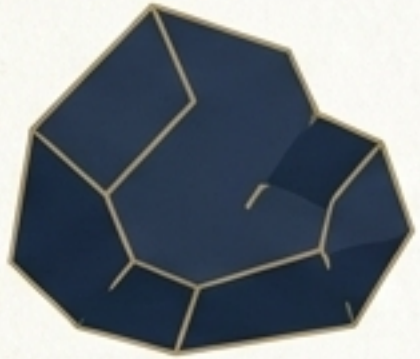

The Paradigm Shift

Secular Academic Teaching	Catechesis
The Goal: Comprehension	The Goal: Conversion & Encounter
The Subject: An Academic Topic	The Subject: A Person (Christ)
The Requirement: Subject Mastery	The Requirement: Authentic Lived Identity
The Standard: Perfection	The Standard: Authentic Striving & Grace

Insight: You are not just passing on data; you are passing on an identity.

The Posture of a Catechist



Avoid: The Sourpuss

Defeatism, pessimism, and treating faith as a weekend hobby.

Embrace: The Joyful Witness

Confidence in Christ's victory, authenticity, and treating faith as total identity.

2. Why do you care about passing on this faith?

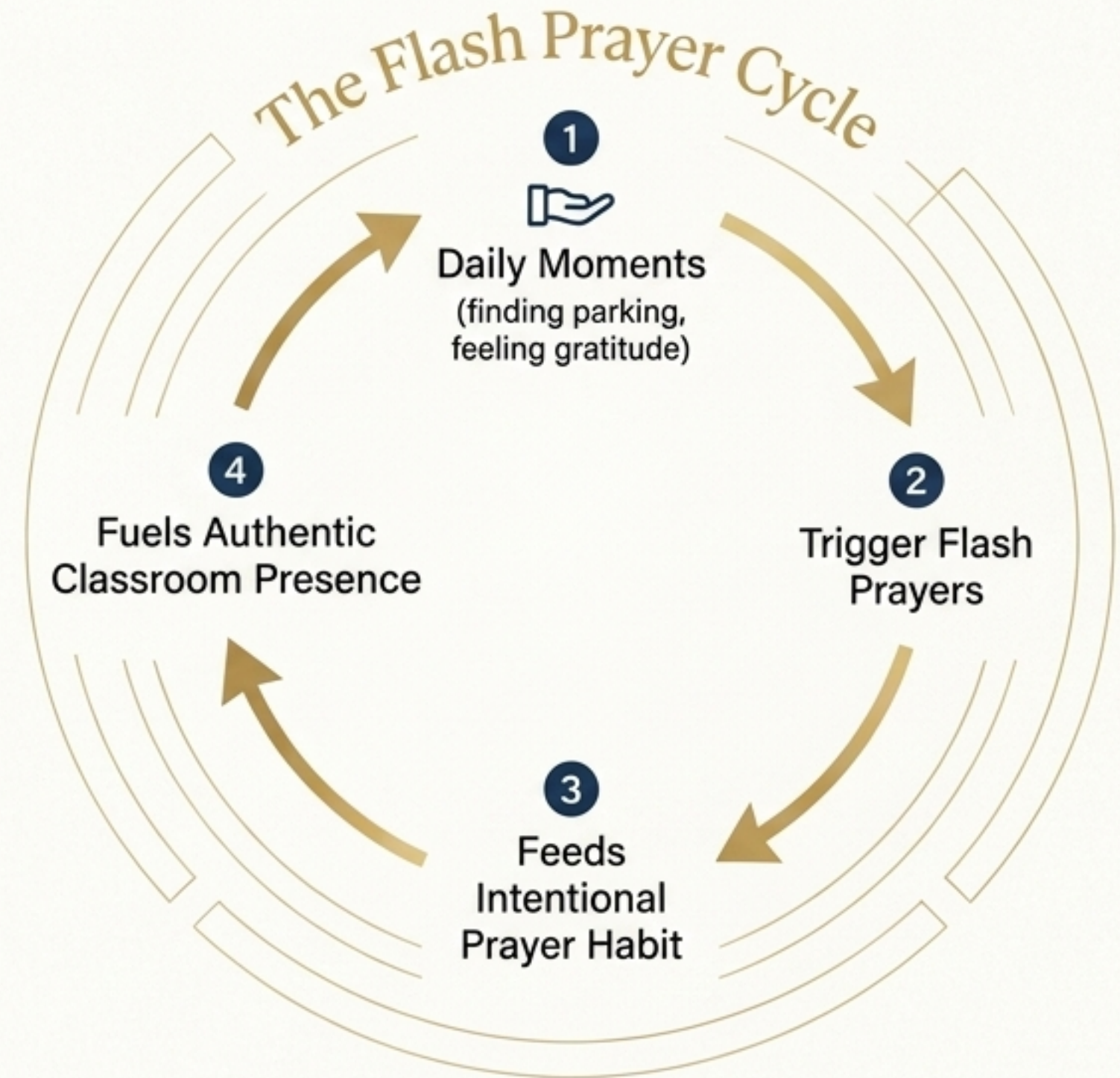
3. How do you personally react to God moments in your own life?

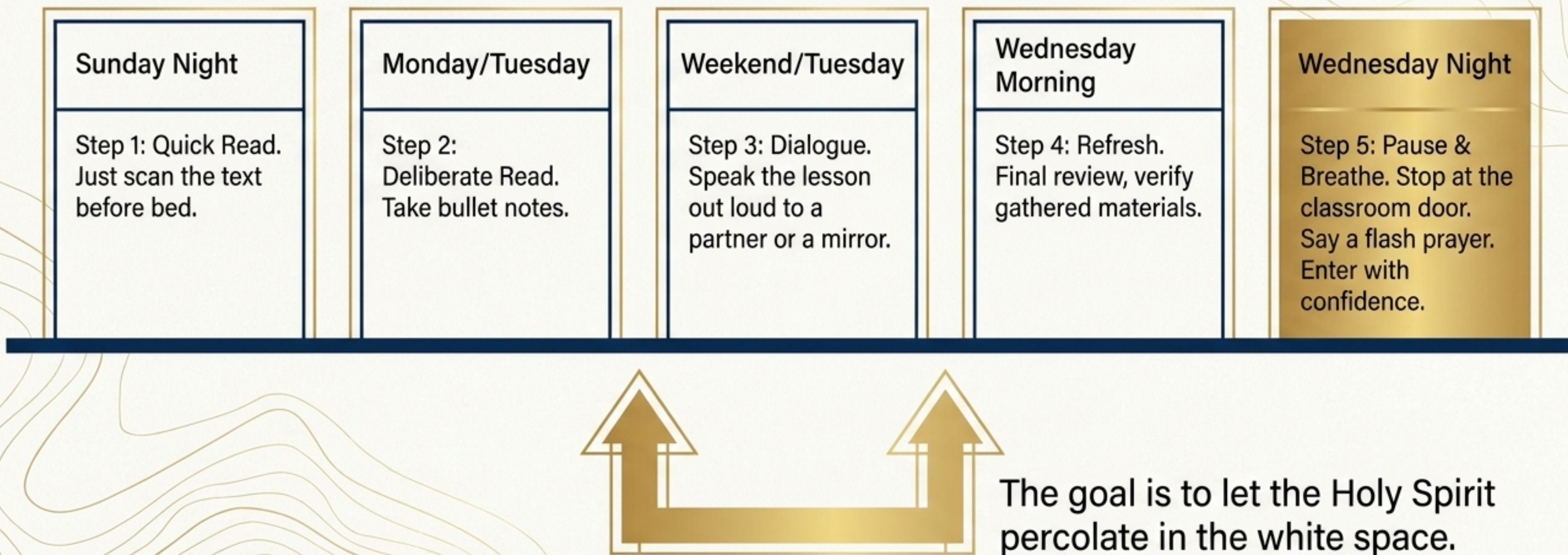


Moving from spiritual witness

The 3 Components of Readiness



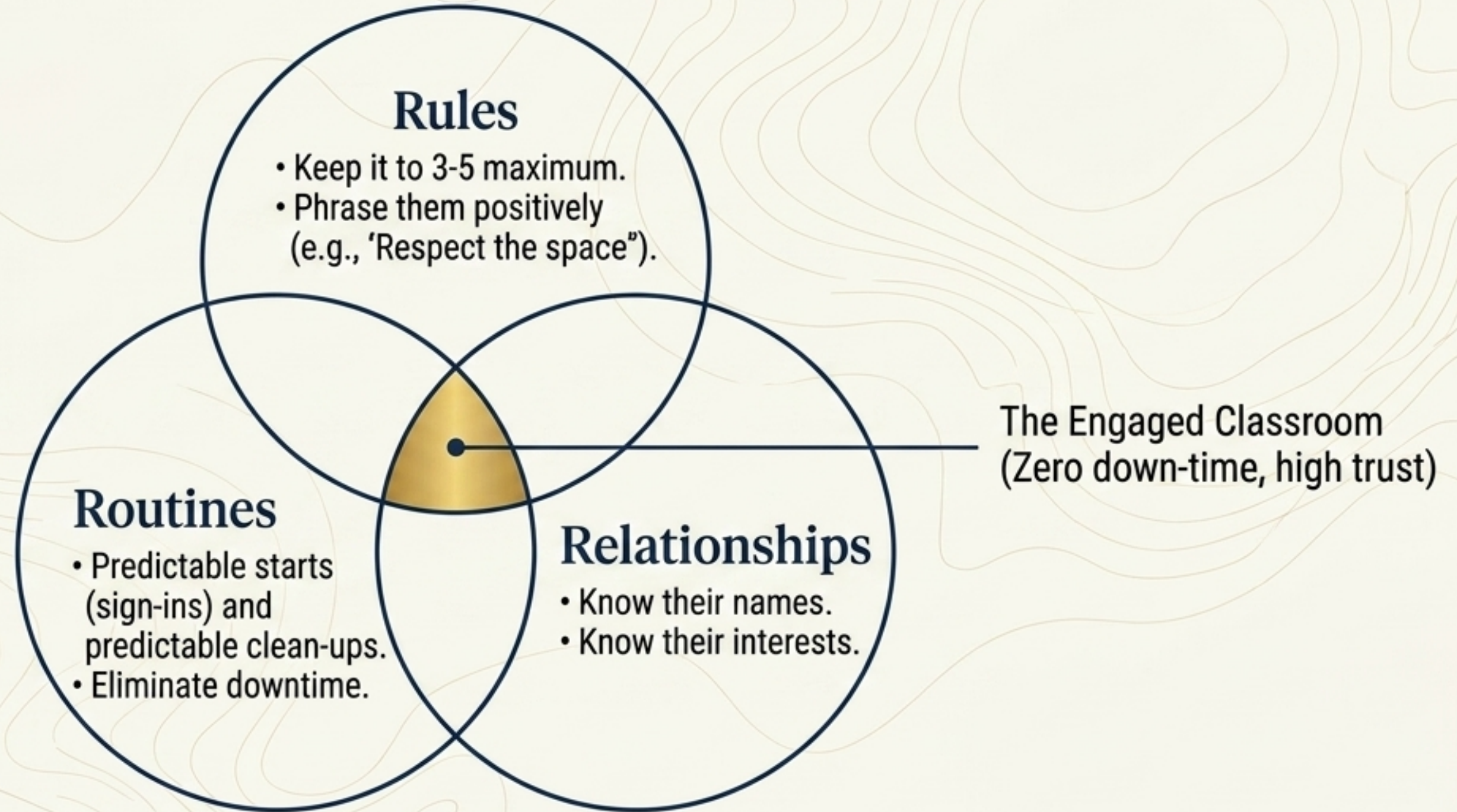
The Spaced Preparation Timeline

The First Two Weeks Toolkit

1. The Illustrated Name Tent

Have students fold construction paper and draw things significant to their lives alongside their name. Greeting them by name is paramount.

2. Find the Fib

(2 Truths and 1 Lie)

Each student shares three facts; the class guesses the untruth. Highly effective icebreaker to discover interests.

3. The Origin Story

Share your journey. Tell them why you are there and what you struggled with when you were their age. Authenticity breeds connection.

The Golden Rules of Engagement

Attention Dial



Rule 1: Age = Minutes

A 7-year-old maxes out at 7 minutes.

A 13-year-old maxes out at 13 minutes.

After that, you must shift activities or stretch.

The Input/Output Loop



Rule 2: Every input needs a Product.

- If they read → they must answer.
- If you teach → they must discuss.

Cooperative Learning (Kagan Strategies): Structure activities so all 25 kids are speaking and engaged, not just the 3 brave ones who always raise their hands.

Golden Rule: Praise in public; correct in private.
