The theme of asking God with boldness for what one needs runs through the first reading and the Gospel today. As a Jewish boy growing up, Jesus would have learned the stories of the many Old Testament figures who were unafraid to ask God directly and boldly for what they wanted: Isaiah, Moses, Hannah, Jeremiah, and here, Abraham, to name just a few. Jesus internalized the message, came before his Father with honestly and boldness ("take this cup from me'''), and taught his disciples they can ask with confidence for what they need too.

For all Christians out there who believe it is selfish to pray for what they want and need, today's Gospel reading challenges that. First, Jesus teaches his disciples, and us, some brief lines we can always use when we don't know what to pray. The Lord's Prayer is a brief summation of praise, openness to God's will, request for what we need, and desire for forgiveness as well as a willingness to forgive. It is a perfect prayer to focus on or to fall back upon when we are otherwise at a loss for how to pray.

Jesus also gives us great freedom in not limiting us to the words of the Our Father. He gives us permission to ask, seek, and knock, without telling us what we can or can't ask for. Fifteen



hundred years later St. Ignatius taught that our deepest desires are also God's deepest desires for us and it is okay to ask for them! General Parish Information













Parishioner Registration : Every household within the Parish is requested to complete a 'Parishioner Registration/Census' form so that our Parish records may be kept up to date. These forms can be obtained from the Parish Office and should be completed fully before being returned to the Parish Office.

Should you move address within the Parish at any time please complete a new form and write 'AMENDMENT' across the top of the form. Thank you.

Hospital : If you are going into hospital as a 'planned admission' you are strongly encouraged to make contact with Fr Daryl well beforehand so that, if appropriate, the Sacrament of the Sick can be celebrated beforehand.

Infant Baptism : Infant Baptisms are intended for the children of practising parishioners only and are celebrated on five occasions during the year after parents and godparents have completed a course of preparation. There can be no celebration without this important course. The dates of the courses for the current year can be found in the application form available from the Parish Office. Baptisms do not take place during the seasons of Advent or Lent.

Sacramental Preparation : Notice of the availability of Application Forms for preparation for First Reconciliation and First Eucharist will be made via the Parish Newsletter between the school Summer Half Term and 31st August each year. Possible candidates for Confirmation should respond to the announcements made via the Parish Newsletter at the beginning of the Autumn school term.

Parishioners are advised that it is very difficult to imagine that any family or individual who is not regularly practising the Faith as members of our community could possibly be ready to celebrate a Sacrament of the Church.

Marriage Preparation : Marriages are celebrated by appointment with the Parish Priest. It should be remembered that in the Diocese of Arundel & Brighton twelve months minimum notice is required before a marriage may take place; this is a requirement of the Church for all marriages that involve a Roman Catholic (even if they are not taking place in the Catholic Church). It is also necessary that one of the parties must have a meaningful connection with the Parish. Marriages do not take place during the seasons of Advent or Lent.

Parish Car Park : <u>All Parishioners</u> attending Mass and using our Car Park need to make sure that they have fully completed our 'Parishioner Registration/ Census Form' (available from the Parish Office) <u>before</u> using the Car Park; this ensures that your current vehicle registration is lodged in the system. Registering only needs to be done once (unless you change your car or if you use another car in the family that is not registered on the system). Important : if you are not registered on the system and you use the car park you will receive a parking notice.

Registered Parishioners and pre-registered visitors are able to park whilst they attend our Masses/liturgies without fear of a charge notice. (Car Park queries - parking@shpcobham.com)

PAGE 6 Lectio Divina Prayer This Week . . .

PRAY LIKE JESUS

Luke 11:1-13

¹One day Jesus was praying in a certain place. When he had finished, one of his disciples said to him, "Lord, teach us to pray, just as John taught his disciples."

²Jesus said to them, "When you pray, say this: 'Father: May your holy name be honoured; may your Kingdom come. ³Give us day by day the food we need. ⁴Forgive us our sins, for we forgive everyone who does us wrong.

And do not bring us to hard testing." ⁵And Jesus said to his disciples, "Suppose one of you should go to a friend's house at midnight and say, 'Friend, let me borrow three loaves of bread. ⁶A friend of mine who is on a journey has just come to my house, and I haven't got any food for him!' ⁷And suppose your friend should answer from inside, 'Don't bother me! The door is already locked, and my children and I are in bed. I can't get up and give you anything.' ⁸Well, what then? I tell you that even if he will not get up and give you the bread because you are his friend, yet he will get up and give you everything you need because you are not ashamed to keep on asking. "And so I say to you: ask, and you will receive; seek, and you will find; knock, and the door will be opened to

you. ¹⁰For all those who ask will receive, and those who seek will find, and the door will be opened to anyone who knocks. ¹¹Would any of you who are fathers give your son a snake when he asks for fish? ¹²Or would you give him a scorpion when he asks for an egg? ¹³Bad as you are, you know how to give good things to your children. How much more, then, will the Father in heaven give the Holy Spirit to those who ask him!"

Other Readings: Genesis 18:20-32; Psalm 138:1-3, 6-8; Colossians 2:12-14

LECTIO:

Prayer is at the heart of today's teaching. The disciples felt their prayers were not up to the mark and asked Jesus to give them some guidance. There are two versions of the Lord's prayer, this one from Luke and Matthew's version (Matthew 6: 9-13). Matthew's version is longer and better known by Christians as it is used in the liturav.

Jesus keeps the prayer quide short and simple. Most importantly he wants the disciples to recognise it's a relationship between Father and child.

The first step is to acknowledge God as our Father recognising his holiness and honouring him. Next we should pray for his Kingdom rule to come. Then we can make any essential requests, for example food for the day, forgiveness of our sins and protection from hard testing.

Jesus didn't intend us to only pray these exact words. Rather they provide us with a framework and guidance on the type of things we should pray about.

The only thing that is subject to any condition is forgiveness. If we do not forgive those who sin against us, then we won't receive forgiveness ourselves.

Jesus goes on to teach about the importance of being persistent in prayer and concludes with the illustration of a father and son. Most human fathers give good things to their children rather than things that are harmful. How much more then will our heavenly father, who knows us perfectly, give us what we need? Of course, sometimes this may mean God not giving us what we ask for because he knows it would be harmful for us.



MEDITATIO:

- What does this passage reveal to us about God and how he wants us to approach him?
- How do you feel about God being your Father?
- How does the condition of forgiving others in order to receive your own forgiveness affect you?
- What is your own experience of prayer? What can you learn from this passage to help you? •

ORATIO:

Pray through these verses from the Lord's prayer. After each line add your own words. Ask the Holy Spirit to help and quide you. Take your time.

CONTEMPLATIO:

Consider today's responsorial verse Psalm 138:3: 'You answered me when I called to you; With your strength you strengthened me.

Mass may be offered for both the living and the dead and also for most other intentions. We do our best to try and accommodate specific dates but this can be especially difficult on weekends and at less than three months notice. 'Mass Intentions' are published in the Parish Newsletter on the weekend before they are celebrated although sometimes a Requiem Mass will 'bump' an intention to a later date.

St Alphonsus Ligouri

Moral theology, Vatican II said, should be more thoroughly nourished by Scripture, showing the nobility of the Christian vocation of the faithful and their obligation to bring forth fruit in charity for the life of the world. Alphonsus, declared patron of moral theologians by Pius XII in 1950, would rejoice in that statement. In his day, Alphonsus fought for the liberation of moral theology from the rigidity of Jansenism. His moral theology, concentrated on the practical and concrete problems of pastors and confessors. If a certain legalism and minimalism crept into moral

theology, it should not be attributed to his model of moderation and gentleness. He founded the Redemptorist congregation in 1732. It was an association of priests and brothers living a common life, dedicated to the imitation of Christ, and working mainly in popular missions for peasants in rural areas. Almost as an omen of what was to come later, he found himself deserted after a while by all his original companions except one lav brother. But the congregation managed to survive and was formally approved seventeen years later, though its troubles

were not over. He was made a bishop when aged 66 after trying to reject the honour, and at once instituted a thorough reform of his diocese. Alphonsus is best known for his moral theology, but he also wrote well in the field of spiritual and dogmatic theology. His *Glories* Mary is one of the great works on that subject, and his book Visits to the Blessed *Sacrament* went through forty editions in his lifetime, greatly influencing the practice of this devotion in the Church.


