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Epiphany Season "Festival of Light"

"Arise, shine, for your light has come, and the glory of the Lord rises upon you" (Isaiah 60:1).



We will soon be in the liturgical season of **Epiphany**, which some call *the season of light*. It is both a day (January 6) and a season (that runs through Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent).

What does it mean?
Epiphany means
"appearance or

manifestation." Throughout the world, Christians celebrate it on January 6 - twelve days after Christmas Day. Many countries refer to it as "*Three Kings Day*." On this day, Western Christianity recognizes Christ's manifestation to the Gentiles. The Gentiles were represented when The Magi visited the child Jesus and showed how God's gift of the Good News is for everyone. Eastern Orthodox Christians called it the "*Feast of Lights*" to reflect their belief that baptism happens because of spiritual illumination.

In any event, Epiphany is celebrated in many different ways around the world including eating a "*Kings Cake*" with a trinket baked inside. Whoever finds the trinket, is King or Queen for the day. *Timkat*, the Ethiopian Orthodox celebration of Epiphany, is a festival which commemorates *the baptism of Jesus* in the Jordan River. Streets are adorned with colorful banners, and the air is filled with the sounds of traditional music and laughter. People don their finest attire, often showcasing beautifully embroidered garments that reflect their cultural pride.

This year we will be commemorating Epiphany on Sunday, January 4, (the closest Sunday to January 6), but we will also be celebrating the season of Epiphany through a special inter-generational event called the "**Festival of Light**" on **Wednesday evening, January 21**. The Festival of Light will be a fun, joyous event for people of all ages where the Sanctuary and other parts of the building will be lit in **brilliant light** with LED votive candles and Moravian Stars.

The Christmas season is often a whirlwind of activity, both in church and outside church, and many of us have our days filled with family and holiday activities. And yet, all this activity gives us precious little time to think about much else.

Then it happens. We wake up after all the relatives have gone home, all the decorations are stored away for yet another year, and a temporary lull (albeit short-lived) seems to fall upon our homes. All of a sudden we are faced with a brand new calendar year, and we will need to think about which activities will stay with us in the new year and what we might begin anew.

At First Pres, we still have the same opportunities to become involved in serving God and his congregation, and the beginning of the new year is a great time to consider accepting a new call to serve. Some deacons' and elders' terms are expiring; some committees and groups within the church are reorganizing with new leadership; others who may not have been active in the church, or those who think it might be time to start contributing in a different way, could consider the start of 2026 to mark a fresh commitment to serve.

There are many good reasons to commit to serving others, and I have asked Artificial Intelligence ("AI") on-line to help us consider the benefits of serving. Here is the response:

"Helping others offers rich rewards, including a 'helper's high' from endorphins, reduced stress, better mood, stronger social connections, increased purpose, and even potential health benefits like lower inflammation and a longer life, creating a cycle of *fulfillment* and *well-being* for both the giver and receiver, with rewards ranging from *intrinsic* joy to tangible recognition.

PSYCHOLOGICAL & EMOTIONAL REWARDS

Helper's High: Your brain releases endorphins and dopamine, creating feelings of euphoria, calm, and pleasure.

- **Reduced Stress & Anxiety:** Acts of kindness can act as a stress reliever and improve overall mental health.
- **Increased Self-Esteem & Purpose:** Making a positive impact boosts self-worth, gives life meaning, and fosters a sense of connection.
- **Greater Gratitude:** Helping others can make you more thankful for your own blessings.

PHYSICAL & HEALTH REWARDS

- **Lower Inflammation:** Studies show helping others can reduce inflammation markers in the body.
- **Improved Relationships:** Showing you care strengthens bonds with others.
- **Longevity:** Volunteering and helping can be linked to a lower risk of early death.

SOCIAL & PRACTICAL REWARDS

- **New Opportunities:** Helping can lead to new friendships, career opportunities, and community integration.
- **Building a Legacy:** Your positive impact can inspire others and continue long-term.
- **Empowerment:** Taking action to help builds confidence.

TANGIBLE & FORMAL REWARDS (FOR VOLUNTEERS/EMPLOYEES)

- **Recognition:** Appreciation letters, social media shout-outs, awards, public forums.
- **Perks:** Gift cards, merchandise, exclusive event access, donations in their honor.
- **Growth:** Educational opportunities, career development, job offers.

Of course, the best reason of all is that it is God's will and plan for us to love others as Jesus loves us. This is our call to serve. Consider what you might do to answer God's call, and make a commitment to serve. Incidentally, we are always looking for Stephen Ministers. Why not talk to us and learn what it's about? You can find us at our Stephen Ministers table in Spencer Hall after service on Sundays.

Throughout both months, our focus remains on nurturing the whole child socially, emotionally, spiritually, and academically within a loving, play and relationship-based environment. We are thankful for the partnership of our church community and the continued prayers and support that allow our preschool to be a place where children feel safe, valued, and deeply loved.

The Gibbs Family

The joy of storytelling doesn't come from the writer. The joy of storytelling is the joy coming through the writer from those whose stories are being told. Being able to write this story about a family here in our church community is an honor. Reading about the small and large miracles that take place in and out of our church walls are what make this congregation thrive. Meet the Gibbs family.

Peter L. Gibbs, Jr (PJ) was born in Manasquan, New Jersey and his wife Kristin was born in Elizabeth, New Jersey. Both of them were raised by strong family elders in the Catholic faith, but eventually discovered a home in Methodist church. They continued in their faith journey as Methodists as their family grew with the births of Payton and Logan.

Living in New Jersey was getting more difficult to afford, and after Payton had been diagnosed in the autism spectrum, she was going to need more therapy. Wanting a better quality of life, Naples, at the time, was a great opportunity for the whole family.

The Gibbs family moved to Naples in 2015 with PJ starting a position at Gulf Coast High School teaching history and coaching football, recently accepting the position of Director of Student Services at Kaiser University. He has been coaching football for 25 years and is now with the Community School of Naples and the Royal Palm Academy. Kristen works with the Galt Insurance Group in Naples and is deeply involved in her growing family: Payton, in eighth grade and Logan in fifth grade both attending Royal Palm Academy, and their two-year-old super mutt "Saint."

We often see Payton and Logan on Sundays taking on various roles in our worship services and our children's programs. They were narrators for World Communion Sunday; they write and pray in our "Children's Time" and are involved in our Christmas pageants and special events. They are leaders in our children's classes and Vacation Bible School, and candle lighters for Advent. If there is something to be done, they are the first to say yes. But the one thing they both love above all else is when they usher. When I asked why that is so, Logan said it gives him a sense of pride, helping and being utilized. Payton feels that she is accepted and trusted. These two amazing young people are making their own traditions by

being actively involved in our church life, and in doing so creating new traditions in our church community. Their parents are so grateful for their participation, learning new life skills in a loving accepting church.

They first learned about First Presbyterian Church through our Preschool, Ashley Henning and friends. When Nancy Van Fleet arrived, they remarked, "she changed our world. We are so grateful to have found a church where we genuinely feel we belong. Watching our kids grow in their faith and flourish in this



community melts our hearts. We couldn't be more proud of how far they've come." Finding a church that accepted them with open arms, and one that offers outreach and service to the community was what they were looking for. So many of our families who attend here all say the same: a church that believes in mission, in outreach to community, welcoming families, giving purpose to their lives in an active way, is where they want their children to learn the beauty of faith, purpose, honesty, and service. All these families nurture us in return in so many ways! Logan's response when I asked what his favorite activity/hobby was, he replied: "family closeness." How beautiful is that? His respect runs deep for



determination and dedication, it can certainly become a reality for her. Logan's heart-felt kindness, respect, and love of all that is good will lead him to be a beacon in this world and beyond.

As their church, we can all smile, knowing that through our doors come a generation of children and young adults who are aware of this world, and are learning what is good and what is not. And they will be the ones to make the difference. Our gratitude goes to the parents who are nurturing them to be the kind of people we all need in our lives and who give us hope. But the greatest surprise was a phone call from Holly Row, an American sportscaster for ESPN, inviting her to come to New York and be a guest at the Heisman Awards. Payton was over the top excited and spent four glorious days with her dad meeting and hanging out with the biggest names in football. Holly is the heart behind the foundation *Joy+US*, which "sparks joy in the lives of those who need it most." Holly has become a tireless advocate with her mission to bring hope and happiness to others. Payton's sites are on the NFL, and knowing her drive,

The Coming of the Light

Communities of faith around the world mark earth's regular passage from dark to light (and from light to dark in due season) with everything from pop-up solstice celebrations in cow pastures to ancient vespers services in great cathedrals. What is it about twilight that speaks to the human soul, and what spiritual challenges are hidden in this earthly give-and-take of natural light? These questions and more will be on the table when we meet in January to celebrate the Christian season of Epiphany, the season of growing light.



Wednesday, January 28

Avery Davis Lamb is a co-executive director of Creation Justice Ministries. He works at the intersection of Christianity and environmental justice.

His research focuses on the role of religious communities in building climate resilience and adaptation, with emphasis on the virtues and practices of climate hospitality. He organizes faith communities across the country in support of action on environmental justice. He has worked for *Sojourners* and *Interfaith Power and Light*.

He is currently serving on the board for *The Center for Spirituality in Nature*.

Mr. Lamb will discuss with us the scriptural roots of "creative justice," a concept deeply grounded in Christian theology and practice. It is intended to capture both the depth of our interconnectedness with everything and the necessity to partner with God in the healing and restoration of all. He will draw on scriptures to tell the story of creation justice in the Bible and how our communities can be partners with God in the work of healing the world.



Wednesday, February 4

Dr. Suzanne McDonald is professor of Systemic and Historical Theology at Western Theological Seminary (WTS) in Holland, Michigan. She is from Australia. She studied 16th and 17th century literature and did postgraduate literature studies at Oxford where she began training for ordained ministry at Cambridge.

Suzanne has a Ph.D. from St. Andrews, taught at Cambridge, and then came to the U.S. - first to Calvin College and then to WTS. She spoke to us by Zoom during Covid on "Creation Care: Why Should Creations Care?"

Dr. McDonald will speak to us this time on "In the End...What? Thinking well about Eschatology." There is much confusion and fear over how Christians think about "the end of times." We will explore some aspects of what the Bible teaches us about eschatology - our hope for the time when Jesus Christ will come again in glory to set all things right and make all things new.



Wednesday, February 11

Rev. Dr. Scott Rennie was born in Bucksburn, Aberdeen. He studied Geography at St. Mary's and then Divinity at Christ's College, both at the University of Aberdeen. After serving as Assistant Minister at Queen's Cross Church, Aberdeen, he was awarded the Scots Fellowship at Union Theological Seminary in the City of New York. Scott has served congregations in Angus, Aberdeen, and London before coming to the St. Giles' Cathedral in Edinburgh.

St. Giles' Cathedral, founded in 1124 by King David I, has been a working church for over 900 years. A backdrop to Scotland's turbulent religious history, it has seen the seeds of civil war sown and been John Knox's parish church during the Reformation to its current standing as a modern Presbyterian church. It is still an important center for civic services such as the Kirking of the Parliament and services for Most Ancient and Most Noble Order of the Thistle.

Scott will also be our guest preacher on Sunday, February 8. His sermon title is: "*Revealed Wisdom?*" based on Isaiah 58:1-9a and Matthew 5:13-20.

A PW update from Linda Ferrario

I recently returned from a trip to East Africa. It was an eye-opening experience to see the way the population struggles to obtain clean water. The Presbyterian Women have decided to financially support *Wine to Water*, an organization that helps people attain clean water. For \$50, a family of four receives a ceramic filter which supplies clean water for 5 years.

Wine to Water is headquartered in Tanzania, a country with diverse geography, including mountains in the North, rivers in the midlands, active volcanoes and the Great Rift Valley. Despite having abundant water resources, these resources are unevenly distributed across the country and some regions experience water shortages.

According to the United Nations, over 40% of the Tanzanian population lacks access to clean water. The daily water collection is usually done by women and girls who spend a total of 16 million hours per day, collectively, collecting water across the country. Moreover, the World Health Organization estimates that diarrhea, due to contaminated water, is the fourth leading cause of death in Tanzania.

Wine to Water's Tanzania office is making a positive impact by working through multiple schools, collaborating with a ceramic filter factory, and engaging with local teams towards community water systems. Access to clean safe water has a significant impact on communities. It frees up time for woman and children who would otherwise spend hours collecting water. With time freed up, women take more prominent roles in their communities, children focus on education, and families engage in agriculture and other income-generating activities. Additional, access to clean water reduces the incidence of waterborne illnesses, improving the overall health of communities.


