It is the home of Mercury Message Service, a telephone answering service staffed by human beings. It is also the box office, and costume and props storage for the off off Broadway theater in the room on the other side of the wall.

Writer's Notes:



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History of Big Dawg Productions

Founded in 1995, Big Dawg Productions initially performied in rented spaces like Thalian Hall's Studio Theater, the company established its first permanent home in 2008 at the historic Cape Fear Playhouse on Castle Street, opening in 2009 with *A Thousand Clowns*. Following the pandemic, the company returned to Thalian Hall's Studio Theatre, where the company reopened with the acclaimed *The Lifespan of a Fact*, delighting sold-out audiences with one of the first live post-pandemic productions in the area.
