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#### Let's get Going ... and Growing!



In June of 2027 I will celebrate the 40<sup>th</sup> anniversary of my ordination as a Teaching Elder (Minister of Word and Sacrament) in the Presbyterian Church USA. The world has changed a lot over the past (almost) 40 years. But one of the constant refrains I have heard from parishioners during

the entirety of my ministry has been our need to attract more people and *grow*. I have heard this in both large churches and small. Generally speaking, there is a lot of anxiety among church folk about declining rates of participation and affiliation in religious institutions of all kinds in North America and Europe. And, interestingly, everyone has an opinion about why this is and what to do about it!

However, the realities of church growth and decline (both real and imagined) are more complicated than most people think. For example, there is a perception that Evangelical Protestant churches are growing, and that Mainline Protestant churches and Roman Catholic churches are declining. But in reality, Evangelical churches have suffered the most precipitous decline over the past decade in the United States, going from about 21% of the American population to about 12% today.

Add to this the confusion many people have about the difference between what they see locally (Micro perceptions) and what is happening nationally (Macro perceptions). For instance, in any given metro area (particularly in the Sunbelt) there will be a number of large "Mega" churches, which are typically evangelical in orientation, but some of them are affiliated with Mainline denominations. Add to this the pervasive presence of Evangelical Christianity on television, radio, and social media, and it creates the impression that this is a growing, powerful movement.

But the larger picture is quite different: Evangelical churches, like their Mainline and Roman Catholic cousins, have been losing members in significant numbers primarily from small and medium sized churches located in small towns and rural areas, and to a lesser extent in urban and suburban areas. The result has been the closure of many of these churches and consolidation in larger churches. So, for example, in Mainline denominations, the larger churches (1,000 members plus) account for less than 20% of the total number of churches but contain more than 60% of total church membership.

Add to this the fact that there are hundreds—if not thousands—of vital Christian congregations of all kinds across the country that are growing despite the overall numerical decline. What are they doing right? One common feature is that many of them are using Music and Arts programming and Speaker's Series to creatively bridge the gap between the secular and sacred in order to reintroduce (or introduce for the first time) people to Christianity. St. Martin-in-the-Fields in London has been leading the charge on this for decades and has developed one of the most vital and impactful ministries anywhere as a result. Westminster Presbyterian Church in Minneapolis also has been a pioneer in this area. You can read about them here:

Every congregation, of course, has to develop means of outreach that make sense for their particular community. But I can tell you from almost 40 years of experience in leading churches across the country that well marketed, carefully constructed Music and Arts programming, and Speaker's Series, are effective means in encouraging people to cross the *church threshold* who would not likely do so otherwise. Thirty percent of the population currently attends church at least once a week (or so they say!). We need to connect *relationally* with the 70% who have either dropped out or who are indifferent to who we are and what we are all about.

I look forward to exploring these issues with a variety of groups in the church during this time of transition.

As I was thinking about what to say in this month's Outreach, I realized that I already had what I wanted to say. Below are excerpts from the August 3, 2025 sermon of Pastor Russ Goliger of the UCC Church of Westminster, Massachusetts, our northern

church. His message was inspired by Hosea 11:1-11.

Sermon Title: "When Love Won't Let Go"

We live in a world that teaches us to hoard our treasures and hedge our bets. We diversify our investments, keep backup plans, and rarely trust one source for anything, especially not for hope. And when it comes to trusting God? Many of us carry silent doubts. We've prayed and waited. We've watched dreams collapse, relationships fracture, churches decline. And somewhere deep inside, we wonder: "Can I really trust God to hold me when everything else falls apart?"

Israel in Hosea's time faced a similar crisis of trust. The Northern Kingdom - often called Israel, sometimes referred to Ephraim - trembling under the looming threat of Assyria, sought security not in God but in political alliances - most notably with Egypt. Egypt, the very place of their former bondage, now seemed like a safer bet than the God who had delivered them. It was a tragic irony: seeking refuge in the arms of their oppressor rather than in the heart of their Redeemer. Their sin wasn't just idolatry—it was relational betrayal. Hosea 11 paints God not as a distant judge, but as a grieving parent. "How can I give you up, Ephraim?" God cries. "My heart recoils within me; my compassion grows warm and tender." This isn't wrath—it's heartbreak.

Hosea 11 is not just ancient poetry—it's the heartbeat of the gospel. It's the story of a God who refuses to abandon us, even when we abandon Him.

It's the story of Jesus, who entered the chaos of our distrust, bore the weight of our rebellion, and still said, "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing."

# Ministry

It's the lion's roar of verse 10. It is a roar of mercy that confronts us and our own reactions. "They shall go after the Lord; he will roar like a lion; when he roars, his children shall come trembling from the west." That roar is not a threat—it's a call home.

So what does this mean for us today? It means that trusting God isn't about certainty — it's about proximity. It's about staying close even when we don't understand. It's about choosing not to run to Egypt—whatever Egypt is for us: control, distraction, a false security— but to stay in the tension and let God's love hold us.

We will experience frustration, doubt, discomfort, even fear and anxiety as we move forward together. We will have negative predictions, we'll be judgmental, we'll take things personally. We may stubbornly think we are going in the wrong direction, or things aren't going the way we want. We may even want to give up, take our ball and go home.

But trusting God means that when we feel like giving up, God is already holding on. And it means that our churches, even in decline or conflict, are not abandoned. God's compassion still grows warm and tender. The roar still echoes.

And the invitation still stands:

All who are weary, come home. Stay home. Let your church family surround you. Feel God's love. Come home. I am here, God says. Come home. Amen.

We're so proud of our students' growth and grateful to you and everyone at FPCN for helping make these opportunities possible.




