A Special General Meeting of the Q.M.A.A.C. Old Comrades was held at 8 p.m. on Thursday, July 1st, 1920, at 91 Belgrave Road. Present: Dame Florence Leach, Misses Hilda Horniblow (in the chair), Edith Thompson, Davy, Haythorne, Sanders, Ireland, Chapman, and approximately 500 members of the Association.

The meeting was called to inaugurate a London Branch. Nominations for the respective offices of President, Secretary, Treasurer, and five Members of Committee were invited and voted upon.

The following resolutions were passed:—

1. "That Miss M. M. Stevenson, O.B.E., should be elected President of the London Branch." Proposed by Miss Sanders; seconded by Miss D. G. Jones. Carried unanimously.

2. "That the Secretary should elect her own Assistant Secretary." Proposed by Miss Richardson; seconded by Mrs. Parkes. Carried unanimously.

3. "That the Committee should be composed of two officials and three members." Proposed by Miss Ireland; seconded by Miss Baker. Carried unanimously.

Miss Ireland was unanimously voted Hon. Secretary; Miss Suggate, Treasurer; Miss Baker, Assist. Secretary.

The following were elected as Members of Committee: Mrs. Esslemont, Misses Chapman, Corner, Parker, Bartlett.

ITEMS OF INTEREST.

Q.M.A.A.C. Investiture.

Miss N. A. Barnard, who was asked to represent the Association at an investiture which took place in Birmingham write as follows: "I am sorry for the delay in reporting on the investiture of Q.M.A.A.C. in Birmingham on June 9th. There were seven members decorated by Brigadier-General Wood, and the ceremony took place in front of the Council House, with a large number of spectators. The Brigadier made a fine speech in which he specially commended the work done by the Waacs in France, and the pluck they showed. One of the recipients was specially mentioned for her courage and the way she stuck in her post during the German advance early in 1918. Forewoman Latchwell was the only member who wore uniform, and she carried herself and saluted most smartly. She looked, in fact, the very embodiment of alertness and capability, and just what Dame Florence and the O.C.A. would have wished I am sure.

Before the ceremony I spoke to each member separately, and conveyed the O.C.A.'s congratulations. Most of them had served overseas they told me."

This was held in London at the end of June, and was unanimously voted a great success. Dame Helen Gwynne Vaughan was in the chair, supported by Miss Davy, Miss Pratt, Miss Haythorne, and nearly all the Deputy-Controllers: Dame Florence Leach was the guest of the evening. Over eighty administrators were present, many of whom had come from long distances. The speeches were described as "few but good," and except for a brief respite then, the conversation never languished, and the noise grew louder and louder. Obviously everyone enjoyed themselves tremendously, and it is hoped that the dinner will become an annual event.

OBITUARY.

Dr. Eaton, Medical Controller.

Every member of the Corps who knew her, and she came into touch with a large number, will be greatly distressed to hear of the sudden death of **Dr. Eaton**, on August 2nd. She was Medical Controller in the Eastern Command during her connection with the Q.M.A.A.C., and all those who worked with her learnt to value her fine character. On demobilization she obtained an appointment in the Ministry of Health, where she was doing admirable work. She will be greatly missed, and many of our comrades will feel a deep sense of loss on hearing of her death.

No. 4,100, Louie Holmes, Forewoman Clerk.

Members who knew Louie Holmes will be grieved to hear that she died at her home in the Lake District on 19th May, after some months of suffering, bravely and patiently borne. She joined in October, 1917, as a clerk, and served at Eastern Command H.Q., London, Hotel Metropole, Folkestone, and Tunbridge Wells. At Folkestone she received promotion for excellent work, being afterwards awarded the Medal of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire. She was a splendid worker and good comrade, with many sterling qualities, and it is sad that such a promising useful life should be cut short.

NEWS OF MEMBERS.

The overseas dinner brought a number of administrators up to London, and ultimately into the office at the Duke of York's Headquarters, and thus succeeded in stirring up a good deal of new interest in the Association. **Miss Davy**, who has however, been as keen as possible ever since the O.C.A. was started, has been working in the office three or four days a week all July. **Mrs. Hills** (Rouen) is regularly giving her services twice a week, and **Miss Mary Thompson** (Clothing Depot) and **Miss Smart** (Connaught Club) have also given up much of their scanty spare time. Various members of the committee have put in some hard work, but the formation of the London Branch will probably monopolise several of the most active. **Miss Eva Chapman** has nobly undertaken to address all the Gazettes each month. Voluntary workers are always welcome, and there is plenty for them to do, but it is realised that Q.M.A.A.C. are on the whole very busy people, and their spare time valuable.

Dr. Sandeman and **Dr. Watson** have resumed their practise in Aberdeen. Dr. Sandeman is a member of the Council of the Scottish Board of Health.

Miss Low is engaged on political work in Edinburgh. She is chairman of the Edinburgh and East of Scotland O.C.A.

Miss Ewing (Controller Western Command), who is living in Edinburgh, has been for the last six months one of the two Women's Training Officers for Scotland, working under the Ministry of Labour. This work will probably come to an end in September. Miss Ewing's sister, who was a U.A. in the Scottish Command, has gone abroad.

Miss Stanhope (U.A. Main Camp, G.H.Q.) is attending a secretarial course in London. She is in touch with many members of her old unit, and a strong contingent of signallers from her camp appear at the Thursday night socials in Belgrave Road.

Miss Latimer (London District) who lives at Knutsford, has joined the Liverpool Branch of the O.C.A., and describes the first meeting as most enthusiastic. Miss Latimer is learning poultry farming at Hulton.

Miss Martin (London District) writes from Clifton, and suggests that a local branch should be started in Bristol, where so many started their army career in the depot. Miss Martin has been teaching since she was demobilised, but is giving it up in order to have further training. She hopes to learn a Bantu language and then go out to the wilds of Africa to teach.

Miss Kathleen Tizard, who was a driver in France for two years, is now living at Southsea. Her sister was also a member of the corps.

Miss E. M. Trotter, Controller of Personel, who has been seriously ill for more than a year, is now very much better, and was well enough to be invested with the order of the C.B.E. by the King recently.

Miss Bartels and **Miss Curtis**, late Headquarters Staff, have gone to the Channel Islands for a year to learn tomato growing. At the end of that time they hope to set up for themselves, and to employ other Waacs.

Miss De Putron has started a branch of the Service Women's Association in the Islands, but although her home is in Guernsey, she will be in London most of the year, as she has been appointed secretary of the Parents' National Educational Union.

Miss Collin Baillie is training at the Margaret Morris School of Dancing. **Miss Beatty** (U.A. the Curragh) is in training as a solicitor, and will be one of the pioneers in that profession for women.

Miss Haskins (Headquarters Irish Command) has just finished a course of secretarial training.

Miss Finney (London District) has a secretarial post in a Dublin Hospital: **Miss Lloyd** (U.A. Dublin Depot) also has a post in Dublin, and **Miss Fish** (Rouen) is training as a secretary there.

Miss Margaret Howard (20146) has a post near Hitchin, and expects to be able to come to the club meetings in London occasionally.

Quite a number of ex-Q.M.A.A.C. are employed at Bedford College, University of London. **Miss Sandberg** is back in her old post as Assistant Bursar, **Miss Newby** (Warwick and Tidworth) is head cook, there are ten Q.M.A.A.C. on the household staff, and **Miss Read** (Connaught Club) on the clerical, while **Miss Lindsell** (D.C. Bedford Area) is head of one of the halls of residence. **Miss O'Neill** (Womereux) is working for her degree there. **Miss Jessie Horniblow** (Shoreham), **Miss Goldingham** (Warwick Square), **Miss Wilkins** (Wimereux), **Miss Wells** (H.Q. York) are all teaching. **Miss Lewis Davis** (York) is house-keeper at St. Felix School, Southwold. She is engaged to be married. **Lady Muriel Herbert** (France) was recently married to Dr. Jex Blake. **Miss Sanders** (Northern Command) is working in the Training Department of the Ministry of Labour where **Miss Berry** (D.A.C.C. Bostall) also holds a post. **Miss Leneghan** (Aldershot) is in charge of one of the hostels at Nottingham, under the same department, and **Miss Bell** (Grove Park) is with her. **Miss Bird** (Connaught Club) is matron at the Ladies' College, Cheltenham, and **Miss Lindsay** (Rugeley) has a post of the same kind at Reading. **Miss Holman** (Darlington) is learning laundry management at Wimbledon.

OLD COMRADES OVERSEAS.

Miss B. Clay, late Controller Northern Command, is working in Poland with one of the units of the Friends' Relief Committee. She writes as follows: "I have been doing relief work for four months now in Warsaw. I came en route for Tamapol, but as the Bolsheviks are expected to take it the mission has decided not to go on at present. Our work is all very disorganised just now, inevitably, owing to the condition of the country. I am at the moment working in the warehouse, sorting out the relief stores, not very exciting but most necessary work. I am only an inexperienced worker as yet. My great ambition is to do typhus work, that is what you might call the front line trenches, and I am not coming home till I have done that or its equivalent." Miss Clay's letters are most interesting and if space permits a longer quotation will appear in the next issue.

Another administrator, **Miss Constance Smith**, of Rugeley and Ripon, is also working in Warsaw, and has met Miss Clay. Miss Smith is coming home soon, but hopes to go to Philadelphia in the spring to take up a physical training post.

A correspondent asks if we can tell her the whereabouts of **Miss Atkinson**, who was U.A. at Dover and Biggleswade. When last heard of she was on the way to Serbia, with **Miss Carlisle** (Oswestry and S.U.A. Dover). Two other members also in Serbia are **Miss Jolly** and **Miss Lascelles**, formerly

motor drivers at Q.M.A.A.C. Headquarters, B.E.F. Will our Serbian unit please send us some news?

Miss Fowler (Gordon Square and Gloucester Gate) writes a very cheery letter from Burmah. As the last news that most of us heard of her was that she had been pitched out of a motor lorry when taking her unit for an outing, it is pleasant to hear that she is recovering, although not well yet, and is enjoying the life and her new surroundings.

Miss Fairbairns, Recruiting Controller, has just returned from a year in New York and will probably remain in London for a time, if she can find a suitable post.

Mrs. Newton (née Betts) writes from N.A.C.B. Headquarters, Cologne, and tells us that she hopes to be back in England soon and is looking forward to seeing old friends.

Miss Mackenzie (Connaught Club) has a post in Madrid, and **Miss James** (Gordon Square) is doing secretarial work on the Gold Coast.

Miss May Finlay (Ostrohove) who is joint hon. sec. of the Edinburgh Branch of the O.C.A., looked in at the office during the last week in July. She was just off to Spain for the holidays, taking with her a lively unit consisting of six young nephews.

Miss L. M. Chase has recently returned from a most interesting journey. A fortnight after she was demobilized she went out to Austria in connection with the administration of one of the relief funds. She writes, "I travelled through the states of Central Europe, working there and meeting many interesting people. Hungary I found particularly interesting, and all the country beautiful. I started out through Paris, Switzerland, the Tyrol, Vienna, and so on, working round north to Cologne, and home through Belgium. I have a month's rest, after which I may start again."

Miss Brinsley Richards has just gone out to Vienna on relief work, and expects to be away about two months.

As we go to press a most interesting letter from **Miss Batty** (Connaught Club and Bostal Heath) has arrived. She is living in Alexandria, and talks of an Egyptian O.C.A. Branch in the autumn. She is already in touch with four Waacs, three Wrens, and a Wraf.

Miss Elsie Chambers, writing from 661 Talbot Street, London, Ontario, Canada, says, "I came to Canada through the Overseas Settlement scheme, being an ex-Q.M.A.A.C. I hope to come across some of the others soon, and am looking forward to meeting old friends." **Miss McDonald** sails for Canada on August 13th, and **Miss T. E. Veitch** for Vancouver, B.C., on the same date; no doubt by the same boat. **Dr. Douglas**, one of the Overseas Medical Controllers, who is a Canadian, has returned to Montreal.

Miss A. F. Porter sails for South Africa a few days later. She is going on a visit to her sister, but may remain indefinitely if she finds work to suit her.
