We recently invited parents and carers to take part in our Wellbeing Survey, giving families the opportunity to share their views on how our school supports children's wellbeing, safety, and sense of belonging.

We are delighted that the results reflect very positive feedback about our school community.

Families describe our school as a welcoming, safe, and caring place where children feel happy and supported, and where wellbeing, respect, and positive communication are clearly valued. Parents also express a strong level of trust in staff and confidence that any concerns will be listened to and addressed.

The survey has also helped us identify areas where we can strengthen communication and involvement, and we look forward to continuing to work closely with families to support every child to thrive.

Wellbeing Survey Highlights

A Welcoming and Safe School

The vast majority of parents feel our school is a warm, welcoming place where children feel safe, secure, and valued every day.

Wellbeing at the Heart of School Life

Parents strongly recognise our commitment to children's health, wellbeing, and emotional support, as well as the respectful and confidential way staff work with families.

Positive Encouragement and Care

Families feel children are encouraged to do their best and are supported to grow in confidence and wellbeing.

Clear Communication and Trust

Parents report high levels of trust in staff, positive communication about children's progress, and confidence that concerns will be listened to and followed up.

A Bright, Caring Environment

The school environment is viewed as well-kept, welcoming, and supportive of children's wellbeing.
