It truly is amazing to see the 77 garden beds in full bloom. So much effort and time is put into each garden bed. When the gardens are ready to be harvested, the gardeners set up a "Gardeners Market" every Friday morning in the North East Campus parking lot. Donations are accepted in exchange for the produce. Any leftover produce is given to the Castle Town Center Bistro and the Rockford Rescue Mission. Proceeds from this market benefit the Good Samaritan Endowment Fund at Wesley Willows.



The popularity of the gardens has grown so much that residents wanted a walking path installed from the Castle Town Center to the Community Garden parking lot. This blacktop path will make the gardens easily accessible for all of our residents to travel from the Castle Town Center to the gardens.

STRATEGIC PLAN, 2020

The Board of Trustees and staff are in the trenches working on four strategic areas of focus for Wesley Willows. The purpose of strategic planning is to clarify a vision, set overall goals for our organization, and to develop a plan to achieve them.

The four areas of concentration are as follows:

- 1. **Information Technology:** Are we current with our technology needs and how do we prepare for future growth.
- 2. Succession Planning: The CEO, COO, and CFO are all with-in 4-6 years of retirement. How do we address these changes in leadership?
- 3. Finalize Skilled Nursing Plan: Determine what the best use of Willows Hunt Terrace, Willows Arbor and Hunt Terrace will be in the future.
- 4. **Pricing, Marketing, and Demographics:** Develop a plan for how to utilize the current campus and amenities and what needs to be done to keep them marketable. What does data tell us about how to proceed in the expansion of the WW campus.
