General Parish Information













Parishioner Registration : Every household within the Parish is requested to complete a 'Parishioner Registration/Census' form so that our Parish records may be kept up to date. These forms can be obtained from the Parish Office and should be completed fully before being returned to the Parish Office.

Should you move address within the Parish at any time please complete a new form and write 'AMENDMENT' across the top of the form. Thank you.

Hospital : If you are going into hospital as a 'planned admission' you are strongly encouraged to make contact with Fr Daryl well beforehand so that, if appropriate, the Sacrament of the Sick can be celebrated beforehand.

Infant Baptism : Infant Baptisms are intended for the children of practising parishioners only and are celebrated on five occasions during the year after parents and godparents have completed a course of preparation. There can be no celebration without this important course. The dates of the courses for the current year can be found in the application form available from the Parish Office. Baptisms do not take place during the seasons of Advent or Lent.

Sacramental Preparation : Notice of the availability of Application Forms for preparation for First Reconciliation and First Eucharist will be made via the Parish Newsletter between the school Summer Half Term and 31st August each year. Possible candidates for Confirmation should respond to the announcements made via the Parish Newsletter at the beginning of the Autumn school term.

Parishioners are advised that it is very difficult to imagine that any family or individual who is not regularly practising the Faith as members of our community could possibly be ready to celebrate a Sacrament of the Church.

Marriage Preparation : Marriages are celebrated by appointment with the Parish Priest. It should be remembered that in the Diocese of Arundel & Brighton twelve months minimum notice is required before a marriage may take place; this is a requirement of the Church for all marriages that involve a Roman Catholic (even if they are not taking place in the Catholic Church). It is also necessary that one of the parties must have a meaningful connection with the Parish. Marriages do not take place during the seasons of Advent or Lent.

Parish Car Park : <u>All Parishioners</u> attending Mass and using our Car Park need to make sure that they have fully completed our 'Parishioner Registration/ Census Form' (available from the Parish Office) <u>before</u> using the Car Park; this ensures that your current vehicle registration is lodged in the system. Registering only needs to be done once (unless you change your car or if you use another car in the family that is not registered on the system). **Important** : if you are not registered on the system and you use the car park you will receive a parking notice. Registered Parishioners and pre-registered visitors are able to park whilst they

attend our Masses/liturgies without fear of a charge notice. (Car Park queries - parking@shpcobham.com)

The musings of one of God's smallest creatures on events in and around the Parish over the past seven days Ust when Fr D thought that things were beginning to die down as the holiday period a whole lot of things suddenly arrived in his lap during this week . . .

Fr D was delighted that last Sunday Fr Tony was able to celebrate our two morning Masses whilst he was in Ewell celebrating the fiftieth anniversary of Fr Graham Bamford's ordination as a priest in 1975 (Fr D would only have been fourteen years old at the time). LOVE IN ACTION

Luke 10:25-37 ²⁵A teacher of the Law came up and tried to trap Jesus. "Teacher," he asked, "what must I do to receive eternal life?'

²⁶Jesus answered him, "What do the Scriptures say? How do you interpret them?" ²⁷The man answered, " 'Love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your strength, and with all your mind'; and 'Love your neighbour as you love yourself.' "

"You are right," Jesus replied; "do this and you will live."

²⁹But the teacher of the Law wanted to justify himself, so he asked Jesus, "Who is my neighbour?"

³⁰Jesus answered, "There was once a man who was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho when robbers attacked him, stripped him, and beat him up, leaving him half dead. ³¹It so happened that a priest was going down that road; but when he saw the man, he walked on by, on the other side. ³²In the same way a Levite also came along, went over and looked at the man, and then walked on by, on the other side. ³³But a Samaritan who was travelling that way came upon the man, and when he saw him, his heart was filled with pity. ³⁴He went over to him, poured oil and wine on his wounds and bandaged them; then he put the man on his own animal and took him to an inn, where he took care of him. ³⁵The next day he took out two silver coins and gave them to the innkeeper. 'Take care of him,' he told the innkeeper, 'and when I come back this way, I will pay you whatever else vou spend on him.'

³⁶And Jesus concluded, "In your opinion, which one of these three acted like a neighbour towards the man attacked by the robbers?"

⁷The teacher of the Law answered, "The one who was kind to him." Jesus replied, "You go, then, and do the same.'

Other Readings: Deuteronomy 30:10-14; Psalm 69:13, 16, 29-30, 32-33, 35-36; Colossians 1:15-20

LECTIO:

A teacher wants to trap Jesus with a question. Jesus sees straight through him and asks him to answer his own question. The teacher gives the correct answer that sums up the Jewish teaching: loving God and loving our neiahbour.

But the teacher hasn't achieved his objective of making himself look cleverer than Jesus so he asks another question, "Who is my neighbour?" Jesus responds with a powerful parable – the Good Samaritan, as we know it today.

Jesus contrasts the responses of three people when they encounter a man at the side of the road who has been robbed and beaten up. The first two, a priest and a Levite were in positions of religious authority. They would have sought to obey the law in every detail but here they fail to obey one of the most important commandments.

It is the third person, a Samaritan, who acts like a good neighbour and helps this man. To appreciate the full impact of this parable we need to understand the longstanding animosity that existed here. The Jews looked down on the Samaritans and considered them 'unclean', no better than Gentiles. Jesus uses a non-Jew, a despised foreigner, to show this religious teacher how to live out Jewish teaching!

With this parable Jesus makes it clear that we should always be neighbours to any fellow human being who needs help. We may never have met them before, they may be from a different racial and religious background, but nonetheless we are still their neighbours.



MEDITATIO:

- Consider the reasons the priest and the Levite might have had for not helping the man. Do you see any of these attitudes in vourself? What needs to motivate our actions towards others?
- What do we learn from this passage about why we should help others in need? •
- Is it significant that Jesus says 'do this' (verses 28 and 37)? What light does James 2:14-17 shed on this?
- Think about what it means for you to love God with all your heart, soul, strength and mind.

ORATIO:

Let Psalm 69 guide your prayers for those you love and for those you see in need.

CONTEMPLATIO:

Read Colossians 1:15-20 slowly several times. Then take a couple of lines at a time and contemplate the meaning of the magnificence of Christ revealed here.

Gregory X obliged him to take upon himself a greater one as Cardinal and Bishop of Albano, one of the six suffragan Sees of Rome. 

Parish Roundup

RETIRING COLLECTION - This weekend our Retiring Collection will be for Stella Maris . Seafarers and fishers play a vital role in all our lives, but they often work in difficult, hazardous conditions. Sea Sunday is the day people come together to pray for seafarers and fishers, thanking them for the vital role they play in all of our lives. When seafarers and fishers arrive in a port, they are strangers in a foreign land. They do not know the locals and often don't know who to turn to when they need help. Port chaplains and volunteer ship visitors from Stella Maris (the Catholic Church's maritime agency formerly known as The Apostleship of the Sea) are there for them. Our support make a big difference to seafarers and fishers in need. Thank you.



Parishioners will be aware that three weeks ago at around 23.50 on Sunday 22nd June there was a fire in the boundary hedge in our Car Park. It is unclear how this started but, most probably, with the recent weather making needle droppings from the fir trees tinder dry a stray cigarette end carelessly cast away could well have been the cause. The fir trees are an extremely resinous species and park) - so two fires in just over two years! It was very fortunate that, the incident being late on a Sunday night, there were no vehicles present except for the school minibus. Any other evening of the week would have seen at least five or six vehicles parked up next to the hedge and then we would have been in the position of

actually end up fuelling any fire dramatically. This latest incident, of course, follows another, two years ago (when re-lining the car possibly having cars exploding! Having had these experiences and given the apparent changes in weather patterns, and with climate scientists telling us that more extreme heat patterns are in our future, leaving planted areas tinder-dry during large parts of the summer, we simply cannot ignore a quite perilous health and safety issue (it would be a dereliction of our duty as responsible land owners). Having thought about possible approaches to the problem Fr Daryl has decided, with the advice of the Parish Finance Committee, to have the present coniferous hedging removed and replaced with a barrier that is fire retardant, withstands 130mph winds (with the Leg 'o' Mutton field adjacent to the car park the wind is frequently very strong), maintenance free, and guaranteed for twenty-five years. The fence has an anti-corrosion technology, which means that scratches will not rust! When scratched, the fence forms a waterproof layer made up of a combination of zinc and aluminium oxides; so even when chipped or damaged during its life there will be no rust! With no footholds and a smooth finish the barrier will deter intruders and maintain the current level of privacy of the car park from the common land. The colour of the barrier will be green to go some way to match the loss of the conifers. This has not been an easy decision to make but it is a necessary one given the circumstances we now find ourselves in.

When the time comes for the works to commence it will obviously be necessary to restrict sections of the car park as the works progress but the works will be completed as quickly as is feasible to limit disruption of the regular use of the car park.

NEW DOCUMENT ON TAXATION FROM THE BISHOPS' CONFERENCE - The Catholic Bishops' Conference of England and Wales (CBCEW) published a new document on taxation on Tuesday. "Render unto Caesar," written by the Bishops' Department for Social Justice, explores the principles that should underpin taxation from a Catholic perspective, taxation and the family, and the moral implications of tax avoidance and tax evasion with contributions from economists, academics, and experts including Anna Rowlands, who has advised the General Secretariat of the Synod of the Catholic Church and the Dicastery for Integral Human Development; and Ruth Kelly, a former Treasury minister and current member of the Vatican Council for the Economy. "Render unto Caesar" aims to help inform government policy by blending moral principles with economic analysis. As well as examining the principles on which a tax system should be based, it examines how they can be applied, given the many challenges Western countries face of ageing populations, changing patterns of family life, increased conflicts, environmental challenges, and the consequent huge fiscal pressures. Speaking as the document was published, Bishop Richard, Chair of the Department for Social Justice, said:

"Sometimes, people ask why the Church should comment on political and economic matters. However, it is important that public policy in all areas of social life is informed by moral principles. The Church teaches that the light of faith, can, and should, help us understand better how to address the challenges facing our society. It is for this reason that we have commissioned a number of experts to offer their analysis of this complex question. We offer this document as a contribution to the process of deliberation that needs to take place amongst all people of goodwill."
