A little goes a long way

Although all three readings today seem only superficially related, each implores the readers to persevere with confidence through times of trial. The prophet Habakkuk cries out to God for deliverance in a time of crisis. God responds, not with an immediate rescue, but with a promise that he will ultimately save "the just one." Likewise, St. Paul encourages Timothy to live from the spirit of power, love, and self-control rather than falling back into cowardise. In the Gospol Josus into cowardice. In the Gospel, Jesus reminds the apostles that even a little faith will suffice to do great things. Taken together, the scriptures for the day offer consolation and strength for everyone struggling with the challenges of daily discipleship in an imperfect world.



Travelling with Jesus on the road to Jerusalem, the apostles acknowledge to Jesus that they don't think they have enough faith. Instead of berating them for this, Jesus surprises them with the assurance that even a tiny amount of faith is enough to work miracles. If faith the size of a mustard seed is enough to uproot a mulberry tree, Jesus' followers won't have any excuses for why they can't do great things in his name. In the meantime, while they are praying for greater faith, the disciples can do what they can with what they have. With faith the size of a mustard seed a person can plough, tend sheep, or serve at table and all of those actions can give glory to God. As St. Teresa of Calcutta wrote, we all

have "the opportunity to be come holy through the works of love that we do because holiness is not the luxury of the few. It is a very simple duty for you, for me-you in your position, in your work, and I and others, each one of us in the work" (Where There Is Love, There Is God). How many times do Christians miss opportunities to serve God because the opportunities seem so trivial or commonplace? Or how many times do we not even attempt to do amazing things because we assume we don't have what it takes to make a difference? Jesus doesn't want excuses for not trying.

The second half of the reading changes the subject to the expectations of faithful disciples. We are called to be like servants, going diligently about our work without the expectation of reward (although Jesus promises a reward in other parts of the Gospels). He wants his disciples' motives to be pure-do the work of God because it is right and good, not because it will profit us personally.

Should you move address within the Parish at any time please complete a new form and write 'AMENDMENT' across the top of the form. Thank you.

Hospital: If you are going into hospital as a 'planned admission' you are strongly encouraged to make contact with Fr Daryl well beforehand so that, if appropriate, the Sacrament of the Sick can be celebrated beforehand.

Infant Baptism: Infant Baptisms are intended for the children of practising parishioners only and are celebrated on <u>five</u> occasions during the year after parents and godparents have completed a course of preparation. There can be no celebration without this important course. The dates of the courses for the current year can be found in the application form available from the Parish Office. Baptisms do not take place during the seasons of Advent or Lent.

Sacramental Preparation : Notice of the availability of Application Forms for preparation for First Reconciliation and First Eucharist will be made via the Parish Newsletter between the school Summer Half Term and 31st August each year. Possible candidates for Confirmation should respond to the announcements made via the Parish Newsletter at the beginning of the Autumn school term.

Parishioners are advised that it is very difficult to imagine that any family or individual who is not regularly practising the Faith as members of our community could possibly be ready to celebrate a Sacrament of the Church.

Marriage Preparation: Marriages are celebrated by appointment with the Parish Priest. It should be remembered that in the Diocese of Arundel & Brighton <u>twelve months minimum notice</u> is required before a marriage may take place; this is a requirement of the Church for all marriages that involve a Roman Catholic (even if they are not taking place in the Catholic Church). It is also necessary that one of the parties must have a meaningful connection with the Parish. Marriages do not take place during the seasons of Advent or Lent.

Parish Car Park: All Parishioners attending Mass and using our Car Park need to make sure that they have fully completed our 'Parishioner Registration/ Census Form' (available from the Parish Office) before using the Car Park; this ensures that your current vehicle registration is lodged in the system. Registering only needs to be done once (unless you change your car or if you


use another car in the family that is not registered on the system).

Important: if you are not registered on the system and you use the car park you will receive a parking notice.

Registered Parishioners and pre-registered visitors are able to park whilst they attend our Masses/liturgies without fear of a charge notice. (Car Park queries - parking@shpcobham.com)

Harvest Thanksgiving Mass and Social

On Friday afternoon (it always is!) last week it was noticed that the internet was not working anywhere in the Parish plant. Lectio Divina Prayer This Week . . .

FAITH AND ACTIONS

Luke 17:5-10

 5 The apostles said to the Lord, "Make our faith greater."

⁶The Lord answered, "If you had faith as big as a mustard seed, you could say to this mulberry tree, 'Pull yourself up by the roots and plant yourself in the sea!' and it would obey you.

"Suppose one of you has a servant who is ploughing or looking after the sheep. When he comes in from the field, do you tell him to hurry and eat his meal? Of course not! Instead, you say to him, Get my supper ready, then put on your apron and wait on me while I eat and drink; after that you may have your meal.' The servant does not deserve thanks for obeying orders, does he? 10 It is the same with you; when you have done all you have been told to do, say, 'We are ordinary servants; we have only done our duty."

Other Readings: Habakkuk 1:2-3, 2:2-4; Psalm 95:1-2, 6-9; 2 Timothy 1:6-8, 13-14

LECTIO:

Jesus packs a lot of teaching into these few short sentences. There are two themes: the first two verses concern faith and the later verses are about servanthood.


We begin with the disciples asking for faith. It is helpful to put their request in context. In the verses preceding today's Gospel reading the disciples have had a lesson about forgiveness and the consequence of causing someone else to lose faith. Forgiving someone three times was considered honourable according to Jewish tradition at the time. But Jesus calls his disciples to forgive as often as is needed. The disciples realise that following Jesus will demand far more than they are able to give so they ask for more faith.

Jesus replies that what is important is to have a genuine faith in God. It doesn't matter how small this may be;

whenever genuine faith is present remarkable things can and do happen.

Jesus then talks about the idea of servanthood. The heart of his teaching is that God deserves our service simply because of who he is. God owes us nothing. We owe him everything. The worldly attitude is to expect a reward for what you do. It's a great temptation to expect God to bless us in some way when we serve him. Jesus makes it clear this attitude is wrong. Taking pleasure in serving him out of gratitude and love is all the reward we need.

To be servants of God means above all to be people of faith. Right attitudes in serving God keep us humble and help guard us against pride.



MEDITATIO:

- Which of these verses speak most clearly to you at this point in your life?
- Do you see yourself as God's servant? Think about the reasons why you serve God. Are you satisfied with serving him out of love and gratitude, or do you look for praise from others?
- Spend a little time with your eves fixed on the Lord. Let him soften your heart and draw you close to him so that your faith, service and gratitude may grow.

ORATIO:

Prayerfully consider your response to God from this reading and your meditation.

In today's reading from Paul's letter to Timothy, the apostle encourages the young evangelist to keep alive the gift God gave him. This can speak to us too. Ask the Holy Spirit to nurture these precious gifts of power, love and self control, enabling you to live out your life in humble service to God. The Holy Spirit will also help you endure when times are hard.

CONTEMPLATIO:

Consider this verse from the apostle Paul's letter to the Romans:

'So then, my brothers and sisters, because of God's great mercy to us I appeal to you: offer yourselves as a living sacrifice to God, dedicated to his service and pleasing to him. This is the true worship that you should offer.' Romans 12:1

'Mass Intentions' are published in the Parish Newsletter on the weekend before they are celebrated although sometimes a Requiem Mass will 'bump' an intention to a later date.

St John Henry Newman

St John Henry Newman, the 19th century's most important | *Plain Sermons* as well as two | In 1845, he was received English-speaking Ċatholic theologian, spent the first half of his life as an Anglican and the second half as a Roman Catholic. He was a priest, popular preacher, writer, and I eminent theologian in both churches. Born in London, England, he

studied at Oxford's Trinity College, was a tutor at Oriél College, and for 17 years was vicar of the university church, St Mary the Virgin. He eventually published eight

volumes of *Parochial and* Church that Jesus created. novels. His poem, "Dream of into full communion as a Gerontius," was set to music by Sir Edward Elgar.

After 1833, Newman was a prominent member of the Oxford Movement, which emphasized the Church's debt to the Church Fathers and challenged any tendency to consider truth as completely subjective.

Historical research made Newman suspect that the Roman Catholic Church was in closest continuity with the

Catholic. Two years later he was ordained a Catholic priest in Rome and joined the Congregation of the Oratory, founded three centuries earlier by Saint Philip Neri.

Returning to England, Newman founded Oratory houses in Birmingham and London and for seven years served as rector of the Catholic University Ireland.

NOVEMBER MONTH OF THE DEAD - Traditionally the month of November is dedicated to the Holy Souls in purgatory. The Church commemorates all her faithful children who have departed this life, but have not yet attained the joys of heaven. St Paul warns us that we must not be ignorant concerning the dead, nor sorrowful, "even as others who have no hope for the Lord himself shall come down from heaven and the dead who are in Christ shall rise." The Church has always taught us to pray for those who have gone into eternity. Even in the Old Testament prayers and alms were offered for the souls of the dead by those who thought "well and religiously concerning the resurrection." It was believed that "they who had fallen asleep with godliness had great grace laid up for them" and that "it is therefore a holy and wholesome thought to pray for the dead, that they may be loosed from sins." We know that a defiled soul cannot enter into heaven.

NOVEMBER BOOK OF THE DEAD - As usual Parishioners are invited to complete a 'Dead List' (available in the narthex) for any family or friends who have died since last November. These will then be added to our Parish Book of the Dead which will be placed on the sanctuary throughout November. It is customary for these lists to be accompanied by a Mass Intention for the 'Holy Souls' (the diocese has stipulated that the donation for a Holy Souls Mass is £10). Each weekend during November one of our Masses will be celebrated for the Holy Souls.

MUSIC GROUP REHEARSALS FOR PARISH CAROL SERVICE - Our Music Group is presently practicing for our Parish Carol Service on Sunday 21st December; if you are a musician or someone who likes to sing in a group with others you are warmly welcomed to join the group; Scheduled rehearsals are: Tue. 14th Oct. 19.30, Sat. 25th Oct. 10.30, Tue. 4th Nov. 19.30, Wed. 26th Nov. 19.30, Wed. 10th Dec. 19.30, and Sat. 20th Dec. 10.30.

SPIRITUAL DIRECTION OPEN MORNING - Saturday 11th October, 10.00 - 13.00. Curious about spiritual direction? PRISONERS, FAMILIES, COMMUNITIES: A FRESH START - For over fifty years now, the annual Prisons Week has provided an important focus for Christian communities to pray for the needs of all those affected by prison: prisoners and their families, victims of crime, those working in the criminal justice system, and the many people who are involved in caring for those affected by crime on the inside and outside of our prisons. Prisons week raises awareness and generates prayer. It motivates volunteers to step forward and give their time and talents, in prisons and in their own communities. It also provides an annual focus and reason for Christians to work together, building capacity and motivation to make a difference for people who are out of sight and often out of mind. Our Retiring Collection <u>next weekend</u> is for the work of P.A.C.T. (Prisons Advice and Care Trust).
