

The beautiful story of Gesu began in the early 1920's when outward migration from the City of Cleveland to the rapidly developing Cleveland Heights area was heavy. There were only two parishes in the area to care for the expanding population of Catholic families. In response to a need for another parish to service this growing Catholic community, Archbishop Joseph Schrembs founded a parish in University Heights, an area designated for the building of a new campus for the Jesuit College of St. Ignatius, now known as John Carroll University. Archbishop Schrembs asked the leadership of the Chicago Province of the Society of Jesus to mission a Jesuit priest to serve as pastor of this new University Heights parish which was to be named Church of the Gesu after the Mother Church of the Society of Jesus in Rome.

Gesu Parish and School was officially established in 1926 under the leadership of its founding pastor, Fr. Francis J. Rudden, SJ, and the Sisters of Notre Dame. This newly organized Jesuit community included just 53 families. Rapid growth of the worshiping congregation and the school student body over the next several decades contributed to the building and continued renovation of the various church and school structures that occupy our campus today. We are currently blessed with over 2,600 families that proudly call Gesu home!

From its humble beginnings, Gesu has flourished as a center for learning and a faith-filled community dedicated to living the Word of God.



It is with great excitement that we kick off *The Gesu Century: One Faith, One Family, One Future*, a capital and endowment campaign that will ensure the vibrancy of Gesu for years to come. After the Parish's in-depth planning process that included a strategic plan, parish examen, listening sessions, feasibility study, facilities audit and other endeavors, Gesu began to determine what the parish needs are today and what they will be for the future. The three main factors that led to Gesu's launch of this capital and endowment campaign, the first in over 20+ years, are:

- **Gesu Endowment:** Increased cost of Catholic education and efforts to provide affordable and accessible education is of utmost importance. Growing the Gesu Endowment Fund will provide resources for faculty and staff, allow for financial assistance to those in need and help us fulfill our mission of Eucharistic Living, Lifelong Learning and Generous Serving.
- Infrastructure and Preservation for the Church and School: The buildings on the campus are aging and, therefore, addressing the need for repairs and upgrades is essential to maintain a safe and functional environment.
- Outdoor Worship and Learning Spaces: Utilizing specific outdoor areas of our campus for worship and learning will enhance our prayer and educational experiences.

The following is a sampling of some of the major projects we plan to undertake. It is by no

means exhaustive and may change if unforeseen issues arise.

As of August 1, 2024, Gesu has raised over \$6.3 million in gifts and pledges toward our \$12 million goal.

A Legacy of Thanks

I grew up next door to Gene and Betty Skerl for 20 years, and I always knew how special they were. To sit down with her recently and listen to her genuine love and appreciation for her family and Gesu, is truly inspiring. Her humbleness and gratitude are admirable. In a world where there is so much self-indulgence and brokenness, it is beautiful to see a woman and her family who want to share their faith and gifts with others. In the Jesuit tradition, Betty is truly a woman for others...

Over 60 years ago, a young family moved to University Heights to raise their children in a nice neighborhood where they could walk to school. Gene and Betty Skerl moved onto Milford Road – eight houses away from Gesu Catholic School! Little did they realize this decision would be the beginning of an incredible life focused on their family, faith and friends.

Gene and Betty raised their six children – Mike, Jim, Nancy, Laura, Lynn and Tom - in Gesu Parish and School. Today, the family has grown to include 11 grandchildren and 13 great grandchildren. Betty says, "We wanted a place where our family could grow and flourish." Gesu pro-

vided all of them the opportunity to deepen their faith and grow.

When the children were young, Betty was committed to being involved in their school, and a highlight was volunteering to be a school room parent. This involvement allowed her to meet the parish and school staff as well as other Gesu families. In their early years at Gesu, much was changing with the Church due to Vatican II, and women were being given more opportunities to become involved. Betty accepted these opportunities and became a lector, Eucharistic minister and visitor for the homebound. Eventually, Betty became the Chairperson of Gesu's Liturgical Commission and trained lectors, Eucharistic ministers and servers. "It is all about the people – this is most gratifying for me."

During the 70's and 80's, Gesu was growing as a parish and school. Betty believes this was due to the strong Jesuit leadership of Fr. Dietz, Fr. McAuley and Fr. White. She worked



closely with Fr. McAuley and recalls him being like a brother to her. "Sr. Jeanne and Sr. Diane trusted my leadership and asked me to help lead the RCIA program. I embraced the chance to walk with individuals on their faith journey."

As Betty reflects on her six+ decades at Gesu, she says she didn't always realize the benefits of Gesu. Yet during two of her family's most challenging times - the passing of her husband Gene and of her son Jim - she greatly appreciated the strength, support and love of the Gesu community. That same love shone through many times during

Betty's most memorable moments with her children and grandchildren celebrating sacraments and graduations at Gesu. She comments, "Gesu has always been home to me!"

Betty was inspired to make a significant gift to *The Gesu Century Capital and Endowment Campaign*. She sees this as an opportunity to give back to a place that has been such a gift to her and her family. "Gesu has enriched my spiritual life more than I could ever imagine. I have so many blessings in my life, and many of them stem from this parish."



Last fall, when Betty and her sons, Mike and Tom, met with Fr. Laniauskas, she shared how much the liturgy has meant to her over the years. As a result, it is fitting for Betty's generous gift to the campaign to be designated for the building of the outdoor worship space. "I'm so grateful for the spiritual exercises as it has brought me closer to God. I hope and believe the outdoor chapel and gathering space will deepen others' spiritual lives too."




The 7:45 am bell sounds, and the hallways are abuzz with over 640 boisterous students in grades K-8. As one weaves their way through the crowd, emotions from the conversations heard are very similar to those heard 10-20-30 years ago...excitement about a field trip, nervousness about a science test, confidence about a presentation. Yet, one only has to dive a little deeper or ask a few more questions to realize the field trip, the test, the presentation is anything but the same as

a decade ago. Education has changed, should change, and is changing here at Gesu Catholic School. We are proud to share that enrollment continues to be strong with a 5% increase over the last ten years, a waitlist for several primary grades and a full preschool. The foundation of our mission, Catholic Faith Formation, is the priority and ever present with over 90% of our student body Catholic. Yet, to rest on our laurels and say we will continue to educate students in the same manner we have in the past is a slippery slope and one we do not intend to slide down.

Adaptability, collaboration and critical thinking are just some of the important 21st century skills we foster here at Gesu. Our dynamic and versatile faculty understand that these are more than mere educational buzz words, but rather, skills necessary for students to thrive in our changing world. In order to foster these skills, continued professional development for our faculty and staff is a necessity.

One of the many facets of the Gesu Endowment is faculty and staff professional support. A robust endowment enables us to retain and hire knowledgeable




faculty while continuing to provide them with current professional development in areas such as the science of reading and project based learning, all while educating faculty on how to support students with various learning styles. Our faculty and staff are valued members of our community. Growing the endowment is one way to support and show gratitude to the Gesu faculty and staff.

Enhancing the aesthetics of the school both inside and out is another focus of *The Gesu Century* campaign. There is certainly some nostalgia in walking the halls of the current school building which look remarkably similar to how they did in the earlier days of the school. Many affectionately refer to the green and brown hallways as places where they first switched classes, met their favorite teachers, or made weekend plans with friends. However, be assured that the rich history of Gesu will not be erased with a new paint color. The interior renovations will only enhance the recruitment of future students by providing a cleaner and more vibrant space for young minds to excel.

Additionally, some funds raised from *The Gesu Century*

campaign are earmarked for a variety of outdoor enhancements. Regardless of the unpredictable Cleveland weather, an outdoor play area and classroom will provide space for creativity and dynamic play. Our current outdoor environment already draws many classes outside, and it is exciting to think of the active learning additional space will allow for Gesu students.

Reflecting on the last 100 years, it is beautiful to see the accomplishments of Gesu graduates. The Gesu Century campaign will help ensure the students of Gesu will be prepared to make a difference in the world that awaits them.

What is an Endowment?

An endowment is a permanent fund of assets that are invested to provide long-term support for a cause or an organization. The original assets, known as the corpus, grow over time through gifts and the interest earned from the investments. Each year a portion of the income is spent, while the remainder is added back to the corpus to grow. Gifts of all sizes are accepted to Gesu's Endowment and provide support to Gesu for ten, twenty, fifty years and beyond.

Describe Gesu's Endowment

The Gesu Endowment Fund was established on January 24, 1983, through the generosity of parishioners and friends of Gesu. It is a legally separate entity from Gesu Parish, yet it provides financial support to Gesu Parish and School. This support allows Gesu to continue its mission of Eucharistic Living, Lifelong Learning, and Generous Serving all for the greater glory of God.

Gesu has three main Endowment Funds. The general endowment fund supports many aspects of the parish and school and is comprised of many smaller endowments such as The Morrissey Family Fund (Boosters), Cathleen Coyne Teacher Fund, Sweete Family Fund, Mary Carol Jones Scholarship Fund, etc. Together these funds total just over \$10,000,000 as of June 1, 2024.

The Fr. Francis Dietz, SJ Scholarship Fund was established to provide financial assistance to parish students in grades 7-8 and high school students attending Catholic high schools.

The Fr. Robert J. McAuley, SJ Scholarship Fund was established to provide financial assistance to Gesu students in grades K-6.

Who manages the Gesu endowment?

The Gesu Endowment Fund is overseen by its Board of Directors, which is comprised of ten to fifteen individuals. The Board meets on a quarterly basis to review fund

performance and asset allocations and to discuss other endowment matters. Currently, Gesu's Endowment Board works with the Gesu Investment Committee to provide oversight of Gesu financials and investment practices. Gesu's Endowment Board also ensures that all assets are invested in a socially responsible manner. PNC is the outside organization that manages the investment funds that make up the Gesu Endowment Fund.

How important is the Gesu Endowment?

The annual "gift" from the Gesu Endowment to Gesu Parish and School is critical. Each spring, the Gesu Endowment Board carefully reviews the financials and approves the transfer of 4% of the previous 3-year average endowment values for Gesu Parish and School. These funds can be used for various items such as financial assistance, capital projects, facility maintenance, etc. The Gesu Endowment Fund has grown over 40 years and continues to provide support in perpetuity. To ensure that Gesu's mission continues for the next century, the *The Gesu Century Capital and Endowment Campaign* is committed to raising \$5 million to increase this fund.

What is a named endowed fund?

A minimum of \$10,000 is required to establish a named endowment at Gesu. It can be provided as a lump sum or accumulated within a five year period. Once the named endowment is established, the funds are invested and begin increasing in value. The endowment continues to provide self-sustaining funds as a permanent legacy. The donor of a named endowment works with Gesu to define the purpose of the fund. For example, The Morrissey Family Endowed Fund is restricted to Gesu's Athletic Program and the Mary Carol Jones Scholarship Fund is intended for students that may need financial assistance. The different funds may be used for scholarships, programs or unrestricted support. Goots, Grain & Giving From the Heart

This is an exciting time at Gesu as we prepare for our 100th anniversary which is quickly approaching in 2026! As mentioned in Fr. Laniauskas's cover letter, it was determined that we should make significant improvements to our campus and raise additional funds for our endowment in order to ensure a lasting future for Gesu. We knew it was important to be strategic about these efforts, so we made the decision to embark on a major capital and endowment campaign. This is Gesu's first major campaign in over 20 years.

When nonprofit organizations or other institutions begin a campaign, there are usually questions regarding the purpose, and oftentimes people have reasons not to give or support it. These reasons may include: "I already pay tuition." "I give at Mass...that's enough." "I can't afford it." "They have some wealthy people in that parish. They should just ask those people." "I don't like some of the improvements they are planning."

You, too, can probably think of other reasons not to participate, but I believe there is truly one reason to give: Faith.

In many ways, we are fortunate. The Old Testament is rich with specific examples of the offerings that God required of His people. From goats to grain and from the building of the Tent of Meetings to seemingly endless wanderings through the desert, the path of faith was an often arduous one.

The New Testament also speaks of giving, but giving from the heart. There is that old saying of "to give until it hurts," unfortunate words because giving doesn't hurt. Rather, it creates joy. In fact, Saint Paul tells us that "... each one of you should set aside a sum of money in keeping with his income" to give to the church (1 Cor. 16:2).

Read that advice from Saint Paul again. No goat, no grain, no tithing, no single sum demanded from any or all. In keeping with our income, which we all have, we are all able to exercise our faith with the sum that we set aside. It simply takes thought and prayer.

Can we give \$1? Sure we can. How about \$10, \$100, \$1,000, \$10,000 or more? Sometimes, even much

more. We have faith. We can consider our income, what to set aside, and give it joyfully. The mechanics of a capital campaign give us the time, if we need it, to pledge our gift and pay it over weeks, months, or even several years. We also have the privilege of directing our chosen sum of money to a specific component of the campaign or place no restrictions on it and leave its direction to Gesu itself. We can even endow it and be a part of a 40 year tradition of endowed dollars supporting the efforts of the entire parish.

If you have read this far, you likely know the final message here is to set aside that sum of money, as Saint Paul advises. He offers no directive, no measure of grain or number of goats as the standard. Armed with only our faith and our free will, itself another blessing we enjoy, we have all we need to carry forward.

Be it the single dollar, the \$10,000 or much more, imagine if every member of our church considered the need, shunned the negative excuses, and did as we are called...to give from the heart!

Why would we do that? Simply, very simply, because of our faith!
