A Message from the Rector

One of the nation's most favourite hymns is *Amazing Grace*. It was written by John Newton over 200 years ago and it tells the story of his life. He describes himself as a 'wretch'. He



was a sailor, and went off to sea at the age of 11. At the age of 20 he was on ships running the slave trade between Liverpool, Africa and the Caribbean. The crew, including John, treated slaves as if they weren't human. John was an angry and violent young man who often got into trouble.

As he was sailing on a journey back to England on 9th March 1748 John stared death in the face as the ship was caught in a violent storm. Thirty foot waves tore a the rigging and men, livestock and rations were washed overboard. He prayed that his life would be spared, saying 'God have mercy on me.'

After being in the storm for forty hours, the wind stopped and he fell down on his knees and prayed his thanks to God. By the time he reached Ireland four weeks later he had become a Christian, promising to change his life. He quickly realised he could no longer work in the slave trade and be a Christian, and he ended up supporting the abolition of slavery.

This was the story that was the focus of our first ever 'Café Church' held in the Church Rooms on 9th September. There were around 15 to 20 people gathered in an informal and relaxed atmosphere, with coffee, tea and cake. Jenny Holding, who is training to be an authorised lay minister, led the gathering which included singing *Amazing Grace*. If you want a taste of what informal church can feel like, then come along to the next Café Church on Tuesday 14th October starting at 1:30pm.

Earlier this summer I took the funeral of a friend who as young man was a merchant seaman. His ship was travelling across the Atlantic from Norway to Baltimore full of iron ore. He was in a storm for ten days, on watch for two four hour sessions each day. He said with every wave the prow of the ship plunged under the sea and huge waves of water came over the boat and hammered into the bridge-house shaking the whole ship.

If he didn't keep the ship head-on into the waves, they would have capsized. He thought he was going to die. So one night he prayed this prayer, just like John Newton: "O God — if there *is* a God, and You get me out of this — I'm going to clean up my life and I'm going to change things. I'm not going to go on as I've been doing." He did survive, and he did clean up his life. In fact he became a vicar!

We may think stories like John Newton's are from yesteryear. But God is the same yesterday, today and forever. My friend's story, so similar to John Newton's, shows that God answers prayers. If you're in a fix, and need help, cry out to God and don't be surprised if God answers!





Doddington, village of my birth, stands amid Fenland's fertile earth. The A141 with traffic day and night pounds on and on, with heavy-laden juggernauts, cars, buses, motor bikes, all sorts of things disturb the people's peace. Inside St Mary's noises cease - lovely old church among the trees.



The thatched Round House, so neat and smart gets many an admiring glance. Across the road, the village pond, of which some folk are not too fond, but those of us who like wildlife see quite a lot if we observe. In spring provides a shelter of logs for wild birds, moorhens and the frogs.

Lionel Walden School modernised with airy rooms, big window frames, and a lovely playing field for games. In summer sees the children's sports with cups and prizes to be won the Football Club arranges the fun.

The Three Tuns boasts a bowling green, as fine as any to be seen.
On summer evenings men at play enjoy the game till end of day.







The Church Room is a meeting place for Mothers' Union and Sunday School. Once a month Women's Institute meet, have competitions for fruit and jam, knitting, cooking and sewing. Good speakers thrill the members there with talk on pets, verse and beauty care.

Recently formed a young wives group To enjoy informal meetings, or scoot off to London to see a show.

Jumble sales or cheese and wine, all young mums invited to go.

Join in, enjoy themselves, drink tea, make friends, something new to see.

Spring and autumn that smell arrives! Some would have us believe we thrive on this foul stench that creeps right in despite closed doors and windows thin. For fresh air, we need a gas mask As trailer loads pass by - dirty task All this smell to make our food grow, The village farmers tell us so.

Two smart estates so people say are Burdett Close and The Rowans. Way down Wood Street left and right with gardens a spectacular sight.

Clock Tower corner a busy spot. On days when it is really hot a meeting place for old gents who sit and chat on the village seat pass the time of day, spin many yarns and rhymes. or listen to the music coming from the Compton organ played inside the Methodist Church. A really active Sunday School. The 100th Club meet once a month, The Guild, a real Tuesday night treat. The few hard-working members there hold bazaars and cake stalls To raise the money pay for all. Mod cons, new crocks and kitchen bright, it really is a pleasant sight so clean and smart, so nice and bright.

So very proud indeed are we of our County Hospital, that stands along the Benwick Road.
Local people share the load of nursing care, cooking and cleaning.
The "Friends" do their share, raising cash. We all do hope it will not close, So many rumours—no one knows.



VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

Last week we carried out a session in Wimblington, around the time of the afternoon school pick up, to raise awareness of speeding in the village.

In this 30mph zone we had vehicles travelling at 47mph, that is the difference between someone getting hurt and someone getting killed on our village roads.

We really need more volunteers to enable us to do more sessions, raising awareness and slowing down the traffic through the village.

Any drivers found to be exceeding the speed limit during one of our sessions will receive a letter from Cambs Police advising them of the speed limit on that stretch of road and making them aware of the dangers of speeding. Should a vehicle registration be identified exceeding the speed limit by our equipment for a third time, the registered owner will receive a visit from the Cambs Police. Drivers cannot be fined when spotted with our equipment. However, if trends show a particular issue at a location the police will run a session with their own equipment and issue fines.



Get ready for Trick or Treat with these easy to make Spider Biscuits ... or even easier still buy some plain biscuits and just decorate them!

Ingredients

70g softened butter
50g peanut butter
150g golden caster sugar
1 medium egg
1tsp vanilla extract
180g plain flour
1/2 tsp bicarbonate of soda
20 peanut butter cups
(or Rolos or Maltesers)
100g chopped milk chocolate
Icing eyes (or make your own)



Step One

Heat oven to 180C/160C fan/gas 4 and line two baking sheets with parchment. Using an electric hand whisk, cream the butter, peanut butter and sugar together until very light and fluffy, then beat in the egg and vanilla. Once combined, stir in the flour, bicarbonate of soda.

Step Two

Scoop 18-20 table spoons of the mixture onto the trays, leaving enough space between each to allow for spreading. Make a thumbprint in the centre of the cookies. Bake for 10-12 mins or until firm at the edges but still soft in the middle – they'll harden a little as they cool. Leave to cool on the tray for a few mins before topping each biscuit with a peanut butter cup, Rolo or Malteser. Transfer to a wire rack to cool completely

Step Three

Heat the chocolate in the microwave in short bursts, or in a bowl set over a pan of simmering water, until just liquid. Scrape into a piping bag and leave to cool a little. Pipe the legs onto each spider, then stick two eyes on each. Leave to set. Will keep for three days in an airtight container.



Doddington Horticultural Society

The nights are drawing in and the evenings are getting longer. The gardens are starting to fade and it's time to plant the Spring bulbs, evergreens and Winter bedding plants to see us through the next few months.



October is the right time to pick the last summer fruits, dig up root vegetables, protect tender plants and apparently, we should, "Hang tomato plants upside down in the greenhouse to ripen any remaining fruit".

We should also give our garden tools a good clean, tidy the shed, sweep paths and patios, repair fences, clean gutters, sweep leaves, aerate the lawn, prune roses and provide for wildlife. So, there is plenty to keep us all busy.

At the end of the month, it is Halloween, when we start to see pumpkins everywhere. If you and the children are carving pumpkins remember to keep the pulp. If you not using it for pumpkin pie or pumpkin soup you can put some out for the hedgehogs, puree it into ice cube trays to add to the dog's food (full of vitamins and fibre) or even use the puree as a natural remedy to get rid of the dreaded headlice without nasty chemicals. It's worth keeping some puree in the freezer just in case.

The committee have started to review the 2025 Show and plans are already underway for next year, **Saturday 25th July**. Before then we have our Horticultural Society Tombola at the Doddington Christmas Lights event on **Saturday 22nd November** and the 3rd Doddington Scone Off on **Saturday 14th March 2026**. Both will help to raise funds for the Summer Show.

Doddington 80 Years Ago: October 1945

Pte Jack Duffield, 2nd Bn Cambridgeshire Regiment, arrived home from his captivity in the Far East. He appeared to be fairly well, but was loath to disclose much of his experiences as a prisoner of war.

The recently re-hung church bells were dedicated in a ceremony conducted by the Assistant Bishop of Ely, the Right Reverend Gordon Walsh. The tower now contains the five repaired bells dating from 1736/7 and the new tenor bell. At the conclusion of the ceremony a peal was rung by the bell ringers of St Wendreda's, March.

At an auction at the Three Tuns the 40 acre Parson's Land farm was sold for £4,450 to Mr I Fresher. Properties belonging to the late Robert Wade at 36/38 and 16/18 Benwick Lane and house with shop at 63 Newgate were also sold.

Doddington was set a target to raise £8,000 for the final wartime savings campaign which was to be known as Thanksgiving Week. A total of £70,616 had been raised in the previous campaigns in the village. Amongst the events organised was a children's fancy dress parade, the results being: Class 1 (under 6), 1st Tony Hill, 2nd Judith Shaw, 3rd Margaret Behagg; Class 2 (6 to 11), 1st June Kingham, 2nd Richard Hardy, 3rd Frank Payne; Class 3 (11 to 14), 1st Jennifer Henson, 2nd Sheila Driver, 3rd Master H Hudson. The judges were Mrs Wesley Jnr assisted by Mrs Wesley Snr.

A stackyard fire at Ransonmoor destroyed two stacks, one belonging to Mr AW Walker, and the other belonging to Mr C Hurst and containing 19 tons of straw. Both were destroyed but nine other stacks and nearby buildings were saved.

Cynthia Hatch moved her ladies' hairdressing salon from High Street to Benwick Lane. Mr F Redhead of Eastmoor farm transferred his milk round to Harradine's of March.



Doddington 50 Years Ago: October 1975

A report by the Peterborough Community Health Council presented to the Cambridgeshire Area Health Authority concluded that Doddington Hospital should continue as a small general hospital.

First steps were taken to re-form the women's section of the Royal British Legion which had not met for two years. 14 members attended and Mrs G Edgeley was elected chairman and agreed to act for two or three months after which it was hoped Mrs G Mason would takeover. Mrs W Ellington will act as secretary and Mrs B Fisher treasurer.

Mrs Jill Freud gave a talk to the Young Wives Club on her career in the theatre.

The Parish Council were disappointed that plans for 50 houses off Church Lane had been passed by the District Council without taking their objections into consideration, other than reducing the number from 52 to 50. The Clerk was to write to the District Council for an explanation.

The Parish Council was also concerned about the state of the site next to 10 Newgate Street and it was agreed to write to the Planning Department to seek some concrete action in the matter.

A burglary had occurred at Askham House and some antiques were stolen whilst the family were asleep upstairs.


