

### From the Pastor's Desk ...

#### A PARISH PRIEST WAS MURDERED IN NEBRASKA THIS WEEK:

Whenever a First Responder like a police officer or firefighter dies, whether it is in the line of duty or of natural causes, we know that the entire community in which they served grieves and shows its solidarity and support for the surviving family members. It is not uncommon that brother/sister firefighters or police officers will come from far and wide to attend the funeral or memorial service for a fallen comrade. Given this dynamic, I ask everyone to offer prayers for the repose of the soul of **Fr. Stephen Gutgsell** of Fort Calhoun, NE, who was murdered in his rectory in the early morning hours of Sunday, December 10<sup>th</sup>—stabbed to death in his kitchen. Needless to say, Fr. Gutgsell did not celebrate any Sunday Masses on the Second Sunday of Advent and his parish likely went without the Holy Eucharist that day. Sad.

I never met Fr. Gutgsell, but his untimely and tragic death should affect me and us all. Please join me in praying that Fr. Gutgsell will rest in peace with the Lord whom he loved and served. Pray also for the perpetrator(s) of this crime; that they may be brought to justice and that they will repent of their actions and seek the mercy of God.



### St. Peter Canisius - Feast Day December 21



Born in Holland, St. Peter Canisius (May 8, 1521 – December 21, 1597) was a preacher, teacher, and writer throughout his whole life. At the age of 19, he received a master's degree from the university at Cologne. Soon afterwards, St. Peter met Peter Faber, the first disciple of Ignatius of Loyola, who influenced him so much that he eventually joined the Society of Jesus.

St. Peter Canisius founded colleges and seminaries, served as a missionary, cared for the sick or imprisoned, and wrote close to eight volumes of letters — many about St. Cyril of Alexandria and St. Leo the Great.

Blessed with many talents, St. Peter Canisius is a wonderful example of a man who developed his talents to further God's work here on earth.

#### THE HOLY FACE OF JESUS

"Seek the Lord and His strength; Seek His face continually." Psalm 105:4 "Make Your face shine upon Your servant, And teach me Your statutes." Psalm 119:145

Show us thy face and we shall be saved. Throughout the history of the world people have longed to see the face of God. The face of Jesus Christ is both a sign of God's divinity and his humanity. Jesus knew we would seek his face and long to see it. He showed us his Holy Face during his life, death, and resurrection.

On Epiphany 1849 he answered that call again. When the pope had to flee Rome due to a revolution, God allowed the veil of Veronica to be miraculously illuminated allowing the imprinted face of Jesus on his way to Calvary to be seen clearly, for the first time in centuries, for three days. Artists were brought in to capture Jesus' image, those images were printed, touched to the true veil and sent out to the religious. One religious man, Leo Dupont, worked 6,000 verified miracles in front of one such print.

It was the favorite devotion of St. Therese the Little Flower, whose name in religious life was Therese of the Child Jesus and the Holy Face.

Short daily prayers, revelations, and a chaplet were given to a little known nun, Sister Mary of Saint Peter. This chaplet was given to her to be *th*e devotion to fight communism, a concept she had never heard of before.

The Lord showed us his face. Let us seek it, let us love and adore his face as Mother Mary did, as the saints in heaven do. If you are looking to increase your love of Jesus, consider making this devotion your own.

To learn more about this beautiful devotion, stop by the parish office. There are copies of the autobiography of Sister Mary, chaplets, plaques, and framed copies of the image from the veil of Veronica. These are all free and waiting for you! But supplies are limited so head over today! All of these materials have been made available to us by a family from our parish who has a deep devotion to the Holy Face. ## GRIEF DOESN'T TAKE HOLIDAY BREAKS TIPS FOR THE CHRISTMAS SEASON FROM TRI-CITIES CHAPLAINCY

**Acknowledge Feelings as Normal**: It is normal for children to experience a wide range of emotions when grieving the death of someone significant. Acknowledge these feelings and assure your child that having these feelings is normal.

**Emotional Expression**: Accept expression of all emotions. Children may express sadness, pain, frustration, anger or other powerful emotions. Avoid minimizing their feelings or trying to put a "positive" spin on them. For example, saying, "It's important to focus on the good times you had with your dad," may communicate that you do not want to hear a child talk about painful things.

**Traditions**: Plan ahead. Create new traditions or choose to embrace the old as a way to stay connected. Involve children in creating new traditions. Come together and decide what traditions still work for your family, what traditions it is time to let go of, and what new traditions you can create together.

**Memories**: Include the memory of the person who died in your celebration. Invite children to make something meaningful, such as a holiday card or gift, specifically for your person. Some children might want to take these items to the cemetery. There are lots of ways to remember your person during the holidays, by cooking their favorite food, listening to their favorite songs, or taking part in their favorite traditions.

**Self-Care**: Always remember to take care of yourself. Give yourself a break, surround yourself with a strong support system, and take time to recharge. Remember: you have to take care of yourself first so you can take care of others around you.

**Give Back**: Caring for others can be very therapeutic when you are grieving. Consider taking time to volunteer at a local non-profit, or make a donation in your person's memory or honor.

### ONE FOR TWO? ... NOT

Did you notice? The **Fourth Sunday of Advent** is on December 24th this year. So Christmas Eve is the evening of that same day. You might be wondering ... "**Can I fulfill my obligation for Sunday and for the holy day of The Nativity of the Lord by coming to Mass just once on December 24th?**" The answer is: **No.** We are to come to Mass once for *Sunday* (either Saturday evening, December 23rd at 4:00 p.m. or Sunday morning, December 24th at 9:30 a.m.) **and** once again for *Christmas* (either of the two Masses on Christmas Eve, Sunday, December 24th or the Mass at 9:30 a.m. on Christmas Day, Monday, December 25.)

Celebrating Mass together is essential for maintaining our loving union with God. Without it, our relationship with God suffers. That's the reason the Church makes Mass attendance an obligation on Sundays and holy days. Every Sunday we celebrate the Lord's Resurrection, and on Christmas we celebrate the Lord's Incarnation. 
# Making Room for God

he story of John the Baptist is the story of taking a back seat to Jesus, of fading into the background so that Jesus might be the light. Fading out of the picture is something we may find ourselves doing more than once in our lives. Sometimes it's also a choice we have to make, even when it's painful.

Actor Nick Nolte talked about what it was like for him when he turned seventy; how his body would hurt and how painful it was to get out of bed some mornings. He told of how he cried when a longtime friend passed away and of the sadness death brings. But the worst part, he said, is coming to the realization that your children have grown up, are on their own, and don't need you the way they once did. His son has a family, and for him the family comes first, as it should. That's the painful part, Nolte says, the letting go of your children because they are no longer yours; in reality, they never were.

From the perspective of faith, why do we need to fade into the background? To leave room for the hand of God in life, that's why. So that God can do what God does best, and so that we don't get in the way of it all. That is a task not only at the end of life but for all of life. •

# Dear Padre,

Was Jesus born in a stable or a cave? The Christmas scene in our church has Jesus born in a little shed. but in my friend's church it looks more like a cave. The Bible says Jesus was born in a manger, so just where was Jesus born?

The Christmas scenes, sometimes called Nativity scenes or crèches, vary from church to church. In Scripture, we find more details about the Nativity in Luke's Gospel, but even he simply

says that Mary wrapped Jesus in swaddling clothes and laid him in a manger because the inn was full (Luke 2:7).

In none of the Scriptures do we have any details about what the place looked like, but since a manger is a place where caregivers feed livestock, we can assume that Jesus was born in a stable of some kind. At that time, small caves sometimes were used as stables.

Nativity scenes, though, are not an attempt to present a historically accurate picture of where Jesus was born. Rather, scenes of the birth of Jesus remind us of the special love that God shows for us in sending the Son to us. We do not care so much about creating an exact picture of what took place as we do of beholding the beauty and wonder of God born among us.
