What does the fact that Adam and Chava (Eve) hide from the Holy One teach us about the relationship between man and Adonai? Circle the answer:

That's right. By eating of the fruit of the Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil, Adam and Chava have allowed sin to separate them from their relationship with the Holy One.

Adam and Chava were removed from the garden, the place where the Holy One appears to have also dwelt.

Adonai told Adam and Chava that they would die on the day they ate of the fruit from the Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil.

Based on Genesis chapter three, how does the Holy One describe death? Circle Yes or No

They physically died when they ate the fruit? YES or NO

They were exiled (forced to leave) Gan Eden? YES or NO

Death is separation from the Holy One and Life (the Tree of Life)? YES or NO

They did not physically die on the day they are of the fruit. They were exiled from Gan Eden. Since Gan Eden contained the Tree of Life and since Adonai dwelled in Gan Eden, the Torah shows us that death is separation from the Holy One and Life!

Now we can see why the Tree of Life and the Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil were such powerful themes throughout this Parsha. **They show the possibility for a relationship between man and the Holy One.** As long as man kept from eating from the Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil, he could stay in Adonai's presence and eat from the Tree of Life.

The Torah is teaching us about <u>man's relationship with his Creator</u> through the Tree of Life and the Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil. It is a relationship based on <u>commandments</u> (mitzvot) from the Holy One and <u>obedience</u> by man! Therefore, the main message of this portion of Scripture is this: <u>Disobedience to the</u> <u>commandments</u> (mitzvot) of YHVH severs the relationship between God and man.
