It won't last forever

While the first reading and the Gospel connect in theme, as usual, the second reading from the Second Letter to the Thessalonians offers practical advice for any age. We can summarize Paul's words as "Keep busy and mind your own business" as you go about doing God's work in the world.





"Not a hair on your head will be destroyed."

Sheepish Question:

Where do trust and gratitude intersect for me?

Like other "apocalyptic" writings of the time, the first reading from Malachi offers a frightening prophecy of the end times while encouraging the faithful to remain steadfast when awaiting God's justice. Jesus gives more dramatic imagery of the end times but also ends with a note of consolation for the listeners who may be frightened by what is to come. Throughout the Gospels, Jesus

preached about the impermanence of material things: "Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust consume and where thieves break in and steal..." (Mt. 6:19). He consistently reminded his listeners, "life does not consist in the abundance

of possessions" (Lk. 12:15). In today's Gospel, Jesus addresses the crowds upon finally entering Jerusalem and its massive Temple, richly decorated and exquisitely built. The Temple building was the pride and joy of the Jewish people, but Jesus sees it from a much broader perspective. Just like every human-made creation, the Temple will not last forever. It, too, will go the way of other material things: "there will not be left a stone upon another stone that will not be thrown down." Not even the most magnificent building accomplishment of the people can provide ultimate security to humans.

Jesus gives this speech soon before his death. Four decades later, the Temple building was burned and razed by the Romans as they put down a Jewish revolt in a four year, gruesome war. In the end, the Romans slaughtered thousands of Jews and enslayed or expelled thousands more to foreign lands. The brutal defeat of their people and the destruction of the Temple threw the Jewish people into an existential crisis. Certainly, some of those who suffered remembered Jesus' warning of impending destruction and were able to hold out trust that what appeared to be the end of this life was not the final ending.

Questions of the week

- When thinking of Jesus' teachings on the lack of permanence of possessions and material wealth, what is the lesson for you that you most want to remember?
- How do you feel when you hear Jesus' prophecies about the "end times"? Does anything in his words give you consolation or hope?

General Parish Information

Parishioner Registration: Every household within the Parish is requested to complete a 'Parishioner Registration/Census' form so that our Parish records may be kept up to date. These forms can be obtained from the Parish Office and should be completed fully before being returned to the Parish Office.

Should you move address within the Parish at any time please complete a new form and write 'AMENDMENT' across the top of the form. Thank you.

Hospital: If you are going into hospital as a 'planned admission' you are strongly encouraged to make contact with Fr Daryl well beforehand so that, if appropriate, the Sacrament of the Sick can be celebrated beforehand.

Infant Baptism : Infant Baptisms are intended for the children of practising parishioners only and are celebrated on five occasions during the year after parents and godparents have completed a course of preparation. There can be no celebration without this important course. The dates of the courses for the current year can be found in the application form available from the Parish Office. Baptisms do not take place during the seasons of Advent

Sacramental Preparation: Notice of the availability of Application Forms for preparation for First Reconciliation and First Eucharist will be made via the Parish Newsletter between the school Summer Half Term and 31st August each year. Possible candidates for Confirmation should respond to the announcements made via the Parish Newsletter at the beginning of the Autumn school term.

Parishioners are advised that it is very difficult to imagine that any family or individual who is not regularly practising the Faith as members of our community could possibly be ready to celebrate a Sacrament of the Church.

Marriage Preparation: Marriages are celebrated by appointment with the Parish Priest. It should be remembered that in the Diocese of Arundel & Brighton twelve months minimum notice is required before a marriage may take place; this is a requirement of the Church for all marriages that involve a Roman Catholic (even if they are not taking place in the Catholic Church). It is also necessary that one of the parties must have a meaningful connection with the Parish. Marriages do not take place during the seasons of Advent or

Parish Car Park: All Parishioners attending Mass and using our Car Park need to make sure that they have fully completed our 'Parishioner Registration/ Census Form' (available from the Parish Office) <u>before</u> using the Car Park; this ensures that your current vehicle registration is lodged in the system. Registering only needs to be done once (unless you change your car or if you

use another car in the family that is not registered on the system).

Important: if you are not registered on the system and you use the car park you will receive a parking notice.

Registered Parishioners and pre-registered visitors are able to park whilst they attend our Masses/liturgies without fear of a charge notice. (Car Park queries - parking@shpcobham.com)



The Presbytery removed scaffolding from the front band side of the house and moved some of it to the rear in order to work on the bay window roof and the roof over the dining room. These are more complicated roofs as they join up to the building at different levels. The majority of the works should be completed by this weekend (with perhaps some guttering to be addressed at the beginning of next week. Fr D has been delighted by the work that has been done and is glad that we decided to do it eighteen months earlier than scheduled - there were parts of the main roof that had begun to show signs of rot and the tiles on the back of the house were at the point of crumbling (but given that they were all the original tiles from the 1930's they've lasted well and owed us nothing!). Fr D sincerely hopes that the new tiles will last the same ninety years (becoming someone else's problem to deal with!). As



On Tuesday Fr D met with the rest of the deanery clergy, at Our Lady and St Peter's, Leatherhead, for their regular monthly meeting. Increasingly most of the agenda is taken up with the Bishop's Pastoral Plan and how this will be put into effect in our area. During Advent there will be postcards given out in each of the present parishes which parishioners will be asked to complete ready for presentations/questions to be asked at a meeting in each parish to be held in the first two months of 2026. Two teams of clergy/laity have been meeting throughout the Autumn working on the Bishop's plan in our area; it is hoped that these will for the basis of a Parish Leadership Team and a Parish Finance Committee for the new larger Parish of several communities together.

In the evening Fr D gain met with parents of our Reconciliation candidates to look at the work that the children will be doing with their parents on Saturday - this was the penultimate session ready to celebrate First Reconciliation on Saturday 29th November.

Lectio Divina Prayer This Week . . .

STAND FIRM

Luke 21:5-19

Some of the disciples were talking about the Temple, how beautiful it looked with its fine stones and the gifts offered to God. Jesus said, 6"All this you see – the time will come when not a single stone here will be left in its place; every one will be thrown down.

"Teacher," they asked, "when will this be? And what will happen in order to show that the time has come for it

to take place?

 8 Jesus said, "Be on guard; don't be deceived. Many men, claiming to speak for me, will come and say, 'I am he!' and, 'The time has come!' But don't follow them. 9Don't be afraid when you hear of wars and revolutions; such

things must happen first, but they do not mean that the end is near."

10 He went on to say, "Countries will fight each other; kingdoms will attack one another. 11 There will be terrible earthquakes, famines, and plagues everywhere; there will be strange and terrifying things coming from the sky.

12Before all these things take place, however, you will be arrested and persecuted; you will be handed over to be tried in synagogues and be put in prison; you will be brought before kings and rulers for my sake. 13This will be your chance to tell the Good News. 14Make up your minds beforehand not to worry about how you will defend yourselves, 15because I will give you such words and wisdom that none of your enemies will be able to refute or contradict what you say. 16You will be handed over by your parents, your brothers, your relatives, and your friends; and some of you will be put to death. 17Everyone will hate you because of me. 18But not a single hair from your beads will be lost. 10Stand firm, and you will say your service. hair from your heads will be lost. 19Stand firm, and you will save yourselves.

Other Readings: Malachi 3:19-20; Psalm 98:5-9; 2 Thessalonians 3:7-12

LECTIO:

This is Luke's version of Jesus' end of the world, or apocalyptic, teaching. We find similar passages in Matthew and Mark. But each writer emphasises different aspects of Jesus' teaching according to the needs of their particular community.

Luke writes to those living away from Palestine. It was a time of war with Rome. Luke probably wrote his Gospel after Jerusalem and the temple were destroyed by the Romans in AD 70. This part of Jesus' prophetic words would therefore already have been fulfilled when the early Christians read Luke's account.

In addition to prophesying the destruction of Jerusalem and the persecution of the early Christian church, Jesus also makes a link to the end of the world (verses 10-11, 25-36). So his warnings remain equally important for us today – when persecution comes because of our faith, don't be surprised. Jesus has warned us in advance, persecution is to be expected.

And if persecution comes knocking at our door we need to stand firm. We must endure, remain patient and stand firm. God is still with us even if family or friends reject or betray us.

Luke knew about the reality of persecution. By the time he wrote his Gospel Peter and Paul had been killed as

had many other Christians.

Jesus' words are a reminder that persecution happens and takes many forms. It is a practical fact in many parts of the world today. Some Christians are driven from their homes, their jobs and some lose their lives. The message is still the same: stand firm. God loves you and will not abandon you.



MEDITATIO:

- What types of persecution have you experienced because of your faith?
- Perhaps you have been insulted, embarrassed or ridiculed. How do you react in these situations? What did you say or do? How did you bear witness to Jesus?

ORATIO:

Pray that God will give you the courage and strength to stand firm in the face of any persecution that might come your way so that you bear a good witness to God.

Pray for Christians living in countries where persecution is severe. Pray for those who are in prison because of their faith or who have been rejected by their families.

CONTEMPLATIO:

"... sing together with joy before the Lord, because he comes to rule the earth. He will rule the peoples of the world with justice and fairness.' Psalm 98:8b-9 Read the rest of Psalm 98 and spend some time reflecting on God's mighty power and justice.

accommodate specific dates but this can be especially difficult on weekends and at less than three months notice.

'Mass Intentions' are published in the Parish Newsletter on the weekend before they are celebrated although sometimes a Requiem Mass will 'bump' an intention to a later date.

St Cecilia

Although Saint Cecilia is one Roman martyrs, the familiar stories told about her are apparently not founded on authentic material. There is no trace of honour being paid her in early times.

A fragmentary inscription of the late fourth century refers to a church named after her, I and her feast was celebrated at least in 545.

According to legend, Cecilia was a young Christian of high rank betrothed to a Roman named Valerian. Through her

influence, Valerian of the most famous of the converted, and was martyred along with his brother. The legend about Cecilia's death says that after being struck three times on the neck with a sword, she lived for three days, and asked the pope to convert her home into a church.

Since the time of the Renaissance she has usually been portrayed with a viola or a small organ.

Like any good Christian, Saint Cecilia sang in her heart, and sometimes with her voice.

She has become a symbol of the Church's conviction that good music is an integral part of the liturgy, of greater value to the Church than any other art.
