# A Message from the Rector

+ SIXFENCHURCHES

One of the things I love in the six Fenland villages where I minister is welcoming the children from the various schools

into church for their Carol services. Last month parents from Lionel Walden

School were delighted to squeeze into the back of St Mary's Church eagerly straining their necks to see their child sing. And they weren't disappointed as the children had all learned their lines and sang beautifully, as they told the Christmas story.



One thing we can be sure of as a Christian country, is that by the time our children leave primary school, they will have

rehearsed and learned the story of the Nativity. But like a lot of children's stories, there are things that are miraculous that don't tend to happen in ordinary life: like Mary having a baby even though she was a virgin; like angels appearing and speaking to Mary and Joseph; or a heavenly host singing to the shepherds. And what about the star that the wise men followed from the East?

As we go through the rest of life, the Christmas story becomes just like other stories we loved as children: old favourites like The Snowman, The Gruffalo or Little Nutbrown Hare saying to Big Nutbrown Hare, 'Guess how much I love you.' As children begin to question how Father Christmas has time to climb up and down millions of chimneys in one night, so the Nativity becomes one more fairy story that doesn't translate into grown up life.

Come the New Year, reality bites, we renew our gym membership, work hard to pay off the Christmas credit card, and struggle to keep our heads above water. It's as if we grown ups can't rely on fairy stories any more, and we become spiritually malnourished. What feeds our sense of wonder, our joy? What gives us hope? How do we recover from tragedy or trauma or betrayal?

Maybe, dare I suggest, that we need to keep feeding our spiritual lives after we leave primary school? The more I look into the bible stories, the more they resonate as accurate historical accounts of a God who knows us, cares for us, and, guess how much he loves us?



As we step into a fresh new Spring Term at Lionel Walden, we are embracing the idea that each day is a new beginning - a chance to grow, to strive and to discover what is possible. Our opening assembly will invite pupils to look forward with hope and ambition while also reflecting on the journeys that have shaped them so far. Throughout the term, we will continue to champion the values that define our school: resilience in the face of challenge, hard work in pursuit of excellence, and the teamwork and inclusivity that ensure every child feels supported and celebrated.


#### **Maths**

An example of children showing these values occurred during Maths Week. Maths Week 2025 took place between the 15th - 23rd November. This annual event celebrates the brilliance and creativity of mathematics and as part of



the week, all classes across the school took part in various mathematical challenges, designed for them to think in different ways and collaborate with others. These activities allowed the children to think creatively about maths and to approach problems from different viewpoints.

In our assemblies during that week, the children learnt about Pi and what it means. Building on this, we also set a challenge in Key Stage Two of how many digits of Pi the children could remember after looking at them for 30 seconds. The three children in each class that could recall the most then participated in a final showdown in a whole school assembly. Well done to everyone who participated in this challenge!



Year 6 took part in a particularly special challenge, which was to investigate using the 'Buffon's Needle' experiment to find the true value of Pi. As part of this experiment, the children had to draw lines on a piece of paper before dropping matchsticks from a height to see where they landed. The children then completed a calculation based on how many matchsticks touched one of the lines. Thousands of year 6 classes from around the country also took part in this challenge to contribute towards a world record effort to find the true value of Pi, as this has never been calculated accurately before.

We have taken part in several competitions based around times tables. Recently, the school was a participant in 'England Rocks', a national Times Tables 'Rockstars' competition involving participants from primary and secondary schools from across the country. We were delighted to finish the competition in 327<sup>th</sup> place out of over 4200 schools! This showed a true excellence and



teamwork as the children came together to compete against much larger schools.

# A Sense of Community

At Lionel Walden, we are proud to play an active part in the wonderful community we belong to. Last term, our choir brought joy to residents at Askham and Doddington Court



care homes and helped mark the village Christmas Lights Switch-On with festive cheer. We have gathered with families and neighbours in the church for our Carol Concert, and we have felt the strength of community support during our Remembrance Service. These moments reflect how deeply we value the people around us. Working together, sharing experiences and celebrating one another helps our pupils understand that they are part of something bigger; an inclusive, caring village community that we should all be proud of.

## **Abbey Recreation Ground**

The installation of the Aerial Runway (Zip wire) and a Cone Climber within the grounds, as additional recreational features for the children, is scheduled to take place in January.

Open sessions within the grounds to enable residents to see inside the newly refurbished Pavilion that can be used for community events, committee meetings, children's birthday parties and the like will be held soon. We will also be seeking your views on how you would like to see other areas redeveloped. Details of these events will be advertised on the Parish Council web and Facebook pages together with notices on the various noticeboards throughout the village.

## Village maintenance

Work will commence in January to replace nine of the Parish Council owned public seats in the village. This will take place over a period of time as a number of the sites will require new or replacement concrete slabs to be installed.

Also in January, we are expecting delivery and installation of a vintage red telephone box to be installed next to the bus shelter opposite the clock tower. This will be fitted out as a book swop facility where residents will be able to deposit and borrow good quality second hand books.

# **Doddington Meridian Markers**

In the September issue of the Doddington Diary I reported that the two wooden markers that sit on the Prime Meridian line in Doddington (zero degrees longitude) had rotted away and fallen over. They had been taken into safe keeping where they currently remain.



Following conversations with several residents it soon became clear that there was an appetite to replace them and to raise awareness and Doddington Parish Council has been supportive of this idea. Over the next few months I will be providing them with feedback from residents, starting to explore any funding or grant opportunities and asking you all for ideas for preferred designs and materials. Options may include wood, stone, metal, recycled materials or a mixture.

Thank you to everyone who has already been in touch. Two significant things I have learnt are; that there seems to have been markers for a lot longer than we thought and that the Meridian Line passes through the Doddington Parish twice.

A gentleman from Benwick kindly called me to say that he can remember there being concrete markers near to the Benwick Road/Floods Ferry Road junction in the late 1950's/early 1960's because he and his friends used to cycle past them. Unfortunately, he couldn't recall when they were replaced with the wooden ones.

I was also told, and later given a map, to show the Meridian Line also crosses Forty Foot - the second location in Doddington.

My husband and I may have been spotted acting suspiciously as we drove slowly along the road watching our GPS on the satnav and waiting for it to hit the magical 0 degrees East and 0 degrees West – so we can be sure we have found the exact spot!

# Map of the Manor of Doddington c1601

A copy of the map of the Manor of Doddington c1601, which included March and Wimblington, has been on display in the March and District Museum for many years, but three years ago a new copy of the original map was made for the Museum.


The original map first came to light in the 1890s when a March solicitor showed it to the then rector of March, Rev Charles Walker. By comparing those named on the map with his parish registers he determined that the map was drawn in 1601 or 1602. The map was presented to the March Urban District Council in the 1920s, but disappeared in 1974 during local government reorganisation and only reappeared when it was placed on loan at the County Archives in 2021.

As well as depicting each house and listing its owner or tenant, the occupied land owners and tenants are also listed. As this was before the drainage of the Fens in the late 17th century, large areas of the fens around the villages are common land and subject to flooding.

For centuries before 1600 the Manor of Doddington was owned by the Abbots and then Bishops of Ely, but during the reign of Elizabeth I, the Crown attempted to acquire some of the valuable manors of the Bishop. This did not happen before Bishop Cox died in 1581 and a new Bishop was not appointed for 20 years, during which time the Crown received the revenues from the manor.

When Bishop Heaton was eventually appointed in 1600 he immediately signed over Doddington and other manors to the Crown and within a few months Doddington was granted to Sir John Peyton, Lieutenant of the Tower of London. Sir John and his descendants retained the manor until 1920. The last Peyton baronet of Doddington died in 1962 when the title became extinct.

The Cambridgeshire Records Society have now produced a 71 page booklet analysing the map, including listing all the householders named on the map.




Included with the booklet is a full size copy of the map in four sheets, the original is 8ft by 2ft 8in and covers approximately a six mile area from Primrose Hill, Doddington to Estover, March.

Copies of the book are available from March and District Museum at £24.

Also available is an earlier publication Jonas Moore's 1658 map of the Great Level of the Fens, also £24.

The Museum will open after Christmas on January 10<sup>th</sup> and on Wednesdays and Saturdays 10.30am until 3.30pm.



## Doddington 80 Years Ago: January 1946

Private Fred Buck, 2nd Bn Cambridgeshire Regiment, the last of the Doddington prisoners of war held by the Japanese, arrived home. He had been captured at the fall of Singapore in February 1942. His return had been delayed, as owing to his poor health condition, he had spent time in hospital in New Zealand following his liberation.

Over 400 people attended the New Year's Eve party in the British Legion Hall. The Christmas tree was stripped of its gifts for the children where Father Christmas was ably assisted by Messrs F Kingham and JT Mason. Mr G Duffield as Old Father Time disappeared with the old year and Mr P Thrower entered dressed in a fairy costume as Miss 1946!

Mr and Mrs WS Fisk of Ingles Lane celebrated their diamond wedding anniversary. Mr Fisk's working life of 40 years had been spent as a lighthouse keeper, serving on the Farne Islands, Eddystone and elsewhere. He had been on duty at Eddystone when that building was opened by the then Duke of Edinburgh in 1882. Mr and Mrs Fisk moved to Doddington in 1930.

Messrs H Ellington and W Curtis completed respectively 50 and 40 years as bell -ringers at the church.

North Witchford Rural District Council, having received instructions from the Ministry of Health, had to reduce the number of houses to be built in the first phase at Manor estate from five to four.

# **Doddington 50 Years Ago: January 1976**

Gales at the beginning of the month caused £25,000 damage to the glasshouses of the David Johnson Group in Benwick Road.
