



The Best and Worst Things about being a Wildlife Gardener

What are the best and worst things about being a wildlife gardener?

Becoming a wildlife gardener is like becoming a quiet steward of your own tiny kingdom - where bees rule the air, hedgehogs shuffle under the moonlight, and every flower seems to have an audience. It's not just gardening; it's cultivating life. And while there's immense joy in that, there are thorns among the roses too.

The Best Thing: Reconnecting with Nature

The most rewarding part of wildlife gardening is the deep sense of connection to the natural world. Unlike conventional gardening where aesthetics often lead, wildlife gardening prioritises life - native plants, pollinators, and habitats for all kinds of creatures. Watching a previously lifeless patch of lawn transform into a buzzing, fluttering haven is genuinely magical. Each season brings new visitors: butterflies basking on wildflowers in the summer, frogs hopping through damp nooks in spring, and birds gorging on berries in autumn. There's an intimacy in observing these interactions - seeing that a pile of decaying logs becomes a home for beetles or that a hedgerow harbours nesting birds. You become attuned to subtle changes, like the timing of a bee's arrival or the sound of owls at dusk.

And it's not just about the wildlife - it's about your own wellbeing too. Studies consistently show that time in nature reduces stress, improves focus, and enhances mental health. Wildlife gardening offers that daily dose of natural therapy, right outside your door.

The Worst Thing: Battling with Compromise (and Slugs)

But it's not always meadow songs and butterflies. The hardest part of wildlife gardening is learning to live with a certain amount of mess - and relinquishing control. While traditional gardening often prides itself on neat borders and exotic blooms, wildlife gardening can appear unruly. Neighbours may not appreciate your 'untidy' patch of nettles or the 'weeds' you're carefully encouraging. You'll also need to reframe your expectations. Forget slug pellets and pristine roses - those very slugs are food for birds and hedgehogs. Aphids on your roses? They're just dinner for the ladybirds and lacewings. At times, your role isn't as much designer as it is humble host - offering space for life, even when it chews holes through your best-loved leaves.

It also takes patience. You won't see a thriving mini ecosystem overnight. Sometimes it's a season - or several - before wildlife really moves in. And yes, some battles are literal: protecting young plants from voracious rabbits or calming your frustration when the fox digs up your bulbs again.

Final Thoughts

Being a wildlife gardener is about choosing wildness over perfection, life over order, and wonder over control. The best parts feed your soul. The worst parts teach humility. And somewhere in that balance, you find a kind of peace - a small, joyful rebellion against a world that too often forgets how beautiful wild can be.



The volunteer Yarnton Flood Defence Group has continued to work on a number of things to try and help reduce the flooding situation in Yarnton:

- I. After many, many meetings and a great deal of effort (including everyone reporting instances of flooding over the past year), Oxfordshire County Council, who are the Lead Local Flood Authority have written and published an S.19 flood report for Yarnton. Not only is this a first for Yarnton, with the County Council and the District Council finally acknowledging that Yarnton suffers from flooding, but this is crucial in unlocking a number of other initiatives. The report confirms everything we've been working on, in terms of flood risk and causes, and makes recommendations without being judgmental. You can read the report by searching for Section 19 Flood Investigation Report on Google.
- 2. We've applied for, and been granted, funding to undertake a series of drainage projects in the village to help alleviate and better cope with flooding when it happens. The first of these projects is to dig a 50m long stretch of main river water-course out by the Scout hut, removing silt and plant growth that builds up over time, pending appropriate permissions from the Environment Agency. This stretch of the ditch is the only part of that watercourse that is not owned by Sanctuary.

This work will be commissioned by the Parish Council for the benefit of the community, and will hopefully serve as an example to other land owners that watercourses need to be maintained properly in order to flow. We're also hoping that if we have somewhere lower to pump water to in an emergency, we will have open access (fenced off for safety) to a watercourse that is at a good, lower serviceable level.

We believe that areas where ditches haven't been cleared are a cause for some of the flooding issues we often see. However, we can't be certain as this is a complex issue, with many interlinked hydrological issues, but every little helps to improve the overall drainage situation.

- 3. Sanctuary (who are responsible for a number of water courses in Yarnton) commenced 'Stage One' of their outlined plan of works to improve flows in main river arterial water-courses in Yarnton by clearing plant growth and silt on 28th July. This first stage addresses the upstream areas, with subsequent stages of work moving down-stream.
- 4. Thames Water have updated the Merton Way pumping station, including installing new switching gear, upgrading the fabric of the building itself with a new roof and changes to the windows and security of the building. Cassington Road is having modern pipes laid to replace the collapsed old pitch-fibre pipes, which we expect to improve sewage flow out of the village.

Our annual Yarnton Flood Defence Group meeting between all relevant agencies and local landowners is taking place in late October. We will publish an update on actions and decisions following that meeting.

As a reminder, as we enter the wet season, key resources to keep in mind are:

OxfordshireFloodToolkit.com and **FloodMary.com**: Information on how to cope if you are impacted by flooding.

FixMyStreet.com: To report any highway-related matters (e.g. blocked drains, gulleys, water-courses). **ThamesWater.co.uk(Report a Problem)**: Please report any issues with foul sewage overflows near water-courses.

Gov.uk (Sign up for flood warnings): To receive advanced, localised flood warnings.

Permitted Development and Home Extensions

I am often asked by people who are thinking about extending their property and have assumed that, because the extension that they are considering falls within the limits of permitted development, no planning approval is required and that they can just get on with it.

Permitted development applies to the enlargement or other alterations to a dwelling, provided that it is not listed or located in a conservation area, a national park or an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, or Site of Special Scientific Interest for larger homes, and only applies to houses and not maisonettes, flats, or other buildings. There may also be other restrictions known as Article 4 directions applying to a particular property.

Extensions to the front of the property do not fall within permitted development, but some side extensions may be permitted development. Verandahs, balconies and raised platforms are not permitted development and will require planning permission, although Juliet balconies, where there is no platform and therefore no external access, would normally be permitted development.

Permitted development rights apply to specific types of dwellings, and this is where it can get a bit complicated. Single-storey rear extensions must not extend beyond the rear wall of the original house by more than 3 metres if it is a semi-detached or terraced house or no more than 4 metres if a detached house. Original house means the house as it was first built or as it stood on 1st July 1948 (if it was built before that date). Although you may not have built an extension to the house, a previous owner may have done so. In 2015 planning legislation was amended to increase these limits to 6 metres and 8 metres respectively. Whilst it is correct that Planning Approval is not required if the proposed extension falls within the relevant permitted development criteria, a different kind of approval is required from the local planning authority, confirming that the proposed work is indeed permitted development. For extensions of up to 3 metres for semi-detached or terraced houses and up to 4 metres if a detached house, a Lawful Development: Proposed Use application is required. For extensions under the 2015 planning legislation, a Prior Approval: Larger Home Extension application is required, and will include consultation with neighbouring properties. In both scenarios, the local planning authority must be notified with the relevant application before the development commences. Supporting information in the form of existing and proposed plans and elevations of the proposed extension must accompany the application.

If the local planning authority decides that the work does not fall within permitted development limits, then a Householder Planning Application will be required for the work. If an extension has been built without either a Lawful Development Certificate or a Prior Approval Notification, the local planning authority can require a Householder Planning Application to be submitted for approval. If planning approval is not obtained for an extension already built, and an Appeal against the decision is dismissed by the Planning Inspector, the local planning authority can issue a Planning Enforcement Notice against the construction of an illegal building, requiring it to be demolished at the householder's expense.

Permitted development doesn't just apply to extensions, and includes the installation of solar panels or other alterations to the roof of a house such as dormers or the alteration or replacement of a chimney, as well as outbuildings, swimming pools and even LPG or oil containers.

Oxford Bus and Morris Motors Museum

As part of the Oxford Open Doors festival organised by the Oxford Preservation Trust, we shall be giving free bus rides round the City of Oxford on Saturday 13th September. We shall be based in Bonn Square and running regular buses from 10.30 a.m. until 3.30 p.m.. Most people board our buses at either Bonn Square or next to Nuffield College, but the buses will pick up at other points around the city. Details are on our website.

Our Bullnose Morris was one of 54,151 cars built by William Morris in 1925. It was Morris's golden year as this was 41% of the total British private motor car production. Only seven years earlier his production had been only 387 cars - 99% less. Morris had been reducing his prices each year in the early 1920s. For 1925 the price of the Morris Cowley fell by £30 to £195, and the two-seater fell by £23 to £175, despite introducing balloon tyres as standard and other upgrades.

The British economy stuttered in 1926 and sales were well down on 1925 with only 32,183 being despatched. By now the car design could be traced back to 1913 and looked old-fashioned. The company needed to modernise its cars, so the Bullnose radiator was discarded.





Our museums house lots of oddities. One is the pictured pub sign from 'The Bullnose Morris' when it was operated by the Oxford brewers, Morrells.

The pub was opened in 1969 by Morrells in Watlington Road, Blackbird Leys and had a good trade when Oxford United was playing at home. It was affectionately known as 'The Bully'. The pub passed indirectly to Greene King when the Morrell family sold the Lion Brewery in St. Thomas Street in central Oxford, but was closed permanently in October 2020 as a direct result of Covid.

Updates on 'Botley West' The Examination - What's the Latest?

The 2nd set of the Planning Inspectorate's written questions were published on 30 July.

We were pleased to see that, once again, the Examiners have been very thorough and have taken on board the many concerns of Interested Parties (IPs) - that's all of us who registered back in February - who have sent in representations and responses to them. Nine times the Examiners say they are 'minded to agree' with responses from District Councils and other key parties. They have now asked for answers to another 177 questions, 147 of which are targeted at the Applicant (PVDP).

The Examining Authority asked the PVDP (the Applicant) to justify its choices, design, methodology and conclusions. They have requested that PVDP consider reductions or omissions in 7 additional solar panel areas and asked again for several answers and documents that hadn't been provided! Several questions refer directly to responses from individuals or groups - this means that your responses are being read in detail by the Examiners, taken seriously and used as the basis for further questions - so, well done and read below to see how you can keep them coming!

When are the deadlines?

- •22nd August 2025 (Deadline 4) PVDP's answers along with other submissions were due and will have been published shortly after this date
- •12th September 2025 (Deadline 5) Responses to the Applicants' answers and to other submissions are due.

Key questions. We have produced a list of some of the key questions the Examiners have asked the Applicant and you can read this at stopbotleywest.com. Important topics include questions about the need for Botley West at all; Blenheim company structure and trustees; project funding and whether the whole thing will simply be sold off; loss of agricultural land; why it is proposed to compulsorily purchase land; protecting our heritage, including listed churches and other unique properties; risks associated with flooding; landscape visual impacts; noise pollution; the impact on residential visual amenity,

But - this is just the tip of the iceberg and there are many more needing answers from PVDP.

How should you respond? Look out for PVDP's answers to the Examiners' questions - some *will* affect you! Send your comments to the Examiners by the deadline of **12**th **September.**

Go to <u>stopbotleywest.com</u> for more help and information. We are reaching another important set of milestones in the Planning Inspectorate's consideration of PVDP's application for permission to go ahead with Botley West solar power station, so please make your voice heard at every opportunity.

News from St. Bartholomew's - September Dates and Events

Sunday 1st September: Creation Sunday

We will keep Creation Sunday at St. Bartholomew's on 1st September at our 8 a.m. and 11 a.m. services. From 1st September to 4th October many churches across denominations observe a season of 'Creationtide'. This is a period dedicated to praying for the care of our world, and all life, reflecting on the ways in which human agency has caused great harm to the earth, its vulnerable species and peoples, and seeking to act wisely and responsibly in response.

The theme for the Season of Creation 2025 is 'peace with creation', based on Isaiah 32:14-18. The prophet Isaiah pictured the desolated Creation without peace because of the lack of justice and the broken relationship between people and God. 'The fortress will be abandoned, the noisy city deserted; citadel and watchtower will become a wasteland forever, the delight of donkeys, a pasture for flocks.' (Isa 32.14).

Isaiah foretells a time of restoration and healing within the same passage and so gives a vision of hope. Christian hope is not simply a static reflection, but a dynamic momentum to take responsibility: to act, to pray, to seek change and justice. In observing Creationtide we acknowledge and grasp this hope and consider how we are acting in response to the climate crisis.

Saturday 13th September: Open House Weekend

St. Bartholomew's will be open (as always) on the weekend of the 'Open Doors Festival', running in and around Oxford. The annual festival offers a weekend where many historic buildings, community spaces and places that are not usually accessible to the public, are opened to all, giving people the opportunity to enjoy the city's heritage and culture for free. Yarnton Manor is open for Open House Festival Weekend on 13th September and we are teaming up to offer refreshments (10

a.m. – 4 p.m.) in St. Bartholomew's for those visiting the Manor, raising vital funds for the church. Please do come and visit the church and the Manor and enjoy hospitality!

Saturday 13th September: Ride and Stride

Saturday 13th September is also the annual 'Ride and Stride' fundraising cycle ride and walking event. The event sees many people across Oxfordshire undertake sponsored rides or walks, visiting as many churches as they are able to do. This raises money for the Oxfordshire Historic Churches Trust, and for their local church. It is a great help to many historic church buildings. Pauline Franklin is cycling for St. Bartholomew's for the fifteenth time, and it will be her final year. She has raised wonderful funds for our church building, and we are most grateful. There is a sponsorship form in the church to support her ride.

Sundays 21st, 28th September, 5th October: St. Bartholomew's Vision Sundays

We shall be reflecting on our calling as a parish church within the village of Yarnton on these Sundays. A survey went out in late August, specifically to reflect on our Christian calling. We have often reflected on a passage from the gospel of Matthew in the Bible, and it is a helpful starting point. In this passage, Jesus is asked 'What is the greatest commandment?' (Matthew 22.36). Jesus replies 'Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: 'Love your neighbour as yourself.' (Matthew 22.37-9).

We will consider our life at. St Bartholomew's, and how we are currently fulfilling the 'great commandment' - to 'love God' and to 'love our neighbour' – and how we may be called to act in new ways. All are welcome to join in this time of reflection over these weeks.



September News - Rivers and Flooding

Evenlode Catchment Partnership - 'Restoring the Evenlode catchment for the benefit of all'

The Evenlode Catchment Partnership (ECP) is a dynamic collaboration of over 20 organisations and countless individuals, united by a shared commitment to improving the water environments within the Evenlode catchment, which covers the north-west of Oxfordshire. Since our establishment in 2014, the ECP has been dedicated to enhancing water quality, improving flood management, enriching biodiversity, and fostering greater community engagement with our rivers. Wild Oxfordshire hosts the ECP and leads the natural flood management (NFM), river restoration and wetland creation projects. Changes in land management and river engineering have had a big impact on our wildlife and biodiversity. Natural flood meadow habitat is rare in the Evenlode catchment due to changes to arable farming and past dredging activities, whilst weirs and other barriers block the passage of fish and reduce their access to spawning grounds.

As temperatures rise with climate change in the UK, extreme rainfall days are likely to increase. Recent large-scale flood events in the Cotswolds hit the national headlines, but behind the scenes the ECP delivered one of the first effective lowland NFM projects, demonstrating that NFM on a landscape scale works! Following Storm Bert (November 2024) our NFM interventions prevented flooding for all 12 homes at risk in Milton-under-Wychwood.

Field corner bunds in action. In 2018, natural flood management measures were installed on a farm above Milton-under-Wychwood to reduce flood risk in the village below. The first photo shows a group of people standing in the bottom of a field bund on 24th October 2024.



The second photo shows the same field bund in action on 25th November 2024, following Storm Bert. The water is around 2 metres deep at its maximum and the bund is holding back around 1700m³ of flood water. On this occasion, the houses along the Littlestock Brook in Milton-under-Wychwood did not flood.



Through regular monitoring of our NFM scheme on the Littlestock Brook, it has been thrilling to learn that not only does this project reduce flooding, but it brings multiple benefits including increased biodiversity.

Landowners can also help by increasing the organic matter in their soil, which will increase the capacity of the soil to retain water. Many of the landowners along the floodplain are now reverting their arable fields to grass. This will have multiple benefits including sequestering carbon, reducing erosion of soils and keeping nutrients on farms.

The ECP's work has gained recognition for its impact, with coverage in outlets such as *New Scientist* on our water quality citizen science work. We have used our river restoration and natural flood management projects as models for learning and best practice. Together, we are making a lasting difference to the health of the Evenlode's rivers and the communities that depend on them.


