It's hard to believe that we are in September already and now looking forward to the Autumn Programme. Although the weather has been exceptionally warm it has taken its toll on the


course. Thankfully the ground staff have done a good job on the greens.


Golf Ball Compression: What Is It And Why Does It Matter?

Even though golf ball manufacturers don't talk about compression as much as they once did, it's still an important consideration...

Most balls in most sports compress (they deform or go mis-shaped) at the point of whether impact, football, rugby, tennis and, perhaps most obviously of all, squash, where child can even a young manipulate the ball easily in his hands. her But even or seemingly rock-hard balls such



as snooker balls compress to a degree because impact in many sports can take place at perhaps surprisingly high speeds.



When it comes to golf, all balls feel hard to the touch (other than perhaps any tactile differences between their cover materials) and you would certainly be hard pushed to compress them in your bare hands. But when you factor in that some of the best golfers in the world have driver swing speeds of over 120mph, and even the average male club golfer somewhere between 80 and 90mph, that's an awful lot of collision force between two seemingly hard objects - golf ball and hard metal clubface. Beneath the surface of a golf ball there always lies a core made of various plastic and/or rubber materials.

There may be other layers between core and cover, especially in many of the best golf balls on the market, but it is the compound of the core that largely determines the extent to which the golf ball compresses at impact, and this in turn dictates the amount of energy transferred to the ball



The golf balls of yesteryear would sometimes have their compression stamped on them

In days gone by you will have seen a figure of perhaps 90 or 100 stamped on a golf ball to indicate its compression rating. Compression is a measure of the deflection a golf ball undergoes when it is struck, with values typically ranging from 50 to 100, although at least one version of Callaway's Supersoft golf ball had a compression rating as low as 38.

These days, such figures are rarely, if ever, stamped on a ball, although some manufacturers will still refer to them somewhere in their product features and benefits. This is partly because ball manufacturing has advanced to such a degree, using all manner of high-tech, manmade materials,



that it is possible to make balls that 'feel' significantly different to what their measured compression rating would actually be.

But even if the figures themselves are now largely absent, or certainly less prominent than

once they were, compression is still an important factor in performance as some golfers will find it easier to get greater distance out of a ball they can compress more easily (a low-compression ball) than one that requires greater swing speed to reap maximum benefit from its construction (a high-compression ball).

Swing speed is a big factor in deciding whether you'll be able to reap the full benefits of higher-compression balls Many of the best golf balls for slow swing speeds and the best golf balls for seniors (acknowledging that there will, of course, be some seniors with faster swing speeds!) will be low-



compression models because their cores can be 'activated' more easily at slower swing speeds allowing them to achieve greater distance. Conversely, low-compression balls will compress too much for those with faster swing speeds, meaning sub-optimal performance and most likely a loss of control.

While there are certainly elements of performance in the best premium golf balls from which all golfers can benefit (added feel, spin and control closer to the green) it may come at the cost of compromised distance for those not blessed with the fastest swings as they won't be able to fully 'activate' the core of these higher-compression models at impact.

As an example, Srixon launched two ball models in early 2022 – the new Z Star Diamond and a new Q-Star Tour model. The Z Star Diamond, as played by Brooks Koepka, has a compression rating of 102 and is designed for driver swing speeds of 90+mph;

the Q-Star Tour has a compression rating of 72 and is designed for driver swing speeds of 75+mph, but is otherwise engineered for tour-level performance. In other words, it will be a better distance option for those with sub-tour swing speeds who still want to reap all the other performance benefits of a tour-calibre ball.

In addition to the relationship between ideal compression and swing speed, there is also a school of thought that some golfers might be able to hit low-compression balls a little further than firmer balls in cold weather, and some of our recommended best golf balls for cold weather are, indeed, low-compression models. Golf balls don't go quite as far in the cold because the air is denser, which increases lift and drag so they tend to fly slightly higher and a little shorter. And if the golf ball itself gets very cold, this can also affect the characteristics of its materials resulting in lower initial velocity off the clubface.

"Round of the Month".



On Wednesday 13th August I shot my best ever score, a gross 75 from the White Tees at Welton recording 43 points in the Stableford Competition.

It was a slowish start with 2 bogeys on the 1st and 3rd hole to put me 2 over after 3 holes, but a birdie 3 for 4 points got me started on hole 4. My 'Amen Corner' is 5, 6 and 7, which I consider the hardest part of the course, but this was great for me today scoring 10 points over those 3 holes, with pars at 5 and 7 and a very rare birdie at 6, with a 195 yard approach to 6 foot with a Hybrid 4 and holed the putt for a 4 and 4 points. 2 pars at 7 and 9 with a bogey 5 at 8 gave me a front nine score of 38, just 1 over par, scoring 23 points.


The back nine started well with 2 pars and the 2 bogeys at 12 and 13, both difficult holes and when I recorded a 2 on 14 for 3 points, I knew if I could keep it together over the last 4 a good score was on the cards. My only double bogey of the day was at 15 after a poor drive and 3 shots to get over the ditch but managed to par the last 3 holes, holing a 6-foot putt with about 9 inches of break on 18 to finish the back 9 with 37 shots and a total score of 75, resulting in 43 points. Today, I scored points on every hole with 3 birdies, 8 pars, 4 bogeys and just 1 double.

And a special thanks to my playing partners on the day Garry Gilberthorpe and Colin Taylor, who kept me focused on the day.

The key today was keeping the ball in play from the tee, good approach shots and holing some great putts, helping me to a personal best score of 75 and a 0.8 handicap cut to 10.7. One more good round might finally get me to single figures.

15 RULES EVERY GOLFER SHOULD KNOW

The USGA and The R&A Rules of Golf, effective January 1, 2019.

BALL MOVED



If you move any player's ball (even your own) while searching for it, there is no penalty, just replace the ball.



Ball Moved on **Putting Green**

 If you accidentally move any player's ball (even your own) on the putting green, there is no penalty, just replace the ball.

Once you have lifted and replaced your ball on the putting green, your ball owns that spot. If it then moves, you will always replace your ball no matter what caused the movement, including wind or gravity.

PUTTING GREEN

Repairing Damage

- You can repair almost any damage on the putting green, including:
- Spike marks
 Animal damage
 Any damage from a person or a ball





If your ball hits an unattended flagstick in the hole, there is no penalty.



BUNKERS AND PENALTY AREAS

6 Relaxed Restrictions in Bunkers

> impediments in a bunker, but be careful you don't move your ball when doing so or you'll get one penalty stroke.

- You cannot touch the sand with your club next to your ball, or during the backswing for your stroke.
- You also cannot touch the sand anywhere to test its condition or when making a practice swing.



Areas You are allowed to:

- Ground your club
 Take practice swings
 Take penalty area relief
 Touch water
 Remove loose impediments

TAKING RELIEF

Dropping and Measuring Relief Area



- Your relief area is either one or two club-lengths, measured from the reference point (based on the Rule you are taking relief under).
- Measure club-lengths using the longest club in your bag other than your putter.



 For one penalty stroke, you have two relief options from a yellow penalty area and three relief options from a red penalty area.



- 1 Stroke-and-Distance (red or yellow)
- Back-On-the-Line (red or yellow)
 Drop a ball within one club-length to either side of a straight
 line from the hole through the point where your ball last
 crossed the edge of the penalty area, going back as far as
 you'd like.
- Eateral Relief (red only) Drop a ball within a two club-length relief area measured from where your ball last crossed the edge of the penalty area, and no closer to the hole than that point.
- **Changing Balls** Allowed When **Taking Relief**

You can use your original ball or another ball when taking either free relief or penalty relief.



PLAYING A BALL

Accidental Deflections

> There is no penalty if your ball in motion is accidentally deflected, including by:

- You
 Your equipment
 Your partner
 Your caddie
 A double hit
- Generally, your ball will be played from where it comes to rest.



Search Time You have three



- Help with Alignment
 - Your caddie or partner is not allowed to stand on or close to a line behind your ball while you are taking your stance and until your stroke is made.
 - If you begin taking your stance with your caddie or partner behind your ball, you can back away and start over without penalty.

EQUIPMENT

14 Club Damage

any club that you damage during the round.

Check to see if Model
 Local Rule G-9 is in effect,
 which would allow you to
 replace a broken or significantly damaged club.

Yardage **Books**

> There are limits on the size and scale of green-reading materials that you are allowed to use.




