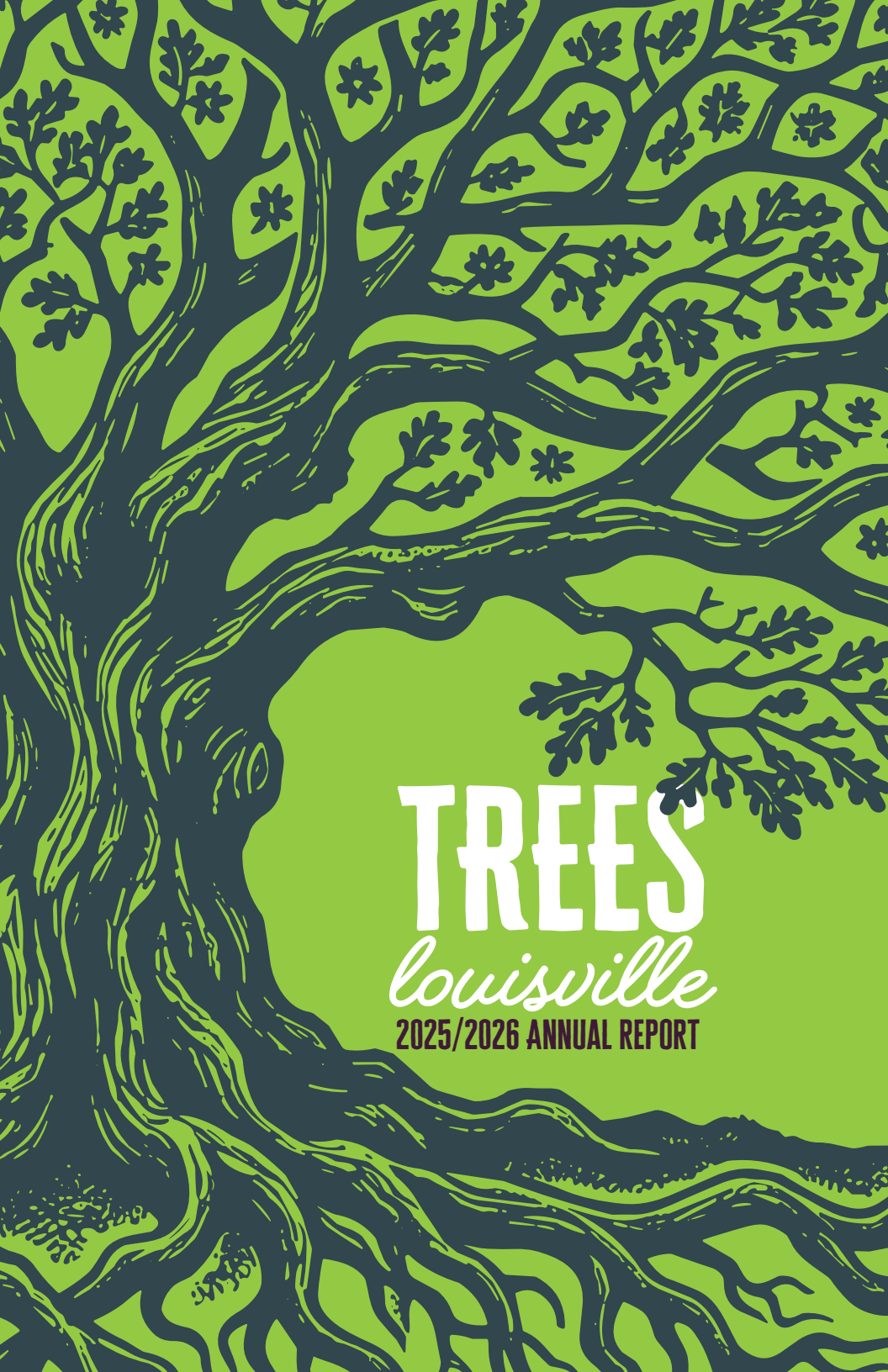

LETTER FROM CINDI

Our 2025–2026 Annual Report celebrates what we have accomplished together and invites you to continue growing with us.

This year, our community of supporters continued to expand. Corporate donations increased, planting projects multiplied, and more volunteers joined us in growing Louisville’s urban forest.

Together, we completed the Urban Forest Master Plan - a 19-month community engagement initiative that provides the City of Louisville with a roadmap for protecting, expanding, and caring for our community forest. Now, we are working alongside our partners and community members to bring the plan’s strategies to life.

Thousands of you participated in TreeFest on April 11th, Louisville’s largest Arbor Day celebration to date, and in Tree Week in October, connecting Louisvillians of all ages with trees and the many benefits they provide.

Together, we also launched Treesilience to Treeconomy, an innovative canopy improvement initiative funded by Dendrifund that will bring much-needed tree services to private properties in Louisville’s lowest-canopy neighborhoods, expand tree planting, and create pathways to repurpose urban wood for its highest and best uses.

And finally, we have begun an exciting new chapter with the purchase and planned renovation of The Canopy Center in Shelby Park, a historic 1920s warehouse that will become TreesLouisville’s permanent community outpost. Your support for The Canopy Center is an investment in the future of our organization and our community. It will provide the space, resources, and foundation we need to advance our mission for decades to come - growing a healthier, more resilient, and more equitable community forest so that every Louisville resident can enjoy the many benefits that trees provide.

Thank you for believing in this work and for making these accomplishments possible. Together, we are growing a greener Louisville, one tree, one neighborhood, and one partnership at a time.

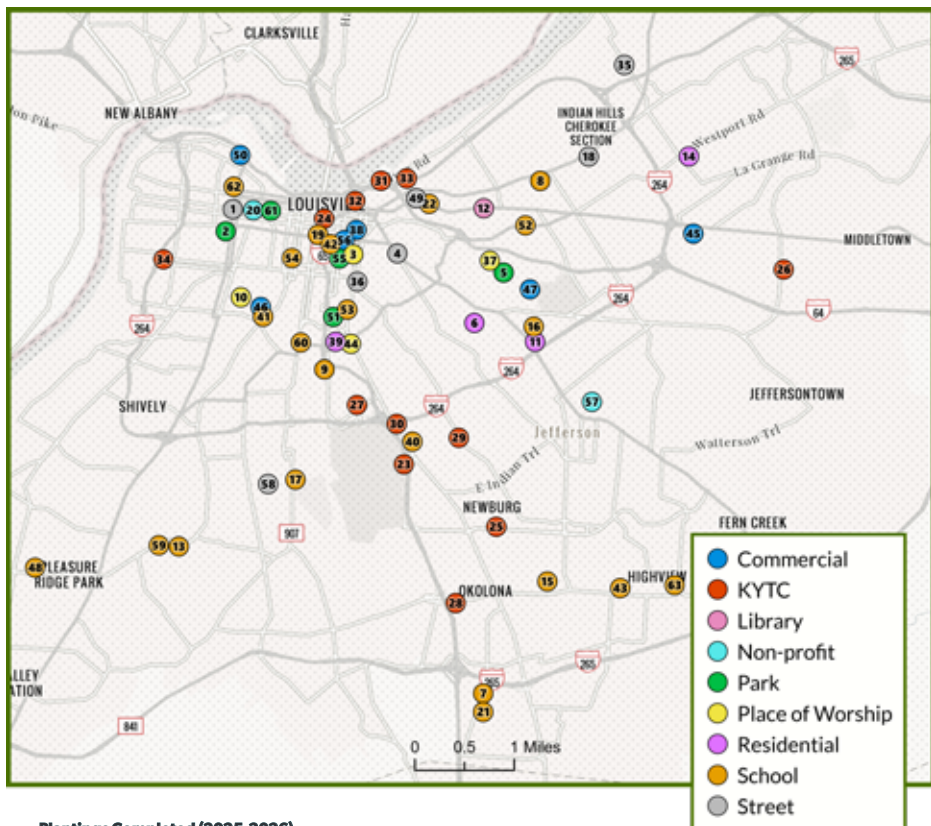

ROOTED IN PARTNERSHIP.

When partners invest in trees, they become part of the landscape of a school, a neighborhood, and a community.

COLLINS AEROSPACE

This season marked TreesLouisville's fourth year partnering with Collins Aerospace, and an exciting first step toward creating a densely planted ecosystem at Churchill Park School. At the school, a steep hillside had become difficult and unsafe for JCPs crews to maintain. When JCPs reached out for support, Collins Aerospace stepped in to help plant 170 trees on site. This planting is only phase one of what will become a thriving new forest, transforming a challenging landscape into a safer, healthier, and more resilient green space for students and the surrounding community. Because of this partnership, a hillside that was once difficult to maintain is becoming a living investment in shade, habitat, beauty, and long-term canopy.



KROGER TREE ADOPTION

For a second year Kroger and Zero Hunger, Zero Waste Foundation sponsored a spring tree adoption. Through this partnership we were able to distribute 275 three gallon trees to Jefferson and surrounding county residents. Tree Adoptions are a crucial part of our mission as the majority of planting space is on residential property and by offering free trees to our community we can help remove the cost barrier of planting and maintaining a tree.



ENTERPRISE MOBILITY

Enterprise Mobility became TreesLouisville's second partner to sponsor sidewalk cuts in a low canopy neighborhood, helping bring trees to places where planting space is limited but canopy is greatly needed.

With their support, TreesLouisville planted 68 trees along the 22nd Street corridor, including 18 new tree belts on Dixie Highway. This partnership is helping transform a highly traveled corridor into a greener, cooler, and more welcoming space for residents, students, businesses, and everyone who moves through the neighborhood.

CHENOWETH ELEMENTARY

Hats off to the Chenoweth PTA for truly digging into this partnership! After securing initial funding, Chenoweth parents recognized the need for more trees - especially along the newly installed car rider line - and came together to double the size of the project. They also helped recruit more than 50 volunteers, including students, and created a summer watering schedule to ensure the trees continue to receive the care they need.

THE CANOPY CENTER: GROWING OUR CAPACITY TO SERVE LOUISVILLE

This year marked an exciting new chapter for TreesLouisville as we officially moved forward with the purchase and renovation of 700 E. Kentucky Street in the heart of Shelby Park. Located just 2.5 blocks from our current headquarters, this new space, which we are calling The Canopy Center, represents a long-term investment not only in TreesLouisville, but in the adjacent neighborhood we are proud to call home. Built in the 1920s and vacant for several years, the building has lived many lives over the past century, serving at different times as a manufacturing facility, a coffee roastery, and even a meat processing plant.

Once complete, The Canopy Center will serve as a community and operations hub, providing expanded space for equipment, staff training, volunteer coordination, and community programming. As demand for our programs continues to grow, this expansion will increase our capacity to plant, protect, and care for trees citywide while strengthening our ability to help implement Louisville's Urban Forest Master Plan.

With this investment, supporters are helping TreesLouisville become an organization ready for the next generation of canopy work - more responsive, more rooted, and better equipped to grow a healthier, more equitable Louisville.

TREE WEEK

Each October, Tree Week brings Louisville together to celebrate, learn about, and care for our urban and community tree canopy. Through walks, plantings, workshops, family activities, volunteer opportunities, and community-led events across the city, Tree Week helps people of all ages connect with trees and the benefits they bring to Louisville. In 2025, we had more than 30 organizations host 60 events across Jefferson County.

TREEFEST

In April, TreesLouisville celebrated its 5th Annual TreeFest in partnership with Louisville Metro Parks & Recreation. More than 3,000 people gathered at Thurman-Hutchins Park for our biggest TreeFest to date, featuring 60+ community vendors and nonprofit booths, hands-on activities, crafts, guided walks, and volunteer projects.

Together with volunteers and partners, we planted 100 trees, gave away 350 additional trees free to community members, and removed invasive species to make way for more native tree growth.

THE PLAN IS COMPLETE. NOW THE WORK BEGINS.

Louisville's newly completed Urban Forest Master Plan is a community-wide roadmap for protecting, expanding, and caring for our urban forest. Its recommendations address everything from policy and planning to maintenance, education, workforce development, and equitable investment.

Now, the focus shifts to implementation. That means a citywide coordinated effort to protect existing trees, plant strategically, improve long-term care, and direct resources to neighborhoods with the greatest canopy need. It also means recognizing trees as vital green infrastructure.

TreesLouisville is helping coordinate partners, track progress, keep the public informed, and lead several actions directly. The next step is turning the plan's recommendations into measurable progress across Louisville.

IMPLEMENTATION UNDERWAY

Coordinated Leadership

The Tree Advisory Committee is serving as the initial steering committee for implementation.

Updated Canopy Data

TreesLouisville has commissioned a new canopy analysis comparing data from 2019 to 2024. The new data will be available in the summer of 2027.

Citywide Tree Inventory

Louisville Metro Parks & Recreation Urban Forestry completed the first phase of a street and park tree inventory covering approximately 80% of Metro Louisville.

Policy and Planning

Metro Council requested a fiscal impact statement for Action 1.3, while partners are researching best practices for Home Rule Cities.

Stronger Planting Standards

The Tree Advisory Committee updated Louisville's permitted and prohibited tree species lists to provide a consistent list for all stakeholders.

REMOVING BARRIERS. REBUILDING CANOPY.

TREESILIENCE

After years in the making, TreesLouisville's Treesilience program officially launched this season thanks to seed funding from Dendrifund. Led by Shaye Batts, Treesilience helps homeowners in specific areas of town where canopy is lowest to remove and replace dead, declining, or high risk trees at no cost to the homeowner.

The first round of removals took place this spring, followed by a second round this summer. The first replacement trees will be planted this fall, ensuring that each removal is part of a larger investment in long-term canopy growth.

We are grateful to our tree care removal partners, Bob Ray Co. and Louisville Tree Service, whose expertise and care helped make this important work possible.

Treesilience is helping build trust, reduce barriers, and create a healthier canopy in neighborhoods that have historically had less access to the benefits of trees. It is also the first step in our broader Treesilience to Treeconomy vision: connecting tree removal, replacement, maintenance, workforce training, and neighborhood investment to support healthier communities and a thriving tree canopy for generations to come.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS: LONG-TERM CANOPY CARE

PLANTING IS ONLY THE BEGINNING



Pruning Young Trees at Years 3, 6 and 10

Planting a tree is only the first step in growing Louisville's canopy. To give young trees the best chance of long-term success, TreesLouisville has made a strong commitment to structural pruning at years three, six, and ten. This ongoing care helps guide healthy growth, reduce future issues, and ensure the trees planted today can become the mature canopy Louisville needs tomorrow.



Weekly Watering During the First Growing Season

Did you know that lack of water is the leading cause of death for young trees? Because our goal is to plant trees that live for 50 to 100 years, we provide weekly watering throughout the first growing season after planting... in the summer of 2025, we watered over 700 trees every week.

DID YOU KNOW?

If planted in a line 30 feet apart, this year's new trees (1,936 planted and 1,575 adopted) would stretch nearly 20 miles!

As they mature, this year's new trees are projected to intercept more than 8.3 million gallons of rainfall each year (about 13 Olympic-sized swimming pools) and absorb more than 168,000 pounds of carbon dioxide annually (roughly equal to the yearly emissions from 17 gas-powered passenger vehicles)!

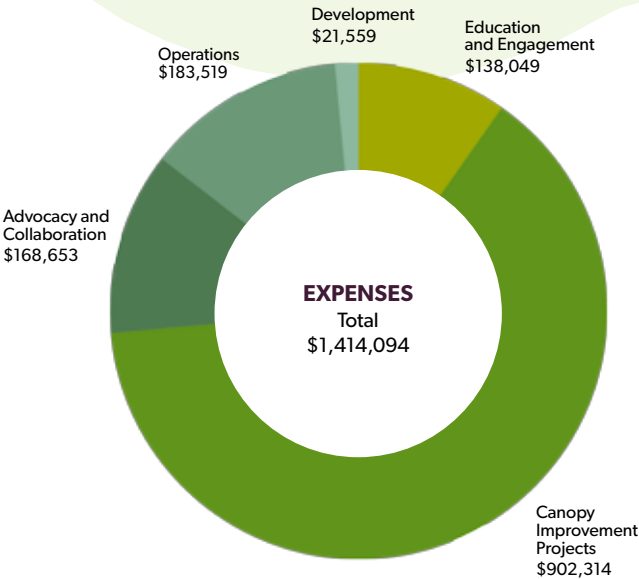
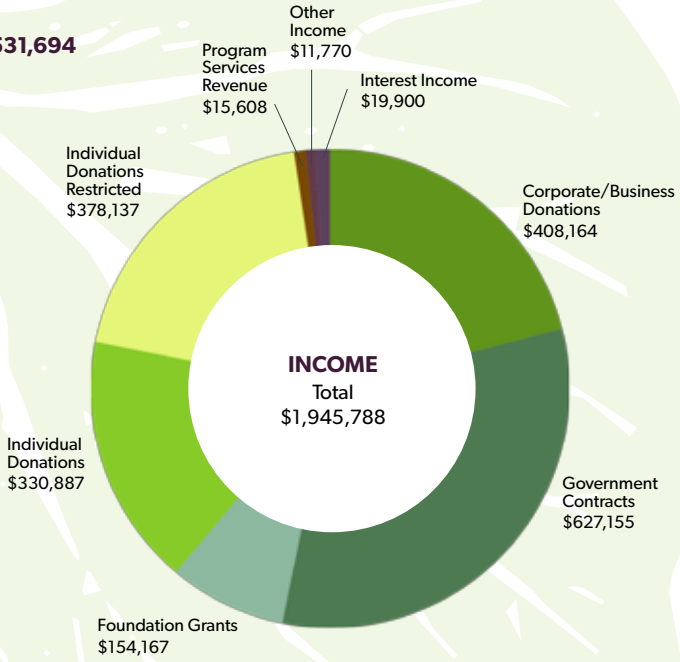
Fun Fact:
