

From the Pastor's Desk ...

SACRED TRIDUUM NOTES:

The Evening Mass of the Lord's Supper on **Holy Thursday** concludes with the transfer of the Blessed Sacrament to an altar of repose, where a tabernacle will be set up. Those wishing to do so can spend some time with our Eucharistic Lord in prayer and adoration at the conclusion of Mass. The Roman Missal suggests that it not be an extended vigil. So we will plan on having our time of prayer before the Blessed Sacrament in the vestibule until 8:00 PM.

Regarding **Good Friday**, there will not be Eucharistic Adoration on that day. The only prayer services will be the *Stations of the Cross* (at 3:00 PM) and the Good Friday *Liturgy of the Lord's Passion* in the evening (at 6:00 PM). Mass is not celebrated anywhere in the world on Good Friday.

UPCOMING CHANGES TO THE DAILY MASS SCHEDULE:

Beginning on Easter Monday, **April 21**st, the schedule for Daily Mass at the Parish of the Holy Spirit will revert to our pre-Lent schedule, as follows:

Monday at 9:00 AM **Tuesday at 5:30 PM**Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday at 9:00 AM

This schedule will permit me to have a 24-hour day-off, from late Monday morning to late Tuesday morning each week.

ADDITIONAL MID-WEEK CONFESSION TIME:

Resuming **May 20**th, the Sacrament of Reconciliation will be offered on **Tuesday afternoons from 4:15 PM to 5:00 PM** in the CHURCH reconciliation room. As noted above, our Daily Mass will follow at 5:30 PM. Our regular Sunday Confession time will continue as usual—from 3:00 PM to 4:15 PM in ROOM 9 of the PCC. However ...

There will NOT be Confessions on Easter Sunday, April 20th or on Easter Tuesday, April 22nd.

PRAYERS FOR PRIESTLY VOCATIONS AND PRAYERS FOR WORLD PEACE:

Each Friday afternoon, during Eucharistic Adoration in the vestibule, we will continue to offer *Prayers for Priestly Vocations* and *Prayers for World Peace* at **4:30 PM** (just prior to Benediction at 4:45 PM). The green-colored and tan-colored sheets containing these prayers will be available in the bulletin bin on Fridays, so that those who come to Eucharistic Adoration at other times during the day may offer these prayers privately if they wish.

The Pontifical Good Friday Collection

Pope Francis encourages all parishes to support the Pontifical Good Friday Collection, which helps Christians in the Holy Land, where they are now less than 2% of the population. Your support is essential to help the Church minister in parishes, provide education in Catholic schools, and offer religious education. The Pontifical Good Friday Collection also helps to preserve the sacred shrines of Christianity, including in Jerusalem, Nazareth, and Bethlehem, to name only a few.

The ongoing conflict between Hamas and Israel has hit Christians in the Holy Land particularly hard. Most of them depend on offering hospitality to Christian pilgrims for work. The war makes their situation even more challenging because less pilgrims are traveling to Israel. In these times of crisis, the Pontifical Good Friday Collection is necessary to meet the basic needs of the People of God still living in this Land and to maintain a Christian presence where the Church was born.

An offering basket for this collection will be placed on the table near the holy water font on Good Friday, both at the *Stations of the Cross* and at the *Evening Liturgy*.

When you contribute to the Pontifical Good Friday Collection, you join with Catholics around the world in solidarity with the Church in the Holy Land. PLEASE BE GENEROUS! Hosanna to the Messiah!

While Jesus would not be crowned an earthly king, Jesus' entrance into Jerusalem has many parallels to the Messianic expectations of the Hebrew people. Before entering, Jesus requisitions a donkey from its owner. In the ancient world, kings had this right. The animal that Jesus requests is rare—a colt upon which no one else has sat yet. Yet, it's a donkey. This is no great war-charger, no magnificent animal. Jesus acts with all the authority of an earthly king, yet his kingdom is one of simplicity and humility. As the disciples throw cloaks over the donkey, the crowd spreads theirs on the road. This ancient gesture dates back to the line of kings descended from King David. In addition to these physical kingly gestures, the crowd of followers cries out in jubilation and praise of Jesus. The Messiah has come to Jerusalem!

TRIDUUM

THREE DAYS OF COMMUNION WITH THE LORD

THE BREAD THAT MAKES US ONE

Because the loaf of bread is one, we, though many, are one body, for we all partake of the one loaf.

—1 Corinthians 10:17

As we partake of the one loaf, we become one body. Such is the communion that Holy Thursday invites us to embrace. This is a bold commitment, for God's people remain severely fragmented by dualistic political, religious, and economic ideologies, as if truth and right were byproducts of division rather than communion. Christ invites us, not to ignore differences or compromise convictions, but to focus on our common faith, common hopes, and common Spirit in the Lord. If we do, we may yet help to answer Christ's heartfelt prayer for unity at the Last Supper: *Father, may they be one, as we are one* (John 17:22).

THE CROSS OF DISCIPLESHIP

Whoever does not carry his own cross and come after me cannot be my disciple.—Luke 14:27

Pain can be an isolating experience. Suffering can close us in upon ourselves and cause us to assume that our hurt is beyond comprehension or empathy. Pain may also tempt us to insulate ourselves against vulnerability in life and in love. These measures can further separate us from the Lord who identifies with the most poor and defenseless among us. True disciples take up the cross with its intersecting vertical and horizontal beams that reconcile heaven to earth. In this way, they share the vulnerability Jesus embraced by becoming human, becoming brothers and sisters in Christ and co-heirs to Easter glory.

THE EMPTY TOMB

"Why do you seek the living one among the dead? He is not here, but he has been raised."—Luke 24:5

We live in a culture that loves to gaze into tombs. The eye of the media directs us to stare into the void of personal and communal tragedies in search of details to fascinate, distract, or titillate us in our loss. The Easter Vigil is a time for watching of a different sort. We do not seek to commune with darkness, but to keep vigil with full hope of meeting the risen Lord. We face the horizon singing the *Exultet* in joyful anticipation of communion with the Light of the World: *The night will be as clear as day: it will become my light, my joy.*

TRIDUUM FACTS

Most Important Liturgical Season: The Triduum is considered the most solemn and significant part of the Catholic liturgical year, spanning from the evening of Holy Thursday to the evening of Easter Sunday, commemorating the core events of Christ's Passion and Resurrection.

A Single Continuous Liturgy: The Triduum is celebrated as one unified liturgy. That's why there is no final blessing or dismissal on Holy Thursday and Good Friday until the Easter Vigil is completed.

The Mass of the Lord's Supper: Holy Thursday's Mass includes the *Mandatum*, the washing of feet, which recalls Jesus' act of service to his apostles and highlights his commandment to "love one another as I have loved you."

Veneration of the Cross: Good Friday is the only day in the liturgical calendar when Catholics do not celebrate Mass. Instead, a solemn liturgy includes the reading of the Passion and the veneration of the cross, where members can come forward to reverently kiss or touch a crucifix.

Silence and Solemnity: After the Good Friday service, the Church enters a period of silence and solemnity. The altar is stripped bare, and no sacraments are celebrated until the Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday night.

The Easter Vigil is the Longest Mass: The Easter Vigil, celebrated on Saturday evening, is typically the longest liturgical celebration of the year. It includes multiple Old Testament readings, the blessing of fire and water, and often baptisms and confirmations for new Catholics.

Blessing of Fire and the Paschal Candle: The Vigil begins with the *Lucernarium*, where a fire is lit outside the church and used to light the Paschal candle, representing the Light of Christ, who dispels the darkness of sin and death.

Renewal of Baptismal Promises: During the Easter Vigil, members renew their baptismal promises, reaffirming their faith and commitment to Christ.

COMMEMORATING THE TRIDUUM

Many parishes have Eucharistic Adoration as part of their **Holy Thursday** celebration. Spend some extra time in silent prayer before the Eucharist.

Stations of the Cross are particularly appropriate on **Good Friday**. By calling to mind the steps in our Savior's journey to Calvary, we can better appreciate what he did for us.

Holy Saturday features no morning liturgy but some parishes might gather on Holy Saturday morning for Morning Prayer from the Liturgy of the Hours. This is a good day to schedule at least one period of prayer in silence.

The Easter Vigil is a richly symbolic celebration of our belief in the Resurrection and the history of our salvation. Many parishes schedule baptisms for the Easter Vigil liturgy as a concrete representation of salvation through Christ.

Easter Sunday is the preeminent Sunday, reminding us of why we celebrate Mass and worship the Lord throughout the year. "Alleluia" is the word for the day. Sing or repeat it to yourself often as you go through the day's festivities.

THE HISTORY OF THE TRIDUUM

The origins of the Triduum can be traced back to the early Christian communities in the 2nd and 3rd centuries. Initially, Christians celebrated the entire Paschal Mystery—the passion, death, and resurrection of Christ—in a single day, known as *Pascha*. This observance, centered on the Resurrection, began on Holy Saturday evening and concluded on Easter Sunday morning, reflecting the vigil tradition of waiting in prayer for Christ's victory over death.

By the 4th century, with the legalization of Christianity under Emperor Constantine and the growing influence of liturgical practices in Jerusalem, the commemoration began to expand. Early Christian documents, like the writings of Egeria, a 4thcentury pilgrim, describe distinct liturgies in Jerusalem that separated the events of the Last Supper, Christ's crucifixion, and His resurrection into different days. This separation gradually became widespread throughout the Church.

The structure of the Triduum—Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday—evolved further in the Middle Ages as the Church sought to highlight each key moment of Christ's passion and resurrection. By then, the liturgical ceremonies became more defined, with specific prayers, readings, and rituals associated with each day, forming the three-day observance that Catholics recognize today.



The Emptying Process

e like to fill life with good things—good friends, good times, good jobs, good memories. They are all graced moments of life. Life is also marked by an emptying process. Friends move away, good times come to an end, jobs become boring. Saint Teresa of Kolkata (Mother Teresa) once noted how even God can't fill what is already full. The emptying process may very well be the action of God in our lives, emptying us to make room for God's gift of resurrection and life in its fullest.

Holy Week is the story of such a process—one long saga that begins with Palm Sunday as it focuses on how Jesus willingly emptied himself even unto death. The story moves on to Holy Thursday and the gift of the Eucharist to sustain us in the emptying. On to Good Friday, where, once more, a narration in stark liturgical strokes tell of the emptying of Jesus. Finally, the Easter Vigil and the Feast of the Resurrection, the culmination of a journey through death into life. We tell this weeklong story because the story of Jesus is also our story—more of God working in us rather than our own doing. The Jesuit theologian Karl Rahner once noted that one of the tasks of life is to learn how to die well. Our willingness to learn that lesson, again and again, is how we begin to share in the resurrection, even as we live our lives today.

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Dear Padre,

I'm thinking about going to the Easter Vigil, but why does it have to be so long?

When an event seems long, it may have to do with our expectations. If we go to the Easter Vigil and expect it to be like a Sunday Mass, then it will seem long. The typical parish Easter Vigil lasts two to three hours. There are some communities who vigil all night. Why does it have to be so long? Because this is one night of the year when we Catholics tell our whole story.

There are four parts of the Vigil. Part One is the *Lucernarium* (Light) when we gather around the paschal fire from which the

paschal candle is lit. Then follows the passing of the light to members of the congregation, who are holding candles. By candlelight, we hear the Exsultet—the Easter Proclamation, sung only on this night. Part Two is the Liturgy of the Word, when we take our time listening to readings, singing psalms, and reflecting on salvation history. Part Three is the Sacraments of Initiation, when new members are welcomed into the Church, baptized, and confirmed, and all renew their baptismal promises. And Part Four is the Liturgy of the Eucharist, when new members receive holy Communion for the first time. The Easter Vigil is rich with meaning, solemn as well as joyful, and to fully experience it, we must take our time. •
