball cap that Arthur loves to wear to school), and Kathy is a second-generation Asian-American who was born and raised in Virginia. Our family enjoys reading, eating, tending to our small garden, removing our two cats from dining surfaces, playing the piano, dancing, playing tennis (Kathy and Arthur are both beginners; it's hard to say who is progressing faster), and exploring the beach and nature around Santa Barbara. Arthur (7) loves art, researching plants and animals, and playing soccer with his friends. Recently he's also gotten into



skateboarding, where his parents are unfortunately not much help. Edith (3) loves testing her big brother's patience, cruising around at high speed on her scooter, and checking that the water in her water bottle is always "fresh."

## How did you discover MCS?

We first learned about MCS from Will's department chair at UCSB, whose children attended all the way through upper elementary. As it turned out, Arthur entered Navy Door and had the very same head teacher, JoAnn Serpa, who taught Will's chair's children almost twenty years ago!

When Edith was born a few years later, we didn't hesitate to apply for Pre-Primary and were thankful to get her a spot in White Door. She has an October birthday, so she started over a summer session--which ended up being a perfect transition for her personality.

## What made you choose the Montessori philosophy and in particular, MCS for your children?

We love everything about the Montessori philosophy: above all, its fundamentally child-centered approach; the thoughtful, beautiful design of the materials and the environment; the balance of flexibility and order; the ability for each child to set and honor her own pace; the emphasis on empathy, collaboration, and citizenship; the appreciation of learning and discovery over rote teaching and testing; and the encouragement of direct engagement with the child's environment over any reliance on technology or other distracting filters.

MCS won us over at first visit with the calming beauty of its campus, the sincerity of its teachers, the variety of extracurricular classes, and its size, which seemed just right-- not so big that there was no sense of community, but not so small that it felt insular or clique-ish. We also appreciated that MCS did not exude any sense of pretension or extravagance. If it did, we would have felt out of place.

### What stands out about the faculty and staff?

We are constantly amazed by how much they care about each child, and how wonderful they are at what they do.

# How do you feel MCS handled the COVID-19 pandemic?

We don't think MCS could have handled the past school year any better than they did. There was so much evident foresight but also continuous, real-time adjustments that the teachers and staff made to ensure that the year was a success. Even during the period when Edith was physically at school and Arthur was fully virtual, everyone made the best of it. We were incredibly grateful every single day to be able to take our children to school to learn and play with their friends, when so many children around the world were unable to do so. We were confident that the school was always making the best decisions possible on the basis of the available science, and we felt reassured by the apparent alignment of the staff and community. It's certainly stressful living in a time when a stuffy nose means your child is home for two weeks, but it felt like our community was strongly united in doing everything we could to preserve a "bubble" within which everyone was safe and all of our children could continue to go to school.

# In what ways do you enjoy volunteering at MCS?

We're not naturally drawn to official volunteer leadership roles (and wholeheartedly appreciate the families who go above and beyond in more visible roles), but we do enjoy supporting MCS in various ways and contributing to the sense of community. Fond memories include Will's failed experiment during his lesson on mass, volume, and density at Navy Door (it turns out raisins will rise and fall in tonic water, but not unsweetened sparkling water), reading in the classrooms, and staffing various stations at the Harvest Festival with one child or the other in tow. This summer, we look forward to being a host family ambassador.

## What do you love most about MCS?

We love that MCS is a place where children love to learn, where the teachers and staff continue to mix tradition (e.g., UN Day) with innovation (e.g., the anti-bias training workshop for parents, the virtual field trip series, and ever more amazing Science Night events), and where the community generates genuine friendships and a beautiful sense of camaraderie. We also love that Arthur and Edith somehow get to know all the teachers and staff across the school; even if Edith has (very) strong loyalties to her own teachers, it contributes to a great sense of comfort and trust for them both.

# What does your child enjoy most about the Montessori approach to learning?

Arthur loves the satisfaction of continually building upon his own learning to keep discovering new things to try. He also loves working and learning with all of his classmates. When asked to name his friends in Green Door, he invariably names every single person in the class. Edith loves that she is free to do any and all "works" in Red Door. Very much like Arthur, she also relishes the opportunities to learn by observing what other children do.

# How did the new outdoor learning environments benefit your child this year?

Our children thrived this past year and loved being outdoors! As Irene Morales (Green Door) knows all too well, Arthur loved keeping an eye on everything that was happening in all the other classes and doors (and was always able to tell us what Edith did in her PE or music class).

# What are a few aspects of the learning at MCS that you hope your children will carry their entire lives?

We hope that Arthur and Edith will always love to learn, that they will seek to understand what they don't know, and that they will know how to treat all other living creatures with care, kindness, and empathy. No matter what happens in the world, if the next generation learns at least that, there is hope.






# FUNDRAISING REVENUE S Chaucer's Auction Scrip Rest



## MCS Annual Gala

In April 2021, MCS held its first-ever Virtual Auction Benefit, "Embracing What Is Possible, A Celebration of Resiliency." This year's event was interactive and fun for the whole family, as MCS celebrated the community's resiliency during this school year.

# ANTI-BIAS TRAINING FOR PARENTS AND STAFF

Britt Hawthorne is a nationally recognized anti-bias/anti-racist teacher-educator. Britt worked previously with our faculty and staff and we were pleased to provide this training opportunity for MCS parents.

The goals of this presentation were to dismantle the color-blind assumption and prepare children to work toward justice. The discussion shared concrete ways families can support their children's developing racial and ethnic identities. Families learned how to empower their children, affirm their numerous identities, and accept differences.

When we commit to collectively talking about fairness, equality, and justice with young children, we begin to envision a world in which not only children but all people are treated with dignity; free from the burden of unfair assumptions based on a single characteristic. It becomes a world where we actively challenge racism and bias each day.



# A CONVERSATION WITH ALYSSA CARSON

In recognition of International Women's Day on March 8, MCS hosted a virtual discussion with 20-year-old astronaut in training, Alyssa Carson. Her accomplishments are many and in 2013 NASA invited her to be on the MER 10 panel in Washington DC to discuss future missions to Mars live on NASA TV. She was later selected as one of seven ambassadors representing Mars One, a mission to establish a human colony on Mars in 2030. More than anything, Alyssa is driven by an insatiable desire to live life to the fullest; to break through the ceiling of possibility and make a positive and lasting impact on the world.
