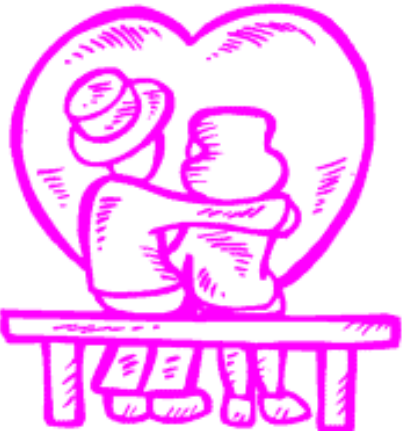

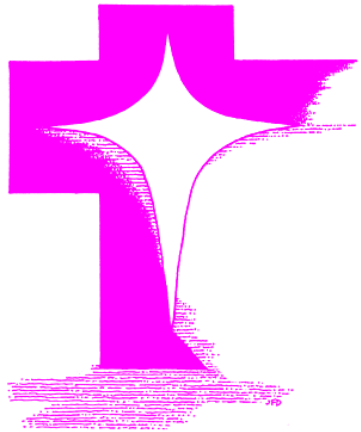

Do you get it ?

After baptizing the crowds who came out to hear him preach in the wilderness, John the Baptist was thrown into jail by Herod. Herod was offended when John called out his adultery with his brother's wife and "all the evil things Herod had done" (Lk 3:19). The age-old practice of the powerful imprisoning the righteous played out again.

We may be puzzled why John is uncertain in this gospel passage about Jesus' identity. Weren't they cousins? Didn't John tell the crowds that Jesus was the Lamb of God when he baptized him? Didn't he tell them that Jesus was the one for whom he was preparing the way? Why the uncertainty now?

John's uncertainty about Jesus mirrored the questions that many Jews had about him. They were expecting a Messiah who would overthrow the Roman occupiers of their day. They were expecting a king who would rule their nation with great power and subdue all their enemies. They



expected a king-military hero. Jesus' way of acting in the world and the company he kept wasn't what the Jews were expecting in a Saviour. Yes, he was doing deeds of amazing power, but he was also hanging out with sinners, eating with tax collectors, and talking with women in public (gasp!). He also wasn't treating the rich and the powerful with special respect. In short, he was a mystery to many. So it's not surprising then that John is unsure just who this Jesus was turning out to be.

By telling John's disciples that John could decide for himself who Jesus was by his actions, Jesus trusted John would "get it." After all, John certainly knew the Old Testament scriptures well and would have recognized the parallels between what Jesus was doing - giving sight to the blind, healing the deaf and the lame, and proclaiming good news to the poor - and the promise from the prophet Isaiah of the wonders God would do?.

Questions of the week . . .

- What are some other examples from history of powerful people imprisoning the truth-tellers?
- When have you met someone who didn't conform to certain cultural or religious expectations but did wonderful, life-giving things?

General Parish Information

Parishioner Registration : Every household within the Parish is requested to complete a 'Parishioner Registration/Census' form so that our Parish records may be kept up to date. These forms can be obtained from the Parish Office and should be completed fully before being returned to the Parish Office.

Should you move address within the Parish at any time please complete a new form and write 'AMENDMENT' across the top of the form. Thank you.

Hospital : If you are going into hospital as a 'planned admission' you are strongly encouraged to make contact with Fr Daryl well beforehand so that, if appropriate, the Sacrament of the Sick can be celebrated beforehand.

Infant Baptism : Infant Baptisms are intended for the children of practising parishioners only and are celebrated on five occasions during the year after parents and godparents have completed a course of preparation. There can be no celebration without this important course. The dates of the courses for the current year can be found in the application form available from the Parish Office. Baptisms do not take place during the seasons of Advent or Lent.

Sacramental Preparation : Notice of the availability of Application Forms for preparation for First Reconciliation and First Eucharist will be made via the Parish Newsletter between the school Summer Half Term and 31st August each year. Possible candidates for Confirmation should respond to the announcements made via the Parish Newsletter at the beginning of the Autumn school term.

Parishioners are advised that it is very difficult to imagine that any family or individual who is not regularly practising the Faith as members of our community could possibly be ready to celebrate a Sacrament of the Church.

Marriage Preparation : Marriages are celebrated by appointment with the Parish Priest. It should be remembered that in the Diocese of Arundel & Brighton twelve months minimum notice is required before a marriage may take place; this is a requirement of the Church for all marriages that involve a Roman Catholic (even if they are not taking place in the Catholic Church). It is also necessary that one of the parties must have a meaningful connection with the Parish. Marriages do not take place during the seasons of Advent or Lent.

Parish Car Park : All Parishioners attending Mass and using our Car Park need to make sure that they have fully completed our 'Parishioner Registration/Census Form' (available from the Parish Office) before using the Car Park; this ensures that your current vehicle registration is lodged in the system. Registering only needs to be done once (unless you change your car or if you use another car in the family that is not registered on the system).

Important : if you are not registered on the system and you use the car park you will receive a parking notice.

Registered Parishioners and pre-registered visitors are able to park whilst they attend our Masses/liturgies without fear of a charge notice.

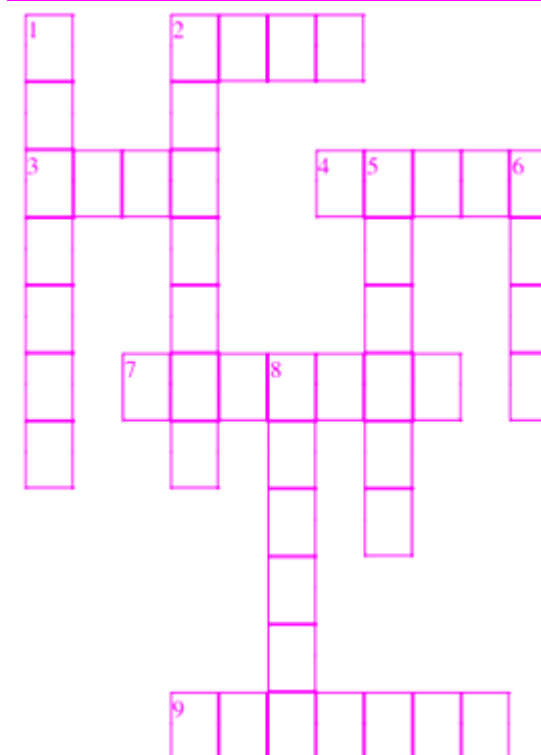

FAITH IN JESUS

Matthew 11:2-11

²When John the Baptist heard in prison about the things that Christ was doing, he sent some of his disciples to him. ³"Tell us," they asked Jesus, "are you the one John said was going to come, or should we expect someone else?"

⁴Jesus answered, "Go back and tell John what you are hearing and seeing: ⁵the blind can see, the lame can walk, those who suffer from dreaded skin diseases are made clean, the deaf hear, the dead are brought back to life, and the Good News is preached to the poor. ⁶How happy are those who have no doubts about me!"

⁷While John's disciples were leaving, Jesus spoke about him to the crowds: "When you went out to John in the desert, what did you expect to see? A blade of grass bending in the wind? ⁸What did you go out to see? A man dressed up in fancy clothes? People who dress like that live in palaces! ⁹Tell me, what did you go out to see? A prophet? Yes indeed, but you saw much more than a prophet. ¹⁰For John is the one of whom the scripture says: 'God said, I will send my messenger ahead of you to open the way for you.' ¹¹I assure you that John the Baptist is greater than anyone who has ever lived. But the one who is least in the Kingdom of heaven is greater than John."

LECTIO:

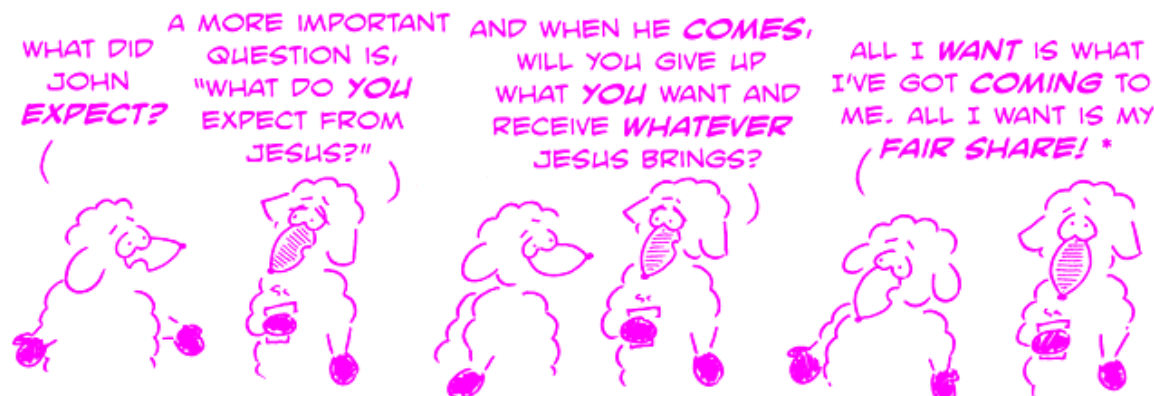
Today's reading focuses on John the Baptist again, not this time in his role preparing the way for the Messiah but rather as a witness to Jesus' Messianic ministry.

John the Baptist is in prison but has been told about what Jesus is doing. He is puzzled. Jesus' actions don't seem to match up with the axe, fire and judgement John had told people the Messiah would bring (see last week's reading in Matthew 3:7-12). Had he made a mistake? Was someone else 'the one who is to come'? So he sends some of his disciples to ask Jesus directly.

Jesus doesn't give a direct answer but tells John's disciples to report the evidence – people are healed, the dead raised to life and the Good News is preached to the poor. He wants John to understand that he is indeed the Messiah and is bringing in the Kingdom of heaven as foretold by Old Testament prophets like Isaiah (see Isaiah 35:5-6, 61:1).

We are not told John's response but Jesus commends his integrity and confirms that John is indeed the 'messenger' sent to prepare the way for the Messiah as prophesied by Malachi (3:1).

John's prophetic role was to denounce sin and call for repentance. The message was the same for everyone – kings, religious leaders, ordinary people – and he was not afraid to speak out. It got him thrown into prison for condemning King Herod's marriage to his brother's wife and ultimately cost him his life (Matthew 14:3-12).

**MEDITATIO:**

- Jesus wants us to grasp who he is for ourselves. Write down who you think Jesus is. You may want to add to this from time to time as Jesus reveals more of himself to you.
- Why do you think people who have no doubts about Jesus are 'happy' (v6)?
- How did John respond when he did not understand what Jesus was doing? What can we learn from this and the answer Jesus gave him?
- John was no blade of grass blowing in the wind. How does the cold wind of criticism or mockery affect you? Can you stand up for your faith?

ORATIO:

God continues to intervene in history and individual lives to bring healing, help and peace. Read Psalm 146 to remind yourself of God's goodness and faithfulness. Use this to offer him your thanks and praise.

Wait before God in prayer. He may prompt you to pray for specific people who need his help and intervention in their lives right now.

CONTEMPLATIO:

Time after time in scripture we read accounts of how God intervenes in people's lives bringing forgiveness, healing and guidance. Spend some time reflecting on the ways God has intervened in your life.

Greater Advent 'O Antiphons'

The "O Antiphons" are prayed for 7 days in preparation for Christmas: December 17–23. For those familiar with the Liturgy of the Hours, these are the antiphons used with the *Magnificat* each day. They are based on Isaiah's prophecies and reveal the different titles given to the Messiah.

Weybridge is the second deanery in Surrey to become a parish in the care of a group of priests working together 'in solidum,' with the priests as a whole - and each priest individually - responsible for the pastoral care of the new Parish.
