From the Pastor's Desk ...

POPE FRANCIS ISSUES A NEW DOCUMENT ON THE ENVIRONMENT:

Appropriately, on October 4th, the memorial of St. Francis of Assisi—the patron saint of ecology, our Holy Father, Pope Francis published an addendum to his 2015 Encyclical on the environment: Laudato Si', On Care for Our Common Home. The new Apostolic Exhortation, titled: Laudate Deum (Praise God), is addressed "to all people of good will," and not just to the world's Catholics.

A good part of the new 15-page document addresses what Pope Francis calls the "resistance and confusion" which often accompanies current discussions about the global climate crisis and its link to human activity. As you know, these discussions happen around the family dinner table, around the office water cooler, as well as in the halls of power—of our nation, of many other nations, and the United Nations.

Pope Francis suggests that a healthy ecology requires a healthier relationship "between human beings and the environment, as occurs in the Indigenous cultures," and a more humane economy, which is not ruled by "the mentality of maximum gain at minimal cost," but shows "sincere concern for our common home" and assists "the poor and the needy discarded by our society."


The popular press has reported a variety of mixed reactions—in favor of and against—to Pope Francis' Apostolic Exhortation since it was promulgated last Wednesday. I invite you to read it for yourself and bring its contents to personal prayer. Let us ask the Holy Spirit to help us to understand the true pastoral intent of Pope Francis' writings.

The Spiritual Exercises in Everyday Life

To discern God's will, an important first step is to practice the first commandment: "I am the Lord your God. You shall have no other gods before me." When we place something that is not Godly into the role of God, making it most important thing in our life, we break the First Commandment. The Spiritual Exercises help each person recognize the things that he or she is overly attached to, the things that take the place of God, or keep a person from turning to God. For instance, we might choose comfort and sleep when called to prayer, or excuse an attachment to sugar, coffee, food, or money as normal and cultural, or perhaps even necessary for mental health. Throughout this section of the retreat, people are praying that God open their eyes to the things they are attached to, and praying for the grace to turn to God instead.

The Gift that Gives Back

It never ceases to amaze me how often I fall into the trap and end up grumbling about the greatest gifts in my life. A husband, children, a life that is full almost to bursting: these are things for which I once begged God. These are the jewels in the crown of my life.

Oh, but the children need care. Constant care. And a husband — a real flesh-and-blood creation of God, entrusted to me by God, to help me be holy and relying on me for holiness in turn — well, that relationship is a lot of work, isn't it? And a "full life" — I laugh to think of it, and then I blush with shame, because I admit sometimes, I do yearn for a life that is a little less ... full. A full life can leave you awfully tired at the end of the day.





When God Daydreamed Us

t the end of the Broadway musical *Camelot*, King Arthur finds himself confronted by the fact that his dream of the Round Table and justice for all has died without having borne the fruit he had hoped. A young boy, Tom of Warwick, comes up to him asking if he might be dubbed a knight. Arthur does so, and then commissions him to go forth and tell the story of Camelot to everyone he meets, all with the hope that someone someday will dare to try again to create a world with equal justice for all.

We all live with dreams of what we might be, of what life might be. They seldom turn out the way we had imagined, yet what would life be without such dreams. They push us into new futures. They create hope and new possibilities. They bring meaning to our lives.

The parable of the landowner and his vineyard is really a story of God and the dream God has for us. It is a story of how God withholds nothing from caring for his vineyard that it might bear fruit, that is, from trying to make his dream for us a reality, even to the point of giving his Son over to that dream.

Dreams never come easy. If they did, they would not be dreams. It was so for those who founded this nation in 1776. It is so for parents with dreams for their children. It is so as well for God, who dreams dreams for us in Jesus. •

Eucharistic Miracle of SIENA


ITALY, 1730



In the Basilica of San Francesco in Siena, 223 consecrated Hosts are kept intact for 276 years. Archbishop Tiberio Borghese closed unconsecrated hosts in a sealed tin box for ten years. The scientific commission put in charge when the box was reopened, found only worms and rotted fragments. The Siena event is against any physical and biological law, the scientist Enrico Medi stated: "This direct intervention from God is the miracle [...], accomplished and maintained for centuries, to testify to the permanent reality of Christ in the Eucharistic sacrament".

















Fourteen tests were made to verify the condition of the Hosts. The most scientific one was the one wanted by St. Pius X in 1914, in the presence of many scientists



This painting of Master Stefano di Giovanni, known as "il Sassetta," is preserved in England in the Bowes Museum in Barnard Castle. It depicts the scene of another Eucharistic miracle that took place near Siena in a Carmelite monastery. The painting depicts a Carmelite monk who, tormented by doubts regarding the Real Presence of Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament, is freed from the devil after receiving Communion

mong the most important documents that describe the miracle, there is a memoir written by a certain Macchi in 1730, in which is written that on August 14, 1730 some thieves were able to enter San Francesco's Church in Siena, and stole the chalice containing 351 consecrated Hosts. After three days, on August 17th, in the alms box of the sanctuary of Santa Maria in Provengano, in the dust, were found the 351 consecrated Hosts intact. The entire population celebrated the finding of the consecrated Hosts which were right away taken back to the church of San Francesco in a solemn procession. With the passing of time the Hosts were not altered. Many times, distinguished men examined them with every means available and the conclusions were always the same: "The sacred Hosts are still fresh, intact, uncorrupted, chemically pure, and do not

present any sign of alteration". In 1914, Pope St. Pius X authorized a test to which many professors of health, chemistry and pharmaceutics, among whom was also the well-known Professor Siro Grimaldi.


The final conclusion of the edited report stated: "The sacred Hosts of Siena are the classic example of the perfect conservation of particles from unleavened bread consecrated in the year 1730, and constitute a unique phenomenon, full of interest which reverses the natural laws of conservation of organic matter, [...] It is strange, surprising, abnormal: the laws of nature have been reversed, in the glass there was mold, the unleavened bread has been more refractory of the crystal [...] it is a unique fact contained in the annals of science."

Additional tests were done in 1922, in occasion of the transfer of the Hosts in a cylinder of pure crystal, in 1950 and 1951. Pope John Paul II, during a visit in the city of Siena on September 14, 1980, said regarding the Hosts: "It is the Real Presence!" The permanent miracle of the sacred Hosts is kept in the Chapel Piccolimini in the summer months and in the Chapel Martinozzi in the winter months. Numerous are the initiatives that induce the citizens of Siena in honor of the sacred Hosts: the tribute of the political districts, the respect of children having recently made their First Holy Communion, the solemn procession in the celebration of Corpus Christi, the Eucharistic ceremony at the end of September, the day of the Eucharistic adoration of the 17th of each month in memory of the finding of August 17, 1730.

Dear Padre,

How is an icon different from a regular painting of a saint?

Generally, icon means a symbol or image. In the Church, it refers to an image depicting Bible stories or holy people. "Icons express in images the same Gospel message that Scripture communicates by words" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 1160).

Even though an icon is an image created with paints, icons are written, not painted. Icon writing, called iconography, is a vocation as well as a talent. The difference between a painter and an iconographer is that iconographers follow strict rules and standards set forth in Eastern Church canon law and Christian tradition. Rooted in God's word, icons are rich in symbolism. The colors, gestures, and shapes speak spiritually to invite us to pray and worship.

Icons can be written on almost any surface, but historically most were

written on wood and had a gold-leaf background. One example of this type of icon is Our Mother of Perpetual Help, which is believed to have been written in the fifteenth century. Pope Pius IX gave it to the Redemptorists in 1865, telling the order to "make her known throughout the world." It now hangs in the Church of Sant' Alfonso in Rome.
