Endure trials for the sake of discipline. Kirkin' o' the Tartan Ceremony

This ceremony reminds us of the Scottish heritage of the Presbyterian Church and its roots in Reformed Theology. A tartan is the distinctive woven fabric that a clan or family grouping uses to identify itself to others. The traditions of the Kirkin' began in this country during World War II - before the United States joined the Allied Powers. At the time, Dr. Peter Marshall, a Presbyterian pastor and Chaplain of the United States Senate, wanted to encourage American identification with the British motherland and determined that he would target those Americans of Scottish descent.

The Confessional Banners of the Presbyterian Church symbolize nine creeds and confessions from the early Christian era to the twentieth century. These historic statements of faith represent our Christian heritage from the Roman Empire to the Reformation, including contemporary reflections of faith in our own time.



Banner #1: The Nicene Creed (fourth century)

- The Cross Which is Also a Sword: A symbol for the Emperor Constantine, and his successors, because he called the ecumenical council which began the process of thinking resulting in this creed, because he was the first Christian emperor, and because he began the tradition of imperial Christianity. The cross is central here as the doctrine of Christ is central in the Creed.
- The Green Triangle and the Three Symbols: The doctrine of the Trinity formalized in the Nicene Creed.
- The Chi Rho Monogram: Christ—the first two letters of the Greek word for Christ, used by Constantine on shields and helmets of his army.
- The Dove: The Holy Spirit.
- The Crowns: The rule and glory of God.

Banner #2: The Apostles' Creed

- The Somber Brown Color: The difficulty and rigor of early Christianity under persecution; also, the monastic tradition.
- The Purple Arches: The entrances to caves or catacombs, where early Christians met in secret; also, the shape of Gothic church windows.
- The Anchor Cross: Security in Christ, as found by the apostles, some of whom were fishermen.
- The Fish: An ancient symbol for the Christian faith, perhaps a secret code mark. Letters for the Greek word for fish can be used as first letters in the phrase "Jesus Christ, God's Son, Savior."
- • The Chalice: The Lord's Supper, and thus the earnest and simple fellowship of



Banner #3: The Scots Confession (Scotland, 1560)

- The Blue of the Shield: The background color of the Church of Scotland.
- The Tartan, X-Shaped Cross: A form called St. Andrew's Cross, he being the apostle who brought the gospel to Scotland. The tartan, or plaid, is that of the Hamilton clan, in honor of the first martyr of the Scottish Reformation, Patrick Hamilton.
- The Celtic Cross: Another ancient form associated with Christians of the British Isles.
- The Ship: A symbol for the Church; the Confession contains a remarkable, strong doctrine of the Church.
- The Bible and the Sword: Paul called the word of God, "The sword of the Spirit." The sharpness of John Knox's preaching of the word was a major





Banner #4: The Heidelberg Catechism (Germany, 1563)

- The Regal Red and Gold: Attribute to the rule of Frederick III, who ordered the writing of the Catechism for followers of John Calvin in Germany.
- The Crown of Thorns, the "German" Cross, and the Tablets: Symbols of misery, redemption and thankfulness-the three basic themes of the Catechism. (The tablets stand for the Ten Commandments, which appear in the Catechism where it teaches that obedience is the proper form of thankfulness.)
- The Two Lights and the Fire: The Trinity-with the Hebrew name of God on the left orb, the Greek monogram for Jesus on the right orb, and the flame standing for the Holy Spirit. There is a long discussion of the Trinity in the Catechism.

Banner #5: The Second Helvetic Confession (Switzerland, 1566)

- • The Blue and White: Heraldic colors of ancient Switzerland.
- The Cross: Again, dominant on this banner because of the extensive discussion of salvation in the Confession.
- The Hand and the Burning Heart: A traditional symbol for John Calvin, father of Presbyterianism in its Swiss homeland.
- The Lamp: Knowledge and discipline, two of the themes of the Helvetic, which make it unique.
- The Shepherd's Crook and the Pasture: The pastoral ministry and the flock's care for its own members.
- The Chalice and the Waves: Holy communion and baptism.





Banner #6: The Westminster Confession and the Shorter Catechism (England, 1646)

- The Three Long Panels and the Maroon Triangle: The Trinity.
- The Eye: God's providence and control of all life and history-a dominant theme of Westminster.
- The Crown: God's rule.
- The Open Bible: The authority of the written Word, basic to this Confession's teachings.
- The Alpha and the Omega: The A and Z of the Greek alphabet, the first and last-referring to Christ and his death for us as central to our faith.



Banner #7: The Theological Declaration of Barmen (Germany, 1934)

- The Swastika Crossed Out and the Cross Rising: A protest and witness against Nazi tyranny and any effort to take the role of God and control of the church.
- The Fire: The suffering and death, which follows from defense of the faith against tyranny, as for some of the Barmen signers. But the cross survives such persecution and the crisis of war, rising out of the flames.

Banner #8: The Confession of 1967 (U.S.A.)

- The Blue, the Red, and the Gold: Colors of the official seal of the United Presbyterian Church in the United States of America.
- The Golden, Down-Reaching Hand (Repeated from the Nicene Banner): God, relating to his world.
- The Crown (Repeated from the Westminster Banner) and the Nail-Scarred Hand: The death and victory of Christ as he reconciles the world.
- The Four Hands of Different Colors, the Clasped Hands, and the Green Circle: The reconciled world at the foot of the cross-God's act of reconciliation being the starting point and theme of the Confession of 1967.





Banner #9: A Brief Statement of Faith (1983)

- The Cross: A rainbow of colors representing the celebration of unity with the diversity of cultures and races living in Christ.
- The Blue background: Symbolizes the universe as the light of the Word of God bringing us together.
- The Earth: Cracks symbolizing our divisiveness and diversity, yet the faith we confess unites us with the one universal Church.
- The Secure Hands of God: Remind us that he who holds our world together in turmoil will unite us in the grace of Jesus Christ. This is the foundation of our knowledge of God's sovereign love and our living together in the Holy Spirit.
- The Presbyterian Church (USA) Symbol of A Brief Statement of Faith has a
 prominent position on this banner. This symbol represents the descending love
 of peace and the baptism of Christ. The open Bible symbol is the Word of God.
 The Font recalls the other Sacraments of Communion, the Last Supper, and the
 pulpit as the preaching of the Word. The flames represent the burning bush and
 Pentecost. The overall image suggests the human figure with stretched out
 arms.

CONFESSION OF BELHAR

How should the church respond when sin disrupts the church's unity, creates division among the children of God, and constructs unjust systems that steal life from God's creation? Members and leaders of the Dutch Reformed Mission Church in South Africa faced these questions under apartheid, a system of laws that separated people by race from 1948–1994.

Apartheid formed a racially stratified society. Those with the lightest skin tones were offered the greatest protection and opportunity. Non-"white" persons were separated into three categories; each skin tone step away from the "white" category represented a decrease in governmental protections and opportunities. Racial separation was established by law and enforced through violence. Non-white citizens lived with constant and intrusive police presence and interference in the daily functions of life. Those who protested risked punishment, imprisonment, and even death.

The roots of apartheid go back in South African culture and church for several centuries. The Dutch Reformed Church embodied racial separation when it formed three "mission" churches in the late nineteenth century, each categorized by its racial identity. The Dutch Reformed Mission Church was formed for people designated as "coloured" (biracial). The church's complicity with racial separation kept Christians from worshipping and coming to the Lord's Table together. The white Dutch Reformed Church (DRC) created an elaborate biblical interpretation and ideology that supported racial separation and then the formal apartheid policies.

The Dutch Reformed Church's active participation and theological defense of apartheid moved the global church to name apartheid a *status confessionis*—a conviction that the Gospel was at stake and thus the faith needed to be proclaimed. Leaders of the Dutch Reformed Mission Church wrestled with this situation theologically and practically. One outcome of their struggles was the emergence of the Confession of Belhar in the early 1980s.

The Uniting Reformed Church of Southern Africa (URCSA), the church that succeeded the Dutch Reformed Mission Church after apartheid, has offered the Confession of Belhar to the global Reformed family as a gift, believing that the themes of unity, reconciliation, and justice issue a call from God to the whole church toward holy action, transformation, and life.

The Special Committee on the Confession of Belhar recommended that the Presbyterian Church (USA) add Belhar as part of its Constitution because it believed the clarity of Belhar's witness to unity, reconciliation, and justice might help the PC (USA) speak and act with similar clarity at a time when it faces division, racism, and injustice.

The Presbyterian Church (USA) approved the Confession of Belhar as part of the Book of Confessions at the 222nd General Assembly (2016).
