From the Pastor's Desk ...

ASSUMPTION OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY:

Tuesday, August 15th is a Holy Day of Obligation this year; that of the glorious Assumption of our Blessed Mother into the realm of heaven, body and soul. Catholics throughout the world are obligated to attend Mass on this day. We will celebrate two Masses on August 15th here at the Parish of the Holy Spirit: at 9:00 AM and at 6:00 PM. If these Mass times are not convenient for you, please consult the Mass schedules at our neighboring parishes.

RECEPTION OF THE BODY & BLOOD OF CHRIST BY INTINCTION:

In a recent decree promulgated by Bishop Tyson, the parishes of the Diocese of Yakima will be allowed beginning on Tuesday, August 15, 2023—to offer the Precious Blood of Christ to the faithful by INTINCTION. What is *intinction*? **Intinction is when the priest or deacon reverently dips the Host into the Precious Blood of Christ and the communicant receives both Sacred Species ON THE TONGUE**.

Please be aware of the following important points as we prepare for this change:

1) With intinction, communicants will NOT be drinking from a common cup containing the Blood of Christ (as was our custom pre-COVID-19).

2) Only a priest or deacon may offer the Body and Blood of Christ to the faithful by intinction; so if you wish to receive Holy Communion in this manner, you will need to approach the altar either in the priest's or deacon's line for Holy Communion; that is, in our CENTER AISLE. Every communicant who approaches a priest or deacon in our center aisle will receive Holy Communion by intinction. (Otherwise, it will be impossible for us to know who wants to receive the Host only.)

3) Holding the Host before you, the priest or deacon will say: "The Body and Blood of Christ," to which you will respond "Amen." Then the priest or deacon will place the Host (reverently dipped into the Precious Blood of Christ) ON YOUR TONGUE. Receiving Holy Communion in the hand is NOT an option in this case.


4) Those wishing to receive the Host only (which always contains the fulness of our Risen Lord's Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity) should proceed to any Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion to receive it; NOT TO THE PRIEST OR DEACON. With this option, the Host may be received either in the hand or on the tongue, as usual. Remember to say "Amen" when the Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion says: "The Body of Christ."

The Falling Action and the Field

In my freshman year of high school, I was fairly miserable at identifying the five essential elements of plot in literature (exposition, rising action, climax, falling action, and resolution).

To this day, the only reason I remember anything about them at all is because my English teacher used episodes of Scooby Doo to illustrate the different elements. Falling action vs. climax is where I got tripped up, the two are similar, and only discernible if you examine them relative to each other.

Every Scooby Doo episode has a big dramatic sequence (the climax) where the ghost/monster/zombie chases The Gang through the haunted mansion. The falling action is what comes immediately after. Searching for her glasses that she lost during the chase, Velma bumps into a pulley wheel disguised behind a tapestry and realizes the ghost/monster/zombie is actually the janitor in a costume, hooked up to an elaborate cable system jerry-rigged throughout the mansion. Meddling kids.

I confused the two because, to me, they are both equally dramatic: the chase and the fallout.

It occurs to me that, if you look at the course of salvation history, we are living in the falling action element, not the climax. Take the parable of the treasure in the field. We have found the treasure, but we haven't yet bought the field.

I often make the mistake of thinking I am still lost in the climax, searching for the truth. But I know exactly where the truth is.

What I need to be concerned with is this: Am I doing what I need to do to buy the field?



which is when the fish ultimately find the one sitting quietly waiting for the fish, most of the really treasured aspects of life somehow find us when we're not looking. Consider falling in love or discovering a friend; the job you enjoy so much that you'd almost do it for free; a hobby that gives you so much satisfaction; creative gifts you never knew you had until you stumbled upon them later in life. To say nothing of happiness for which so many go looking and never seem to find, while others are happy without ever seeking it out.



Inspired by the Holy Spirit, Simon answers for the group, identifying

Jesus as the Son of God, the Messiah (Matthew 16:17). Jesus proclaims this was divinely revealed to Simon and changes his name to Peter



August 6 – Transfiguration of the Lord. Christ appeared in glory in the company of Moses and Elijah, discussing the Passion (Luke 9:30-31), and a voice was heard to say, "This is my beloved son, with whom I am well pleased; listen to him" (Matthew 17:5).

August 14 – St. Maximilian Mary Kolbe (1941). A Polish Franciscan, St. Maximilian was imprisoned at Auschwitz. When the jailers chose ten people to execute, he substituted himself for a man with a family. He was honored as a "martyr of charity" by

Matthew 16:13-20, The "Rock-solid" foundation

("Rock"). Jesus gives him the keys to the kingdom, giving Peter (and his successors) the authority to interpret Scripture, forgive sins, and admit people into the Church.


By this, Jesus signaled He was building His Church on a rock-solid foundation - on the confession of Peter about Jesus' divinity. This truth has been handed down through the ages, from the Apostles to the bishops to

us. The Holy Spirit would lead Peter - and his successors, the popes - to continue speaking and acting in truth as the visible head of the Church.

Pope John Paul II.

August 23 - St. Rose of Lima (1617). Born in colonial Peru, Rose worked constantly to help her poverty-stricken family. She became a lay Dominican, and cared for homeless children, the elderly, and the sick in her house.

August 29 - Passion of St. John the Baptist (1st century). St. John the Baptist courageously spoke the truth to the leaders of his time, making him powerful enemies. He was arrested by Herod and martyred (Mark 6:17-29).



to several missionaries, writing them letters and supporting them in prayer, indirectly helping hundreds of souls. Adopt a missionary - or anyone who shares the Faith. Contact your parish or diocese for suggestions.

"Intercession fueled by charity": St. There'se lovingly offered to God the "thorns" she received from others - discomforts,

misunderstandings, hurt feelings - to win souls for Christ. Offer your "thorns" as saving graces.

How can I avoid gossiping?

Chatting with friends can become gossip - unfairly disclosing another's faults or sins without a valid reason, to people who don't know them (Catechism of the Catholic Church, #2477). Try these ideas when chatting becomes gossip:

Name it: A gentle reminder between friends is an act of kindness. Try, "I think we're edging into gossip," or "Oh, that's not kind!" It's better to risk speaking up than silently allowing sin.

Redirect the conversation: Highlight good qualities of the person about whom others are gossiping. Refocus on inspiring news, a good book you read - anything else that is "honorable ... just ... pure ... pleasing" (Philippians 4:8).


Leave: If nothing else works, excuse yourself and leave the conversation. You'll avoid becoming complicit to sin and wordlessly communicate that you find gossip unacceptable.

Pray: Sins of the tongue (gossip, slander, calumny, detraction) are serious and require grace to resist. Invoke the Holy Spirit for yourself, for those who engage in gossip, and especially for those harmed by it.





Dear Padre,

What is spiritual Communion?

Saint Thomas Aquinas said spiritual Communion is "an ardent desire to receive Jesus in the Most Holy Sacrament"...and to lovingly embrace "Him as if we had actually received Him." It is the practice of desiring union with Christ in the Eucharist by those who cannot receive holy Communion for valid cause, such as an infirmity or an irregular marriage. During the COVID-19 pandemic, Pope Francis also said the practice is "highly recommended when it is not possible to receive the sacrament."

A prayer by St. Alphonsus Liquori is ideal for those unable to receive holy Communion:

My Jesus,

I believe that you are present in the Most Blessed Sacrament. I love you above all things, and I desire to receive you into my soul. Since I cannot now receive you sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart. *I embrace you as if you were already there and I unite myself wholly to you.* Never permit me to be separated from you. Amen.

Saint John Paul II wrote, "It is good to cultivate in our hearts a constant desire for the sacrament of the Eucharist. This was the origin of the practice of 'spiritual Communion,' which has happily been established in the Church for centuries and recommended by saints....Saint Teresa of Jesus wrote: 'When you do not receive Communion and you do not attend Mass, you can make a spiritual Communion, which is a most beneficial practice; by it the love of God will be greatly impressed on you'" (Ecclesia de Eucharistia, 34).
