Country: Iceland

Key Links: Prospects Guide | Step by Step Visa information

Key Information:

- The University of Iceland (public university) and Reykjavik University (private university with some state support) are the largest institutions.
- Programmes of the same name at different universities can vary widely in what they involve, so research your options before applying.
- The Icelandic academic year is divided into two semesters autumn and spring, and runs from August to May.
- As an international student, you won't be charged tuition fees at Iceland's public universities, but you'll be required to pay an annual admin fee. At the University of Iceland this costs ISK 75,000 (around £426). If you opt to study at a private university you'll be required to cover the costs of your tuition. These vary by institution and course, so check individual university websites for exact fees.
