AS NIGHT FALLS

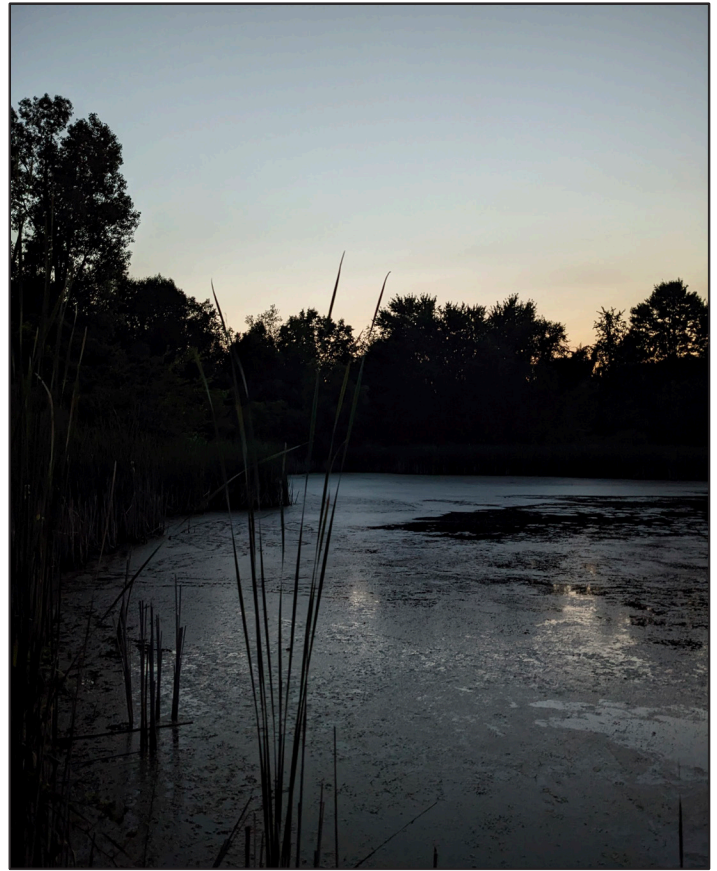
Dusk is a special time. It is a liminal period defined by blurred edges and creeping change, as daylight fades with the sun's setting and night has not quite fallen. In this brief intermission, the set dressings change, and a new cast takes center stage. And tonight, you have a private theater box: the observation tower overlooking Waterfowl Pond.

It begins with the fireflies (family Lampyridae). First, a few blinking lights along the treeline and in the tall grass, then you notice the shadows have lengthened and the sun has ducked out of sight. The remnants of the sunset tint the sky with pink flowing into purple into blue.

Look up from the setting sun and sweep your gaze in an arc above you till you're looking eastward. At the height of summer, three stars, Vega, Deneb, and Altair, shine the brightest in the early evening sky. Together, they form the Summer Triangle. This is an asterism, a group or pattern of stars made up of small pieces of a constellation or spanning several at once. On a clear, moonless night, it frames part of the Milky Way. The summer triangle is visible at different points year-round, but when it appears in the eastern sky, it signals summertime.

Competing with the stars, fireflies fade in and out of view, dotting the night with pulsing lights. There are dozens, maybe hundreds of them, but ask anyone who can remember, and they will confirm seeing thousands in decades past. Last year, 2024, had the highest record of fireflies in recent years. Despite this increase, firefly populations are facing a long-term decline in Michigan and across the United States.

Fireflies aren't unique among insects; we're in the midst of an "insect apocalypse." Their natural habitats grow inhospitable due to climate change, pollution, urbanization, and agriculture. They are attacked on all fronts; even our light pollutes the night and disrupts their carefully choreographed routines. As of 2020, between 250,000 and 500,000 entire species have been made extinct in the last 150 years. We continue to lose 1-2% of the global insect population every year. That means that within less than 40 years, we will have lost a third of all insects. These are conservative numbers. It's hard to imagine



the reality of the loss.

Tonight, it may be hard to believe in an "insect apocalypse." The fireflies blink, the moths flutter, the crickets sing, and the mosquitoes bite. A lot. Mosquitoes (family Culicidae) are most active during dusk. Like some more mythical blood-suckers, they also avoid the sun's blaze. As it grows dark, many of their natural predators retire, and resting animals become an easy target.

In contrast to most insects, mosquito populations are thriving. Every year, it's noted that the mosquitoes are worse than ever, and it's not crazy to think so. The lengthening summers and dramatic rainy seasons create the perfect breeding grounds. They are more than a nuisance; mosquito-borne diseases are

Reflections...

reported further north every year. More than ever, it's important to protect yourself. Bug spray is helpful, but protective layers are the best option.

Mosquitoes can be a nuisance and even dangerous, but it's important to appreciate their part in the web of life. It's not their fault the balance is disrupted. Fireflies might be easier to love, but mosquitoes and other "pests" play a crucial role in a healthy ecosystem. Without insects, animals starve, plants turn barren, and dead things rot in open air.

Our plain-nosed bats (family Vespertilionidae) are one of these animals that depend on insects for food and, in turn, keep their populations at a healthy level. Fix your gaze above the treeline, and you'll notice black blurs swooping up and down. Their movements look erratic, but their acute senses are honed to their tiny prey. They don't seem to mind the abundance of mosquitoes. All bats in Michigan are insect-eating. An adult bat consumes about 50% of their body weight in insects in a single night. A nursing or pregnant female might consume 100% of their body weight. In addition to birdhouses, Seven Ponds encourages bats to stick around with bat houses. There are also a few resident bats in the rafters above the front entrance. In exchange for their insect control, we tidy up after them. It feels like a fair trade.

Echolocation is emitted at frequencies beyond human hearing, but if you listen closely, you might hear them squeaking and chirping. This is one way they communicate with each other. Tonight, though, they're drowned out by mourning doves, bullfrogs, crickets, and cicadas.

This droning harmony is interrupted by a round of howls. It carries across the field, and responding howls seem to come from all around. The grazing deer freeze for a moment before cautiously returning to their meal. A brief thrill of fear also shoots through you, but there's no danger. Coyotes (*Canis latrans*) tend to avoid humans, even deer are usually too much trouble to prey on. Much like your family dog, they are opportunistic eaters and will happily hunt a rabbit or eat some berries. And despite their ringing cries, this group is much smaller and further away than they seem. Their reputation as tricksters is appropriate. Coyotes communicate with a variety of yips, howls, and barks. They manipulate their voices almost like a ventriloquist. This is known as the "beau geste effect," an auditory illusion which makes their numbers sound larger and closer. The nickname "Song Dog" is well earned.

Still, you feel grateful for your position on the tower, the security, and the view it provides. The coyotes' howling

ends, and the deer continue grazing on the grasses, wildflowers, and brush. They are not picky. Deer (*Odocoileus virginianus*) are crepuscular, meaning they are most active during the twilight hours of dawn and dusk. This helps them avoid predators that hunt more in the day than night, as well as shielding them from the harshest summer heat. When you drive back tonight, you'll likely see their eyes flashing in the headlights along the roadside. Combined with potholes like moon craters, dusk is a risky time to drive in rural Michigan.

There are plenty of other animals starting their day at dusk. Although you don't see them from the tower, the skunks, raccoons, opossums, and other nighttime critters leave plenty of evidence. Tracks in the mud, berry seed-filled droppings on the tower stairs, and scattered litter where a trash can was left open.

Life buzzes around you, but the air is warm and still. Breathe in and look back up. The moon hangs full and bright in the sky, outshining the stars. In July, depending on who you ask, it's called a buck moon, a salmon moon, or a berry moon. The names range across cultures and time, marking the rhythms of life.

You watch the purplish hue of twilight fade to black. In a blink, dusk has fully given way to night, and unlike the life teeming around you, you are not nocturnal. When you step inside, make sure to turn off the porchlight, it's not needed. And maybe tonight, open your bedroom window and let the night seep through the screen.

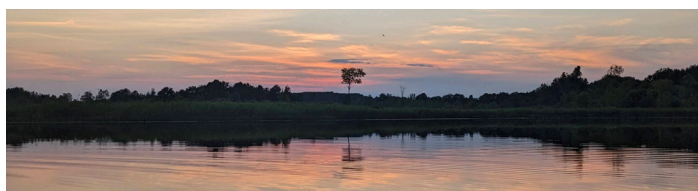

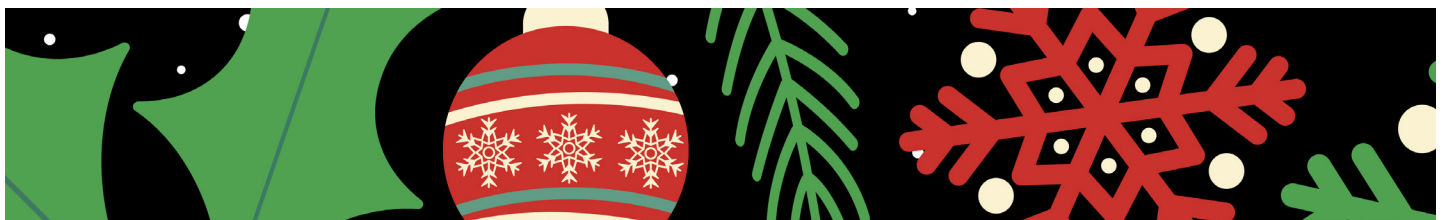
The Stingers Make Us Proud!

Farewell Delaney and Emma

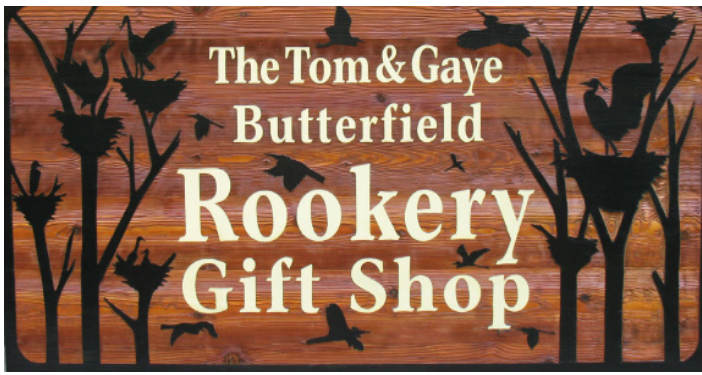

It's time to start thinking about your holiday shopping, and you'll find plenty of options at the Rookery. Stop in and see us soon!

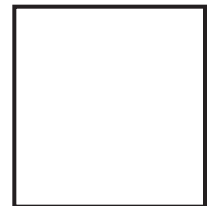

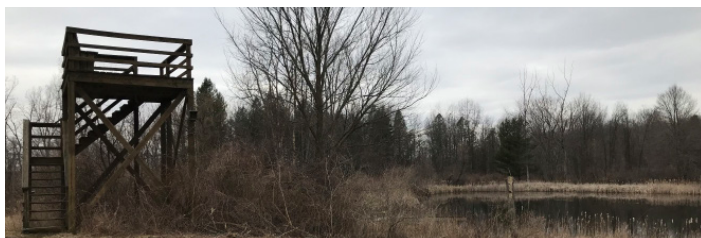

Prairie Seed Collecting

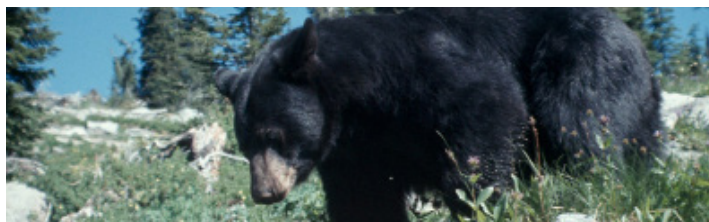

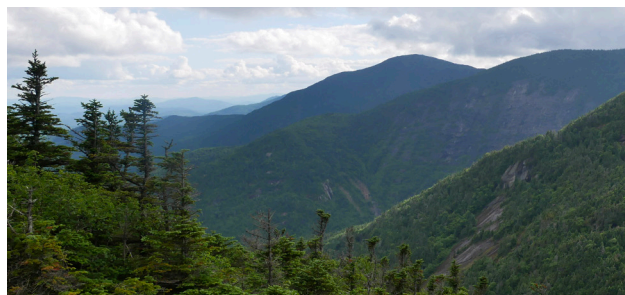
