

The final score was South Kent 84, Putnam Science Academy 64, a 20 point loss this past March that Associate Head Coach Josh Scraba called the worst the team had suffered in 10 years. However, while Mustangs head coach Tom Espinosa has never been a believer in good losses, something positive did actually come out of it.


"We went down there that night and got our (butts) kicked," Espinosa said. "However, we played them again the next day, and the coaching staff was just like, "we're going to be in their face, don't let them run anything, total ball pressure everywhere. Ultimately, we did it and we kicked their (butts). And we loved it. We loved how we played like that. So now, we're going to do it again."

As opposed to funneling opponents into the lane, where big men and shot blockers like Osun Osunniyi or Josh Gray once patrolled, Espinosa instead plans to have his Mustangs apply constant, intense ball pressure. He will stress playing all of the passing lanes, relying on a smaller and more athletic group in this upcoming 2021-22 season than most Mustang Teams of years past. Last year's team was guard-heavy as well, but the commitment to this new style will be from Game 1. This year's team really only has two prototypical post players on the current roster as opposed to having the traditional abundant size that Espinosa loves to deploy. None the less, like last year, Espinosa is OK with that. "Early on, when we were really getting good as a program, we didn't have a lot of bigs, and our guards really carried us," he said. "So we've been here before and we know how to win with a smaller team, we're excited for the change with how we're going to play anyway. I think it's going to really help us not having these big bigs out there. It'll be high quality, being small and more athletic. Our style that we're looking for and that we recruited, we've got everyone."



The backcourt is loaded with a mix of talent in terms of both age and experience.

Darryl Simmons is in his fifth year at the school, third with the prep team (second as a starter), and has proven to everyone that he can run a team at this level after averaging 12.1 points, 4.4 assists, and 1.7 steals while guiding the Mustangs to an 18-3 record last season. A natural leader to whom teammates gravitate, Simmons is hyper-focused on delivering a national championship. He'll be aided mightily by the ultra-smooth and wildly talented Desmond Claude, a 6-foot-5 transfer from St. Thomas More whose stock skyrocketed over the summer and is being mentioned in some circles as a future pro. Arturo Dean is undersized at 6-feet, but compensates with a nonstop motor and relentless toughness that infects the rest of the team. Dashon (DayDay) Gittens, who spent last year at Woodstock Academy, is long and athletic and only scratching the surface of how good he can be.



Miles Rose is back after spending the second half of the last season at PSA. He has great size and terrific skill, not to mention the mindset to put his struggles of last year behind him and regain the confidence that could make him one of the team's most unsuspecting threats. Lee Hubbard III is expected to provide valuable minutes off the bench with his work ethic and toughness. Taiga Jones, PSA's first student-athlete from Japan, has delivered on his scouting report as a solid player who can shoot it and defend. He has been a revelation in the preseason as has Sotirios Nafpliotis, PSA's first student-athlete from Greece, whose ability to knock down 3's in bunches from anywhere was too much to keep off the big guard's game has fit right in, as he has exhibited the ability to shoot and push the ball at any time. Travis Upchurch is even younger, but has the coaching staff just as excited about his future. The cousin of former Mustangs' point guard Danny Upchurch, Travis will benefit from the experience of being on the prep team and learning the system and culture now.

PSA's wings are two highly talented and versatile players who will have a major impact on this season. Mouhamed Dioubate struggled after joining the team last year during the second semester but has come back a different player. He is looking to build off a huge summer and can absolutely dominate a game on the offensive glass. Barry Evans Jr., the recent St. Bonaventure commit, has gotten everyone's attention in the preseason after showing he can do just about everything well on the court.

The frontcourt is filled out by Josh Rivera, who has a college-ready body and has battled an injury since the summer, but could provide major minutes when he's ready; Mouhamdou Cisse, a 7-footer who can control the paint on defense and has a functional post game on offense; and Muazibini Adamu, another young and raw talent who is expected to use this season as a learning experience ahead of a bright future.

"Darryl, is the perfect guy for how we want to play," Espinosa said. "Arturo is perfect for that. Day Day is perfect for that. Barry on the wing... Plus, we play half or more than half our games in our gym this season and that makes it even tougher for opponents to run their stuff."

PSA is also joining a new league this year, the New England Basketball League, which, as the name suggests, features the top teams from the region. The Mustangs will play in the South Division along with Cushing Academy, St. Thomas More, South Kent and Woodstock Academy; Brewster Academy, Bridgton Academy, New Hampton, Northfield Mount Hermon, and Vermont Academy will make up the North Division.

The endgame, as always, is to be the last team standing in March. The Mustangs won their first national championship in 2018, their second in 2020, and they believe this is a team that can capture a third.

"Overall, we're really excited about this team," Espinosa said. "We're going to be a little different, but I think we've got some leadership, a mixture of some young guys and experienced guys, but young guys who are ready. Also, I think with our style it's going to be a lot of fun."

Tom Espinosa HEAD COACH 16th year at PSA

The goal was simple. To get better every year and if that happened, Tom Espinosa really believed that he could build something very special at Putnam Science Academy. Now entering his 16th season as head coach at the small prep school in Northeastern Connecticut, it is fair to say that goal has been met and exceeded!

Espinosa has built the school's prep basketball program into a national power house, one that coaches and players unilaterally hold in the highest regard. Under the watchful eye of the 43 year-old Putnam native, the Mustangs have gone 374-82 dating back to the inaugural 2006-07 season.



In the last 10 years, PSA has gone 301-57, won two national championships and sent more than 100 players into men's college programs - including more than 50 into Division I alone. Espinosa is proud of the process he followed to get to this point. "When I started the first varsity program in 2006-07, I wanted to build this thing and I feel like we did it the right way," he said. "We didn't just bring in 12 high-major recruits and just be nasty in our first year. We incorporated the other kids who were already here. That first year, I brought in one recruit and built everything around him. And then two years later, we brought in three or four recruits, but still having the other kids be part of the team and playing big roles. Every year, we just grew and got better. We were in low leagues, stayed independent, played better competition, and now we've built ourselves a real good reputation and a powerhouse schedule. I feel like we did it the right way. It took us a little while to get going, but we've done pretty well."

Espinosa - who, along with his wife Trish, resides in Putnam with their three children, sons T.J. and Bryce, and daughter Teagan - credits the school's administration for allowing him to follow his vision. He said that building a national program was, and continues to be possible because of their support starting with the original ownership company and continuing today with the current owner, Dr. Tieqiang Ding.

A tremendous game coach and evaluator of talent, Espinosa has gained a reputation for having some of the most well-prepared and hardest-working teams in the country, while also stressing and developing strong fundamentals in each of his players. That comes at a bit of a cost for Espinosa. "During their time here, players don't have the best relationships with Espo because he doesn't want it that way," said associate head coach Josh Scraba, who has worked alongside Espinosa since the 2008-09 season. "Some of them despise him when they're here. Because they don't realize what he's trying to do and the full message of what he is trying to do. He's always got an end plan for this though. Five years down the road or whenever it clicks for these kids, they look back and realize they wouldn't be here without him."



What he is trying to do is prepare them for the next level. Espinosa firmly believes that a college freshman who spends a post grad year at PSA will be far ahead of one who went straight from high school. Freshman ups and downs - like living on your own, balancing school and basketball, working hard all the time - are experienced first at PSA instead. The Mustangs do not just send players on to college, they get them ready to compete and have success on and off the court. "That's the mentality we stress," Espinosa said. "If you want it, you have to go get it. Because we've got too much talent here to wait around. You can be great for two months and then all of a sudden you fall off a bit. Whatever it is, you don't want to get out of bed, you're allergic to the weight room, you don't do your work in class... we've got 10, 11 DI players to choose from. We'll just take the next guy. Nothing is given to them. Everything is earned. And that's how college athletics is. Everything is earned the entire time. Nothing is going to be given to you. You have to bring it everyday. The kids know it, it's not a secret. We stress it when they come on a visit. From Day One of meetings, they know it. I've never promised a kid he'll start, he'll play, any of that. Everything is earned."

That piece of Espinosa's personality was solidified by some of his coaches, Tony Falzarano and Dave Vitale at Putnam High School, where he finished third on the all-time scoring list, and Dave Lindberg at Worcester State University in Massachusetts, where he was a three-year starter and team captain as a junior and senior.

"It's a long season for these kids," Espinosa said. "It's five, six months, 40-something games. Everyone goes through it. It happens every year. Guys are up, then they go down. As a consequence, that's when we find someone else who is ready."

Espinosa cited the 2019-20 national championship team as a perfect example. Mekhi Gray started off strong, tailed off, but bounced back toward the end of the season and was instrumental in winning the title. D'Maurian Wiliams faced those same struggles, but PSA wouldn't have won without him. Also, the greatest example of all, Espinosa said, was Johnnie Williams IV. He was the last man on the bench, essentially serving as a practice player for the first 25 or so games before earning his way into the starting lineup and becoming the team's second leading scorer over the final 10 games. As a result of all these instances in the past, Espinosa and Scraba don't necessarily have to recruit as hard as they once did - not because they expect players to just reach out to them or just show up - but because they want to rely on former players to tell the story of PSA. Espinosa and Scraba will often put recruits and their families in touch with former PSA players - and their families - who previously played for him.

"We are very confident in what they will say." Espinosa said.

The first big recruit to help PSA on its way was Dayshon "Scoochie" Smith for the 2011-12 season. He came from the Bronx, N.Y., and brought a lot of hype with him over his two years at Putnam.





"When we got Scoochie, we had camera crews here for him and got a lot of publicity through that. We started getting invited to national-level tournaments and events," Espinosa said. "Scoochie definitely put us on to that next level. Then Hamidou Diallo and Mamadou Diarra and that era of 2014-15 brought us to the next level where we can get anybody in here and can beat anybody. They gave us that mentality and confidence that there was no stopping us now. We had high major players and pro prospects. That era, 2015-16, is when we hit that level of the sky is the limit here. Kids know they're on the national stage now. Before, it was kind of like 'oh boy, we really had to sell this place, get the gym all cleaned up and looking perfect.' We lost a lot of kids because of our facilities then. However, the success we've had and the great kids we've had who bought into what we do here.... that's why I say they're our best recruiters."

"It's been a long road to get to this point. It came with plenty of challenges and bumps in the road," Espinosa said. When Scraba joined the staff, winning a national title was part of the discussion. "I wouldn't say we had our doubts, but we knew it wouldn't be easy. We still talk about it.. our biggest goal for the longest time was to win a national championship and we almost couldn't believe that we did it. We had that vision to become a national program, and to actually have done it, it is something special."



Josh Scraba has more then 3,200 contacts in his phone, 3,246 (at last check) to be exact. And he estimates that probably 3,000 of them are basketball related.

Such is the life for the Putnam Science Academy Men's Prep Basketball Associate Head Coach. To know him is to know that at any minute he might have to pause your face-to-face conversation to take this phone call from a coach, a parent, an agent, a current player or a former player. "If I don't use my phone on a Saturday, it'll be 20-30 calls that I would have to make on that Sunday," said Scraba, who is entering his 13th season with the Mustangs. "I've really fallen in love with the recruiting process and getting to know the players and families. I love finding the talent. I like the networking part of it, building connections, getting to know people and kids."

The 34-year-old Scraba is genuine in his relationships and makes people around him feel comfortable. He is a self-described talker, which really is perfect for his role as the lead recruiter for a basketball program that has sent more than 100 players into men's college basketball programs since 2010 - including more than 50 into Division I. "At first, it was about basketball," said C.J. Anthony, a member of last year's prep team. "But the more we talked, it wasn't just about basketball. He just wanted the best for me. I really believe that. A lot of people don't want that, they just want what's best for themselves. Talking to Coach Scraba, he was all about me and getting me to the right spot and the right school. It was an instant connection for me right there. His networking is incredible. For me to be able to work under him and help me get into the right situation for college, that's an opportunity you can't pass up."

Scraba doesn't just help bring in the talent though; he helps develop it too, and Putnam Science Academy has won two national prep championships in the last three years with Scraba in such a prominent position. "I just kept giving him more and more responsibility because I saw the passion and work ethic, and he earned my trust," Mustangs Head Coach Tom Espinosa said. "We've been doing it for 13 years. I trust him, he trusts me. He has just nailed it. Getting players is the key and his biggest strength is recruiting kids and building relationships. I don't think there is anyone better, I really don't. I've been so lucky to have him. We have a great relationship, and this is an intense situation with a lot of pressure. It's kind of the perfect relationship because the things I enjoy, he doesn't as much, and the things he enjoys, I don't as much."



Scraba, a native of Putnam, came to Putnam Science Academy for the 2009-10 season, the year his younger brother Travis did a post grad season at the school. That was a few years before the Mustangs became a nationally known program. "I followed PSA a little bit because my brother hung out a lot off the court with Rundell Mauge, when he was at PSA," Scraba said. "Espo had asked me in passing a few times about coming over here, but it really wasn't until my brother came that it was the right time for me too. At that point, we weren't thinking about winning a national championship. That was our goal, but I guess the first motivation was to get a Division I basketball player in here. We were just hoping to get a couple of guys who could play. I looked at it like we were trying to give kids a chance to be seen and kind of be that school for kids in Connecticut who maybe another school wouldn't take."

Slowly but surely, Putnam Science Academy started getting those higher-level players, starting with Scoochie Smith (who went on to play at the University of Dayton) in 2011-12. The following season's team, which had four Division I commits, was the breakthrough team that catapulted Putnam Science Academy.

"I think it switched for us in 2013," Scraba said. "We went on an incredible run where we just beat everyone, everywhere. St. Thomas More at St. Thomas More, which never happened. We beat Northfield Mount Hermon in Boston. We kind of forced our way into the tournament that year by just winning. It was a really tough group of kids that probably wasn't even supposed to be there, and I think that changed everything for us. Finally, it became a reality that we could be a Top 10 team in the country."



Scraba said the recruiting piece of his job came about organically, that it wasn't even a thought when he came aboard. Everywhere he went, he would meet people and talk to them and started building his network. His advice to young and aspiring coaches is to help people who owe them nothing in return. So if Scraba happens to see a player one night who he thinks would be a good fit at the University of New Haven, he digs into that contact list and calls his guy there.

"I really started liking connecting with players and coaches," he said. "I like helping the coaches and helping the kids. It was just help anyone you can - player, coach, whoever. That's how the networking all started and then it's been sort of endless from there. I'll get a name of a player, and keep in mind, there's hundreds of kids we don't end up with in the end, but that one player turns into two relationships with a couple of coaches and a new college coach who isn't in your network and they give you the names of three players and an AAU coach. You're building six contacts off of one kid."

All of his success in this role has changed his career aspirations. Though he once wanted to be a head coach somewhere, Scraba now says he is quite at home right where he is, in the second chair, and with his phone, always ready to go.

Some superheroes are the products of tragedy, others originate by seizing an opportunity, and some superheros find their origins in the pure, random luck of a chance encounter.

Kevin Donovan was in his first year as an assistant coach with Putnam Science Academy's men's prep basketball team, and word of his excitable nature in the gym had spread. Before one fateful game, he crossed paths in the bathroom with the Vermont Academy head coach. As Donovan recalls, "(The coach) said, 'So I hear you're the hype man.' And I was like, 'Yeah, I am The Hype Man.' And from then on, I've been The Hype Man."



So who - and what - exactly is The Hype Man?

"He's the loudest guy in the gym," said PSA head coach Tom Espinosa. "Jumping in the piles, chest-bumping the kids."

"He's the one screaming 'ON HIS HEAD!' when one of our guys dunks on somebody," said associate head coach Josh Scraba.

"He brings that vibe and energy every day. You don't know how he's going to show up and what he's going to do," said player C.J. Anthony.

"He's the guy who, if the energy goes down for even a second, he's quick and just screaming 'LET'S GOOOO' and getting us back up." said Nic Louis-Jacques, who was with the team in the first semester.

Also, like all superheroes, The Hype Man does have his own distinct look.

"He always comes with some heat. You've got to look at his feet every single day. He has something different on his feet every day," Louis-Jacques said. "Sometimes he's got some crazy pants or shirt on."

Added Anthony: "He comes with the fits, the clothes, like the 90s M.C. Hammer pants or the pink hoodie and the blue Carolina sneakers. He's motivation for me to get my drip up."

This is not some made up persona for the 32-year-old Donovan. Before joining the PSA staff at the outset of the 2016-17 season, he was coaching nearby at his high school alma mater, Norwich Free Academy. It was one of the better basketball programs in the league. However, he was coaching 6-foot-3 centers and 5-foot-3 point guards. Eventually, he walked into PSA's gym for his first day of practice and saw the 6-foot-9 Isaac Kante and 6-foot-10 Alexis Yenta and 6-foot-11 Malik Ondingo.

"That first day, I was so excited to be a part of it, I just showed my emotions," Donovan said. "That's kind of how The Hype Man developed. It just came out. Basically, I just get really excited to be part of this program and to be part of very high-level basketball. This is something that I love. I have a passion for high-level basketball!"

Donovan's alter-ego - calm, quiet, patient, level-headed - serves him well at the school, where he has worked his way from math teacher to Dean of Students in his six years, and as a father, to son Quincy. He readily acknowledges the different personalities that his different roles require, and neither of them are forced. In both places, he is who he is.

"He's laid back, always happy, and wants to say yes to everybody for everything. He never stirs anything up, he's not loud," said Scraba, a close friend who knows him as well as anyone. "Then he walks in the gym and he's immediately yelling "BOOM" when someone hits a 3-pointer."

But to be clear, Donovan isn't just some cartoon character. The energy he brings to the sideline is just as important, and he has a terrific basketball mind.

"He's one of those guys that the players really, really relate to and he's great at building relationships with the guys," Espinosa said. "He's really good with sets, and X's and O's, especially offensively. He's kind of our guy with quick hitters... side out of bounds, two seconds left, that kind of thing. He's really good with that."



That's a strength developed over countless hours of coaching, watching, and studying the game. After graduating from Eastern Connecticut State University, he wasn't even sure coaching was in his future, so he went back to NFA to work with his good friend Garvin McAllister, who was coaching the freshman team there. Donovan kept working his way up, and when he started coaching at the AAU level, he got the exposure to that high-level game and studying high level players.

"One thing that I really like to do is analyze X's and O's," he said. "I think that analyzing the game, being able to read defenses and what they're going to do as well as game planning from there is something I have a strength in. I like analyzing players and looking at their tendencies and breaking down every part of it. I really think that is one of my strengths."



Donovan is very detail-oriented, and he jokes about some of his early scouting reports. "My first scout was like seven pages long and had pictures and everything. Then I see Scraba has like a napkin with some scribbles that he just throws out there, and I'm like 'OK, I can tone it down a little bit."

Rest assured though that he will not tone it down on the sidelines. The Hype Man said he "doesn't like to be in a quiet gym."





By late summer 2018, Dana Valentine had been working his full-time job at the Governor's Office in Massachusetts as part of Charlie Baker's staff for nearly a year. However, he knew months earlier that it wasn't really for him.

He worked in Constituent Services, which is a fancy way of saying he took "phone calls from people all over the state complaining that there's a pothole here, there are protesters there, or people having problems with Governor Baker's comments about whatever topic



they had problems with. Anything and everything that people would complain about." Valentine said.

"Adults are a lot harder to deal with than children. That, and wearing a shirt and tie every day quickly made me realize that wasn't my lane. Governor Baker is a real down-to-earth guy, we had some good conversations about a lot of different things. However, it wasn't my thing."

Coaching basketball, however, was. Valentine played football in high school and college, but he understood basketball at a deeper level. He had coached some AAU programs and he helped out at Notre Dame Prep before it relocated out of nearby Fitchburg, Mass. He was ready to take a leap of faith without any real plan and get serious about it, leaving his stable job for a chance to coach.

It wasn't long before he got a call from PSA Athletic Director Tom Espinosa, who needed a coach for the school's Varsity team. Valentine jumped at the opportunity that basically started the next day, and he finds himself now in his fourth season with the Mustangs, entrenched as an integral piece of the program's success. "He's done a great job," Espinosa said. "He does a great job with all the teams and it's not easy, because you're dealing with a lot of kids who think they should be on the prep team and he's got to handle all that plus coach them on the floor. The kids really like him and really respect him. He's been a great addition to our program."

Valentine is now an assistant coach on PSA's Prep team. The 29-year-old also has close interaction with the Elite and Varsity teams, as he is a regular at practice and assists with individual player workouts throughout the day. Being able to turn on pretty much any college basketball game on any given night and seeing someone he has coached or has coached against on the floor is a big perk of the job for him. There is so much more to it.

Valentine grew up in Roxbury, MA., which is inner city Boston, but was part of the METCO program (Metropolitan Council for Educational Opportunity) - a school integration program that enrolls Boston students of color in high-performing, predominately white public schools in the suburbs - from first grade through high school graduation.

"That definitely opened my eyes that there was a lot more out there for me and for the people back at home," Valentine said. "I just think that there is so much talent in the inner cities, and not just in terms of athletics. Talent in guys and girls who don't have the same opportunities and resources available. The people I am friends with in Roxbury don't have a computer lab in their school or all the textboolks that we had at Cohasset High School. To see the things that people were able to accomplish without having the same opportunities as me, it motivates me to help people in those situations get those resources and to have opportunities to get in touch with those resources."

"I just want guys who might be in a similar situation that I was in to have the same opportunities to change their lives and their families' lives. That's not to say they are the only people who need the help or opportunities, but I feel that there is such an abundance of talent in different areas who need those opportunities. As I got down the line and finished school, I thought that I could help younger guys do the same thing. The fact that you can impact these guys and send someone to the NBA or send a guy to these high-level schools where they don't have to pay for college, that was one of the big attractions."

When it is time for basketball, Valentine sets a standard and holds his players accountable for their actions. He is an intense and demanding coach.

"Life isn't all about basketball, but in between those lines, a different switch goes off," he said. "We rachet it up to a different level of intensity and attention to detail that you need to bring. As their coach, I have to set a standard and hold them accountable for those things. Accountability is one of the biggest things that I am about."

Says Darryl Simmons: "He loves to win and hates losing, so he wants everyone to play hard, dive for loose balls, communicate. He's demanding."



That coaching style works for Valentine and his players because of the off-court relationships that he builds.

"Coach Dana is someone you want to be around," Simmons said. "He's a leader. He always tells us that it's bigger than basketball and to control what you can control. You have to have the mindset that he can be hard on you, but it's because he cares, and that it's going to be better for you in the long run."

Said Valentine, "A lot of our kids come from underprivileged situations. The kids are mostly African-American kids from different cities around the country," Valentine said. "To have someone who comes from where they come from and looks how they look and knows the language, I just think it's important for those guys to feel a sense of comfort and home. I think I can give some guys that level of comfort in addition to the basketball piece. I can provide a different perspective and be a person to bounce things off of. It's more for the students and athletes."



John Cavaliere Assistant Coach Elite Head Coach



John Cavaliere enters his first season at PSA as the Head Coach of the men's Elite Varisty Team.

He is a major addition to the Mustang program, as he has eight years of college coaching experience, including the last three years as the head coach of Division II Concordia College. The 33-year-old Cavaliere demands energy, toughness, and core ideas. "We're not backing away. No matter who you are, we're coming at you. We're bringing the fight to you," he said. "If you're able to run your stuff against us, we're not playing our style of basketball." Cavaliere started his coaching career at Concordia after graduating college, then worked his way up to the top spot through an unparalleled dedication to the team. Cavaliere has PSA connections, as he recruited (and landed) former Mustangs Dan Porcic and Luc Brittian to the Clippers. 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


In what is now the eighth year together, PSA has partnered with Westview Sports Medicine, located conveniently in nearby Killingly, Connecticut to give our student athletes "comprehensive health care services that include a very integrated and holistic approach to injury prevention, injury recognition and assessment, treatment, and reconditioning," as stated on their website.

Headed by Alex Williams, who also created the sports medicine program in 2013, Westview uses its state-of-the-art outpatient facilities to provide the highest quality health care possible and help maintain the safety and welfare of all who participate in athletics. Among the equipment at the facility are anti-gravity treadmills, a Biodex Balance System, a multi-sport virtual simulator, and upper body and bicycle ergometers.

Patrick Wyman, in his thrd year, is Putnam Science Academy's on-site athletic trainer.

"I think we are very fortunate to be able to work with Westview and have them handle all of our sports medicine services and training program," PSA head coach Tom Espinosa said. "Those guys - Alex, Patrick, and all of the other trainers at Westview who help our students out - they do such a good job of caring for the student-athlete first and foremost. Whether it's injury prevention or rehabbing something, our kids get the best treatment and are able to do what they love to do, whether it's basketball, soccer or whatever."

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

It is what coaches Tom Espinosa and Josh Scraba had in mind when they started building the program so many years ago, and what drives them and every player who puts on a Mustangs' uniform then and now and going forward.

"That's the goal, every year," said Darryl Simmons, who was a little-used reserve on the 2020 team, but is now the face of the program as their starting point guard. "We put everything else aside, we focus on winning games, and winning another championship. Everything else will take care of itself. Hassan Diarra is the only one with two rings. I've got one. I want three."

Diarra was one of 11 Division I scholarship players on that team (that includes Simmons, who already holds about a dozen offers). He was the team's leading scorer and left as the program's all-time leading scorer. The day of the national prep final was to be held was the day that Covid ripped through the sports world and put everything on hold. The NCAA cancelled its conference tournaments and the national tournament that day, the NBA, Major League Baseball, and the NHL shut down.





The National Prep Tournament's title game was also called off, and Putnam Science Academy was crowned co-champions along with Brewster Academy, the other semi-finalist.

The run to the first championship, just two years earlier in 2018, had been building. The Mustangs reached the Final Four three years in a row before breaking through and finally winning it all.

The Mustangs' went 36-4 that year, but it was never as easy as it looked. Espinosa called that group one of the most challenging he's ever had, with both individual and team ups and downs, on and off the court.

"But the bottom line was, guys fought through it and everyone came together," he said. "It was very symbolic of what we try to do here. We tell the kids all the time that it's going to take everyone."

"That was the dream when we started the Varsity program in 2007," Espinosa said. "It was an unbelievable feeling. It was surreal. That was the top of the mountain." That further fueled the program. "As a staff, we wanted that feeling again," he said. "Dealing with so many new kids year after year, a lot of them have never experienced a championship before. Darryl is the only player on the team that has been through it with us. You want them all to experience it, so that's part of the drive. I think too, that sometimes when people win something, they lose motivation. Fortunately that's not our case. We got another taste of 2020 and we are still hungry as ever. The first one put an X on our backs, so there's no relaxing for us."


