Ponderous Thoughts



"All you need is a smile and a little sparkle." —Dolly Parton

Dolly Parton, in many ways, makes a pretty unusual saint. Just put her, in full makeup and with her heels on, next to Mother Theresa in your mind...they don't really seem like they go together...yet the two of them have had a profound affect on the lives and faith of more people than either of them could ever have imagined.

Both women had a heart for people who were often ignored or forgotten. Mother Theresa saw Jesus in the faces of sick and starving people in Calcutta; Dolly Parton wanted every child to not only be able to read, but to actually own books. And while Dolly didn't give up the glitz and glamour of a music career, she did create the Imagination Library, which aimed to put a book in the hand of every child, every month, from birth until they turned 5. 60 books of their very own, from a woman who had watched her father struggle with illiteracy, and wanted to prevent anyone else from ever feeling that way. Currently the Imagination Library sends 3.4 million books out each month to the U.S., Canada, the U.K., Australia, and the Republic of Ireland.

Of course, it takes more than generosity to be a saint, and Dolly Parton was public about her faith as well. From her hit song, "The Coat of Many Colors," tying together the Bible story of Joseph and his colorful coat and the little coat her mother sewed for her from scraps of fabric, to her public statements about her faith keeping her sane and positive in the stressful entertainment industry, to the ways she viewed generosity and kindness as part of her Christian calling, Dolly Parton kept her Christian faith at the center of her life.

One of the themes of *Theo of Golden*, which we will share as part of a sermon series and book group starting in September, is how we might perceive saints in ordinary life. While no one could call Dolly Parton ordinary, she embodied that kind of sainthood—it was pure and genuine, just an expression of who she was. We had the sense that she was who she was at home, on stage, and anywhere else she went, and that if that dazzling smile were ever directed our way, it would feel like the warmest welcome.

Dolly and Mother Theresa were alike in another way: they weren't perfect, and they acknowledged their imperfections instead of trying to hide them. Their openness about being human makes them seem all the more saintlike, and also more relatable.

I was sitting at my desk in the office, working on charge conference paperwork, when I got a text message from my father that Dolly Parton had died. Over the course of the afternoon, I began to see news reports, social media posts, and comments from friends about Dolly Parton's legacy, and particularly what she meant to them. I am not a fan of country music, and I still don't prefer most of Dolly's music, but I am a fan of Dolly Parton. Saint Dolly—may she ever point us to grace, welcome, and generous love.

Lay Member Report to Oriental UMC from Annual Conference 2026

As your Lay Member to the North Carolina Conference, I attended this year's gathering in Greenville of eastern North Carolina United Methodists with Pastor Anne, Lay Leader Catherine Baxley, and 1,010 fellow laity and clergy. The NC Conference encompasses 56 counties in eastern North Carolina, with 136,130 members in 438 congregations. Thursday 6-18-26

The full Conference opens each year with separate executive sessions for Laity and for Clergy. Conference Lay Leader John Hall led the Laity Executive Session, sharing the stories of laity serving joyfully in ministry and their daily lives. Catherine and I were particularly struck by the volunteer-powered, dementia-focused respite program "Come Again Community Respite" in New Bern. Trinity UMC is partnering with Centenary UMC using the "Respite for All" model. Well worth exploring for Oriental. <https://respiteforall.org/locations/come-again-community-respice-at-trinity-umc/>

The Plenary Session

Bishop Shelton preached the opening service, reminding all of the United Methodist Church's Vision Statement: "The UMC forms disciples of Jesus Christ who, empowered by the Holy Spirit, love boldly, serve joyfully, and lead courageously in local communities and worldwide connection." Reports included New Faith Communities, Higher Education & Campus Ministries, Office of Clergy Life, Board of Ordained Ministry, and Connectional Ministries.

Celebrations highlighted the 70th anniversary of approval for full ordination of women since 1956. Currently 43% of NC's UMC pastors are women.

The NC Conference celebrated the official federal recognition of the Lumbee Nation whose tribal lands are in the southern part of our Conference. John Oxendine led a wonderful session including the young ladies called Lumbee Ambassadors who travel statewide, all wearing traditional garb. Highly recommend watching it at nccumc.org/ac2026/watch, scroll down to "Thursday Afternoon Session" and go to minute 1.33.32.

Thursday evening's work session included my favorite report, the Conference Statistician's report. Yes Jackie, your weekly head counts MATTER! Average Conference attendance at weekly worship services stands at 28,946, down 11 from 2024. \$635,817 was given toward United Methodist Men's projects and \$622,597 toward United Women in Faith projects. Membership for 2025 was down 6,255 from 2024. Worshipers engaged in mission for 2025 were 32,181 (up 2,070 from 2024). Our Conference approved a budget of \$11,279,314 for 2028, a 4.31% decrease from last year's budget. The evening concluded with an ice cream social.

Friday 6-19-26

Friday morning's plenary session began with Rev. Dr. Susan Henry-Crowe sharing the history of the United Methodist Social Principles and its latest revision.

Friday afternoon, the All Saints Celebration and Memorial Service for clergy who passed away in the past year was held and Oriental's Rev. Penny Dollar Farmer was honored. <https://nccumc.org/news/2026/06/all-saints-memorial-service-2026/>

The Juneteenth Celebration featured powerful and soulful music from the University UMC Jazz Ensemble from Chapel Hill featuring jazz artist Ti Berinson, UUMC's music minister. And here's the link to wonderful photos: <https://nccumc.org/news/2026/06/juneteenth-celebration/> The Council of Bishops of the worldwide United Methodist Church will host a Leadership Gathering in Calgary, Alberta, Canada October 20-24. The theme is "Emboldened by the Spirit - Imagining the Church to Be".

Connectional Ministries presentations included inspirational reports from Methodist Home for Children's and from Camp and Retreat Ministries.

The financial reports were presented by the Conference Council on Finance & Administration, the Insurance Committee, the Board of Pension, and the Commission on Equitable Compensation.

Saturday 6-20-26

On Saturday morning, celebration of the Lumbee Nation continued, highlighting the strong connection between the Lumbee and the NC Conference.

The Gun Violence Task Force shared this video <https://nccumc.org/leadership/2026/07/gun-violence-prevention-task-force-video/>.

There was an update on the Full Communion Agreement between The United Methodist Church (already approved) and the Episcopal Church (will vote in 2027), allowing the UMC and TEC to serve together in shared worship, shared ministry, and shared .

Next year's Annual Conference will be in Greenville June 16-19, 2027. New delegates to General Conference will be elected at that time in preparation for the next legislative assembly of the General Conference in Minneapolis May 8-18, 2028.

Fixing of the Clergy Appointments were shared at the Conference: In Pamlico County, Pastor John Farmer continues at Bayboro and Alliance UMCs, Pastor Dennis Goodwin at Vandemere UMC and our Pastor Anne at Oriental UMC.

Conference concluded with the inspiring Ordering of Ministry service. The former Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church, the Right Reverend Michael Curry preached. Elected in 2015, he was the first African-American to lead the Episcopal Church. Prior to that he was the first African-American Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of North Carolina and has retired to Raleigh.

In the spirit of ecumenism, the laying on of hands for ordination included Bishop Darin Moore, Presiding Bishop of the Eastern NC Episcopal District of the AME Zion Church. Episcopal Bishops Michael Curry and Sam Rodman stood in affirmation for the ordination of the elders. Some of you may know Greg & Dottie Gallagher--their nephew Dawson Lane was ordained as an Elder and named the Conference's Associate Director for Clergy Life while also serving part-time at Holly Springs UMC. And our District Lay Leader Kim Rice Smith became a Certified Lay Minister.
