Common suffering



The account of the healing of the foreign leper Naaman in the Second Book of Kings is matched to the story of Jesus healing ten lepers, including one foreigner (the Samaritan) in the Gospel today. Both tell of the desperate plight of the outcast men who are willing to do anything, even follow the commands of someone they had never met who was from another country or religion, in the hopes of being cured. Both converted to the worship of God when they experienced his power in their healing. Both are willing to proclaim their new allegiance loud and clear for all to hear.

As the Gospel reading unfolds, Jesus is traveling through a region where Jews and Samaritans generally lived segregated lives because of their distaste for the others' religious practices. Although both groups shared a distant, common religious history, they suffered a divisive break which left the two groups embittered with each other.

In those times, the disease of leprosy was such a curse that lepers were forced to remain outside of regular society lest they infect others with their sickness. Even if their skin disease was not contagious, having leprosy was a mark of being unclean and so "unholy." For a leper to come into contact with a clean person would automatically render that person unclean too. That is why the ten lepers stood at a

distance from Jesus. Following the legal requirements, they shouted to get his attention, thereby warning him not to come into physical contact with them and get contaminated. In this case, the social effects of the disease brought together ten Jews and Samaritans whose common suffering overcame their religious and ethnic conflicts.

Like Naaman, the foreigner healed of leprosy in the first reading, the Samaritan leper here is humble enough to seek out and accept healing from his people's "enemy." Not only that, but both Naaman and the Samaritan lepers enthusiastically embrace the God who has healed them. They respond by boldly and publicly proclaiming their new belief.



"Has none but this foreigner returned to give thanks to God?"

General Parish Information

Parishioner Registration : Every household within the Parish is requested to complete a 'Parishioner Registration/Census' form so that our Parish records may be kept up to date. These forms can be obtained from the Parish Office and should be completed fully before being returned to the Parish Office.

Should you move address within the Parish at any time please complete a new form and write 'AMENDMENT' across the top of the form. Thank you.

Hospital : If you are going into hospital as a 'planned admission' you are strongly encouraged to make contact with Fr Daryl well beforehand so that, if appropriate, the Sacrament of the Sick can be celebrated beforehand.

Infant Baptism : Infant Baptisms are intended for the children of practising parishioners only and are celebrated on five occasions during the year after parents and godparents have completed a course of preparation. There can be no celebration without this important course. The dates of the courses for the current year can be found in the application form available from the Parish Office. Baptisms do not take place during the seasons of Advent or Lent.

Sacramental Preparation : Notice of the availability of Application Forms for preparation for First Reconciliation and First Eucharist will be made via the Parish Newsletter between the school Summer Half Term and 31st August each year. Possible candidates for Confirmation should respond to the announcements made via the Parish Newsletter at the beginning of the Autumn school term.

Parishioners are advised that it is very difficult to imagine that any family or individual who is not regularly practising the Faith as members of our community could possibly be ready to celebrate a Sacrament of the Church.

Marriage Preparation : Marriages are celebrated by appointment with the Parish Priest. It should be remembered that in the Diocese of Arundel & Brighton twelve months minimum notice is required before a marriage may take place; this is a requirement of the Church for all marriages that involve a Roman Catholic (even if they are not taking place in the Catholic Church). It is also necessary that one of the parties must have a meaningful connection with the Parish. Marriages do not take place during the seasons of Advent or Lent.

Parish Car Park : All Parishioners attending Mass and using our Car Park need to make sure that they have fully completed our 'Parishioner Registration/Census Form' (available from the Parish Office) before using the Car Park; this ensures that your current vehicle registration is lodged in the system. Registering only needs to be done once (unless you change your car or if you use another car in the family that is not registered on the system).

Important : if you are not registered on the system and you use the car park you will receive a parking notice. Registered Parishioners and pre-registered visitors are able to park whilst they attend our Masses/liturgies without fear of a charge notice. (Car Park queries - parking@shpcobham.com)

NOTE : the Car Park does not use QR codes any found are **scams!**

ALWAYS BE THANKFUL

Luke 17:11-19
¹¹As Jesus made his way to Jerusalem, he went along the border between Samaria and Galilee. ¹²He was going into a village when he was met by ten men suffering from a dreaded skin disease. They stood at a distance ¹³and shouted, "Jesus! Master! Take pity on us!"
¹⁴Jesus saw them and said to them, "Go and let the priests examine you."
On the way they were made clean. ¹⁵When one of them saw that he was healed, he came back, praising God in a loud voice. ¹⁶He threw himself to the ground at Jesus' feet and thanked him. The man was a Samaritan.
¹⁷Jesus said, "There were ten men who were healed; where are the other nine? ¹⁸Why is this foreigner the only one who came back to give thanks to God?" ¹⁹And Jesus said to him, "Get up and go; your faith has made you well."

Other Readings: 2 Kings 5:14-17; Psalm 98:1-4; 2 Timothy 2:8-13

LECTIO:
In today's Gospel reading Jesus gives us an important lesson in being thankful for God's blessings. Jesus is on his way to Jerusalem to face his crucifixion and resurrection. Standing at a distance on the outskirts of a village ten men with a dreaded skin disease cry out to him, 'Jesus! Master! Take pity on us!' (verse 13). The plight of people suffering from leprosy and other skin diseases in Jesus' day was very harsh indeed. They were forced to leave their family and friends and live in exile away from the rest of the community. They had to fend for themselves alongside others in the same condition. They were cut off from the religious life of the community and considered 'spiritually unclean'. Some even believed that their disease was a punishment from God. Their situation was miserable, their prospects were bleak and there was little hope. The only way back to a normal life was if the skin disease cleared up and the priests certified it. No wonder these men cried to Jesus for help. Jesus simply tells them to let the priests examine them. They all obey Jesus' instructions and on the way to the priests the miracle takes place. All ten are healed. As soon as one of the group discovers he has been healed he rushes back to thank Jesus and give praise to God. Did he talk to the other nine before returning? We are not told. But we are told that this man was a Samaritan. The other nine were presumably all Jewish. Jesus was a Jewish teacher. The Jews looked down on the Samaritans and regarded them as religious heretics. The very person they would have least expected to show his gratitude is in fact the only one who gives thanks to God. Jesus' final words to the Samaritan are significant. The word translated 'Get up' has several meanings; early Christians would have understood a reference to resurrection or new life. Ten lepers were healed but only the Samaritan is told his faith has made him well. Perhaps Jesus is referring to spiritual as well as physical healing.



MEDITATIO:

- How does this passage speak to you?
- Why do you think the nine that were also healed didn't return to thank Jesus? Have you ever received an answer to prayer but forgot to thank God before doing anything else?
- How can we avoid taking God's blessings for granted? Is there a danger that we can sometimes feel we 'deserve' God's blessing because of something we have done?

ORATIO:
Think about all the ways God has been good to you. Write them down and read your list through each day this week. Respond to God with thanks and praise. The Holy Spirit may well remind you of more things as the week progresses. Ask God to help you to always be grateful for all he has done in your life. Choose a Psalm each day this week to help you express your praise to God.

CONTEMPLATIO:
Consider these verses from Philippians 4:4, 6-7:
'May you always be joyful in your union with the Lord. I say it again: rejoice! Don't worry about anything, but in all your prayers ask God for what you need, always asking him with a thankful heart. And God's peace, which is far beyond human understanding, will keep your hearts and minds safe in union with Christ Jesus.'

Mass may be offered for both the living and the dead and also for most other intentions. We do our best to try and accommodate specific dates but this can be especially difficult on weekends and at less than three months notice. 'Mass Intentions' are published in the Parish Newsletter on the weekend before they are celebrated although sometimes a Requiem Mass will 'bump' an intention to a later date.

St Teresa of Avila

St Teresa of Avila lived in an age of exploration as well as political, social, and religious upheaval. It was the 16th century, a time of turmoil and reform. She was born before the Protestant Reformation and died almost 20 years after the closing of the Council of Trent. The gift of God to Teresa in and through which she became holy and left her mark on the Church and the world is threefold: She was a woman; a contemplative; and an active reformer. As a woman, St Teresa of Avila stood on her own two feet, even in the man's world of her time. She was "her own woman,"

entering the Carmelites despite strong opposition from family. She is a person wrapped not so much in silence as in mystery. Beautiful, talented, enthusiastic, courageous, adaptable, and affectionate, she was totally human. Like Jesus, she was a mystery of paradoxes: wise, yet practical; intelligent, yet much in tune with her experience; a mystic, but also an energetic reformer; a holy woman and a womanly woman. Teresa was a woman "for God," a woman of prayer, discipline, and compassion. Her heart belonged to God. Her ongoing conversion was an arduous

lifelong struggle, involving ongoing purification and suffering. Misunderstood, misjudged, and opposed in her efforts at reform. Yet she struggled on, courageous and faithful; she struggled with her own mediocrity, her illness, her opposition. And in the midst of all this she clung to God in life and in prayer. Her writings on prayer and contemplation are drawn from her experience: powerful, practical, and graceful. She was a woman of prayer; a woman for God.

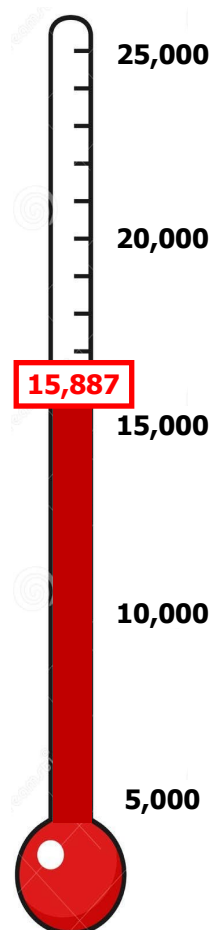

PRISONERS, FAMILIES, COMMUNITIES: A FRESH START - For over fifty years now, the annual Prisons Week has provided an important focus for Christian communities to pray for the needs of all those affected by prison: prisoners and their families, victims of crime, those working in the criminal justice system, and the many people who are involved in caring for those affected by crime on the inside and outside of our prisons. Prisons week raises awareness and generates prayer. It motivates volunteers to step forward and give their time and talents, in prisons and in their own communities. It also provides an annual focus and reason for Christians to work together, building capacity and motivation to make a difference for people who are out of sight and often out of mind. Our Retiring Collection this weekend is for the work of P.A.C.T. (Prisons Advice and Care Trust).

WORLD MISSIONS SUNDAY - Next weekend our Retiring Collection will be the annual one for the Pope's own missionary society the Association for the Propagation of the Faith (now known as Missio). Last year Missio raised £5.6 million in England and Wales, helped 30,000 of the world's poorest children, and trained 1,751 seminarians on the way to becoming priests.

CHRISTMAS BAZAAR GRAND DRAW TICKETS - If you were not able to collect Christmas Grand Draw Tickets after Mass over the last two weekends please make a point of collecting them as you leave Mass this weekend. ALL parishioners are being asked to take four books of tickets to try and sell to family, friends, and work colleagues over the next few weeks before the 'big event.' The Grand Draw is the major 'money spinner' of the Bazaar and we hope to have sold as many tickets as possible before the doors open on the day; this is also a way of everyone in our community getting involved! Don't forget that if you are the seller of the first prize ticket (and you have correctly filled in the ticket stub) you too will win a prize!

NOVEMBER MONTH OF THE DEAD - Traditionally the month of November is dedicated to the Holy Souls in purgatory. The Church commemorates all her faithful children who have departed this life, but have not yet attained the joys of heaven. St Paul warns us that we must not be ignorant concerning the dead, nor sorrowful, "even as others who have no hope for the Lord himself shall come down from heaven and the dead who are in Christ shall rise." The Church has always taught us to pray for those who have gone into eternity. Even in the Old Testament prayers and alms were offered for the souls of the dead by those who thought "well and religiously concerning the resurrection." It was believed that "they who had fallen asleep with godliness had great grace laid up for them" and that "it is therefore a holy and wholesome thought to pray for the dead, that they may be loosed from sins." We know that a defiled soul cannot enter into heaven.

NOVEMBER BOOK OF THE DEAD - As usual Parishioners are invited to complete a 'Dead List' (available in the narthex) for any family or friends who have died since last November. These will then be added to our Parish Book of the Dead which will be placed on the sanctuary throughout November. It is customary for these lists to be accompanied by a Mass Intention for the 'Holy Souls' (the diocese has stipulated that the donation for a Holy Souls Mass is £10). Each weekend during November one of our Masses will be celebrated for the Holy Souls.

NOVEMBER BLESSING OF GRAVES - Our annual Blessing of Graves will take place on Sunday 9th November at 15.30 (Cobham Cemetery). Please put the date in your diaries now.

MUSIC GROUP REHEARSALS FOR PARISH CAROL SERVICE - Our Music Group is presently practicing for our Parish Carol Service on Sunday 21st December; if you are a musician or someone who likes to sing in a group with others you are warmly welcomed to join the group; Scheduled rehearsals are: Tue. 14th Oct. 19.30, Sat. 25th Oct. 10.30, Tue. 4th Nov. 19.30, Wed. 26th Nov. 19.30, Wed. 10th Dec. 19.30, and Sat. 20th Dec. 10.30.
