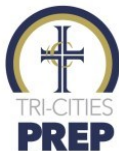

Our Home Chalice Program is Starting this Week!



The Home Chalice Program invites the families of our parish to participate in prayer for priestly and religious vocations. Through this program, a blessed chalice is entrusted to a family for a short period of time (typically one week). The chalice is then displayed reverently in the home as a visible reminder to family members to pray together for vocations, and to reflect on how God may be calling specific members of our parish to serve His Church.

Families will receive the chalice during the weekend Mass they normally attend, and will be sent forth with a brief prayer of blessing. After the home prayer period, the chalice is returned to the parish so it may be entrusted to another family. Families from all weekend Masses are encouraged to participate in this program.

OUR JOB AS FISHERS OF MEN



God is the one who calls men to the priesthood, but He often uses our voices of encouragement and invitation to do so. With your help, we can make Called By Name Sunday on April 25-26 a great success that will bear fruit in our diocese for generations to come. Thank you for your openness to, and generous participation in, this diocese-wide initiative. How can you participate in Called by Name Sunday? Here are some suggestions ...

1. **Be open** to God's call to the priesthood.
2. **Pray** about someone in our parish who you think God may be calling to the priesthood—someone with qualities that you would want in your parish priest.
3. **This weekend, take a form** from the vestibule table and record his (the prospective priest's) name and contact information. There is a basket available to collect the filled-out cards. **You may also use the QR code** (printed here) to submit the information directly with your smart phone anytime.



Once the names are forwarded to the Diocese of Yakima, Bishop Tyson and our Diocesan Vocation Team will then send the identified men a letter of encouragement, along with Fr. Michael Kelly's and Fr. Lalo Chavez' contact information, should they wish to follow up.

Dear Parish of the Holy Spirit,

I am so thankful and blessed to have had your support for my mission trip to Honduras in March. Without your support and prayers, it wouldn't have been possible to have this once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to serve my brothers and sisters in a foreign country. I'd like to share my experience.

I was in Honduras March 15-20 at La Finca Del Niño with 11 other students from Washington State University's Newman Center, serving at an orphanage. Each morning, our missionaries and a staff member of La Finca broke into four groups. Every morning the groups had a different task. One group helped alongside the teacher at the school on their facility. La Finca offers free schooling for nearly 100 children from the surrounding area. In the classrooms, we helped teach English and Math or had playtime with the kindergarteners. The second group worked alongside the maintenance crew on different projects around La Finca; whether that was painting, raking leaves, shoveling sand, or moving blocks. Our third group worked with the Tías. The Tías are women who take care of the 18 children living full time at La Finca. We helped with any chores they needed. Another missionary and I cleaned one Tía's house for her and cooked lunch for the children. The final group was with La Finca's head missionary, Nate, playing and walking along the beach with the five kindergarteners after they got out of school.

La Finca is a Catholic organization. We had the opportunity to pray Morning Prayer and the Rosary with the children and staff in Spanish multiple times each week. It was amazing to see the children willingly choose to participate in Morning Prayer, especially when the 5-6 year olds would sing the only songs they knew at the top of their lungs. The most remarkable thing we all noticed was the amount of love at La Finca and the pure joy that was a result of it. There wasn't a moment when I didn't see those children without smiles on their faces, which was remarkable knowing the places and circumstances some of them have come from.

This mission was an adventure that convinced me to change aspects of my life and to grow in my relationship with the Lord while continuing to serve my brothers and sisters. I will forever be grateful that you made this a reality for me. I cannot say it enough, thank you!

CATHOLIC HOME MISSIONS APPEAL

STRENGTHENING THE CHURCH AT HOME



In nearly 75 dioceses in the United States and its territories, funds from Catholic Home Missions are a lifeline for churches in rural areas where small Catholic populations are unable to sustain basic pastoral ministries without outside assistance.

In southern Illinois, the challenges facing the Diocese of Belleville are particularly acute. Most of the diocese's 28 counties are rural and have small Catholic populations, while the cities within the diocese are among the poorest in the entire country. Although the diocese lacks necessary material resources, it is blessed with dedicated men and women who faithfully carry out their mission to share the Gospel in ministries including catechesis, Hispanic/Latino ministry among the area's growing Spanish-speaking population, and campus ministry for the students at Southern Illinois

University (SIU) in Carbondale and other college campuses in the area.

The Newman Center campus ministry located on the SIU campus strengthens the faith of Catholic young adults with faith formation programs, fellowship, and prayer, as well as community service opportunities beyond campus. By participating at Sunday and weekday Masses and in student-led retreats, weekly dinners, and outreach to families in need, these students grow in their faith and prepare to be church leaders. Working with the diocesan vocation director, the campus ministry program helps nurture priestly vocations—a record of success made possible through support received from the Catholic Home Missions Appeal, which funds the full-time campus minister's position. Open Door

It is “Good Shepherd Sunday,” and the gospel quotes Jesus: “I am the gate for the sheep.” It seems the oddest of Jesus’ “I am” identities, until you realize that the shepherd himself was often the literal gate of the sheep’s pen, as he would lay his own body across the entrance to keep the sheep secure and safe from any predators. Actually, the predators that worry Jesus the most are other shepherds—“strangers” who came before him, all of whom Jesus flatly denounces as “thieves and robbers.”

Does that scare us today? Are we vulnerable to attacks, even from those supposedly in charge of our care? When Jesus opens the gate, we go in and out through him, through Jesus, to find pasture. We follow

him because we recognize “his voice.” In the synodal Church that Pope Francis called us to, and to which we continue to be called by Pope Leo XIV, every voice is welcome and needed so that the Holy Spirit will fill the whole Church with truth.

Here in Honduras, where I live, folks with little education can offer profound witness to the love of God. It comes from their own intimacy with Jesus, recognizing his voice in their daily life. They are often the poor victims of widespread corruption, like “a thief [who] comes only to steal and slaughter and destroy.” Here in Honduras, we take refuge in Jesus, that we “might have life and have it more abundantly” (John 10:10). ●

Reflect

How can we recognize voices that speak the truth? How do we recognize Jesus’ voice?



You had gone astray like sheep, but you have now returned to the shepherd and guardian of your souls.

1 PETER 2:25

Dear Padre,

Should Christians avoid practicing qi gong or tai chi? Or even meditation in which you empty your mind? Thank you.

This is one of those questions that has been debated for a long time. Social media offers many so-called experts with vastly different opinions. It can be very confusing, particularly if you are looking for a black-and-white answer, a yes or a no.

The pope who provides us with the most helpful direction to answer this question is Pope Benedict XVI. He did not forbid Eastern spiritual practices entirely but warned against their integration into Christian life without proper discernment. His perspective was rooted in a theological understanding that Christian spirituality is a unique path focused on a relationship with Christ. He emphasized that our Catholic spiritual tradition is distinct from the goals and methods of non-Christian traditions. He believed the practice of such non-Christian traditions, without preparation and without awareness of the challenge they present, could lead to spiritual error if not approached with caution and discernment.

So, the answer is nuanced. If you are using the practice as a spiritual practice, you should proceed with the utmost caution. If, on the other hand, you are using these practices for the more common physical or psychological—not spiritual—reasons, then it is permissible. ●
