Marrying two cabinet textures as well as two counter and island surfaces is possible. The cooking area, the washing area, and the working area can be defined based upon their use. We will give each a different look to bring a little pizzazz to the atmosphere.

We can use free movement furniture half-moon for example - and mix straight lines. This way, nothing will look too much alike. Not only should we be trendy, but the idea is to be very creative and flexible.

Ventilation will be much more linear, zen looking and sophisticated. We let it disappear and make it part of the decoration elements.

We will treat the kitchen, the living-room and the dining-room as a single room, the central point of the house.

It is important, to start with a plan: define the space of every element, choose materials and tone, and make sure everything will marry well once we're done.
