

It arrived each fall and was <u>the</u> resource for the latest toys and games available for purchase for Christmas. I can remember folding back corners of some of the pages in the catalog, thus offering hints to my mom and dad (and Santa) concerning what I would enjoy as Christmas presents.

As the Advent Season advances, may I be so bold as to offer a Christmas wish list for the Parish of the Holy Spirit? Here are some of my ideas. It's not an exhaustive list.

Read the Parish Bulletin every week.

Do something in our parish (we're talking about stewardship of time and talent here). Get involved in something as a participant or volunteer. See the front page of the Parish Bulletin for a wide variety of ideas.

Sign up to receive Flocknote text messages and emails from the parish. It's free, and it helps us to communicate with you effectively and in a timely manner. There's absolutely no spam associated with this service. Contact us at the parish office and we'll get you set up to receive Flocknotes lickety-split.

Contribute to the diocesan Annual Catholic Appeal (ACA). I wish that every individual or family would make a one-time donation of \$10, \$25, or \$50—or a pledge for a higher amount—to the 2024 ACA. One of our goals this year is to increase our level of participation in the ACA. It's only about 20% right now.

Consider using Bill-Payer from your bank or credit union to make your weekly Sunday offerings to our parish. This service is almost always free. Bill-Payer is a better option than using the ParishSoft online giving link (which is published in the Parish Bulletin) because there's a substantial service charge associated with using the ParishSoft service, which our parish has to absorb.



# When Will We Be Satisfied?



n 1992, *Forbes* magazine published an issue titled "Why Do We Feel So Bad When We Have It So Good?" It featured articles by such luminaries as newsman Dan Rather, President George H. W. Bush, and author John Updike. Many of the writers reflected upon our passion for more and our hunger to live in affluence and how that fails to satisfy. In so many ways, we as a nation find ourselves seeking distractions from living with ourselves lest we be confronted by our ultimate loneliness. As a nation we are addicted to entertainment and smartphones, to drugs and pornography, to finding something new. We are confronted by rising suicide rates and a pervasive, deep-seated anger. Why are we not satisfied?

John the Baptist called the people of his day to repent, which is another way of asking them—and us—to look at life differently. Advent is really about getting in touch with our deep longing for more, a part of our human condition that ultimately is only satisfied by God. We have been created to long for more, a longing that feels like loneliness, a longing that seeks to be satisfied. In the end, we can only find a sense of peace in the midst of such longing by accepting that it can never be fully satisfied in this life. Like the spirituality of Alcoholics Anonymous, accepting rather than fleeing from our human reality becomes a path to new life. ●

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# ONE FOR TWO? ... NOT

Did you notice? The **Fourth Sunday of Advent** is on December 24th this year. So Christmas Eve is the evening of that same day. You might be wondering ... "Can I fulfill my obligation for Sunday and for the holy day of The Nativity of the Lord by coming to Mass just once on December 24th?" The answer is: No. We are to come to Mass once for *Sunday* (either Saturday evening, December 23rd at 4:00 p.m. or Sunday morning, December 24th at 9:30 a.m.) and once again for *Christmas* (either of the two Masses on Christmas Eve, Sunday, December 24th or the Mass at 9:30 a.m. on Christmas Day, Monday, December 25.)

Celebrating Mass together is essential for maintaining our loving union with God. Without it, our relationship with God suffers. That's the reason the Church makes Mass attendance an obligation on Sundays and holy days. Every Sunday we celebrate the Lord's Resurrection, and on Christmas we celebrate the Lord's Incarnation. The entire Christian faith depends on these two key events in Jesus' life. Therefore, we gather together for Mass to praise God for the salvation we have received through Jesus' birth, his life among us, his passion and death, and his glorious rising from the dead. Mass is our way of thanking God for his goodness and his faithful love.







On December 9, 1531, Our Lady appeared to a simple Aztec Indian who had converted to the Catholic faith, Juan Diego. The place of the apparition was on a hill call Tepeyac, located in present-day Mexico City. Three days later, at Juan Diego's request, Mary provided a sign so the local bishop would believe that she actually had appeared. Roses grew out of the cold winter soil, and when Juan Diego opened his cloak to show the bishop what he had found, an image of Our Lady appeared on the fabric. These occurrences led to the conversion of most of Mexico and remain today a strong sign of Our Lady's concern and love for us.

Church-approved Marian apparitions always point to her Son, Jesus. For many of us with a strong Marian devotion, Mary is a pathway into a stronger relationship with our Lord. Her generosity shown to Juan Diego is the same generosity shown to each of us that choose to ask for her intercession. Families pray for one another and she is a very prominent member of our spiritual family. May the miracle of Our Lady of Guadalupe be a sign of warmth for us in the cold of winter and of Advent hope for the coming of the Christ Child who has redeemed the world.

# If you are finding yourself adverse to the holiday spirit, that's okay. Here are some ways to guide yourself through the holidays and not over stress yourself.

Make a plan and set yourself up for success during a celebratory season by minimizing anxiety.

The first step, Cormier said, is acknowledging that the holidays will be different, and to be proactive about what helps and what doesn't. For example, consider the following:

- Are there some traditions you'd rather not do? Some may just be too painful. It may make sense to try something new!
- Do you want to celebrate in the same place? It might be better to travel this season instead of staying home.
- Who are the people you want to be around? Enjoy their company when they invite you for a visit.
- Can you handle an all-day celebration? Be flexible with yourself and let the host know you may only stay for a short while.

Those grieving also should recognize that often how one anticipates an event, especially one they believe may be stressful, almost always is worse than how it actually turns out.

Reminder: In many ways, a holiday is just like any other day in that it only lasts 24 hours.

# Dear Padre,

# Do Catholics have to marry in the Church? If a couple decides to marry outside of the Church, are they still allowed to receive Communion and other sacraments?

Catholics are obligated to follow the laws of the Church, including those laws regarding marriage. If a Catholic marries outside the Church, meaning that they did not follow Church law, then they may not receive the other sacraments until their marriage has been witnessed by the Church.

A wedding is a sacred ceremony for the couple, but it is also a ceremony for the Church. The Christian community is called



upon to witness the ceremony, with the bishop, priest, or deacon called upon to bless the union in the name of the Church. The Church can dispense from the form, that is, the place of the wedding, for good cause, and does so when necessary. When a dispensation from the law is granted, then the person has followed the marriage laws of the Church and is free to receive the sacraments.

A wedding is a sacred ceremony in which a sacrament is conferred. While the park may be pretty or the church down the street may be bigger, neither is a sufficient reason to ignore marriage law and marry outside the Church.
