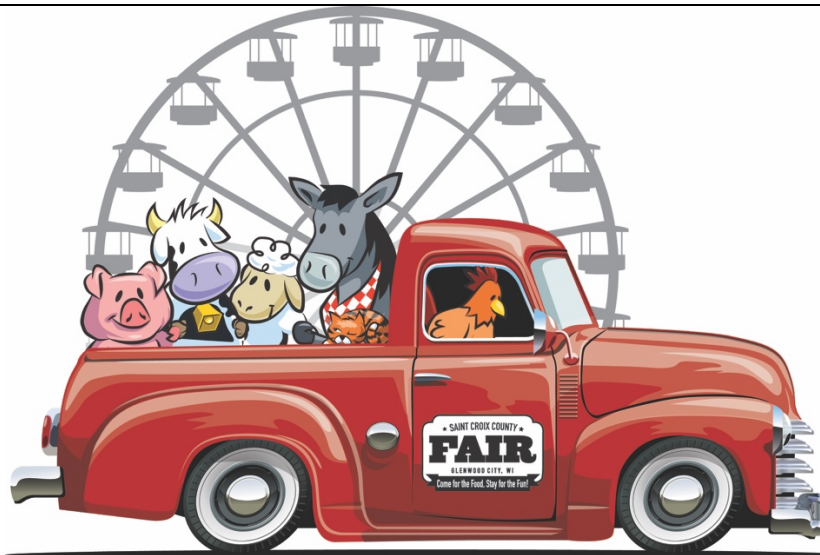

Exhibitors are requested to pay particular attention to their article or animal on exhibit and at the close of the fair take charge of the same. St. Croix County Fair, Inc will take every precaution for their safekeeping, but will not be held responsible for any damage or accident that may occur. Exhibitors will be held responsible for any damage or accident which may be caused by their entries. **NO PETS are allowed on the Fairgrounds, Service Animals specifically trained to aid a person with a disability are welcome.** Dogs participating in the 4-H Dog Shows are allowed on the fairgrounds only on the day of the Dog Shows. **No ATV or Gator type vehicles allowed on the Fairgrounds without permission from the St. Croix County Fair, Inc Board of Directors.**

Parking on the Fair Grounds

\$8.00 per car/per day will be charged for parking on the Fair Grounds **Thursday, Friday, Saturday, and Sunday.** Parking permits will be sold for \$20.00 – the permit is good for parking all days and must be displayed in the vehicle. Parking permits will be SOLD ON WEDNESDAY (11am to 8pm) at the Fair Office and at the GATES ALL DAY THURSDAY AND FRIDAY.

Camping

By action of the St. Croix County Fair, Inc all persons (18 and under) camping overnight at the Fair Grounds will be required to wear wristbands at all times. Camping fees are: \$25.00 per tent, \$35.00 per tent with electricity, \$50 per camper without electricity, \$125 per camper with electricity, and \$160-\$175 per camper with electricity/air conditioning. **Camping registration and further info can be found in the back of the Fairbook.**

JUNIOR FAIR

Premiums will be paid depending on availability of State Aid

Junior Fair exhibitors must be active members of a St. Croix County youth organization with adult leadership and must be residents of St. Croix County or a neighboring county. **Exhibitors may only exhibit in project areas in which they are enrolled, or which corresponds with the educational program of the organization of which they are members.**

Exhibitors must be enrolled in an approved St. Croix County youth organization by March 1 to exhibit at that year's St. Croix County Fair. Organizations must be headquartered in St. Croix County (examples include 4-H, FFA, FCCLA, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Junior Breed Organizations, etc.) This form may be found in the back of this book.

Youth who wish to exhibit at the Junior Fair are **required to register online by May 31. No Late Entries will be Accepted.** If access to online registration is not available, please contact your General Organizational Leaders.

Entry Day at the St. Croix County Fair

All junior exhibitors may pick up their entry tags at the fair office from 10am to 3pm on the Saturday preceding the fair or 11am to 7:30pm on Wednesday of the fair. All non-animal exhibits must be in place by 8pm. School exhibits will be judged on Thursday beginning at 1pm. All animal exhibits may enter the fairgrounds on Thursday only from 11am – 7:30pm, or per department superintendent instructions, and must be settled in place by 8pm.

Face to Face Judging

If an exhibitor is not able to bring articles for judging and another person brings them, the exhibit must be accompanied by a signed Absentee Face to Face Judging Form available at the UWEX Office, or on the St. Croix County Fair website, under Jr. Fair Fairbook. Exhibitors are to bring exhibits from the following departments to judges on Wednesday from 12pm to 7:30pm to be judge.

Foods & Photography

All Foods & Photography exhibits will be Face to Face judged on July 12, 2025 (July 11, 2026). All perishable food will either be sent home following the judging or disposed of. Non-perishable items will also be judged at the Foods Fair, but they will stay at the Fairgrounds in the Junior Fair Exhibit building and will be displayed at the St. Croix County Fair. The Foods Revue and Cake Decorating will be judged the second Saturday in June location to be determined. Please see Dept. 25 for rules.

JUNIOR FAIR GENERAL RULES

1. All exhibits must be the work of the exhibitor and must be work done since the last St. Croix County Fair. All animals and livestock must be shown by the exhibitor unless special permission is granted by the dept supervisor.
2. Only one exhibit per exhibitor in each lot number is allowed. Participants will exhibit only in one particular division(s) that pertains to the project work they are carrying.
3. An exhibitor may call their Club Leader with changes to their entries until May 31 at Midnight. **No changes will be accepted after May 31.** The only exceptions will be in health-related situations regarding an animal. **You must contact the species department head.**
4. 3rd graders are limited to one animal, in one animal species for a total of one animal. 3rd graders may exhibit the animal in showmanship and the appropriate lot. They must be enrolled in that animal project and follow all rules assigned to that project. It is their responsibility to follow all health requirements, rules and regulations.
5. The Junior Exhibit buildings will be closed to the public between 10:00 pm and 9 am.
6. **The decision of the judges is final in all cases.**
7. Each exhibitor of animals must clean their own exhibit area. Exhibitors must bring their cleaning supplies – forks, shovels, and wheelbarrows, and dispose of manure as directed.
8. Exhibits will be released from the buildings on Sunday from 4pm to 7pm and Monday from 9am to 11am. **If exhibits are removed before 4pm exhibitors will forfeit their premium money.** Exhibitors are responsible for arranging to bring and take home their exhibits. All projects must be claimed by 11am on Monday after the fair or they will be disposed of at the discretion of the Fair Board. All animals **MUST** be removed by 7pm on Sunday except those auction animals which will be loaded out on Monday morning.
9. In event of an emergency, refer to the map on the back cover of this Fairbook or ask Fair Personnel.
10. **Cleaning Barns after St. Croix County Fair** – Each Organization is responsible for cleaning their respective animal exhibit area after the St. Croix County Fair. The barns must be cleaned by Monday at 8pm after the St. Croix County Fair. All manure is to be dumped into the manure pits at the end of the barns. **Exhibitors must receive approval from the St. Croix County Fair Association Inc., and provide proof of insurance, if they intend to use a skid steer to clean their area. All operators must be over the age of 18.** Exhibitors in the barns are to pull back the manure 3 feet from the barn walls or dividers before leaving Sunday night if there have been arrangements made to use skid steers to clean the barns. If an Organization doesn't comply the group will be assessed a \$100.00 clean-up charge to be paid to the St. Croix County Fair Inc as well as a premium loss to exhibitors.
11. **NO PETS are allowed on the Fairgrounds, Service Animals specifically trained to aid a person with a disability are welcome.**
12. **ALL ANIMALS NEED TO STAY IN THE BARNs EXCEPT DURING SHOWS.**
13. Bicycles, skateboards, etc. are not allowed on the St. Croix County Fairgrounds during the Fair.
14. No gators or ATVs are allowed on the St. Croix County Fairgrounds without St. Croix County Fair Inc.'s Permission, during the Fair. No one under the age of 16 will be allowed to drive on the St. Croix County Fairgrounds.

FAIR BEHAVIOR RULES

The general supervision of the St. Croix County Fairgrounds, together with the exhibit area, is vested in the St. Croix County Fair Inc which has the responsibility to see that order is maintained on the St. Croix County Fairgrounds.

1. No one will be allowed to smoke in any of the fair buildings including the barns.
2. No one will be allowed to use or possess alcoholic beverages, tobacco, illicit drugs, other intoxicating substances, or weapons in any Junior Exhibit areas including buildings, barns, and fair campgrounds.
3. Persons throwing water will forfeit their premiums.
4. Anyone who is intoxicated or exhibits 'rowdy' behavior will not be allowed in the Junior Exhibit areas.
5. When violations of the above conditions occur, all violators will:
 - a. Be asked to cease the activity or be asked to leave the St. Croix County Fairgrounds.
 - b. Be prosecuted if such activities are violations of the law.
6. Junior Exhibitors who violate behavior rules will:
 - a. Be asked to cease the activity or leave the St. Croix County Fairgrounds and parents will be called immediately.
 - b. Forfeit all premiums for the current fair and immediately remove all of his/her exhibits.
 - c. Forfeit the opportunity to be a Junior Exhibitor at any county, district, regional, state, or national event for a period of 12 months from the time of the violation.

CODE OF CONDUCT / BEHAVIOR EXPECTATIONS

All youth represent their respective program. It is important to behave in a manner that reflects positively. All Junior Fair Exhibitors participating in the St. Croix County Fair are expected to adhere to this code of conduct:

1. Demonstrate healthy choices. Possession and/or use of alcohol, tobacco, weapons, illicit drugs or medications(s) is forbidden. Adults overseeing the activity need to be informed of medication prescribed to the member and/or over the counter medications approved by the parent(s).
2. Exhibit mutual respect for all participants. Use of language and gestures found to be objectionable to others is not permitted.
3. Use good judgment in dress. Revealing attire is not acceptable, such as extremely low-cut tops, short shorts and thong swimming suits are not allowed. Do not wear t-shirts with obscene language/pictures or with drug, tobacco or alcohol advertising printed on them. Closed toe shoes are to be worn by all exhibitors in the barns.
4. Avoid overt public displays of affection.
5. Be respectful of property and facilities. Do not damage or destroy public or private property.
6. Behave in accordance with applicable federal, state and municipal laws.

Supervising adults will take the following steps for violations of this code of conduct:

1. Counsel with involved youth privately to reach an understanding and stop the inappropriate behavior.
2. Take disciplinary actions at the time of occurrence. This may consist of restriction of privileges, apology to the group, additional duties, etc. Physical punishment is not appropriate.
3. Inform parents and the leader of the appropriate youth organization of misbehavior at time of occurrence if supervising adult feels severity of situation warrants such immediate notification.
4. When the infraction is serious, decide as part of a committee of at least two adults to remove a youth from the activity and send him/her home immediately.
5. Write a letter describing the disruptive behavior to be sent to the youth's parents, along with an incident report to be filed with the Fair Office, within 10 days after the activity/incident.

Consequences of violations will result in the following disciplinary action:

1. Families of youth removed from the activity will be responsible for the youths' transportation home. Youth removed from the activity will wait with the supervising adult until parents arrive.
2. If damage/destruction of property occurred, youth will be assessed for the cost of the damages and repairs.
3. Youth will be subject to the disciplinary actions of the organization they represent at the County Fair.
4. Youth who break public laws will be subject to legal action by law enforcement authorities.

Steps for an appeals process:

1. Youth who wish to appeal the disciplinary action may do so within 5 days of the violation.
2. Youth(s) involved must request a meeting with the disciplinary committee which will consist of at least three members from the appropriate organization(s): St. Croix County Fair Board, 4-H leaders' Council, County Committee Member, UW-Extension, FFA, etc.
3. The meeting to review the disciplinary action will be scheduled within 15 days of the request.

ATCP CHAPTER 160 – COUNTY & DISTRICT FAIR STATE AID

SUBCHAPTER 1 - GENERAL REQUIREMENTS AND DEFINITIONS

ATCP 160.01 Definitions. As used in this chapter:

- (1) “Breed class” and “breeding class” mean a specific breed within a class such as holstein in the dairy class.
- (2) “Class” means a grouping in which exhibits may be entered, including an animal breed or age group for animal exhibits; a type of produce, crop or food; or a specific age, age group or educational grade level of exhibitor.
- (2m) “Conference judging” means a judging system using a discussion about each exhibit with the entire group.
- (3) “Danish judging system” means a judging system that allows for multiple first, second, third and fourth class selections as provided in s. [ATCP 160.91 \(4\) \(b\)](#).
- (4) “Department” as it relates to the organizational structure of a fair, means an animal species, production group, or other principal classification of exhibits. As used in any other context, “department” means the state of Wisconsin department of agriculture, trade and consumer protection.
- (5) “Division” means one of 3 exhibitor group classifications for a fair and is limited to junior division, open division and senior citizens division.
- (6) “Entry class” means a class in which the fair allows exhibitors to submit entries.
- (7) “Exotic domestic animal” means an animal that is not a common farm animal.
- (7e) “Face-to-face judging” means a judging system using a semiprivate discussion between the judge and the exhibitor with the following phases:
 - (a) Get acquainted.
 - (b) Learn the background of the exhibit.
 - (c) Self-evaluation.
 - (d) Evaluator comment.
 - (e) Parting.
- (7m) “Fair” means a county or district fair eligible to receive state aid under s. [93.23 \(1\) \(b\)](#) or [\(c\)](#), Stats.
- (7s) “Fair board” means the governing entity of a fair.
- (8) “Lot” or “lot number” means the numerical designation assigned by a fair for a specific category of exhibits within a class.
- (9) “Market class” means a class that includes animals of a certain weight for the species that can be sold for slaughter.
- (10) “Premium” means a monetary prize that a fair awards to an exhibitor after judging all competing exhibits in the class to which the premium pertains.
- (11) “Regular judging system” means a judging system that allows for one first, second, third and fourth class selection as provided in s. [ATCP 160.91 \(4\) \(c\)](#).
- (12) “Self determined project” means a project that meets all of the following criteria:
 - (a) It is approved by the fair board.
 - (b) Its subject matter is related to any of the junior fair departments 9, 10, 13 to 16, 18, or 20 to 29.
 - (c) It does not fall into a defined entry class within any department.

- (d) It is carried out by a member of a youth organization.
- (13) “Youth organization” means an organization under adult leadership that has educational programming.

ATCP 160.02 Premium Requirements.

- (1) GENERAL.
 - (a) The state aid authorized by s. [93.23 \(1\)](#), Stats., may be paid on net premiums paid by a fair. The department may withhold state premium aid from any fair that does not enforce animal health provisions under ch. [ATCP 10](#) that are applicable to animals exhibited at the fair. State aid will be paid only on premiums actually paid by bank check or draft.
 - (b) No deductions may be made from premium money won by an exhibitor. Premiums may, however, be withheld where exhibition rules established by the fair association are violated. A written statement of violation shall be submitted to the department to justify actions taken by a fair.
 - (c) Premiums offered shall be definite in amount. No decrease or increase in published premiums may be made because of the financial condition or the organization or for any other reason.
 - (e) No fair may receive state aid for a premium awarded to any exhibitor in the open division if that exhibitor entered the same exhibit in the junior division at the same fair. This paragraph does not apply if the exhibit was entered in the junior division only as part of a herd group, carcass class or performance class.
 - (f) No state aid will be paid on the cost of ribbons, cups, trophy prizes or entertainment contests.
- (2) PREMIUM LISTS.
 - (a) Premiums for which state aid is requested by county and district fairs shall conform with the uniform premium list and other requirements set forth in these rules. Fairs requesting state aid for net premiums shall submit to the department a printed copy of the premium list used at the fair, as required under s. [ATCP 160.92 \(3\) \(c\)](#).
 - (b) The officers of each fair shall mail a copy of the premium list to other associations, societies, or boards conducting a fair in Wisconsin upon request.
 - (c) Sections [ATCP 160.01](#) through [160.07](#) and [160.91](#) shall be published in premium books used by a fair for which state aid is requested.
- (3) ENTRY FEES.
 - (a) A fair may charge an exhibitor an entry fee or charge stall rents for animals, or both.
 - (b) Exhibitors in department 35 shall not be required to purchase an exhibitor's ticket. Any other exhibitor may be required, if no entry fee is charged, to purchase an exhibitor's season ticket at a price not to exceed that charged for a non-exhibitor's season ticket.
- (4) SPLIT FAIR DATES.

- (a) For purposes of this subsection, "split fair dates" occur when a fair organization judges exhibits or contests and pays premiums at more than one time or at more than one location during the calendar year.
- (b) Except as provided under par. (c), the department may not pay state aid for a fair having split dates unless the department gives advance written approval for a split fair. The department may approve split dates based on hardship.
- (c) The department may pay state aid for the following exhibits or contests in a fair having split dates with advance notification to the department:
 1. Clothing revue.
 2. Demonstrations.
 3. Favorite foods revue.
 4. Dogs.
 - 4m. Cats.
 5. Small animals.
 6. Rocketry.
 7. Shooting sports.
 - 7m. Mechanical projects.
 8. Other exhibits and contests that are similar to those identified in subds. 1. to 7.
- (d) If there are split dates under par. (b) or (c), all blue ribbon winners shall repeat their demonstrations or exhibits at the regular fair dates unless the department grants a hardship exemption. An exhibitor may use audio-visual media, still photography or an educational display to repeat a demonstration or exhibit.

Ag 160.03 Exhibition Requirements. A county or district fair shall meet all of the exhibit requirements of this section to be eligible for state premium aid.

- (1) No fair society or other organization sponsoring a fair may require an exhibitor to become a member of the organization in order to enter an exhibit at the fair, nor may the sponsoring organization make any deduction from an exhibitor's premium as a donation to the fair society, or require an exhibitor in any other way to make a donation to the society.
- (2) State aid may not be approved for out-of-state exhibits or for separate classes of local and non-local exhibitors. Aid may not be approved for payment of premiums to an exhibitor having an out-of-state address but claiming Wisconsin residency unless the fair secretary provides the department with an affidavit that the exhibitor's residence is geographically located within the state.
- (3) State aid may be paid only on articles or animals actually on display in an exhibit building or actually shown in the show ring on regular fair dates unless approval for split fair dates is obtained under s. ATCP 160.02 (4). State aid may not be paid on Dairy Herd Improvement Association records, transportation aid, production contests or other special educational exhibits unless prior approval is obtained under s. ATCP 160.49 (7).
- (4) State aid may not be paid on exhibits removed from the fairgrounds before 4 p.m. on the last day of the fair, or such

other later time as may be specified by the fair, without prior approval of the department. Authority for earlier removal may be granted by the department in case of meat animal sales or other special classes, if requested before the beginning of the fair. In other hardship cases, approval may be granted by the fair. Exhibits in dog obedience and small animal pet classes may be judged during the regular fair but are not required to remain present during the entire fair. The fair may prescribe the length of time junior fair exhibitors of horses shall keep their animal on the ground.

ATCP 160.05 Open Division; General Requirements

- (1) The total maximum premiums set forth for all places in any open division livestock class, excluding poultry and rabbits, may be divided into multiple premiums for a greater number of places, but the maximum premium offered for any additional place shall not be higher than the maximum for the last place in the class.
 - (2) All animals in any open division class shall be owned by the exhibitor, except as provided in s. ATCP 160.09.
 - (3) State aid may be paid on no more than 2 premiums awarded an exhibitor under one premium or lot number in open division individual livestock classes, except poultry and rabbits, and no more than one premium in all other classes, including poultry and rabbits.
- ATCP 160.05(4)(4) State aid may not be used to award a premium to an exhibitor who exhibits an item or animal that has been exhibited in open class division previously in a state aid funded fair in that calendar year and resulted in a premium being awarded for that item or animal.
- (5) The fair board may establish specific classes by professional and amateur level groupings within classes for open class departments 14 to 28.

ATCP 160.07 Classes; General Requirements

- (1) Classes may be combined if the number of entries in several single classes is insufficient. If any classes are combined, state aid shall be limited to the maximum total premiums listed for a single class of animals, items or articles in that department.
- (2) (a) Except as provided under par. (b), no fair may receive state aid for premiums awarded for sexually intact male dairy cattle, beef cattle, sheep, goats, swine or horses unless those animals are registered. Registered status shall be documented by a certificate of registry from the appropriate breed association or society, or by a copy of the application for registration.
 - (b) Paragraph (a) does not apply to dairy cattle exhibited at a fair if a national breed association certifies that those dairy cattle are recorded in that breed association's qualified herd book which records the genealogy of that breed.
- (3) Any animal entered as part of a group class may also be exhibited in a class for individual animals.
- (4) Boars may not be entered as an exhibit in the swine department unless their tusks have been removed.

- (5) The age of an animal, for purposes of determining its entry class under this chapter, shall be determined as of the opening day of the fair.

ATCP 160.39 Senior Citizens Division; General Requirements

- (1) The age of exhibitors in the senior citizens division is limited to persons 62 years of age or over.
- (2) Exhibitors in the senior citizens division may not enter identical items or articles in both the senior citizens division and the corresponding classes of the regular open division.
- (3) State aid may not be used to award more than one premium to an exhibitor in a premium or lot number in the senior citizens division.
- (4) State aid may not be used to award a premium to an exhibitor who exhibits an item that has been exhibited in the senior citizens division previously in a state aid funded fair in that calendar year and resulted in a premium being awarded for that item.

ATCP 160.49 Junior Fair Division; General Requirements.

- (1) In the junior fair division, the department may pay state aid on prizes offered to exhibitors who are ages 8 to under 20 years of age on January 1 of the current fair year and exhibitors who are 5 to 9 years of age on January 1 of the current fair year who are exhibiting under s. ATCP 160.65. A fair board may establish specific entry classes within each department. A fair board may establish subgroups within a junior fair entry class based on the exhibitor's age or grade in school. The department may not pay state aid on prizes for club parades, club floats, song contests, or a project which is not an exhibit or demonstration at the fair.
- (2) All exhibitors in the junior fair division shall be members of a youth organization approved by the fair board.
- (3) Exhibits in the junior fair shall be the product of the exhibitor's own labor. An exhibit may include a study project, merit project or other special project, a skill area, or a supervised occupational experience in which the exhibitor is regularly enrolled, provided that the fair board approves the project, skill area, or supervised occupational experience as an exhibit.
- (4) State aid may not be used to award more than one premium to an exhibitor in a premium or lot number in the junior fair division, except for any of the following:
 - (a) A premium may be awarded to each member of a group that collectively owns and enters a livestock exhibit in departments one to 5 of subch. IV.
 - (b) An exhibitor may receive a separate premium for showmanship where authorized under subch. IV.
 - (c) An exhibitor may receive more than one premium in a department for which additional premiums are specifically authorized under subch. IV.
- (5) State aid may not be used to award a premium to an exhibitor who exhibits an item or animal that has been exhibited in the junior division previously in a state aid funded fair in that calendar year and resulted in a premium being awarded for that item or animal.

- (6) Special educational exhibits may be established if the proposal is presented to the department before October 1 of the year preceding its proposed establishment and the exhibit is approved by the department.
- (7) Within any junior fair department, a fair may establish special classes where none are specified under this subchapter. Special classes may include classes for grade and crossbred females in the beef, swine, sheep and horse departments. Premiums for special classes created under this subsection shall be equal to premiums for comparable classes established in the same department under this subchapter.
- (8) The fair board may establish specific classes are age or grade level groupings within classes for each of the junior fair departments 14 to 16, 18, 20 to 29, 31, 33, and 34.
- (9) Judging in the junior fair division may be done using the Regular, Conference, Face to Face or Danish judging system.

ATCP 160.91 Judging Regulations

- (1) Judging shall be done at fairs by individuals who are registered with the department. In no case shall any person who is an officer or director of a fair be eligible to judge exhibits at such fair; nor shall any person interested directly or indirectly in exhibits shown in any department of a fair be eligible to judge articles or animals in that department.
 - (1m) (a) An individual shall register by submitting to the department an application. The department shall register all individuals who qualify to be judges, including having the knowledge, training, or experience in the specific classes to be judged and adhering to ethical judging practices. The registration is valid for five years.
 - (b) An individual submitting an application after July 1 may not judge for the current fair year.
 - (c) A fair representative may request the department waive par. (b) in cases of unanticipated emergency situations.
- (2) Each judge at a fair shall be provided with a copy of the fair's premium book or list of entry classes at least 7 days prior to the opening date of the fair.
- (3) No animal or article, irrespective of the number of entries in the class in which it is entered, shall be awarded a higher rating than its merit would entitle it to in comparison to the standard of perfection in the class.
- (4) (a) Danish system judging may be used in the junior fair division. State aid may not be paid on premiums awarded under the Danish system in any other division.
 - (b) When classes in the junior fair division are judged according to the Danish system, 4 group placings shall be awarded in any class. When there are less than 8 exhibitors in the class, there shall not be more than 2 in the first group, not more than 4 in the first 2 groups and not more than 6 in the first 3 groups. If there are 8 or more entries in the class, there shall not be more than 25% in the first group, not more

- than 50% in the first 2 groups, and not more than 75% in the first 3 groups.
- (c) The number of awards in the last group placing may be increased to the extent necessary to give awards to all exhibitors.

- (4g) When classes in the junior fair division are judged using the Conference judging system, the judge shall use sub. (4) (b) and (c) to award placements in a class.
- (5) If any class of exhibits at a fair is judged according to the regular system, the judges for that class may give only one first-place, one second-place, one third-place and one fourth-place award in that class.

IAFE CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS

INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF FAIRS AND EXPOSITIONS (IAFE) NATIONAL CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS

The St. Croix County Fair Adopts this code for our animal shows.

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE Code of Show Ring Ethics," fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

- 1) All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership, and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
- 2) Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
- 3) Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.
- 4) Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of violative drug residues. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of, consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to

obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event.

If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the laboratory, to which it is sent, is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise.

At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.

- 5) Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
- 6) The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.

- 7) Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
- 8) No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
- 9) The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
- 10) The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show for violation of this Code of Show Ring Ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or livestock show without recourse against the fair or livestock show. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent that any proceedings or disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show may be published with the name of the violator or violators in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expos and any special notices to members.
- 11) The act of entering of an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

ANIMAL HEALTH RULES & REGULATIONS SUMMARY

This is a summary of animal health requirements for fairs, shows and exhibitions only. They are not necessarily the same as requirements for importing animals into Wisconsin or moving them within the state for other purposes. They may change if animal diseases occur in Wisconsin or elsewhere, so you should always check our website or contact us for current information.

General requirements for show organizers

All fairs or exhibitions of any length must obtain, review, and keep for five years all required records and test results:

- Exhibitor's name and address
- Animal identification (number, type, description, and, when required, official identification
- (see requirements for different animals below))
- Documents showing compliance with disease testing and other health requirements
- Livestock premises number, if any, where animals originated
- Documentation showing legal importation to the event (if applicable) and, when required, movement to the event (see requirements for different animals below)
- For swine, a record of any swine transported directly to a slaughtering establishment
- For swine, a record of any swine transported to an animal market where all animals sold at the market sale for that day were shipped directly to a slaughtering establishment
- **Fairs or exhibitions lasting more than 24 hours** must appoint a licensed veterinarian to inspect all animals daily.

Note: Except in specific circumstances, if an animal already bears an official 840 eartag, that eartag must not be removed and additional official eartags must not be applied. Instead, the existing eartag must be read and recorded when a record of that animal is required. (Ref. s. ATCP 10.045, Wis. Admin. Code)

These regulations apply to all fairs and exhibitions, including additional events (like rodeos, shows, or other organized events) that occur in conjunction with the fair.

Diseases

Lactating Dairy Cattle: Effective April 29, 2024 and June 19, 2024 respectively, all lactating dairy cattle moved interstate and lactating dairy cattle moved to fairs, shows, and exhibitions in Wisconsin are required to have a negative influenza A test from a milk sample collected within 7 days of movement. For more information see: DATCP Home Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (H5N1) in Dairy Cattle (wi.gov)

Animals that show evidence of having contagious or infectious diseases may not be commingled (or housed/kept) with other animals at a fair, show, or other exhibition in such a way as to allow disease to spread. Such animals should not attend the fair, show, or exhibition.

Animals may be denied entry if they arrive at these events with contagious or infectious diseases, isolated and/or removed if they develop disease after arriving, or be subject to other action as would be necessary to control disease. (Ref. s. ATCP 10.08(1), Wis. Admin. Code)

Bovine animals with ringworm, mange, warts or scab will be removed from the fair or exhibition premises, unless the veterinarian in charge finds warts or ringworm lesions are incapable of transmitting disease.

Cattle and Bison

Cattle and Bison FROM WITHIN WISCONSIN Effective June 19, 2024, all lactating dairy cattle are required to have a negative Influenza A test^c on milk samples collected within 7 days prior to movement to a fair or exhibition. Official ID is required for influenza testing.

Cattle and Bison FROM OUTSIDE WISCONSIN (Ref. s. ATCP 10.22, Wis. Admin. Code) must:

- Be accompanied by certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or

health certificate)^a documenting official animal identification (ID) and all required tests and certifications

- Have official individual ID (including steers)^b
- Meet all of Wisconsin's normal requirements for import (see below and

https://datcp.wi.gov/Pages/Programs_Services/CattleBison.aspx

Acceptable animal IDs for all cattle and bison

- 15-digit "840" RFID tags
- Valid only if applied before November 5, 2024:
 - Visual only 15 digit "840" tags
 - USDA metal ear tag number that starts with the state 2 digit code and is followed by 3 letters and 4 numbers (e.g. 35ABC1234). This includes the orange brucellosis vaccination tag.
- Valid only if applied before March 11, 2015:
 - Manufacturer-coded RFID tag - 15-digit number with the first three digits in 900s
 - American ID tag - 8 to 12-digit number prefaced with "USA"

Influenza A requirements^c for lactating dairy cattle from outside Wisconsin

Effective April 29, 2024, all lactating dairy cattle are required to have a negative Influenza A test on milk samples collected within 7 days prior to interstate movement.

Brucellosis requirements for cattle and bison from outside Wisconsin

No cattle are currently required to be brucellosis tested or vaccinated for fairs/shows in Wisconsin.

Tuberculosis (TB) requirements^c for cattle and bison from outside Wisconsin

All cattle from **Texas** and **Michigan's TB Free Zone** (for cattle from Michigan's Modified Accredited Zone see below), regardless of sex or age are required to have a negative TB test within 60 days prior to import. For details and requirements by state, see:

Cattle and bison from Michigan's Modified Accredited Zone – Alcona, Alpena, Montmorency, and Oscoda counties - (for cattle and bison from Michigan's TB Free Zone, see requirements by state above) also need:

- Import permit^e
- To originate from a herd that has a negative whole-herd TB test within 12 months before arrival in Wisconsin that includes all animals 1 year and older^c
- Negative individual TB tests within 60 days before entering Wisconsin^c
- A statement indicating the animals will return directly to the state of origin after the show^d.

Cattle and bison from Canada must meet current federal requirements to enter the United States and may have additional requirements to return to Canada. See aphis.usda.gov, choose "Trade", Live Animal Import or Export as

needed, and then species and country to find requirements. Requirements are subject to change as conditions warrant. For current information, check

Swine

Note: *These regulations apply to all swine, including pet pigs and racing pigs.*

Note: *Herd of origin means the herd in which the pigs currently reside, likely the exhibitor's herd. When pigs are purchased from a herd, the herd from which they originate is the herd of origin for the seller. Once the purchased pigs are added into the buyer's herd (even if the buyer's herd only consists of one or just a few animals), the buyer's herd becomes the new herd of origin and that herd must meet testing requirements to move pigs again.*

Swine from WITHIN WISCONSIN (Ref. s. ATCP 10.32(2) and 10.87, Wis. Admin. Code) need a Wisconsin intrastate certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)^a:

- Stating that the entire herd of origin on the farm was inspected within 30 days before the show and no apparent disease was present at the time of inspection^d.
- **Non-terminal Exhibitions:** All swine must have a PRRS (Porcine Reproductive and Respiratory Syndrome) and PEDv (Porcine Epidemic Diarrhea virus) test of the herd of origin within 90 days of the end of the exhibition^c. Include test date, type, and results on the CVI.
- **Terminal Exhibitions:** No testing requirements.^c

Note: *Terminal Exhibitions are those at which all the swine go directly from the fair/show to the slaughtering establishment OR to a slaughter only market sale. Shows or exhibitions are either terminal or non-terminal. If all of the pigs at the event are not going directly to slaughter (including through a slaughter only market sale), it is considered a non-terminal exhibition. For non-terminal exhibitions, all the pigs at the show or exhibition will need to be tested prior to the event even if individual animals will go directly to slaughter. If going to a slaughter only market sale, contact the Division of Animal Health fair inspector for required information to collect.*

Note: *If the fair intends to use a load-out facility, contact the Division of Animal Health in advance to discuss requirements that must be met.*

Swine FROM OUTSIDE WISCONSIN (Ref. s. ATCP 10.30 and 10.87, Wis. Admin. Code) need a certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)^a that includes the following:

- The negative results of the PRRS test^c from the swine's herd of origin conducted within 90 days prior to movement into Wisconsin including test date, type, and results.
- The negative results of the PEDv test^c from the swine's herd of origin conducted within 90 days prior to movement into Wisconsin including test date, type, and results.
- A statement that the veterinarian has inspected the entire herd of origin within the past 30 days and that no clinical signs of PRRS and PEDv or any other apparent disease was present at the time of inspection.^d
- Official individual identification (ID)^b Acceptable methods of ID for swine are:

- USDA silver ear tag
- USDA 840 ear tag, either visual or RFID
- Breed association tattoo if the pig is a purebred and the tattoo is registered
- An ear tag with the premises identification number and a unique identifier
- Ear notch if the pig is a purebred and the notch is registered

Note: Microchips are not accepted as official ID for any swine including pet pigs.

Requirements are subject to change as conditions warrant. For current information and for PRRS and PEDv testing options, check

Sheep and Goats

Sheep and goats FROM WITHIN WISCONSIN:

- If sexually intact, need official individual identification (ID)^b at any age.
- If not sexually intact, need official individual ID^b if they *are 12 months or older*.
- See below for Official ID options.
- Sheep and goats that go to a market or slaughter establishment after the fair should have an owner hauler statement to move from the fair to the market/slaughter establishment

Sheep and goats FROM OUTSIDE WISCONSIN:

- Certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)^a and official individual ID^b for all animals.
- See below for Official ID options.
- See below for additional requirements for goats from Michigan's Tuberculosis Modified Accredited Zone.
- Sheep and goats that go to a slaughter establishment after the fair should have an owner hauler statement to move from the fair to the slaughter establishment.

Official Identification^b includes:

- Scrapie eartags (including tags on neckstraps for animals with absent/injured ears or with official tattoos – see DATCP Website*)
- USDA 840 ear tags
- Legible breed tattoos (see DATCP Website* and NOTE below)
- Legible scrapie tattoos (see DATCP Website* and NOTE below)
- Approved microchips (Electronic Implantable Identification/EID) – There are many requirements that need to be met to use microchips including a requirement for accompanying tattoos. See DATCP Website* and NOTE below.

NOTE: All sheep and goats **that go through a market or to slaughter** and require Official Identification **must be eartagged with Official ID**. Official ID in the form of a tattoo or Electronic Implantable Identification (EID) is no longer sufficient when moving through a market or going to slaughter.

NOTE: If a Wisconsin origin animal is neutered, less than 12 months of age, and moving through a market after the fair, the market may require Official ID in the form of an ear tag.

Goats from Michigan's TB Modified Accredited Zone – Alcona, Alpena, Montmorency, Oscoda counties – also need:

- Import permit
- To originate from a herd that has a negative whole-herd TB test within 12 months before arrival in Wisconsin that includes all animals 1 year and older^c
- Negative individual TB tests within 60 days before entering Wisconsin
- A statement indicating the animals will return directly to the state of origin after the show.^d

Equine

Equine animals FROM WITHIN WISCONSIN need documentation of a negative EIA (Coggins) test^c done within the previous 12 months, which clearly identifies the animal by complete description, digital photographs, or an approved microchip (if a reader is available). No test is needed for nursing foals accompanying negative dams. Documentation may be:

- Official test report VS 10-11, *or*
 - USDA-approved electronic test form, *or*
 - Global Vet Link EIA electronic form, *or*
 - Certificate of Vet inspection with the test results listed
- Equine animals FROM OUTSIDE WISCONSIN** (Ref. s.ATCP 10.36, Wis. Admin. Code) need:

- Certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)^a which clearly identifies^b the animal by complete description, digital photographs, or an approved microchip
- Negative EIA (Coggins) test^c done within previous 12 months that is reported on the CVI
- No EIA test is needed for nursing foals accompanying negative dams

Equines from Minnesota are exempt from CVI requirement if:

- Ownership does not change while the animal is in Wisconsin
- The animal remains in Wisconsin no longer than 7 days
- Proof of a negative EIA (Coggins) test^c in previous 12 months accompanies the animal

South American camelids: Llamas, Alpacas, Guanacos, Vicunas

South American camelids FROM WITHIN WISCONSIN have no requirements.

South American camelids FROM OUTSIDE WISCONSIN (Ref. s.ATCP 10.85, Wis. Admin. Code) must have a certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)^a and official individual identification (ID)^b. Official ID may be:

- Approved USDA ear tag number
- Microchip number
- Breed association registration number
- Breed association tattoo

Exotic Ruminants

Note: Exotic ruminants are ruminants that are not native to Wisconsin, and are not cervids – for example, Old World camels, yaks, water buffalo, pronghorn antelope, giraffes, and non-domestic sheep and goats. In addition, please contact your county and local municipality for any restrictions.

Exotic ruminants FROM WITHIN WISCONSIN have no requirements.

Exotic ruminants FROM OUTSIDE WISCONSIN (Ref. s.ATCP 10.82, Wis. Admin. Code) must have:

- Certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)^a
- Official individual identification (ID) as required for tuberculosis and brucellosis testing^b
- Import permit^e
- Proof written on the CVI that they meet requirements for:
 - o Tuberculosis (TB) – negative test required within 60 days before entry^c
 - o Brucellosis – negative test required within 30 days before entry^c

Please call 608-224-4872 beforehand to determine which TB test to use.

Poultry and waterfowl (Pigeons are not considered poultry for fairs and shows)

Poultry and waterfowl FROM WITHIN WISCONSIN need ONE of the following:

- For eggs and birds of all ages, an NPIP certificate stating the flock of origin is a US pullorum-typhoid clean and for turkeys a *Mycoplasma gallisepticum* clean flock or NPIP affiliate flock^c or
- For eggs and birds of all ages, documentation the flock of origin is a Wisconsin Tested Flock and has tested negative for pullorum-typhoid and for turkeys *Mycoplasma gallisepticum*^c, or
- For eggs and birds of all ages, documentation the flock of origin is a Wisconsin Associate Flock^c, or
- For sexually mature birds (turkeys over 6 months, all other birds over 4 months), individual tests within 90 days before arrival at the show. These birds also need wing or leg band identification (ID). All birds must test negative for pullorum-

typhoid, and turkeys must test negative for *Mycoplasma gallisepticum*. After testing there can be no change of ownership or commingling with other birds that are not part of the flock except at other shows/fairs. Eggs and sexually immature birds are not eligible for individual testing and cannot be shown unless they originate from an enrolled NPIP, NPIP affiliate, Wisconsin Tested, or Wisconsin Associate flock.

Note: Flock of origin means the flock in which the birds currently reside, likely the exhibitor's flock. Once purchased birds are added to the buyer's flock, even if the buyer's flock only consists of one or just a few birds, the buyer's flock is the flock of origin and that flock must meet NPIP or WI Tested or Associate Flock status to avoid individual bird testing for shows/fairs.

Poultry and waterfowl FROM OUTSIDE WISCONSIN (Ref. s.ATCP 10.42, Wis. Admin. Code) need a certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)^a or equivalent (such as form VS 9-3) specifically showing movement to the fair or show that states:

- For eggs and birds of all ages, they originate from a flock classified pullorum-typhoid clean and for turkeys *Mycoplasma gallisepticum* clean under NPIP or an equivalent program^c, or
- For sexually mature birds, they have tested negative for pullorum-typhoid (and *Mycoplasma gallisepticum* for turkeys) within 90 days^c before arrival at the show. These birds also need wing or leg band ID^b. Eggs and sexually immature birds are not eligible for individual testing and cannot be shown unless they originate from an enrolled NPIP or equivalent program flock.

Not required:

- Import permit number

Small animals: Dogs, Domestic Cats, and other household pets (ferrets, pet birds, rabbits, gerbils, guinea pigs, hamsters, domestic mice and rats)

Note: For animals that are part of menageries, see also rules below for menageries. Pot-bellied and miniature pigs fall under rules for swine. Dog hybrids, domestic cat hybrids, or exotic small cat species such as servals fall under rules for Exotic small animals. Native wild animals and birds, including raptors, and captive wild animals such as raccoons, opossums, and skunks fall under rules for wild animals..

Dogs FROM WITHIN WISCONSIN (Ref. s.95.21, Wis. Stats.) that are 5 months or older need proof of current rabies vaccination.^f **CATS AND OTHER HOUSEHOLD PETS FROM WITHIN WISCONSIN** have no requirements.

DOGS AND CATS FROM OUTSIDE WISCONSIN (Ref. s.ATCP 10.80, Wis. Admin. Code) that are 5 months or older need to be vaccinated against rabies^f by a licensed veterinarian, and regardless of age, need certificates of veterinary inspection (CVIs or health certificates)^a stating the age of the animal and for animals 5 months and older the date of last rabies vaccination and revaccination due date.

OTHER HOUSEHOLD PETS FROM OUTSIDE WISCONSIN (Ref. s.ATCP 10.06, Wis. Admin. Code) need certificates of veterinary

inspection (CVIs or health certificates)^a but have no testing or vaccination requirements.

Small animals from other nations need to meet requirements of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (608-662-0600) and Centers for Disease Control (1-800-232-4636).

Exotic small animals (any species not covered by "small animals" above), exotic large animals, and other wild animals

Note: Local jurisdictions may have requirements beyond the state requirements listed here.

Animals FROM WITHIN WISCONSIN do not have any requirements as long as they are legally possessed in Wisconsin.^f

Animals FROM OUTSIDE WISCONSIN (Ref. s.ATCP 10.84, Wis. Admin. Code) generally have no testing or vaccination requirements, but do need:

- Certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)^a
- Import permit number^e

Note: Some animals may not be brought to Wisconsin.^f These are North American prairie dogs and the following African species: tree squirrels, rope squirrels, dormice, Gambian giant pouched rats, brush-tailed porcupines and striped mice. Some animals may require permits from the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources. See <http://dnr.wi.gov>. For information on obtaining an import permit:

Circus, rodeo, racing and menagerie animals

Note: Local jurisdictions may have requirements beyond the state requirements listed here.

Animals FROM WITHIN WISCONSIN must meet vaccination and testing requirements for their species. See these requirements earlier in this document.

Animals FROM OUTSIDE WISCONSIN need certificates of veterinary inspection (CVIs or health certificates) and vaccinations, identification, and tests required for their species. See these requirements earlier in this document.

They also need import permit numbers^e (Ref. s.ATCP 10.81, Wis. Admin. Code) if they are:

- Circuses and individual circus acts
- Rodeo stock other than individual participants' horses

- Multi-species menageries (defined as any animals kept in a collection primarily for purposes of exhibition or competition)
- Petting zoos

They do not need import permit numbers if they are:

- Rodeo horses owned by individual participants
- Single-species groups

Note: Some animals may not be brought to Wisconsin. These are North American prairie dogs and the following African species: tree squirrels, rope squirrels, dormice, Gambian giant pouched rats, brush-tailed porcupines and striped mice. Some animals may require permits from the Department of Natural Resources. See

Guidelines for housing and managing animals

The State Veterinarian recommends that exhibitors:

- Vaccinate breeding cattle against bovine viral diarrhea (BVD) at least 30 days before the event
- Test cattle for BVD-PI by immunoperoxidase test, and bring them to shows only if they test negative
- Test cattle for Johnes' disease by ELISA test, and bring to shows only if negative test
- Clean and disinfect vehicles used to transport animals to and from the show, and vehicles used on the grounds before, during, and after the show
- Isolate exhibited animals returning to their farms or animals purchased at the show for 21 days before mingling them with other stock

The State Veterinarian recommends that show organizers:

- House cattle separately from South American camelids, exotic ruminants, and poultry
 - House cattle separately from small ruminants, especially sheep
 - House ostriches, emus, rheas and cassowaries separately from domestic poultry
 - House swine separately from any other mammals
 - Include a space for the premises registration code on livestock entry forms
 - Provide hand-washing stations near all livestock facilities
- Provide individual watering and feeding troughs rather than common ones

YOUTH DIVISION – AG 5.06, DAIRY & LIVESTOCK DIVISION

1. All exhibitors are required to furnish hay, bedding, grain, and watering pails for livestock they exhibit.
2. Open to all youth who have carefully selected and kept accurate records of the calf entered for exhibition.
3. All purebred registered and ID Grade animals must meet breed association requirements and have registration documents or

they will be considered as grade animals. All animals that qualify for District, State, or National shows must show as registered.

4. Check Animal Health Rules & Regulations Summary for papers needed.
5. Exhibitors are limited to 4 dairy or 4 beef animals or any combination of dairy/beef not to exceed a total of 4.

DEPT 1 – DAIRY CATTLE

Health Requirements

Please refer to the Animal Health Rules & Regulations Summary page earlier in this Fairbook for full detail.

General Rules

1. In order for youth to participate in the Dairy Show, an Animal Identification form for each organization is required. All Dairy Animal Exhibitors must present a premise ID number and have an identification for their animal. Identification includes an ear tag, RFID, registration papers, or tattoo. Return your completed forms to the Department Chair or Barn Superintendent along with all other required documents. **Please see page 125 for Animal ID and Check-in Forms. (Including Youth Organization Roster for those not in 4-H or FFA) This form is required for ALL animals at the St. Croix County Fair.**
2. All animals must be checked in with superintendent **before** they are stalled.
3. All livestock must be owned or under managerial agreement between the owner and exhibitor. Animals must be shown by the person who made the entry. In the case of an emergency, contact the superintendent for permission to have a substitute leadperson. Substitute lead persons should be a member of a recognized St. Croix County youth group.
4. Exhibitors who preregistered in the wrong class or failed to preregister will be allowed to show for a ribbon only (no premiums and ineligible for champions). This includes showmanship. If the exhibitor believes the entry was made correctly, please check at the fair office.
5. Limit of four (4) beef or dairy or combination not to exceed four (4) animals total.
6. The St. Croix County Fair has established the following judging schedule for dairy breeds other than Holsteins. The sequence of breeds for the colored show will be as follows: Alphabetical Order followed by Any Other Breed. The show order will be as follows: Registered Jr. calf, Grade Jr. calf classes and so forth through the lot numbers for Junior cattle of the breed. At the end of the senior yearling classes, the Junior Champions of each class may be selected at the discretion of the judge.
7. **The Senior cattle show will begin after a 30-minute break following the conclusion of the heifer show and morning showmanship classes.** The sequence of breeds for the colored show will be in alphabetical order followed by Any Other Breed. The show order will begin with the lowest lot number and proceed through the highest lot number for each class. At the end of the senior show for a class, a Senior Champion, registered and grade, may be selected at the discretion of the judge.
8. If large errors concerning space are found in dairy entries as compared to animal counts sent in for barn stalling, a club may not be eligible for Herdsmanship awards. Loss of future space may also occur. Action will be taken by the Dairy Committee.
9. All exhibitors **MUST** utilize a container to collect animal waste on the way to and from the show ring and while waiting at the show ring.
10. 3rd grade exhibitors are limited to one animal in one animal species for a total of one animal. 3rd graders may exhibit the animal in showmanship and the appropriate lot. They must enroll in that animal project and follow all rules assigned to that project. It is their responsibility to follow all health requirements, rules and regulations. They must be able to control their animal, it is recommended that they show a calf born on December 1 or after of that fair year.
11. Registered and Grade Jr Champions may be chosen in all breeds at the discretion of the judge. Junior and Senior Champion and Reserve Champion: The top 2 blues in each heifer or cow class are eligible for Junior Champion and Senior Champion, respectively.

Breed Champion: The Junior and Senior champions of a breed will compete for the Breed Champion

Supreme Champion: The Breed Champions will compete for the Supreme Champion

Age Classifications

SPRING CALF is one born on or after March 1 of the exhibit year.

WINTER CALF is one whose date of birth is between December 1 of the year preceding the exhibit year and February 28 or 29 of the exhibit year.

FALL CALF is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and November 30 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

SUMMER YEARLING is one whose date of birth is between June 1 and August 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

SPRING YEARLING is one whose date of birth is between March 1 and May 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

WINTER YEARLING is one whose date of birth is between December 1 of the second year preceding the exhibit year and February 28 or 29 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

FALL YEARLING is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and November 30 of the second year preceding the exhibit year

Jr 2 YEAR-OLD is one born between March 1 of the second year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the second year preceding the exhibit year. A Jr 2-year-old includes a yearling that has freshened.

Sr 2 YEAR-OLD is one born between September 1 of the third year preceding the exhibit year and February 28 or 29 of the second year preceding the exhibit year.

3 YEAR-OLD is one whose date of birth is between September 1 of the fourth year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the third year preceding the exhibit year.

4 YEAR-OLD is one whose date of birth is between September 1 of the fifth year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the fourth year preceding the exhibit year.

Cows 5 YEARS AND OLDER is one whose date of birth is between September 1 of the sixth year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the fifth year preceding the exhibit year.

DRY COW 3 YEARS AND OLDER date of birth is after August 31st of the third year preceding the exhibit year.

Health Requirements

Please refer to the Animal Health Rules & Regulations Summary page earlier in this Fairbook for full details.

General Rules

1. An *Animal Identification & Check-In Form*, for each individual exhibitor, must be completed. This form will be provided to you at check-in by your livestock species chairman. All livestock exhibitors must be able to provide a premise identification number (PIN). Identification of each individual livestock must be provided. This can include SCLC ear tag, RFID tag, or tattoo.
2. Exhibitors are able to bring a maximum of four beef, dairy, and/or combinations of both.
3. 3rd grade exhibitors are limited to one animal in one animal species for a total of one animal. 3rd graders may exhibit the animal in showmanship and the appropriate lot. The exhibitor must be able to control their animal. It is the responsibility to follow all health requirements and St. Croix County Livestock Committee's rules and regulations.

9. Bred and owned market beef, or breeding stock, must have ownership of the dam of the offspring in order to exhibit under these criteria.

Market/Breeding Stock

1. After the market beef are weighed in at final weigh ins, the fair officials will determine the classes.
2. All steers must be polled or de-horned.
3. No drugs can be used in animals at the fair.
4. Market classes will include the beef breeds, crossbred beef, market heifers, dairy/beef cross, and dairy steers.
5. Market animals will be weighed on Thursday of the fair at times designated by the St. Croix County Livestock Committee. All beef is eligible to show and MUST have a SCLC ear tag upon arrival to the fairgrounds. After weigh-ins the beef will be divided into appropriate classes based on weight into evenly distributed classes determined by the St. Croix County Livestock Committee. The top 2 blues from each lot number within a class will compete for champion of that weight class.
6. If an exhibitor is showing 2 beef and both market beef falls into the same weight class, one beef must move to the heavier weight class. If both beef fall into the heaviest weight class the exhibitor will only be allowed to take premiums on one exhibit.
7. Market animal show will be a 'No Fit Show'. Exhibitors are allowed to clip, wash, comb, blow, and use of hair conditioners. General Rules

- Hunter Over Fences, Dressage, and Gymkhana are governed by the St. Croix County Youth Horse Project. You must be a member, in good standing, of the St. Croix County Youth Horse Project to participate in these events.
- Pleasure and Trail are governed under Fair Board Rules and anyone may participate.
- Current 4-H participants only are eligible State Competition (Contact show committee for details).
- 4-H participants only, grades 6-13, are eligible for the State Hunt/Dressage Show which is held in June (prior to the county fair show). Contact show committee for eligibility requirements.
- Participants are encouraged to attend at least one clinic specific to each discipline with the horse they are planning on showing at the fair.
- Riding bareback or riding double is not allowed at any time, riders must be astride the horse properly at all times.
- The Show Committee reserves the right to split or combine classes depending on class size
- Participants may drop entries on the day of the show.

PLEASURE SHOW

- St. Croix County Pleasure Horse Show will be held on **Sunday at 8:00 am**
- In **Pleasure** classes, the horse and rider are judged on manners and suitability of the horse for a relaxed but collected gait, relatively slow speed, along with calm and responsive disposition.
- **Equitation** refers to a rider's position while mounted and encompasses a rider's ability to ride correctly and with effective aids. In competition, the rider is evaluated rather than the horse
- **Stock Seat/Western classes** require a Western saddle and a shanked bit, unless the horse is 5 years old or younger. The rider uses one hand on the reins with a shanked bit. Horses 5 years old and younger may be shown in a snaffle bit. 2 hands on the reins are allowed if the horse is ridden in a snaffle bit. Riders are required to wear a long sleeved, collared shirt, boots and helmet. (Illegal bits include but not limited to: Cow horse, gag bits, bits without shanks, any bit where the bit slides)
- **English classes** require an English saddle and bridle. Riders are required to wear breeches, a jacket, tall boots or paddock boots with half chaps and helmet.
- **Pony** is defined as height, measured at the withers of 56 inches or less. If you ride a pony by this definition, you ride in the pony Lots. In other classes, the horses and ponies are judged together.
- **Draft** exhibitors will need an adult in the cart with them when driving. Both need to wear a helmet.
- **Trail** See the kick-off materials for the date/time when the St. Croix County Trail Class Judging will be held. Trail can be ridden Western or English, but you need to wear attire that matches the discipline you are riding. Example: if you are riding English you need to be in English attire.
- Riding bareback or riding double is not allowed at any time, riders must be astride the horse properly at all times.

HUNTER HACK:

- Horses are required to jump two fences. (Jumps do not need to be set in a line. If the jumps are in a line they are to be set 36-60 feet apart with a 12-foot interval between jumps.
- Horses may be asked to walk, trot, and canter both ways of the ring. At the discretion of the judge contestants may be asked to hand gallop, pull up and stand quietly following the last fence.
- Class may be judged on flat work, manners, way of going, style over fences and even hunting pace.

WORKING HUNTER OVER FENCES:

- A hunter course shall be a fair test of a hunter, with a minimum of 4 obstacles. Horse to jump a maximum of 8 fences. One change of direction is mandatory. The top element of all fences must be securely placed so that a slight rub will not cause a knock down.
- The class will be judged on manners, way of going, and style of jumping.
- Horse shall be credited with maintaining an even hunting pace that covers the course with free-flowing strides. Preference will be shown to horses with correct jumping style that meets fences squarely, jumping at the center of the fence.
- Preference will be shown to horses with good manners and correct jumping style, who meet fences squarely, jumping at the center of the fence. Horses shall be credited with maintaining an even hunting pace that covers the course with free-flowing strides.
- Judges shall penalize unsafe jumping and bad form between and over fences, including refusals, rubbed rails, downed rails, twisting over genes, incorrect leads around the ends of the course, and cross-cantering.
- Ins and outs must be taken in the correct number of strides or be penalized.

HUNTER EQUITATION OVER FENCES:

- Class is judged as an equitation class over a hunter style course.
- Preference will be given to the rider showing the correct position and the ability to communicate effectively with their mount while smoothly navigating the course.
- Elements may include a bending line, a roll back, a fence at the end of the ring, a narrow fence, trotting an obstacle, and a long approach to a fence.

MINI MEDAL:

- Class is judged as an equitation class over a "jumper style" course. IT IS NOT TIMED
- Elements may be called for include: trotting on course, narrower fences, etc.

GENERAL:

- All horses must be serviceably sound.
- Judge's decision is final.
- Horses will not be requested to jump course more than once. In case of broken equipment, the rider may stop and correct the difficulty with a penalty the same as any loss of forward impulsion.
- When an obstacle requires two or more fences (in and out) faults committed at each obstacle are considered separately.
- At the judge's discretion a Grand, Reserve, and eight Top Ten ribbons may be awarded in each class.

ELIMINATION: Exhibitor will be excused with no further work on course.

- Third refusal, run out, bolting on course, extra circle, or combination of these.
- Fall of horse and rider.
- Bolting from ring.
- Failure to keep proper course.
- Taking a jump at any time if a rail is down on that jump

General Rules

1. Check-in will be available from 10am to 6pm on fair entry day at the poultry building for a health check and submit the Pullorum-Typhoid free documentation prior to caging any bird on the premises. Return your completed form to the Department Chair or Barn Superintendent along with all other required documents. **Please see page 125 for Animal ID and Check-in Forms.**
2. All poultry (including waterfowl) must demonstrate one of the following:
 - a. Originate from flocks designated as US Pullorum-Typhoid Clean or NPIP Affiliate flock and accompanied by a NPIP certificate. Request an originating flock pullorum free certification document when purchasing chicks.
 - b. Originate from a Wisconsin Tested Flock or Wisconsin Associate Flock and be accompanied by the corresponding enrollment certificate for the current year.
 - c. Be accompanied by documentation from a Wisconsin Certified Tester indicating each individual mature bird, identified with a band or tag, has been tested and found negative for pullorum-typhoid (and Mycoplasma Gallisepticum for turkeys) within the last 90 days.
3. Turkeys now require a blood draw sent to the Barron or other qualified lab to be tested for both Pullorum and M. Gallisepticum. The draw should be done by a Wisconsin Certified Tester. There is a lab charge and results take about 2 weeks.
4. Immature birds cannot be tested and must originate from a tested flock. **All testing and documentation must be completed before entry day.** If you have questions or need testing contact Bonnie Walters at 715-772-334 or bonnie.s.walters@uwrf.edu.
5. **Any bird appearing unhealthy or having parasites (mites, fecal worms, etc) or without correct Pullorum paperwork will be refused entry. Any birds exhibiting signs of ill health during the fair will be removed and disqualified.**
6. All entries must be made in the name of the actual owner or owner's immediate family and exhibits must be raised by the exhibitor.
7. Exhibitors are allowed only one entry per lot.
8. Exhibitors are allowed to exhibit no more than 15 total poultry entries. A market chicken entry is 2 birds (see lot description).
9. 3rd grade exhibitors are limited to one animal in one animal species for a total of one animal. 3rd graders may exhibit the animal in showmanship and the appropriate lot. It is their responsibility to follow all health requirements, rules, and regulations.
10. Judging will begin at 9am on Saturday. Ribbons will be awarded according to the Danish system. No premiums will be paid on disqualified exhibits.
11. Exhibitors responsibilities:
 - a. The fair will exercise all reasonable vigilance in the care of the exhibits and police arrangements of the building, but all specimens must be entered at the owner's risk.
 - b. Exhibitors are responsible for feeding and watering their own birds and supplying containers for doing so. Cages and bedding are supplied by the fair.
 - c. All exhibitors will be required to participate in barn duty in order to receive premiums. Exhibitors are required to help with either setting up the barn prior to the fair, supervising the poultry exhibit, or helping with tear down and cleanup following the fair. All exhibitors will be notified of the barn duty schedule prior to the fair. Check the 4-H website in the poultry section or with the contacts listed above if you do not receive notification.
 - d. All birds are released for pickup at 4pm on the last day of the fair and must be picked up by 7pm on that day. Poultry may not remain past that deadline as the cages will be taken down.

The courses will consist of 10 to 15 obstacles with a course time of 75 seconds.

Advanced Standard Agility This class may include single, double, and triple bar jumps, tire jump, wing jumps, broad jump, panel jump, and twelve weave poles, open tunnels, a pause table, A-frame (maximum height 4' 6"), dog walk and seesaw. There will be a maximum of 20 obstacles and course time will be 75 seconds.

Advanced- Jumpers without Weaves

The course is to consist of 16 to 18 obstacles and may include bar jumps (winged or wingless), double bar jump, triple bar jump, broad jump, and tire jump. Best time score.

Both must be given & certified by Veterinarian**). A certificate of vaccination must be shown at time of veterinary inspection prior to show. It is recommended that cats/kittens have a booster distemper shot but is not required for showing at Fair. **Please see page 125 for Animal ID and Check-in Forms. This form is required for ALL animals at the St. Croix County Fair.**
3. All vaccinations must be given at least 2 weeks prior to the fair. Feline exhibitors are encouraged to have cats vaccinated for Feline Leukemia and Chlamydia. Consult your veterinarian for recommendations in your area.
4. All cats must be free of external parasites including fleas, ear mites, and ringworm. Any cat found by the show official to exhibit signs of any contagious, infectious, or communicable diseases will not be allowed to exhibit.
5. Whole male cats are not allowed. No obviously pregnant or nursing cats should be shown.
6. Cage drapes are required. Bath towels or old curtains work well held in place with clothes pins or safety pins.
7. Exhibitors in Grade 3 or older can show in any lot.

The **Honorable Mention, Reserve Grand Champion, and Grand Champion** will be selected to participate in the Wisconsin State 4-H Photography competition if the junior fair exhibitor is enrolled in 4-H. If the exhibitor wishes to have the photo sent to state a high resolution digital copy is due to the St. Croix County 4-H Youth Agent no later than November 1.
7. For altered photos, the original photo(s) must be attached to the front of the poster board. Use small (such as wallet size) photos to conserve space. The original digital image must be the original work of the exhibitor.
8. For Altered and/or Trick Photography entries you must include a short write up on what digital techniques were used to create the picture or how the subject matter was set up for the desired trick photography effect. This can be done on a 3 x 5 index card or paper and attached to the back of the entry under the other criteria (name, date, camera, type of photo).

JUNIOR FAIR GENERAL RULES

1. All exhibits must be the work of the exhibitor and must be work done since the last St. Croix County Fair. All animals and livestock must be shown by the exhibitor unless special permission is granted by the dept supervisor.
2. Only one exhibit per exhibitor in each lot number is allowed. Participants will exhibit only in one particular division(s) that pertains to the project work they are carrying.
3. An exhibitor may call their Club Leader with changes to their entries until May 31 at Midnight. **No changes will be accepted after May 31.** The only exceptions will be in health-related situations regarding an animal. **You must contact the species department head.**
4. The Junior Exhibit buildings will be closed to the public between 10:00 pm and 9 am.
5. **The decision of the judges is final in all cases.**
6. Each exhibitor of animals must clean their own exhibit area. Exhibitors must bring their cleaning supplies – forks, shovels, and wheelbarrows, and dispose of manure as directed.
7. Exhibits will be released from the buildings on Sunday from 4pm to 7pm and Monday from 9am to 11am. **If exhibits are removed before 4pm exhibitors will forfeit their premium money.** Exhibitors are responsible for arranging to bring and take home their exhibits. All projects must be claimed by 11am on Monday after the fair or they will be disposed of at the discretion of the Fair Board. All animals **MUST** be removed by 7pm on Sunday except those auction animals which will be loaded out on Monday morning.
8. In event of an emergency, refer to the map on the back cover of this Fairbook or ask Fair Personnel.
9. **Cleaning Barns after St. Croix County Fair** – Each Organization is responsible for cleaning their respective animal exhibit area after the St. Croix County Fair. The barns must be cleaned by Monday at 8pm after the St. Croix County Fair. All manure is to be dumped into the manure pits at the end of the barns. Exhibitors must receive approval from the St. Croix County Fair Association Inc., and provide proof of insurance, if they intend to use a skid steer to clean their area. All operators must be over the age of 18. Exhibitors in the barns are to pull back the manure 3 feet from the barn walls or dividers before leaving Sunday night if there have been arrangements made to use skid steers to clean the barns. If an Organization doesn't comply the group will be assessed a \$100.00 clean-up charge to be paid to the St. Croix County Fair Inc as well as a premium loss to exhibitors.
10. **NO PETS are allowed on the Fairgrounds, Service Animals specifically trained to aid a person with a disability are welcome.**
11. **ALL ANIMALS NEED TO STAY IN THE BARN EXCEPT DURING SHOWS.**
12. Bicycles, skateboards, etc. are not allowed on the St. Croix County Fairgrounds during the Fair.

JUNIOR FAIR GENERAL RULES

1. All exhibits must be the work of the exhibitor and must be work done since the last St. Croix County Fair. All animals and livestock must be shown by the exhibitor unless special permission is granted by the dept supervisor.
2. Only one exhibit per exhibitor in each lot number is allowed. Participants will exhibit only in one particular division(s) that pertains to the project work they are carrying.
3. An exhibitor may call their Club Leader with changes to their entries until May 31 at Midnight. **No changes will be accepted after May 31.** The only exceptions will be in health-related situations regarding an animal. **You must contact the species department head.**
4. The Junior Exhibit buildings will be closed to the public between 10:00 pm and 9 am.
5. **The decision of the judges is final in all cases.**
6. Each exhibitor of animals must clean their own exhibit area. Exhibitors must bring their cleaning supplies – forks, shovels, and wheelbarrows, and dispose of manure as directed.
7. Exhibits will be released from the buildings on Sunday from 4pm to 7pm and Monday from 9am to 11am. **If exhibits are removed before 4pm exhibitors will forfeit their premium money.** Exhibitors are responsible for arranging to bring and take home their exhibits. All projects must be claimed by 11am on Monday after the fair or they will be disposed of at the discretion of the Fair Board. All animals **MUST** be removed by 7pm on Sunday except those auction animals which will be loaded out on Monday morning.
8. In event of an emergency, refer to the map on the back cover of this Fairbook or ask Fair Personnel.
9. **Cleaning Barns after St. Croix County Fair** – Each Organization is responsible for cleaning their respective animal exhibit area after the St. Croix County Fair. The barns must be cleaned by Monday at 8pm after the St. Croix County Fair. All manure is to be dumped into the manure pits at the end of the barns. Exhibitors must receive approval from the St. Croix County Fair Association Inc., and provide proof of insurance, if they intend to use a skid steer to clean their area. All operators must be over the age of 18. Exhibitors in the barns are to pull back the manure 3 feet from the barn walls or dividers before leaving Sunday night if there have been arrangements made to use skid steers to clean the barns. 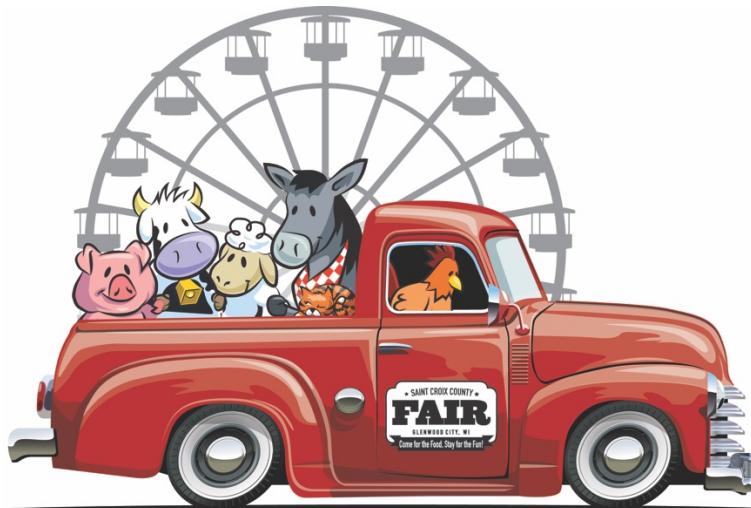

OPEN CLASS FAIR GENERAL RULES

ATCP 160.10 – NOT OPEN TO YOUTH EXHIBITING IN THE JUNIOR FAIR

1. **Completed entry forms are due May 31. Entry can be completed online at www.stcroixcofair.com or by mailing entry forms to *Cindy Van Dyk 904 131st Ave, New Richmond, WI 54017***
2. Open Class exhibitor tags may be picked up on Saturday prior to the fair at the fair office from 10AM – 3PM or on Wednesday of the fair from 11AM – 7:30PM and must be in place by 8PM Non-animal exhibits must be brought in on Wednesday Only. **Animal exhibits may only be brought in on Thursday from 11AM – 7:30PM** Animal exhibits must be in place by 8PM
3. All Open Class Fair Exhibits must be raised, grown or made by the exhibitor. All open class exhibits must be work done within the last 2 years or it will be disqualified. All animals and livestock must be shown by the exhibitor unless special permission is granted by the superintendent during judging.
4. No changes in entries are permitted. In the event an article has been entered in the wrong category, the item will be disqualified, but may be exhibited the following year.
5. All buildings will be closed to the public between 10PM and 9AM
6. Each exhibitor of animals must clean their own exhibit area. Exhibitors must bring their cleaning supplies – forks, shovels, and wheelbarrows, and dispose of manure as directed.
7. Exhibits will be released from the buildings from 4 – 7PM on Sunday and from 8 – 11AM on Monday. Any removal of exhibits before 4 p.m. on Sunday will result in loss of premium money. Exhibitors are responsible for arranging to bring and take home their exhibits. Any exhibit remaining after 11AM will be disposed of at the discretion of the Fair Board.
8. In event of an emergency, refer to EVACUATION PROCEDURE map on the inside of the back cover of book to evacuate the fairgrounds.
9. **Cleaning Barns after Fair** – All Open Class Exhibitors are responsible for cleaning their barn areas after the County Fair. All manure is to be dumped into manure pits near the end of the barns. St. Croix County Fair, Inc. requests that barn cleaning be completed by Monday, 8 p.m. If an exhibitor doesn't comply, they will be assessed a \$100.00 clean-up charge to be paid to the St. Croix County Fair, Inc. as well as a premium loss to the exhibitor.
10. No penalty for items entered but not exhibited.
11. All items will be exhibited at exhibitor's own risk.
12. All ribbons are awarded at the discretion of the judges and the decision of the judges is final in all cases.
13. Only one entry per exhibitor under each lot number.
14. The Superintendent of the Department and/or the judge has the authority to disqualify an item if it does not meet the class or the lot requirements or guidelines.
15. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to ensure that entry tags are attached to the items on entry day.

2 tbsp granulated white sugar	¾ cup milk
4 tsp baking powder	1 egg yolk plus 1 tbsp milk to glaze
½ tsp salt	1 cup blueberries

1. Preheat your oven to 425°F. Grease a large baking tray and set aside.
2. In a large mixing bowl, combine the flour, sugar, baking powder and salt. Whisk together.

Little Hoppers Show

Purpose- To provide younger children the opportunity to get involved in the fair by showing an animal that is fairly easy for a smaller person to handle and to have a positive, non-competitive show experience.

Who may show? Youth Ages 5-9 who are not enrolled in the Junior Fair rabbit project.

The rabbit or Guinea Pig may be a pet or one borrowed from another person as long as the youth has worked with it prior to the fair.

How does it work?

The youth will need to have a parent/guardian sign the attached form in order to participate.

- An adult must be present with the child during the show and check in to assist them if needed.
- Smaller breed rabbits, young rabbits, or guinea pigs are preferred. Rabbit or guinea pig must be manageable for the exhibitor to handle.
- The child will be expected to carry their rabbit or guinea pig out to the judging area with little assistance and place the animal on the table near the judge.
- The Judge will ask a few simple questions about the child and his/her pet:

*What is your name and how old are you?

*What is your animal's name and how old is it?

*What breed is your animal?

*What does your animal eat?

*What is your favorite thing about your animal?

*Do you like showing at the fair?

- Each child will be given a participation ribbon and have their picture taken
- The rabbits or Guinea Pigs for the little hoppers show will be housed at the fair with the other animals, but will have their own designated area in the barn. Children are encouraged to make a poster to hang in the barn about their rabbit or guinea pig.
- The rabbit or guinea pig must be checked in Thursday during the regular check in and remain until check out on Sunday at 4:00 pm. Upon check in the animal will be assessed for any possible health concerns as required for all other entries. All animals must be in good health according to DATCP rules in the front of this book.
