Waiting for Godot is a play by Irish playwright Samuel Beckett in which two characters, Vladimir (Didi) and Estragon (Gogo), engage in a variety of discussions and encounters while awaiting the titular Godot. It is Beckett's translation of his own original French-language play, En attendant Godot, and is subtitled (in English only) "a tragicomedy in two acts".

The original French text was composed between 9 October 1948 and 29 January 1949. The premiere, directed by Roger Blin, was on 5 January 1953 at the Théâtre de Babylone, Paris. The English-language version premiered in London in 1955. In a poll conducted by the British Royal National Theatre in 1998/99, it was voted the "most significant English-language play of the 20th century".

The play is the most famous example of Absurdist theatre. Absurdism was an artistic and philosophical movement developed in Europe in the 19th century. Absurdism is the philosophical theory that the universe is irrational and meaningless. It states that trying to find meaning leads people into a conflict with the world. The absurdist movement in the 20th century saw a rise in prominence in response to the horrors inflicted on Humanity by the second World War. The play has multiple themes borrowed from vaudeville, religion, psychoanalysis, class structure, existentialism and other disciplines. It is, therefore, open to a wide array of interpretations.

The play asks more questions than it answers. It does not force an opinion of God or Humanity on the audience so much as it invites the audience to form their own. Complete with silly hats, moments of slapstick and circular conversations.

So, why produce Godot now? What present day horrors have we collectively faced, especially in the last three years, that would warrant reflection on the themes of waiting for help or salvation or relief or direction that may or may not ever arrive?

What Godot have we been waiting for? More importantly perhaps, why have we chosen to wait?

"Was I sleeping, while the others suffered? Am I sleeping now? Tomorrow, when I wake, or think I do, what shall I say of today?"- Vladimir
