

#### From the Pastor's Desk ....

#### 2025 Diocesan Annual Catholic Appeal (ACA) Progress

Did you know that the Parish of the Holy Spirit has already achieved its goal for the 2024-2025 ACA? We should be proud of this accomplishment! We are 1 of only 8 parishes (out of 41 parishes in the diocese) who have achieved this milestone, thanks to your generosity.

At the same time, I want to advise you of some current benefits of donating to the Annual Catholic Appeal, right nowespecially if you haven't made a pledge or one-time donation to this year's ACA. But first, some numbers ...

Potential Rebate to the Parish of the Holy Spirit	\$44,312
Total ACA Pledges Made So Far	\$168,425
Our ACA Goal for 2024-2025	\$124,113

- Because we have exceeded our ACA goal already, we are now in "rebate status" with the diocese; meaning: **any** 1) further pledges or donations made to the ACA will come back directly to the Parish of the Holy Spirit for our own use, 100%.
- 2) Your donations to the ACA are not "taxed" by the diocese as are the offerings you make to the Parish of the Holy Spirit on Sundays. How so? Here's how it works: Every parish in the Diocese of Yakima remits 6% of its "ordinary Sunday income" to the Pastoral Center in Yakima. This is called the diocesanum (essentially a diocesan assessment/"tax"). However, our donations to the Annual Catholic Appeal DO NOT fall into the accounting category of "ordinary Sunday income." And so, if you make any donations to the ACA now-while we are in "rebate status"—your donation will go 6% further AND will be credited entirely to Holy Spirit Parish. That's a great incentive to donate to the ACA, because our present rebate from the diocese will keep increasing!

As always, I thank you for your stewardship of treasure which keeps our parish and our diocese in sound financial shape; especially when the effects of inflation continue to affect us all. You are well aware, I'm sure, that any costs that are increasing in your own household are also increasing at the parish level-at the "household of God."

May God bless you for your continued generosity to our parish and the Diocese of Yakima.



#### (PRACTICING) CATHOLIC— RECOGNIZE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS By Colleen Jurkiewicz Dorman

**Mini reflection:** As Christians we know that everyone is our neighbor. It's drilled into us from the first time we hear this weekend's Gospel reading. But do we approach the victims that we see? Or do we withdraw from the suffering of others in fear and confusion, thinking: "That's not my problem"?

#### **Crossing the Street**

It takes a cold, hard, Godless heart to step over a wounded man on the street.

But in the parable of the Good Samaritan, the priest and the Levite didn't step over the half-dead traveler. I think we picture them doing so, in our collective imagining of this well-known story, but the words of the Gospel are quite clear: "When he saw him, he passed by on the opposite side."

So they saw him. They saw his need. It made them uncomfortable; it confused them. Many scholars have said that Judaic law concerning the touching of dead bodies might have made them reluctant to approach — and so they decided the simplest way to file this situation in the "not my problem" category was to cross the street.

But that still leaves a half-dead guy on the road. And we all, 2,000 years later, still think of the priest and the Levite as cold and hard and Godless — even if they didn't want to be, even if they didn't think of themselves that way — because the bottom line is, they didn't see the half-dead guy as their problem or as their neighbor.

As Christians we know that everyone is our neighbor. Well, I don't know about you, but I find myself crossing the street a lot more than I should—just like the priest and the Levite.

There is so much pain and suffering in the world. We certainly can't begin to alleviate it all. But we have to start with the pain and the suffering that we see, that's right in front of us — even if it's something we really, really want to ignore. Even if we find it inconvenient or confusing or scary or weird.

The heroism of the Good Samaritan wasn't in his selfless actions, although those were certainly commendable. It was in his courage. "He approached the victim," Jesus said, when others wouldn't.

Can we approach the victims we see? Do we have that courage?

## The Passion of Compassion

e tend to hear the parable of the Good Samaritan and place ourselves in the role of the Samaritan, thereby expected to be compassionate, as was the Samaritan. Those who heard Jesus tell the parable, however, would never have identified with the Samaritan. To them, the Samaritans were religious heretics who worshipped not in Jerusalem but at their own temple. Thus, the people of Jesus' day would have seen themselves as the victim, the one on the side of the road. Who, then, would be the Samaritan, the surprising caregiver, the compassionate one? Because parables are about God and how God works, it would be God who is and has always been the one who heals and feeds and nurtures us back to life. The parable then surprises the hearer of Jesus' day-God as a compassionate Samaritan!

It is God's compassion that we bring to those seeking forgiveness as well as to those who, for whatever reason, have not yet reached the point of asking for forgiveness. It is God's compassion that we bring to the unborn, the immigrant, the homeless, the sick in need of healing, the jobless who have lost hope. It is God's compassion that a nation brings to anyone who has lost his or her way, as it has been noted that the greatness of a nation is in how that nation deals with and cares for the weakest among them.

#### Reflect-

When have I needed a compassionate response? When could I have been more compassionate?

# Dear Padre,

I have a question about the prayer the priest says after the Our Father. Someone told me it's called an "embolism." Why don't we just end with "Amen" like when we say it at home?

You have correctly identified the "embolism" or "interpretation" that has been added to the Lord's Prayer during the sacred liturgy. It reads, "Deliver us, Lord, we pray, from every evil, graciously grant peace in our days, that, by the help of your mercy, we may be always free from sin and safe from all



distress, as we await the blessed hope and the coming of our Savior, Jesus Christ." This addition, ancient in its use during the eucharistic liturgy, is a further explanation of the content and the intercessory nature of the prayer. It develops the last petition of the Lord's Prayer and asks for deliverance from the power of evil for the whole community of the faithful. It is an appropriate insertion, reflecting the purpose of the eucharistic gathering as spiritual but also as a celebration of the Lord's words and directions to us. In private prayer, the embolism would be out of place.

The sacred liturgy is filled with intercessory prayers, acclamations, and bits and pieces of ancient eucharistic prayers and blessings. Everything has been carefully chosen and placed within the celebration of the sacred liturgy to assist the faithful who gather to lift their minds and hearts to the Heavenly Father, through his Son Jesus, by the power of the Holy Spirit.
