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Family Faith Formation Program Overview

Saint William's Family Faith Formation meets twice a month during the school year providing families with a springboard to continue their formation in a family setting. At least one parent attends with their child(ren).

Children are introduced to God by the knowledge that everything around them comes from God. Growing within the security of their family is the opportunity for parents to begin introducing stories of Jesus. When you take your young children to Mass with you, they begin to realize this is a special place where we can gather with friends.Special actions and events happen gathered in this place. They watch you approach the alter to receive Jesus and they also want to be a part of Eucharist.

Faith filled events also permeate all of family life. This is where faith happens, within the family. We, at Saint William's recognize that you, as parents, are blessed to foster your children's spiritual growth. We wish to be your partner and helper in this journey with your family. We offer opportunities through our Family Faith Formation for you, the parents, to be nourished in your own adult faith. This will allow you to be able to likewise nourish your children in their journey.

We present a practical approach to faith formation recognizing the schedule demands on today's families. We offer a program your whole family can attend at one time, while still providing age-appropriate catechesis.

Saint William Parish Mission Statement

As a Christ- centered Catholic community, St. William Parish responds to the spiritual, physical, and emotional needs of God's people through active programs to address the issues of spiritual life, social justice, and the needs of our youth. The primary concerns of our parish will be: Spiritual Life and Worship, Social Ministry, Youth, Young Adult, and Mature Adult Ministries.

Family Faith Formation Statement of Purpose

Saint William's Parish Family Faith Formation works together with families to provide faith formation opportunities for children and adults. Catechesis is that activity which enables faith to become living, conscious, and active through the light of instruction – especially sharing God's word in Scripture and the Tradition of the Catholic Church. Catechesis is a life-long process for each individual as well as the work of the entire Catholic Christian community.

The church teaches that the <u>primary responsibility</u> for the spiritual growth and development of the children rests <u>first and foremost with the parents</u>. Parents may share this responsibility with others, but they do not relinquish it.

Our program strives to work together, with you to become closer in Christian community to live as Jesus taught us: through love, faithfulness, scripture, faith sharing, and example We at Saint William feel that passing on our faith to the next generation is a high priority. We recognize that we are in this together and are willing to undertake the work to make that happen. Passing on Doctrinal knowledge is important and necessary, but fostering loving, faith filled homes is the key that makes that faith knowledge come alive and last a lifetime. Together we need to keep the following goals in mind:

- Celebrate Mass together
- Get to know Jesus- Reading the Bible, use an age appropriate Bible for your children and have one readily available in your home
- Talk to Jesus- Praying together and teaching your children to pray by themselves. Begin with prayers you know or learned as a child, use spontaneous prayer, "Help me Jesus" or "Thank you Jesus"
- Family Time- Sharing mealtime is a wonderful way to work this time in. Everyone eats, do it together at least once a day. Car time is another time that many families are together, going to and from games, practice, after school activities etc.
- Share your faith- this is simply talking about your daily life, thinking about how God works in all the daily events and activities of your lives together

Every family will approach using *Finding God* at home in a different way because we are all different. We all live and pray differently. Some families will spend time each week working on *Finding God* and some will spend an hour before class. How much time and effort you choose to spend with your child will indicate how much they will absorb. I do encourage you to do one thing above all else and that is to <u>ATTEND WEEKEND MASS AS A FAMILY</u>. That is the most important thing you can do as a family: take the long view, and know that regular attendance at Mass will make a difference in the faith of each member of your family.

Getting Started At Home

1.) Choose a time you will work together on *Finding God.* Choose a day of the week and a time when you can meet consistently. A regular day and time will be easier for your family to adhere to a regular schedule.

2.) Choose where you will work on *Finding God.* Would it work better for your family to work at a table or to sprawl on the floor? Keep in mind that TV and phones are tempting distractions- it's best to silence them during this time.

3.) Choose a place for your family to pray. It would be good to have it be a different location than your work location. Changing location and posture will help you all transition in to a

prayerful mood.

4.) With your children, choose some items that you can use for your prayer environment. You might like to use a cloth that changes with the liturgical seasons or the seasons of the calendar year. You will need a Bible and a candle for prayer.

5.) Young children will need some assistance when reading and working in their textbooks. You may need to work with them or ask an older sibling to help. Take turns reading aloud with young children and offer encouragement as they complete the activities.

6.) Remember by **working and learning together** as a family, your family will grow in faith together. Your family's spirituality will be greatly enhanced. You will have opportunities to share important stories and pray together on a regular basis.

7.) Consider partnering with another family (or two!) and getting together to work on the textbook and at home activities. Parents and children can help each other on the activities. Forming friendships in faith can increase your families enjoyment too!

Grade Objectives

When your child finishes Kindergarten they should know who God is and that God loves them. God sent his son, Jesus, who also loves us. The church is a family who prays together and helps each other. Your child should be able to make the Sign of the Cross correctly and recite the Meal Prayer.

When your child finishes First Grade they should know who Jesus is and that Jesus shows us how to care for each other. One way we learn about God and Jesus is through the Bible. The Commandments are introduced as rules showing us how to live Your child should know how to recite the Hail Mary and the Our Father.

When your child finishes Second Grade they should know about the Trinity (God, the Father, the Son, Jesus and the Holy Spirit). The Church celebrates God's love and forgiveness as we are forgiven our sins. Jesus gives himself in Eucharist, which we receive. In receiving the Sacrament of Reconciliation your child should be able to recite the Act of Contrition and know all the responses used during the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass.

When your child finishes Third Grade they should know more about the Trinity. We worship in Church to show our gratitude to God. The Church is the Body of Christ. They learn about the Seven Sacraments and that they are signs from Jesus for us.

When your child finishes Fourth Grade they should know God's plan is for peace and harmony among all people. Jesus teaches us to love God and others. Human life is sacred because it comes from God. God's forgiveness is without end.

When your child finishes Fifth Grade they should know God speaks through the Church. God sent his son, Jesus, to bring us salvation and new life. The Sacraments give us grace to follow Jesus. The Eucharist unites us to Christ and to our community

People of Faith Adult Component

At the heart of all we are and do as Catholic adults is the revelation of the Good News of Jesus. Our faith is lived in discipleship to Jesus and His message. It is in living out this message of the Gospel we learn to be Christian disciples in our own time, place and circumstances.

The calls to holiness, to community, and to service of God and our neighbor are "facets of Christian life that come to full expression only by means of development and growth toward Christian maturity." This maturity of Christian faith can blossom at any age. We see it in children like Samuel who hear and respond to God's word (1 Samuel 3:1-18). We see it in your people like Mary who ponder and say "yes" to God's call (Luke 1:26-38). We see it in adults and marvel especially at the beauty of faith in those who have persevered in following the Lord over the full course of a lifetime.

Like all living things, a living faith needs nourishment, which the mature adult disciple finds in union with Christ. We receive this nourishment chiefly by active participation in the liturgy. But, it is also maintained by • frequent reading of the word of God, sacred writing of our tradition, and documents of the Church

- involvement in the community life and mission of the Church
- personal prayer
- participation in the works of justice and service to the poor
- fulfilling our human obligations to family and society

A living faith is a searching faith – it "seeks to understand." Adults need to question, probe, and critically reflect on the meaning of God's revelation in their unique lives to grow closer to God.

It is this faith that St William Family Faith Formation wishes to enable you to reach. We invite you to actively participate in our program to see your faith life come alive.

Sacraments at St William's Parish Diocesan Guidelines

The purpose of the sacraments is to sanctify, to build up the body of Christ, and finally to give worship to God. Because they are signs they also instruct. They not only presuppose faith, but by words and objects they also nourish, strengthen and express it.

Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy #59

Sacraments are signs of God's presence among us. They are actions of Christ in the community of the church. By encountering Christ in these actions, we experience the presence and power of God and God's saving grace. The place where this encounter happens is in the gathered assembly of the church.

It is necessary that conversion of heart in response to God's action in our lives precedes the celebration of the sacraments and that commitment to on-going conversion follows. Ritual actions unaccompanied by an on-going journey of faith with the community are stripped of their richness and fullness of life. Sacraments are meant to be actions and celebrations of the entire parish.

Significant Principles in Catechizing And Celebration of Sacraments

1. A faith-relationship with Christ in the church and an on-going conversion of life.

- 2. A process of journeying together as church to determine readiness for reception.
- 3. The involvement of the family of the candidate in the preparation process and in the celebration.
- 4. The participation of the parish community in the preparation and in the celebration.
- 5. Two years of preparation prior to the reception of the sacraments.

Sacrament Preparation at St. William Parish

First Reconciliation & First Eucharist

Sacramental preparation is a separate preparation from the Family Faith Formation program. It is a two year preparation culminating in the reception of the sacraments. During the first year, children regularly attend Faith Formation classes or Catholic School. During the second year, children continue those classes and add the separate sessions to prepare for the sacraments of Reconciliation and First Eucharist during that year. The Sacrament of Reconciliation is prepared for during the fall of the year and celebrated in January. The Sacrament of First Eucharist is prepared for in the winter and celebrated in late spring.

Confirmation

The preparation period for the Sacrament of Confirmation is also a 2 year period. In the Diocese of Venice, a candidate may not be Confirmed before the 10th grade. We suggest, therefore, the preparation period begin in the 9th grade. During the time of preparation, the candidate will attend both the High School Ministry Program (encouraged even if enrolled in a Catholic School and the Confirmation Preparation sessions during each year.)

Catholic Prayers

Praising God is a part of our Catholic faith. God is our touchstone and we need to be learning to communicate with our God from our earliest age. As Catholic parents, we begin by modeling prayer in our homes, at meal times, bedtime, and other important moments in our daily lives. Reminders of God, the Blessed Mother and the Saints of our church, such as a crucifix, the Bible, statues, holy pictures, should be in our homes. A special prayer space or table is recommended complete with the bible and a seasonal liturgical color might be a part of that space. Your children need to learn the following prayers at the earliest age possible. These are the expectations for your child:

Kindergarten: Sign of the Cross Meal Prayer

First Grade: (Add) Hail Mary Our Father

Second Grade: (Add) Act of Contrition

Third Grade: (Add) Apostle's Creed

Fourth/Fifth Grades: All of the above

The Sign Of the Cross

In the name of the Father,

and of the Son,

and of the Holy Spirit, Amen.

Grace Before Meals

Bless us, O Lord, and these your gifts,

which we are about to receive from

thy bounty, through your Christ our Lord, Amen.

Hail Mary

Hail Mary, full of grace.

The Lord is with thee!

Blessed art though among women, and blessed is the fruit of thy womb Jesus.

Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners, now and at the hour of our death, Amen.

* This Act of Contrition is the modern form. If you wish to teach your child the form you may have learned, that is also okay.

and to avoid whatever leads me to sin.

Apostles' Creed

I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth. I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord. He was conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit, and born of the Virgin Mary. He suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried. He descended to the dead. On the third day, he rose again.
