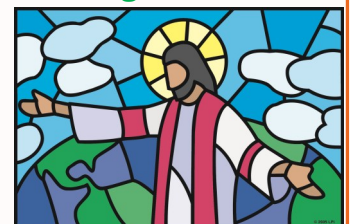

PENTECOST

THE COMING OF THE HOLY SPIRIT

Pentecost marks the glorious fulfillment of Easter. Fifty days after the Resurrection, the promise Jesus made to his disciples came true: the Holy Spirit descended upon them in wind and fire, transforming fear into courage and confusion into mission. This feast celebrates the birth of the Church and the power of the Spirit that continues to move within it today.

Gathered in the Upper Room, the apostles and others waited in prayer with Mary. Suddenly, “a sound like a strong driving wind” filled the house, and “tongues as of fire” rested on each of them (Acts 2:2–3). They began to speak in many languages, and people from every nation heard the Gospel in their own tongue. From that moment, the Good News began to spread to the ends of the earth.

Pentecost reveals that the Holy Spirit is not distant but active—breathing life into the Church, inspiring faith, and guiding believers. The same Spirit who hovered over creation and descended on Jesus at his baptism now dwells in every baptized person, empowering us to live as witnesses of Christ.

The seven gifts of the Holy Spirit—wisdom, understanding, counsel, fortitude, knowledge, piety, and fear of the Lord—enable us to grow in holiness and to share God’s love in the world.

Pentecost is sometimes called the “birthday of the Church,” but it is more than an anniversary.

It is a living reality. The Spirit who descended at Pentecost still renews the earth, stirring hearts, awakening faith, and giving courage to proclaim Christ’s peace.

As we celebrate this feast,
we pray: *Come, Holy Spirit,
fill the hearts of your faithful,
and kindle in them
the fire of your love.*

SYMBOLS AND CUSTOMS OF PENTECOST

The feast of **Pentecost** is rich in symbols that express the power and presence of the **Holy Spirit**. In Scripture, the Spirit appears as **wind and fire**—signs of God’s creative energy and transforming love. The **wind** recalls the breath of life that moved over the waters at creation, while the **tongues of fire** that rested on the apostles represent light, courage, and the flame of divine love that spreads through the Church.

The **dove**, a familiar image of the Holy Spirit, signifies peace and purity. **Red**, the color most associated with Pentecost, fills churches in vestments, flowers, and banners, recalling the fire of God’s love and the Spirit’s presence moving through the world.

Many parishes celebrate Pentecost with **special hymns, processions, and prayers to the Holy Spirit**, such as *Veni Creator Spiritus* (“Come, Creator Spirit”). In some places, **rose petals** or paper flames are dropped from church ceilings to symbolize the descending fire of the Spirit.

Pentecost also marks the transition into **Ordinary Time** on the Church calendar—a season that continues the mission begun at Pentecost, as the Spirit guides the Church in daily life and faith. These signs and customs remind us that the Spirit’s fire still burns in the world, renewing the face of the earth.



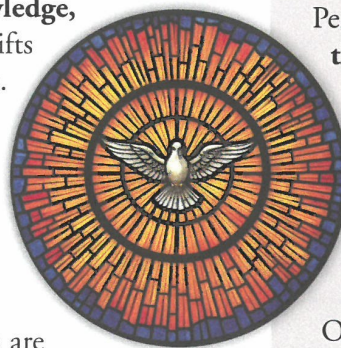
THE GIFTS AND FRUITS OF THE HOLY SPIRIT

The **seven gifts of the Holy Spirit** are divine helps given to every baptized believer to strengthen faith and guide Christian living. They are: **wisdom, understanding, counsel, fortitude, knowledge, piety, and fear of the Lord** (Isaiah 11:2–3). These gifts help us know and do God’s will with courage and love.

The **fruits of the Spirit**, described by St. Paul in Galatians 5:22–23, show how the Spirit’s presence bears visible results in our lives. They are: **love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control**.

The gifts are like seeds planted in the soul; the fruits are their blossoms. Both flow from living in harmony with the Holy Spirit, who forms Christ’s character within us.

At Pentecost, these gifts were poured out upon the disciples and continue to be given to all who open their hearts to God’s grace. Through the Spirit, the Church remains alive and the world is renewed.



THE HISTORY AND MEANING OF PENTECOST

The word *Pentecost* comes from the Greek *pentēkostē*, meaning “fiftieth.” It began as a **Jewish harvest feast**, celebrated fifty days after Passover, when the people gave thanks for the first fruits of the land. For Christians, it marks **fifty days after Easter**, celebrating the coming of the Holy Spirit promised by Christ.

In the **Old Testament**, Pentecost (or the Feast of Weeks) commemorated God’s covenant with Israel and the giving of the Law on Mount Sinai. In the **New Testament**, this feast becomes the moment of a new covenant, as the Spirit writes God’s law on human hearts.

After the Ascension, the disciples remained in Jerusalem as Jesus commanded. When the Holy Spirit descended upon them in the Upper Room, they were transformed from fearful followers into bold witnesses. That day, Peter preached his first sermon, and about three thousand people were baptized.

Pentecost thus marks the **birth of the Church** and the beginning of its mission to the nations. The symbols of **wind and fire** express the Spirit’s power and presence—wind that gives life, fire that purifies and strengthens.

Over the centuries, the Church has celebrated Pentecost as the **culmination of Easter**, when Christ’s saving work is made complete by the Spirit. It reminds believers that the same Spirit continues to guide and renew the Church in every age.

STEWARDSHIP: In the second reading today, St. Paul reminds the Corinthians, "There are different gifts, but the same Spirit; there are different ministries, but the same Lord." How am I using my gifts for the common good?

A Gift for All People of All Times

When reading aloud today's passage from Acts of the Apostles, do you stumble over the names of the peoples gathered as I do? "Parthians, Medes, and Elamites." Where is "Cappadocia, Phrygia, and Pamphylia"? And why were all these peoples in Jerusalem in the first place?

It might help to know that Pentecost did not originate as a Christian feast. There are three pilgrimage festivals that drew Jews from across the Mediterranean region to Jerusalem. Sukkot celebrates the fall harvest and God's protection during the exodus from Egypt. Two are in the spring: Passover, the Feast of the Unleavened Bread, recalling the night the Jews were freed from enslavement in Egypt; and Shavuot, or *Pentecost* in Greek, remembering the giving of God's law on Mount Sinai.

The scene described in Acts echoes the story at Mount Sinai. The peoples who gathered outside the house in Jerusalem represent the breadth and diversity of peoples known at that time, and not just at that time. Some of the civilizations mentioned had not existed for hundreds of years. The book of Acts wants us to know that the gift of the Holy Spirit was an event of such significance that somehow *all* were mysteriously present—not just those of times gone by, but even we who live in such far-away, hard-to-pronounce places as Islamabad or Albuquerque. Today, we celebrate a gift that transcends time and geography. A gift that continues to draw all of us together in wonder and awe. ●

Dear Padre,

I am a senior Catholic woman. All my life, I have waited for the Church to welcome women as priests. I have volunteered with numerous faiths over the years and have worked with pastors and rabbis who are women. Why does the Catholic Church not recognize that women have callings to the priesthood?

My answer will probably not be acceptable to you, and it might even make you a little more frustrated and perhaps even discouraged. The understanding of the Church is that the call to priesthood is not based on merit. If it were based on merit, and that was the single important criterion, your question might be phrased in a different way. I will let you imagine what that might be!

The tradition, practice, and discipline of the Church continues to insist that the call to ordained priesthood requires the respondent to be male. Any explanation beyond this simple statement would be strained and of little use. We are aware of the traditions that are practiced in other Christian denominations. We are probably aware of the Roman Catholic theology of priesthood that is offered in support of the practice. We can probably offer example after example in support or in disagreement of the practice. None of it matters when it comes up against the hard truth of the tradition, practice, and discipline: the priesthood requires a baptized male for validity. ●
