A Message from Father Peter



As we come closer to Holy Week, we will begin to hear in our scripture readings Christ preparing His disciples and apostles for his passion. For us as Orthodox Christians this is not just a remembrance of the events of Christ's passion, we are preparing to walk with Christ into His Passion. The Church tells us: *Today He who hung the earth upon the waters is hung on the Tree. The King of angels is decked with a crown of thorns. He who wraps the heavens in clouds is wrapped in the purple of mockery.* (Hymn of Good Friday). As we hear Christ speaking of His passion in the gospels He is speaking to us, to prepare us to enter His Passion, to walk with Him, and to stand with the faithful women at the cross. The liturgical services of Holy Week are our presence with Christ.

We begin Holy Week with the services of Bridegroom Matins. We are warned that we must be ready and prepared for the coming of the Bridegroom. The story of the wise and foolish virgins is asking us how we are getting ready to meet the Bridegroom. Will we waste our time and light on self-absorbing comfort, or will we make the time to attend the services of Holy Week with anticipation? The doors of the Church are open for us to participate fully in the events of Holy Week. What is needed is for us to turn the light of desire to be with our Lord. We are told we do not know the time or hour that the Bridegroom will call us, and we need to live in the expectation that He will come today or we will be unprepared.

In the gospel of this week we celebrate with Christ the mystical supper, hearing the words, "Take eat this is my body, take drink this is my blood." We will witness the arrest, hear the false charges, see and hear the mockery and the punishment. Then we will witness how everyone deserted him and ran away. However, some did not abandon him. The women, who were with Him from the beginning, and His mother followed Christ and He will speak to them on the road: "Daughters of Jerusalem, do not weep for Me, but weep for yourselves and your children."

Holy Week allows us to live and understand the sacrifice that Christ made for us and our salvation. We come to the empty tomb with the experience of the women, who stood by Christ throughout His passion. They went early in the morning to anoint a body, and they were given the privilege to be the first to hear that He is Risen! They were commissioned to proclaim this first to the apostles and then to the world. We join the women in the joy and commission to proclaim the good news, by standing with them living in the present with our participation in the services of Holy Week.

I encourage all to make it a priority to attend as many Holy Week services as possible. Let us be the wise virgins who are ready to meet the Bridegroom and be the faithful women who did not abandon our Lord. Let us live Holy Week and make ready our walk to the tomb that brings us forgiveness, love and life.




From St. Basil's House April 2024

Great and Holy Monday

Commemorated on April 29, 2024

Holy Week: A Liturgical Explanation for the Days of Holy Week

3. MONDAY, TUESDAY, WEDNESDAY: THE END

These three days, which the Church calls Great and Holy have within the liturgical development of the Holy Week a very definite purpose. They place all its celebrations in the perspective of End Times; they remind us of the eschatological meaning of Pascha. So often Holy Week is considered one of the "beautiful traditions" or "customs," a self-evident "part" of our calendar. We take it for granted and enjoy it as a cherished annual event which we have "observed" since childhood, we admire the beauty of its services, the pageantry of its rites and, last but not least, we like the fuss about the Paschal table. And then, when all this is done we resume our normal life. But do we

understand that when the world rejected its Savior, when "Jesus began to be sorrowful and very heavy... and his soul was exceedingly sorrowful even unto death," when He died on the Cross, "normal life" came to its end and is no longer possible. For there were "normal" men who shouted "Crucify Him" who spat at Him and nailed Him to the Cross. And they hated and killed Him precisely because He was troubling their normal life. It was indeed a perfectly "normal" world which preferred darkness and death to light and life..... By the death of Jesus, the "normal" world, and "normal" life were irrevocably condemned. Or rather they revealed their true and abnormal inability to receive the Light, the terrible power of evil in them. "Now is the Judgment of this world" (John 12:31). The Pascha of Jesus signified its end to "this world" and it has been at its end since then. This end can last for hundreds of centuries, but this does not alter the nature of time in which we live as the "last time." "The fashion of this world passeth away..." (I Cor. 7:31).

Pascha means pass-over, passage. The feast of Passover was for the Jews the annual commemoration of their whole history as salvation, and of salvation as passage from the slavery of Egypt into freedom, from exile into the promised land. It was also the anticipation of the ultimate passage—into the Kingdom of God. And Christ was the fulfillment of Pascha. He performed the ultimate passage: from death into life, from this "old world" into the new world into the new time of the Kingdom. And he opened the possibility of this passage to us. Living in "this world" we can already be "not of this world," i.e. be free from slavery to death and sin, partakers of the "world to come." But for this we must also perform our own passage, we must condemn the old Adam in us, we must put on Christ in the baptismal death and have our true life

hidden in God with Christ, in the "world to come...."

And thus, Easter is not an annual commemoration, solemn and beautiful, of a past event. It is this Event itself shown, given to us, as always efficient, always revealing our world, our time, our life as being at their end, and announcing the Beginning of the new life.... And the function of the three first days of Holy Week is precisely to challenge us with this ultimate meaning of Pascha and to prepare us to the understanding and acceptance of it.

1. This eschatological (which means ultimate, decisive, final) challenge is revealed, first, in the common troparion of these days:

Troparion—Tone 8

Behold the Bridegroom comes at midnight,And blessed is the servant whom He shall find watching,And again unworthy is the servant whom He shall find heedless.Beware, therefore, O my soul, do not be weighed down with sleep,Lest you be given up to death and lest you be shut out of the Kingdom.But rouse yourself crying: Holy, Holy, Holy, are You, O our God!Through the Theotokos have mercy on us!

Midnight is the moment when the old day comes to its end and a new day begins. It is thus the symbol of the time in which we live as Christians. For, on the one hand, the Church is still in this world, sharing in its weaknesses and tragedies. Yet, on the other hand, her true being is not of this world, for she is the Bride of Christ and her mission is to announce and to reveal the coming of the Kingdom and of the new day. Her life is a perpetual watching and expectation, a vigil pointed at the dawn of this new day. But we know how strong is still our attachment to the "old day," to the world with its passions and sins. We know how deeply we still belong to "this world." We have seen the light, we know Christ, we have heard about the peace and joy of the new life in Him, and yet the world holds us in its slavery. This weakness, this constant betrayal of Christ, this incapacity to give the totality of our love to the only true object of love are wonderfully expressed in the Exaposteilarion of these three days:

"Thy Bridal Chamber I see adorned, O my Savior And I have no wedding garment that I may enter, O Giver of life, enlighten the vesture of my soul And save me."

2. The same theme develops further in the Gospel readings of these days. First of all, the entire text of the

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four Gospels (up to John 13: 31) is read at the Hours (1, 3, 6 and 9). This recapitulation shows that the Cross is the climax of the whole life and ministry of Jesus, the Key to their proper understanding. Everything in the Gospel leads to this ultimate hour of Jesus and everything is to be understood in its light. Then, each service has its special Gospel lesson : On Monday:

At Matins: Matthew 21: 18-43—the story of the fig tree, the symbol of the world created to bear spiritual fruits and failing in its response to God.

At the Liturgy of the Presanctified Gifts: Matthew 24: 3-35: the great eschatological discourse of Jesus. The signs and announcement of the End. "Heaven and earth shall pass away, but my words shall not pass away...."

"When the Lord was going to His voluntary Passion, He said to His Apostles on the way: Behold, we go up to Jerusalem, And the Son of Man shall be delivered up As it is written of Him. Come, therefore, and let us accompany Him, With minds purified from the pleasures of this life, And let us be crucified and die with Him, That we may live with Him, And that we may hear Him say to us: I go now, not to the earthly Jerusalem to suffer, But unto My Father and your Father And My God and your God, And I will gather you up into the heavenly Jerusalem, Into the Kingdom of Heaven " (Monday Matins)
