The gold chalice that I am using at all our Masses this weekend has some history attached to it. It was purchased by the Women's Group of our parish and presented to the Parish of the Holy Spirit in May, 2005. Over twenty years, this chalice has been used a lot—especially at daily Masses when Msgr. Auve and Fr. O'Shea were the celebrants. The chalice required some minor repairs and re-gilding, as both the exterior and interior of the "bowl" portion had a lot of scratches from wear-and-tear. With all the refurbishing work done, this chalice looks brand new again! I'm sure it will continue to serve our parish well, over the next 25 years (and beyond).

A generous donor from our parish made the chalice refurbishing possible. Another donor has provided funds to purchase a paten—the plate/bowl that holds both small and large hosts—to match the chalice. We are looking at options for this purchase right now.

I want to thank our Women's Group once again for gifting our parish with this chalice. Other individuals and families have also donated some vestments to our parish. I want to thank them too. All of these religious articles are used to offer fitting worship to Almighty God, which is the most important "work" we do together here at the Parish of the Holy Spirit.

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP RECOGNIZE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS

What's Most Important?

I hold to the belief that you cannot have allegiances to both Duke and UNC, the Packers and the Bears, or the Yankees and the Red Sox. In Matthew 6:24, it says, "He will either hate one and love the other, or be devoted to one and despise the other." That verse isn't talking about sports! It's talking about God and money. Some of us love both God and money and that can be a problem. If you were to love any of the sets of teams mentioned above, you would have a huge problem as well.

Simply put, you can only have one thing that is the *most* important in your life. When I ask my children what is the most important thing in their lives, they know to respond, "God." But just because you know that is the right answer doesn't make it the truthful answer. Total allegiance to a sports team seems easier. You won't find a Packers fans secretly wearing a Bears jersey. However, we can find Christians secretly hoarding their money or doing things based solely on their love of money.

Maybe the problem lies in the fact that, at times, we are merely lukewarm fans of Jesus and not intentional disciples. If we truly have matured in our faith and strengthened our relationship with the Lord, then real commitment becomes easier. There will always be the temptation for money to take priority over Jesus, but the more committed we are, the harder it becomes to allow anything to come between us and our God. The question we all must continually ask ourselves is, "Is God truly the most important thing in my life?"

As infants, we reach out, wanting to be wanted. When we begin school and discover others who might be friends, we want to be wanted. As teenagers discovering the stirrings of something new and deep, we want to be wanted. And when we grow old, then still we want to be wanted.


The parables Jesus told were always about how God moves in our lives, how God is powerfully intertwined in all that is. Jesus told parables to give us a hint of where to find God. This Sunday's parable is about a rich man with a steward about to be dismissed. The steward then finds ways to ingratiate himself into others' lives so when he is dismissed, he won't be left

out in the cold. It's not the rich man who is the Godperson in the parable. The rich got rich by abusing the poor. Rather, it is the steward who is the image of God—a God who, like the steward, is desperate to be accepted, to find a way into our lives. We might say clever...or even sneaky. It is God who finds a way into our lives when we are afraid, when we face the loss of love, when our worlds are falling apart, when we go looking for him. There, then, is God, eagerly wanting to be wanted.



Many elderly religious served with little to no pay, and unfortunately, today, many US religious orders lack adequate retirement savings. The women and men religious featured on our 2025 Retirement Fund for Religious campaign materials are among those who benefit from this collection, which receives donations to help hundreds of communities provide for their aging members.



Brother Jordan Coonen, OP 65 years of religious life

"I was deeply influenced by the Racine Dominican Sisters who staffed my schools. Sister Marie Therese encouraged me to consider religious life," shares Brother Jordan Coonen, 84, a Dominican Brother of Chicago, Illinois.

Born in Little Chute, Wisconsin, Brother Jordan was one of eight children, shaped by his devout family—especially his mother's faith. After graduating from St. John High School, a visit to Chicago led him to join the Dominican Order.

His ministry took him to parishes in Chicago, Denver, and Madison, where he worked with youth, led maintenance, and taught crafts.

Now retired, he remains active in a large Dominican community, makes thread crosses, and stays connected with friends across the nation.



Sister Maria Cigolini, MSCS 62 years of religious life

"I was blessed to grow up in a faithful home. Inspired by my brother's vocation, the Scalabrinian Sisters, and a devoted priest, I felt called to religious life early on," shares Sister Maria Ciglioni, 86, a member of the Missionary Sisters of St. Charles Borromeo located in Melrose Park, Illinois.

Born in Rio Grande do Sul, Brazil, one of nine siblings, Sister Maria joined the Scalabrinian Sisters, encouraged by her brother, a seminarian, and a local priest.

She served as an educator for over 40 years before discovering her calling as a nursing home chaplain, where she walked with patients and families through life's final moments.

Now retired, she lives with her fellow sisters, dedicates her days to prayer, and lovingly knits scarves and hats for those in need.



Sister Sharon Glumb, SLW 57 years of religious life

"Inspired by my teachers, my family's Catholic life, and the sisters I met, I entered religious life in 1968," shares Sister Sharon Glumb, 76, of the Sisters of the Living Word in Des Plaines, Illinois.

Born in Chicago and raised with five siblings in a faith-filled Polish American household, Sister Sharon entered religious life inspired by her parish and the spirit of renewal after Vatican II.

She served in religious education and vocation ministry.

Now retired, she works part-time with the Wisconsin Religious Collaborative on shared services and continues to play her guitar in prayer and reflection.

Dear Padre,

At a recent gathering, a relative questioned my family's continued participation in the Catholic Church because of the sexual abuse cover-up. What is the best way to address this question?

Resist the temptation to argue or make any response that is not respectful. Choose to respond with empathy and understanding; perhaps something like this: "I understand and respect your feelings. Some have made the difficult choice to leave the Church. Others find the choice to remain also difficult.

"As a mature and discerning person, I am not making excuses for behaviors that are inexcusable. I cannot and will not defend behavior that should not be defended. I choose to remain in the Church because I choose to remain in a relationship with Jesus, and that relationship



includes my reception of the sacraments of the Church. I value the sacraments even as I remain vigilant about the conduct of those who have been entrusted with celebrating those sacraments. I retain my practice of the sacraments and, at the same time, I retain my responsibility to be alert to abusive behavior. This is not acceptance or approval of what most certainly happened. It is continuing to participate in what is beautiful and wise and true so that, in the company of other believers, I may become more like Christ." •

A WORD FROM **POPE LEO XIV**

I would like that our first great desire be for a united Church, a sign of unity and communion, which becomes a leaven for a reconciled world.
