Message from the CEO



Dear SCFU Community,

As we bid farewell to 2025, we find ourselves reflecting on the work we have done, the relationships we have created & strengthened, and the goals we have achieved together. Yet, as we look back on all that has been accomplished, I want to

encourage each of us to look a little deeper and notice the achievements we may have overlooked along the way.

One example of acknowledging such achievements struck me when I was thinking about the many meetings I have with our SCFU team throughout the year. They always begin with an agenda filled with actionable items requiring planning and attention, often focusing on budgeting and forecasting, enforcing policies, implementing new state and federal regulations, strengthening our skillsets, and identifying areas in need of improvement, among a host of other pertinent topics and issues.
